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## Escapes Twice but is again Captured

Stock Inspector Capp and Mounted Policeman McHughes, who with a posse have been scouring the mesa west of town and the Ladrone mountains, today brought in Billy Kennebeck, who is charged with being an accomplice in the disappearance of a number of horses from the country surrounding Mountainair.

The arrest was made at the ranch of H. E. Byers, where Kennebeck was helping R. D. Cox build a house, and two members of the posse were left to guard him, while the remainder made further search for other members of the alleged gang. Although handcuffed and under guard the prisoner made his escape and securing a horse, fled. The wild ride of ten or more miles was made without saddle or bridle, but ended by his dashing into another part of the posse headed by Inspector Capp.

The boy was brought to Belen where he was lodged in jail, handcuffed and fettered. In a short time, the officers, who had gone to secure food, were notified that the prisoner had again fled. On account of the snow the trailing was an easy matter. It was found that after making his escape from the building, he secured an ax and broke the fetters from his limbs. He was trailed to an acequia, where he was found hiding beneath a culvert, in the water and slush.

Policeman McHughes accompanied him to Albuquerque where he will be lodged pending the arrival of Sheriff Julius Meyer of Torrance county, who will take him in charge.

Kennebeck is a young man of about 22 or 23 years and this is the first time he has been in trouble of this kind. His many friends in Belen hope that he may be able to prove his innocence in this case.

The officer are still on the trail of others supposed to be implicated and expect shortly to report other arrests.

## Would Make Tax Uniform

State Game and Fish Warden Baca states that he will ask the legislature to establish a uniform hunting tax of \$1.25, applying it to everyone carrying a shotgun, rifle or pistol. People may be seen out hunting, with a gun in their hands, and we can not make them pay a fine for having no license unless we discover game they have killed."

## LEGISLATURE MEETS AVALANCHE OF BILLS

Friends of Senator Fall Lose in Adoption of Resolution which Ignores Alleged Election of last June

The state legislature has been grinding away and almost one-sixth of its legal existence has passed into history. The greater part of the first week was taken up with the organization, and oiling up of the machinery. Up to the time of our going to press, a large number of bills have been introduced, some good, some bad and some indifferent. The first bill passed by the senate was one by Senator Clark of San Miguel county, authorizing the state auditor and state treasurer to set aside certain monies out of certain funds, for the payment of the salaries of the legislators. The bill was put through in record breaking time and within fifteen minutes after passage had been reported to the lower house.

The first legislation by the lower house was the passage of a bill providing \$9,000 for the printing of the bills as introduced and \$2,500 for the printing of the journals of the legislative bodies.

The range of the bill introduced is from prize fighting to defining Sunday, and from repealing a fence law to financing the state fair. Senator Watson

wants a law passed providing a penalty for selling or giving away of adulterated kerosene or gasoline. Representative Llewellyn introduced a resolution, which passed the house, calling on the presiding officer to name a committee of five of the members of that body, to investigate the high cost of coal in New Mexico, when it is currently reported that we have more coal than Pennsylvania. Senator Barth has introduced a resolution calling for the submission of an amendment to the state constitution for the recall of public officials. Senator Evans in Joint Resolution No. 5, provides for the ratification of the amendment to the constitution of the United States for the direct election of U. S. senators.

The election of the United States Senator to succeed Mr. Fall, whose term expires March 4, 1913, came up in the house on Wednesday of this week by the calling for a report of the committee to which had been referred Mr. Burg's resolution regarding the matter.

Mr. de Baca moved to table the majority report. On motion of Mr. Mullens and despite the objection by Mr. Blanchard it was read. It was a substitute for the original resolution and was as follows:

"Whereas, On the 6th day of June, A. D., 1912, by the action of the legislature then assembled, under an election held, according to the provisions of the law and constitution of the United States and the provisions of the constitution

of the state of New Mexico, Hon. A. B. Fall was duly elected United States senator from the state of New Mexico, for the term beginning March 4, A. D., 1913, and his election was duly declared by the Hon. E. C. de Baca, lieutenant governor of New Mexico, at the time presiding over the joint session of the legislature which so elected him. And whereas the governor failed to sign the credentials of Senator Fall. And whereas, the private legal advisor of the governor has published in the public press, an opinion which at least questions the legality and regularity of the said election, and, whereas, we desire to affirm our belief that the said election was legal and regular, and in conformity with the law, but being desirous that no question be raised which may cast a doubt upon the legality of his said election.

"Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this legislature shall on the 28th day of January, A. D. 1913, proceed under the law governing such cases, to the election of a senator for the term beginning March 4, A. D. 1913."

After the reading, the report

of the minority of the committee was then presented and read. Mr. Burg moved its adoption. There was some sharp discussion between Mr. Blanchard, who objected to the adoption, and Speaker Baca, but the roll was called and resulted in 33 votes for the adoption of the minority report and 15 against it. The minority substitute resolution was as follows: "Whereas, The term to which one of the members elected to represent the state of New Mexico in congress will expire on March 3, 1913.

"Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this legislature proceed on January 28, 1913, under the law governing such cases, to the election of a person for senator in congress to represent the state of New Mexico for the term beginning March 4, 1913."

The same sufficed to adopt the resolution to suspend the rules and order it printed, everyone voting in the affirmative.

The resolution as passed utterly ignores the former alleged election of Senator Fall to succeed himself and amounts to a repudiation of that action.

McCoy, member of the legislative senate from Torrance county and a booster of the Chataqua at Mountainair, has received a letter from one of the officials of the American school of Archaeology informing him that during the coming summer the school would make the last day "An archaeological day," and that it would attend the Chataqua in force. Thereafter the students and instructors will remain in Torrance county for a week excavating at the ancient ruins to be found there and doing other research work.

"This is pleasing news," said Mr. McCoy, "because it will add a new feature to our Chataqua. We have tried very hard and against many difficulties to build up that attractive and educational institution. We have just added Clovis day to our Chataqua and the Clovis people being a live bunch are going to show appreciation by attending in large numbers."

## Santa Fe Instruction for Farmers

Another Agricultural School on wheels is to be run in New Mexico in co-operation with the State Agricultural College and Experiment Station. Instead of running another agricultural train with varied exhibits and short stops as was the case last year, two cars will be run. These cars will spend practically a whole day at nearly every stopping point, so that there will be plenty of time for the lectures, demonstrations, and for answering questions. The lectures will be confined to a few lines of instruction and these will be covered in detail. In addition to the Santa Fe demonstrators, there will be from three to five of the college men with the cars.

A large passenger coach will be used for the lectures and visitors will be made comfortable. A baggage car will contain the exhibits which will be intended to illustrate the lectures.

In the irrigated districts, fruit growing, trucking, and irrigation will be given first place, with livestock, dairying and silos. Some of the matters discussed will be how to handle the cream separator, how to test cream, why cream tests vary, care of cream, selection of cows, proper rations of feed, how to build a silo, and what crops to grow for silage.

Every effort will be made to make these talks interesting and at the same time intensely practical. It is hoped that there will be a good attendance of farmers and business men and their wives.

The date for the Farmer Instruction cars at Belen has been announced as Friday, January 27th, from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. The subjects discussed will be Fruit and Vegetable Growing; Irrigation, Field crops, Livestock and Dairying, and Silos and Ensilage.
