STOREHOUSE OF STORMS

From pre-Columbian times through the Spanish centuries, the Revolution, and to the present, Chihuahua, the largest and most prosperous state in Mexico, has had a rich and romantic history. Ciudad Juárez, Mexico's fourth largest city and busiest port of entry, is just across the Rio Grande from El Paso; due south is the capital city of Chihuahua.

Archaeology reveals the lives of the ancient inhabitants, those of the Casas Grandes and the mountain tribes. Linking the ancient and the modern are the primitive Tarahumaras. There were heroes: Coronado and his Southwestern expedition, Father Hidalgo, Benito Juárez escaping from Maximilian's grenadiers. In Chihuahua, Pancho Villa began and ended, mowed down by assassins. The gold and silver of the Sierra are importantly Chihuahua's story, as are the great herds of cattle, the inland empires, the rise of modern industry and agriculture, the harnessing of water power.

Robert Lister, professor of archaeology at the University of Colorado, has published over sixty reports, monographs and articles which resulted from his field trips and research. Mrs. Lister, co-author of *Chihuahua*, accompanied her husband on their latest expedition to the Sudan where they were engaged with others in the colossal salvage at the Aswan Dam.
