Mission

El Centro de la Raza, a department of the Division of Student Affairs, at the University of New Mexico (UNM) provides tools for self-determination, personal responsibility and resiliency to UNM Latino/Hispanic students. We support the transformation of students through knowledge and skills, while challenging systems to achieve social justice. In engaging the community, El Centro continues the legacy of advocacy, holistic support and partnerships.

Vision

El Centro de la Raza serves as an agent of change to provide state of the art student services, programs, research and educational opportunities to support social, cultural, economic and political sustainability in New Mexican communities.

2014-2015 Goals

- El Centro will positively impact retention and graduation of undergraduate and graduate/professional students through academic, cultural/personal and professional activities designed to build a sense of community and a supportive environment.
- El Centro will recruit Latino students and provide information to Latino students and their families about UNM and El Centro programs/activities.
- El Centro will use program evaluation and assess the data for continuous improvement and to ensure its relevance in academic, cultural and professional aspirations of Raza/Latino students.

Impact on Students

El Centro's strategic direction and the impact it has on UNM students are defined by meeting present and future challenges that our student population and communities face. El Centro is meeting these needs by creating specific academic and research programming, professional development opportunities, support services, mentoring and strategic relationships that benefit UNM students. Understanding the difficulties that Latino/Hispanic students experience navigating through the university system and the need to advocate and serve this growing population, El Centro de la Raza serves as a bridge and a support system so Latino/Hispanic students graduate and/or move on to professional careers or to graduate school. Throughout its 45 years of existence, El Centro has served as a bridge and a support system so Latino/Hispanic students can reach their highest potential. Understanding the difficulties that Latino/Hispanic students experience navigating through the university system and the need to advocate for Latino/Hispanic students, El Centro will continue to serve as a place where advocacy, mentorship, and professional advising is conducted to provide guidance and support to our Latino/Hispanic students at UNM. According to census data Latino/Hispanic population constitutes 46% of the population of New Mexico, and by the year 2050 the Latino population will become an absolute majority in the US. The growth of the Latino population means that the need to serve this population will increase in the way that is proportional both to population increase and the services this population will need. Similarly, programs and services that are particularly tailored for Latino/Hispanic students will need to correlate with the needs of industry and local

communities to ensure that our population of students is competitive in engineering, health, management, and social science fields so that our program supports the economic and social needs of our larger community by creating special opportunities in mentoring, academics, social entrepreneurship, advocacy, internships and scholarships. El Centro is instrumental to student success by building strategic partnerships and supporting the development of new leaders for the future of the Latino/Hispanic community. In order to address this need, El Centro promotes indigenous models of sustainable community development, innovation, and social entrepreneurship to enhance the education of our students. Our special programs are intended to reinforce High Impact Practices and Activities that enhance student transformational learning, increase retention rates and provide clear pathways to graduate and professional education. El Centro has partnerships with over 100 community organizations locally and from across the state of New Mexico. It also fosters relationships with UNM public service and academic departments, and indirectly serves K-12 schools. El Centro sponsors students, staff, and faculty to participate in academic and professional conferences across the nation, and its now creating specific relationships with universities in Latin America and Mexico to provide Latino/Hispanic students with special programs abroad through very specific and targeted programs.

The target population for El Centro's programs is the Latino/Hispanic student body, although El Centro is inclusive and supports all students on campus. El Centro serves undergraduate students, graduate students, and professional students, including our larger community.


