Student Veterans Will Get Payment November Tenth

The Veterans Administration Regional Office in Albuquerque is now processing the enrollment of UNM veterans for the fall term.

Enrollments this year are predominantly under the provisions of Public Law 550 and the extremely large number of veterans enrolling under this law has caused a temporary backlog in the vocational rehabilitation and education and finance divisions of the VA regional office.

However, both of these Divisions are working overtime and on Saturdays to expedite paying the veteran students and trainees their training allowance.

All payments due will be made by November 10th, and thereafter on the 20th of each month as provided by law.

Veterans were asked not to inquire at the VA about their training allowance until after November 10th. If they have not received their September check by that time they should contact the VA immediately.

Kappa Mu Epsilon Will Show Film

Members of Kappa Mu Epsilon, mathematics honorary, will be shown the film "UniVec" at their 7:30 p.m. meeting tomorrow in Mitchell hall 122. The film explains the operation of an electronic computer.

Dr. Ried said he hoped the fraternities and sororities would follow the lead of the Kappa Sigma Spirit Day in aiding the drive by student activities. All such organizations have been contacted, but no further activities have been announced.

All University students are eligible to try for a position in the three-act comedy. Several parts for both men and women are open in the play. It features the escapades of three escaped convicts who take over a household and straighten out love affairs, bolster family finances, and dispose of two unwanted gentlemen in a delicate and foolproof manner.

500 Annual Proofs Still Unreturned

Wolfpack Fails to Check Cowpoke's Bid for Crown

New Mexico's Lobos settle down to almost a full week of drills as they start preparing for a powerful Arizona invasion next Saturday afternoon on Zimmerman Field.

The Lobos will try to capture the elusive Kit Carson rifle, the winner's trophy, which Arizona has held for seven and a half years, to New Mexico's two and a half.

Cheerleaders For Freshman Team Chosen

The new freshman cheerleaders, selected last Thursday night in the SUB, are: Martha Bengé, Sue Harris, Carol Robbins, Charlotte Stevens, and Wendy Woods.

Marilyn Smally was selected as alternate by the seven judges. The judges were the student body president, past and present RallyCom presidents, and four past and present cheerleaders.

Twenty-three women and no men tried out for the positions, said Sally Stringer, RallyCom member in charge of the tryouts. The tryouts were sponsored by RallyCom, the student spirit organization. There were more than 100 people in the SUB ballroom to cheer the candidates on, she said.

The first freshman football home game will be Nov. 5 against Denver University freshmen. The frosh football team has three games scheduled, two at home.

Fulbright Applicants Have Deadline Soon

Applicants for the Fulbright and Buenos Aires convention programs must apply to Graduate Dean Edward F. Castetter before Nov. 1.

The programs allow graduate students to obtain awards to be used for college education in foreign countries. Applicants must be United States citizens, in good health, holding a college degree or its equivalent at the time the award is to be taken up, and must have a knowledge of the language of the foreign country in which the proposed study is to be conducted.

Students may obtain information about the programs from Dean Castetter, and may write for descriptive brochures to the Institute of International Education, 1 East 67th street, New York 21, N.Y.

Dear Editor:

Your ideas on voting are not contrary to mine, but your methods seem to hold a tendency toward leading people to false conclusions. This is done by misleading statistics. I refer to your editorial in the 14 October issue.

You say, "(as) we predicted . . . the freshmen . . . cast more votes than any other class. . . . Outnumbering the combined senior and junior ballots, and rolling up 101 more (votes) than the sophomore class."

So what??? These quantities mean nothing by themselves. From the observation that the freshmen make up about 40 percent of the class-divided student body, they certainly would cast the greatest number of votes. But, percent-wise, the freshmen made the poorest showing of the four classes. Why didn't you put that in your paper? On the other hand, the seniors made the best showing with almost one-third of all eligible, voting.

I can come to several conclusions as to why you didn't put this kind of information in your paper: 1) the editor knows nothing of a method of presenting reputable, functional statistics, 2) the editor would like to stir up class "patriotism" so as to turn out a larger vote, 3) the editor has a poor ghost writer. Which one is it? Or didn't I get it?

I'm not a "Disgusted," nor am I a "Peeved." But I'd sure as hell like to see some decent basis for your presentation of a "logical" editorial.

Truly, your editorial topic, "A Multitude of Nothing" is an apt one.

UNM Air ROTC Grad Earns Jet Pilot Wings

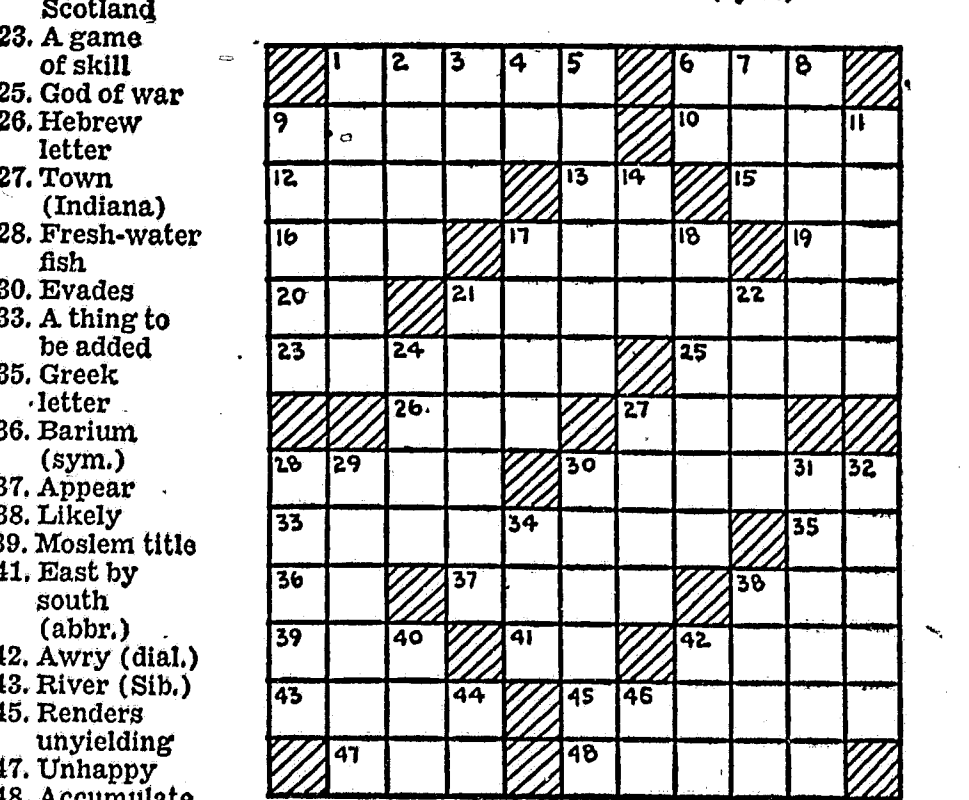

Opening up late in the game with an effective spread formation, the Whites overcame the deficit and then pulled away as two long touchdown passes from quarterback Jerry Huckabee to end Erwin Thomson proved to be the turning point.

Larry White was unanimous selection for lineman of the game, after displaying play that would name him to anybody's all-American squad. Mastrogiovanni, because of his late save and game winning pass thrust, rates "back of the day" honors.

Wyoming Leads Conference

Next week Wyoming slugs it out with Utah for the feature of the 'Pokes homecoming celebration.

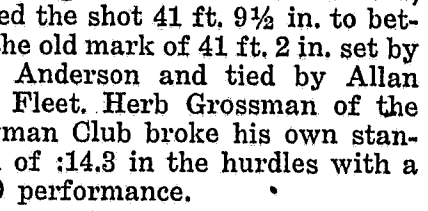

Winnifred Matthews will report on the national convention of Phi Sigma, which was held last August in Florida.




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
