THE WHITE OAKS ROAD.

Ground has been broken and work on the White Oaks road commenced by the Detwiler Bros., who have contracted for the first ten miles. The present status of this enterprise is very satisfactory, and there is every reason to believe that it will be vigorously pushed. The gentlemen who have charge of the matter—the east have, we understand, already provided the funds necessary to construct the first fifty miles free from all encumbrance. The foreign syndicate stand ready to advance the necessary funds to construct the road the balance of the way to the White Oaks coal fields.

The Journal has always had faith in this project. This faith has been based upon the merits of the road itself. There is not a road in process of construction to-day that offers the assurances of as profitable a business as this does. The projectors of this road in El Paso are wide awake, practical men, and the gentleman who has taken charge of the enterprise in the east is a financier of national reputation. For the past few years capital has been timid, but there is now a feeling of security, and the general disposition in the east is extremely favorable to a project possessing the merit this does, backed as it is by western trunk lines seeking connection with the southwest.

Everything now points to the success of this road, and with it will come an era of rapid growth and prosperity to El Paso. All will reap the benefit, whether they came on with commendable spirit

A few days after reaching home I was informed that my command was broken up, and that I was to report at Cincinnati and await orders. That was the way I got out of the army."
