UNM ANTHROPOLOGIST Bruce Huckell and a former graduate student, David Kilby, now a professor of Anthropology at Eastern New Mexico University, are researching a Clovis culture site, something fairly rare. Many Clovis sites were temporary camps where the hunters who traveled throughout North and Central America about 13,000 years ago stopped to kill and butcher large animals such as mammoths and bison, repair and replace stone tools, and conduct other necessary tasks. Huckell has explored Clovis sites in Arizona in the past and never expected to travel to North Dakota, but this site was different. <u>http://news.unm.edu/?p=6887</u>
