Mr. Mor ley has christened this unique building "The Navajo Lodge" and it now offers the traveller over the most popular transcontinental highway a most hospitable welcome, and the sur rounding mountains offer also attractions not found in many locali-

The lodge is built entirely of hand hewn pines from the Datil National Forest and has a large attractive lobby reaching clear up to the roof with restic stairways on each side leading up to a mezzanine floor from which the bed rooms open. A large open fireplace adds cheerfulness to the lobby. The ceiling of the lobby is supported by logs thirty-five feet long, which are covered with hewn slabs laid herring bone style.

On the ground floor leading off the lobby is a dining room that will accommodate twenty-six guests comkitchen adjoining.

There is a broad porch on the east and south sides of the ground floor and another porch fifteen by twentysix feet on the second story reached from the mezannine floor.

The furniture like the building, and while the stockmen will be force is all made at the lodge from native timber, and like the building, is artistic and in keeping with the envoirment.

The lobby mazannine hall and dining room are all decorated with Navajo rugs and hides and skins of bear lions, lobo wolves, coyotes, linx, wild cat and other predatory animals, killed in the Datil mountains. The rugs and blankets are made at the Lodge by Navajo squaws out of wool shorn from sheep raised on the ranch.

RANGE CONDITION HOLM O. BURSUM NOMINATED FOR

As has been the expectation ever since Gov. Mechem called an election to vote for a United States Senator, Holm O. Bursum was nominated to fill the vacancy which he has been filling so acceptably, since his appointment, in the U-S. Senate, caused by the resignation of Albert B. Fall, who is now in the cabinet.

While it was a foregone conclusion that Bursum would be nominated, the meeting was one of the most enthusiastic gatherings of the G. O. P. ever held in the state. A. B. Renehan was chairman, and the committee on resolutions reported and their recommendations were embidied in a platform that will appeal to every fair minded voter in the state of New Mexico.

A new oll well will soon be spudded in on the tract north of Columbus, N. M., by the Redland-New Mexico Oll Company, the contract calling for a hole 4,000 feet deep unless oil is found at a lesser depth.

The balance on hand in the state reasury on June 30, 1921, was \$2,864,-318.04, as compared with \$2,651,019.55 on July 1, 1920, according to the annual report of State Treasurer Raymond Earhart of Arizona.

Building permits for the month of July in Albuquerque reached the high mark of \$\$4,171, which is a new record for the city for the year. This is the highest since 1920 when the mark was over \$100,000.

Canning of the tonato crop in the Mimbres valley, N. M., has been started, and in spite of the blight which struck the vines the early part of the season it is thought that the crop will equal that of last year.

The harvesting of the big apple crop of the Roswell, N. M., valley has been started and indications are that it will compare favorably with that of other years, and on account of the high quality will bring a higher price,

Artesia, N. M., will ship about 1,200 carloads of apples during the fall months. The crop this year is said to be of unusually good quality although the yield is small. There will be a good peach crop in the Hope country.

After a ten days' search in the mountains near Las Vegas, N. M., all hopes of finding the body of Kenneth Herron, who was lost last fall while hunting, were given up. It is thought that the fate of the boy will never be known.

Thousands of acres of land in the Santa Cruz county oil district have been leased in Arizona. Representatives of the State Land Department located about all the forestry land, it is said, but whether it was all located for the state, or some for private individuals, is not known,

The contract for the new highway from Magdalena to Wolf Wells, ten miles west, has been let and the work will be pushed to completion as fast as possible. This is part of the main road to the Arizona line and for some time has been one of the worst stretches in that part of the state.

Recent rains in practically all parts of Arizona have tended to improve road conditions with the exception of a few points where the highways have been badly washed and culverts are out, according to information received by the state headquarters of the Automobile Club of Arizona from its thirty local representatives.

Announcement has been made that work on the road from Clifton, Ariz., will be started soon and with the work on the two projects in Grant county, N. M., it will mean that the dam to dam highway will be opened within the next year. This will mean much to Grant county, as this will be one of the finest transcontinental routes in the entire West. The first work in the county will be on the stretch from Santa Rita and Sherman to connect with the scenic highway over the Block range. The second section will be from the Gila river west to the county line, and is also of great importance as it will connect with the route to Mogollon. With all the routes completed Grant county will have some of the finest roads in the Southwest.



GREAT POWERS TO MEET IN GENERAL CONFERENCE.

PRINCIPLES DEFINED

NOTES ARE SENT TO GREAT BRITAIN, FRANCE, ITALY JAPAN AND CHINA

(Western Newspaper Union News Berrice,)

Washington .- Putting into definite terms its proposals for a disarmament conference, the United States invited the great powers to unite in "a practical effort to remove the causes of misunderstanding" and so facilitate reduction of the world's enormous outlay for the materials of war, Informal identic notes of invitation

forwarded to Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan, the American government pledged its own unstinted co-operation in such an effort and further defined as follows as its own conceptions of the principles involved:

That there can be no hope for peace or stability until the tax burden re sulting from heavy armament had been reduced.

That such a reduction is possible only if troublesome international problems are solved by common con ent

That among these problems the Pacific and Far Eastern questions occupy a position of "unquestioned importance

That although there is no intention to dictate the scope of the conference, the discussions should touch upon matters "which have been" of international concern as well as those now admittedly controversial; and

That the question of naval armaments might well be considered first though there should be no barrier to a full consideration of armaments of ev ery sort.

Coincidentally with the dispatch of the invitations to the four great pow ers, China was asked to send a delegation to take part in those discussions of the conference which relate to the Pacific and the Far East. All five na tions thus invited have indicated informaily that they would accept

The note of invitation follows the principles previously defined by this government in its informal conversations with other powers, but particular attention was attracted by the suggestion that a solution of the Far Eastern situation should include common understandings with respect to matters which have been and are of international concern.

BBYS:

State Department officials would not interpret the text of the note, but the general assumption here was that under this definition a way would be found to discuss such questions as Yap and Shantung, which "have been" of international concern, but which Japan now is inclined to regard as closed incidents.



Motor Fuel is **Real Problem**

Temporary Gasoline Excess Now Does Not Solve the Question for the Future.

UNMINED RESERVE LIMITED

If Oil Was Extracted From Ground at Rate Equal to That of 1920 the Reserve Would Only Last 13 Years.

By E. H. LESLIE,

Associate Professor of Chemical Engineering, University of Michigan.

At present petroleum is being produced faster than it is used, and stocks of gasoline are increasing. Crude off produced in Oklahoma has dropped in price from \$3.50 .o \$1.00 per barrel, and the price of gasoline has been lowered several cents per gallon. But one should not be misled by the present situation; which is only a part of the business cycle through which we are passing. It is a peculiarity of the oll-producing business that the drilling of new wells reaches a maximum at the crest, or even after the crest, of the wave of prosperity. The result is an overproduction of crude oil in the time of depression. Prices drop, profits vanish, and new drilling stops. But within a year or two the pendulum swings the other way, and again there is a scarcity of oil due to the interruption of drilling in the time of depression. This cycle of events would take place even if there were an endless supply of crude oil underground. Real Fuel Problem.

The real motor fuel problem is not concerned with the swings of the business pendulum, although the present abundance of fuel is pointed to by superficial critics as showing how wrong have been the predictions of the scientists that have warned us of a future shortage.

The problem arises in part through the fact that the underground reserve of petroleum is limited. At present the unmined reserve of the United States is only about 5,800,000,000 barrels. Were this oil to be extracted from the ground at a rate equal to that of the year 1920, a feat that is quite out of the question from a practical standpoint, the reserve would only last 13 years. It is thus evident, however, that after a few years we must expect

On the other hand, the use of automobiles, tractors, trucks and gasoline engines is becoming more general. Today the total number of registered motor vehicles is over nine millions, an almost unbellevable increase in the short period of 25 years. What is more, the number is still growing, and will probably exceed 13,000,000 within a few years.

Where are we to get the fuel to run this vast number of cars?

The quality of market gasoline will not change greatly in the next few years, at least not until the automo tive engineers perfect devices that will handle heavier and less volatile gasoline satisfactorily.

In spite of the fact that for several years the United States has produced two-thirds of the world's oil, we have recently been dependent upon foreign sources of supply of crude oil. Eighty per cent of the world's oll is consumed in this country. In 1920 our imports were 110,000,000 barrels, or 25 per cent of our domestic production. This oil came largely from Mexico. As the years pass, the United States will become more and more dependent upon imports of petroleum. This will mean higher prices and therefore necessitate more efficient utilization once the oll is in this country.

Other Sources of Fuel.

What other possible sources of fuel are there? Much has been heard of shale oil and of alcohol.
