UNM News Minute #289 - November 9, 2005

1. DR. PAUL ROTH, interim executive vice president for Health Sciences, and dean of the School of Medicine, accepted the gavel Monday in Washington, D.C., at the national meeting of the Association of American Medical Colleges as chair of the AAMC's Council of Deans. Roth was selected chair-elect in 2004. The AAMC represents the 125 accredited U.S. M.D.-granting medical schools and the 17 accredited Canadian medical schools.

2. THE UNIVERSITY OF NEW MEXICO Foundation surpassed its overall fund-raising goal of \$43.4 million by raising more than \$43.5 million, an all-time high, for fiscal year 2004-05. The amount represents an increase of approximately \$1.8 million over the \$41.8 million raised in fiscal year 2003-04 and exceeds the previous benchmark of more than \$42 million established in 2002-03.

Chief Information Officer Bill Adkins has announced an initiative to migrate 2,500 main campus Oracle Corporate Time calendar users to Groupwise, currently used by 8,000 main and north campus users.
