1. THE CHRISTIAN SCIENCE MONITOR profiled UNM's Graduation Project in an Oct. 19 feature story. The two-year old project, administered by UNM's Weekend and Evening degree program, identifies students who quit the University just shy of graduation and offers them incentives to return and complete their degree.

4. THE MASTERS IN PUBLIC HEALTH PROGRAM captured a grant from the Center for Disease Control to study the social and healthcare problems within New Mexico's ethnic and racial communities.
