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## Gerald Dalies Meets Fatal Accident

Gerald, the twelve-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. P. B. Dalies was killed last Sunday by the accidental discharge of a small rifle at the home of his parents in Belen. With his younger brother, and sister, he had returned from Sundayschool and was playing about the house. Whether the gun was in the hands of the little brother or whether it was leaning against the wall, when discharged will forever remain a mystery. As Gerald came through the door, the gun was discharged the bullet entering his throat, and ranging upward, passed through the neck, and into the wall beyond. The jugular vein and spinal chord were both severed, and the limp body fell to the floor. The little brother rushed to the church, where the parents were attending services, and reported the accident. Upon arriving home, the father tried to revive the son, who was already gasping for breath, but in vain. Ere the arrival of a physician, the little spirit had fled to its Maker.

Gerald was a bright, manly little fellow, the pride of his parents, and friends to whom ever he met. He ranked well in his classes in school, where he will be missed by his numerous playmates. His teachers and his pastor speak of him in only words of praise.

The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon, being conducted by the Rev. John A. M. Ziegler, pastor of the Evangelical Lutheran Church, interment being in the Belen Cemetery. The church was crowded with friends of the afflicted family, who came to show their sympathy for the sudden and awful bereavement. The funeral cortege was one of the longest ever witnessed in Belen, in spite of the cold.

He was in the sixth grade in school and a member of the Lutheran Sundayschool and a junior member of the Lutheran League. The entire community deeply sympathizes with Mr. and Mrs. Dalies in his untimely death.

## Belen in Grip of Cold Weather

Sunday afternoon and Monday were about as disagreeable days as are often witnessed by inhabitants of this (usually) land of Italian Skies. The tail end of the snow storm which swept from the northwest struck us on Saturday night, and while only a very little of the beautiful fell, we experienced all the disagreeableness of a northwestern storm. The wind seemed to whip from all directions, chill and cold. Sunday night a little more snow fell which continued on Monday. Early Tuesday morning the thermometer dropped below zero, causing coal piles to dwindle. By noon the weather had moderated with the sun shining bright and warm again.

Altogether there was not probably over four inches of snow on the ground. Our sister city on the north, which boasts of her unrivaled climate claims a foot or more, with snowdrifts four to six feet deep! ## New Mexico a Changed Country

New Mexico has only been state for a little over a year which is pretty fair proof that the first shall be last; for long before the Pilgrims had even begun loading their 1,100 train loads of furniture into the May flower, New Mexico was settled by white men and was moving forward at a speed which would make a snail look like the Empire State Express.

For deliberate growth New Mexico holds all records. It was first settled by the Spaniards in 1598. Nineteen years later it had forty colonists and eleven churches. In the last 300 years it has achieved 327,000 people. However, considering its distance from anywhere in particular, this is a pretty good record.

Moreover, New Mexico has gradually improved the character of its citizens.

It began with Apaches, who were chased out by the Spaniards, who were in turn booted by the Mexicans. Then the cowboys and bad men ejected the Mexicans and finally the persevering farmer and fruit raiser crowded out the desperadoes with the nervous trigger fingers. One can now travel New Mexico from end to end without encountering anything more perilous than dust in the eyes, all literature to the contrary notwithstanding.

New Mexico is situated in the western elbow of Texas, and is carefully defended from the rest of the United States by mountains, deserts and transcontinental railroad fares. It has 122,000 square miles and enough mountains to furnish scenery for all the people in the world. It is one of the driest states in the union, running most of rivers on a six month schedule, and the farmer has to borrow a mountain stream before he can get the land even interested in agriculture. It has some brand new and hustling towns, one fine old Spanish relic 300 years of age, Santa Fe, and a large number of extinct and perfectly behaved Indian settlements varying from 1,000 to 2,000 years of age.

New Mexico was once very unhealthy, owing to the great danger of breathing Indian arrows and revolver bullets, but has since become noted for the wonderful nutritiousness of its air. New Mexico air will revitalize and halfsole a pair of worn-out lungs in six months' time.

New Mexico was once connected with civilization by the Santa Fe trail, a 1,100-mile long wagon road, ornamented with skulls. It is now reached by the Santa Fe railroad and the tourist who stops at the eating houses of this railroad and absorbs the products of New Mexico's soil learns to love the state in spite of the Indian workmen and their prices.—Geor. Fitch.
