LIKE CRUNCHING NUMBERS AND FIGHTING CRIME?

The Metro Law Enforcement Program may be right for you.

Graduate accounting students at Anderson have an opportunity to work with the white collar crime unit of either the Albuquerque Police Department or the Bernalillo County Sheriff's Department. This 3-credit accounting elective is offered on a limited basis each fall and spring. Students are required to complete an application, be interviewed both internally (UNM) and externally (APD or BCSO) and have a background check. Selected students will then serve as an intern for an entire semester working 7 - 9 hours per week with one of the law enforcement agencies. UNM Technology Business Plan Competition

On Friday, April 11, Anderson will host the third-annual UNM Technology Business Plan Competition Awards Reception and Banquet. It will take place from 6:00 - 9:00 p.m. at the DoubleTree Hotel, located at 201 Marquette NW. This year, we will award \$40,000 in prize money to students looking to form their own high-tech startups in New Mexico. These awards are the Michael Gallegos Prize for Entrepreneurship (\$25,000), the TVC Lockheed Martin Prize (\$10,000), and the vSpring Capital Prize (\$5,000). Venture capital partners have also offered more than \$100,000 in seed funding as incentives for our teams. More faculty are involved in mentoring our budding entrepreneurs than ever before, and the field of competitors promises to be our strongest yet.

Julie Walleisa, USGBC board member and D/P/S architect, will speak on the effect of commercial building design on both worker productivity and a company's financial performance. Julie will also explain the significance of LEED certification and what makes Jefferson Green a Gold building. Learn more from one of the region's leading green building experts.

Jefferson Green has set a new standard for sustainable design in New Mexico. The building uses 30% less water and 45% less energy than a typical office building. It features an under-floor air distribution system, advanced glazing and shading, operable windows, energy efficient lighting, low-flow plumbing fixtures, and a variety of recycled, regional, and low-emitting materials. Question: I took a lot of courses with the "BA" prefix for my Associate's Degree from CNM. Do any of these transfer to the BBA program?

Answer: Because of accreditation guidelines, there are only a few courses from CNM's Pre-Management program that transfer to the BBA program at Anderson. BA 150 is accepted as CS 150, provided it has been completed within the past 5 years. If you completed this class more than 5 years ago, you will need to take the CS 150 waiver exam. BA 133 and BA 113 may be used for free elective credit. BA 211 is the only course from CNM that transfers as an upper-level management course, provided it has been taken within the past 5 years; it transfers to UNM as MGMT 310 and counts towards the management core. BA 222 cannot be used for free elective credit if you are in the BBA program, as you'll be taking MGMT 322 Marketing Management as part of the management core.
