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## ELECTRIC LIGHTS FOR BELEN

Practically Assured by Representative of New York Capital

At a meeting of a number of the business men of Belen, Monday night at the Commercial Club rooms, the proposition of Mr. Woy, manager of the Albuquerque Electric Light Company, was presented and accepted. Mr. Woy, who represents New York capital proposes to instal an electric light plant of sufficient capacity to supply current for all who will use it for some time to come. While he does not require subscriptions from local people, he said this would be preferable, thus giving home people a voice in the management of the business. Those who were present at the meeting subscribed \$3,500, and it is expected that this sum will be doubled before the report is made to Mr. Woy.

Temporary organization was effected, and it is hoped to have permanent organization perfected and incorporated by March 1st. The question of erecting a complete power house was discussed, and it is probable that arrangements will be made to utilize power already established, thus saving the time of insillation, as well as reducing the running expenses. It is practically assured that ere many moons, Belen citizens will be enjoying the benefits of electricity in numerous ways. So mote it be.

## Chief Features of Governor's Message to the Legislature

State must rely on regular levies for nearly all revenue for regular and special appropriations until legislature provides other methods of raising revenue.

Recommends free text books for public schools. Believes results are not commensurate with money spent on state educational institutions; urges creation of central board to control and manage all institutions.

Recommends that Spanish American Normal school, whose building at El Rito was burned, be combined with the Normal University at Las Vegas.

Favors fair and reasonable appropriation for bureau of immigration and urges at least temporary provision to maintain work. Recommends ratification of income tax and direct election of senators amendment to federal constitution.

Approves board recommendation for large irrigable farm for reform school.

Approves requests for increased appropriations for state penitentiary, repairs, extensions and establishment of large convict farm.

Recommends work of revising statutes be put in charge of attorney general and that attorney general be given two assistants.

Recommends "Daylight Saloon Law" and other measures to further regulate and restrict sale of intoxicating liquors.

Must have fair valuation and lower rate of taxation to attract capitalists and home seekers.

Recommends abolition of prize fighting and gambling.

Wants further appropriation for traveling auditor's work and points out serious shortages discovered in counties.

Urges prompt action in passing equitable county salary bill.

## Who Wants to Buy? Easter Comes Early

The following announcement of a sale of Republican junk at Washington March 5th has been issued by the Democratic state committee of Kentucky:

Easter bonnets will blossom earlier than they will burst into bloom for another century.

The earliest date on which Easter can come is March 22, but that has not happened since 1818. This year it will be March 23, the same date on which it fell in 1856 and 1845.

The Rev. Father Martin S. Brennan a noted St. Louis astronomer, says that tables computed by mathematicians have not been carried far enough to show just how long it will be before Easter again falls on so early a date, but it will not occur until some time after the year 2000.

The rule of fixing the date of Easter originally was that it was the Sunday after the first full moon following the spring equinox. The equinox falls March 21. According to a ruling of the council of Nice, if Mar. 21 is a Saturday and there is a full moon on that day, the following day will be Easter.

This year March 21 will be Friday and there will be a full moon on Saturday.

### PARCELS POST AND ITS EFFECT ON THE LOCAL MERCHANT

The parcels post which went into effect on the first should be a great boon to merchants enterprising and aggressive enough to take advantage of it. But that advantage can not be secured effectively and directly without newspaper advertising. We do not say this because we happen to be in the newspaper business. The situation is plain enough. Merchants under the new system may mail packages of considerable weight and at low cost to be delivered in the near vicinity by local or rural carriers. The people to be reached seldom see a show window. They do not come to the center to trade as of old. The telephone, the rural carrier and now the parcels post make it unnecessary to lose the time to trade that way. They scan the newspapers for advertising announcements and will buy where they find the things they want, the dealer perhaps never seeing his customer. In other words the coming of the parcels post makes more necessary than ever before newspaper advertising for the live merchant.—Silver City Enterprise.

## SALOON IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

Early Morning Blaze does Damage of \$3,500 Wednesday

About 5 o'clock Wednesday morning the Witzel Bar, just west of Hotel Belen, was destroyed by fire of mysterious origin, together with all the contents. The loss is about \$3,500, partially covered by insurance.

The fire was discovered by guests of the Hotel Belen, who were awakened and gave the alarm. The flames had already gained such headway that little could be done to check them, and nothing could be removed from the building. For a while it looked as if the hotel was doomed also, but the fact that there was little wind aided the fighters in saving this property. A number of the guests of the hotel packed their belongings hurriedly in anticipation of a hasty exit.

As we go to press the insurance adjusters are in the city for the purpose of adjusting the loss.

The coming legislature might profitably devote a day or two of its time during the session to the formulation and passage of a primary law. Political bosses have dominated in New Mexico long enough. It is time that the people had something to say concerning the nomination of candidates for office. Let the people have a chance to smash the bosses and see what a complete job they will make of it.—The Eagle.

The Wells Fargo Express company has announced its intention of initiating a service which will compete with the Parcel Post Service, in the handling of matter not exceeding eleven pounds in weight. For a number of years the several express companies have fought the establishment of the Parcel Post by the government, and had they initiated rates anything similar to those now in vogue, the Parcel Post system would not have been established. But, since Uncle Sam has taken a hand, the express companies will find that they have a competitor of no mean magnitude and are able to care for its patrons to the utmost. Should the express

companies inaugurate rates competitive with those of the government, they will by that act, admit that they have been robbing the people, for lo, these many years.

The legislature which meets this week at Santa Fe, will, no doubt, pass some sort of a salary bill for the county officers. That the members will do well to study the matter carefully, was demonstrated by the veto of Governor McDonald of the act passed by the last legislature. Should the members do as they did, and leave this important matter till the last days of the session, and then pass any old thing, the people may expect it to receive the same fate as the last. Why an officer in one county should receive double the amount of salary as the same officer in another county, is something which we have not been able to penetrate. Of course in some counties, more office help is required than in other counties, but this matter was taken care of in the last bill, by providing for salaries for additional deputies. The majority of the county offices in the state are managed by deputies, who are willing and ready to work for reasonable salaries. Then why should a large salary be attached to the office, for the benefit of one who does not give his time to the work?

### A BLANKET RAISE IN ASSESSMENT.

New Mexico will face a deficit the coming year unless some method is provided of raising more funds than the present tax levy specifies. Some say this deficit will amount to as much as \$150,000, but whatever the sum some way will have to be devised for meeting it. In several states after the official state budget is made up for the coming year, the state board of equalization is given power to make a blanket raise on all assessable property in the state, to meet the deficit, should there be any. This has found favor in a number of states and is said to work admirably. The percentage of raise required is carefully figured out and is then applied to everything assessed in the state. In this way everyone is raised alike and there is no chance for the cry of "favoritism," which usually goes up after every attempt to equalize taxation. Perhaps this may be a good solution of the New Mexico deficit, although there are still glaring inequalities in the tax assessment that should be equalized before this is tried.—Silver City Enterprise.
