

#### WESTERN

Police at Fort Worth, Texas, were Kan, that, through an examination of finger print records, a man who was two weeks ago has been identified as attributed to politics, William B. Brousefield, an I. W. W. organizer of San Diego, Calif.

Mexico will be represented by a commission at the meeting of the League of the Southwest at Riverside, Calif., in December, it was announced by Arnold Kruckman, secretary of league. He said he had received a letter from Gen. Alvaro Obregon, president of Mexico, to this effect.

Gas, which was said to be flowing at the rate of 100,000,000 cubic feet a day, broke through the easing of a well of the Royal Dutch Shell Oil Company at Signal hill, near Long Beach, Calif., and burst into flames. William Bouck of Sedro Woolley, Wash., former master of the Washington State Grange; C. R. Cottrell, J R. Wrage and R. A. Briggs, all Washington state, were expelled from the National Grange at its convention at Portland, Ore., and forever barred from re-entering the order. Bouck and his associates were accused of radical and disloyal actions.

Postmasters have been asked by Postmaster General Hays to lend quiries of other postmasters.

A deficiency appropriation bill carrying approximately \$104,000,000, or \$86,000,000 less than the \$190,000,000 requested by various government departments, was reported by the House appropriations committee. The navy asked for \$27,000,000 and was granted nothing, while the veterans' bureau, which requested \$121,000,000, was allotted \$65,000,000.

The proposals of the United States for a ten-year naval hollday will have no effect on the present status of the American naval building program, Secretary of the Navy Denby said. The present building program will continue until some definite agreement has been reached and there will not be even an effort to slow down or curtail the building operations pending the final agreement on the matter, the secretary said.

Of \$108,213,165.35 collected in registration fees from 9,245,195 passenger cars and commercial vehicles, 28,114 trailers and 177,234 motorcycles, as well as chauffeurs' licenses in the forty-eight states and the District of Columbia, Jan. 1 to July 1, 1921, accord ing to the United States bureau of public roads, the sum of \$101,793,416, or 94 per cent, is available for good roads. Total revenue for the year 1920 in reg-Istration fees was \$102,546,212.25. The revenue for the first half of this year, therefore, exceeded the entire revenue for 1920 by \$5,666,953.08.

#### FOREIGN

For the first time in history a negro institution was admitted to the Carnegle foundation when the trustees oted to receive Fisk University, Nashville, Tenn., into the foundation.

The Australian government is reducing its expenditures for defense by approximately \$1,250,000, the acting minister of defense announced in the house of representatives at Melbourne.

A bronze turkey, mounted on a marble pedestal from the Cathedral of Milan, the Thanksgiving gift of the Ital lan-American Society of Italy to President Harding, arrived in New York or the steamer Taormina from Genoa.

> Hungary has decided to send a financial mission to the United States to raise a loan, says the Innsbruck Nachrichten. Count Lazzio Szechenyi, whose wife was formerly Miss Gladys Vanderbilt of New York, the paper adds, will be head of the mission.

Egypt this season will have 582,915, 000 pounds of lint cotton for market, according to figures furnished by the American consul stationed at Alexandria. This amount is about a normal supply. In 1920 the supply amounted to 556,027,000 pounds, and in 1919 to 542,962,000 pounds.

Convicting home brewers is a costly Job for Uncle Sam. Twenty-five persons were fined \$10 to \$25 each by Federal Judge Carpenter in Chicago for violations of the dry law. It was estimated that it cost the government \$50 for each case. This amount is used in marshal's fees, grand jurers' pay, overhead expenses and commissioner's fees. Fines of \$25 cover about half the cost, it was stated.

Forty-eight advances, aggregating \$2,074,000 for agricultural and live stock purposes have been approved by the War Finance Corporation. The advances included for Arizona \$163,000, South Dakota, \$59,000 and Nebraska \$60,000

C. G. Golden, 36, car inspector for the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific railway at Tucumcari, N. M., was killed by being crushed to death under a switch engine. He had thrown the switch for the Golden State Limited and stepped back outo another track and was struck by the yard engine.

The Twenty-fifth United States in fantry, which has been stationed at for the past several years, is to be transferred soon to Honolulu, and replaced there by the Tenth cavalry, now stationed at Fort Huachuca, ac cording to word received.

The Arizona highway fund benefited to the extent of \$13.826.51 during the month of October as a result of the 1 cent-a-gallon tax on gasoline, accord ing to figures announced by the secre tary of state. The total collections since the law became effective on June 9 now amount to 861,348,56, the report said.

The Pioneers' Association of New Mexico was organized at a meeting held in Albuquerque, and plans were made for the organization of branches of the association in different parts of the state. The time for the annual reunion of the society was set for the second Monday in October of each year.

The state of Arizona's title to 100, 000 acres of land in Santa Cruz county, known as "Baca float No. 3," will not be considered by the Supreme Court, it was announced, because of want of Jurisdiction. The appeal was brought by three Arizona citizens who claimed that foreclosure of the land by the state on delinquent tax liens was invalid.

W. H. Smith, former city clerk of Nogales, Ariz., was found gullty by a jury in the Superior Court on a charge of embezzlement. The penalty for this offense is from one to ten years in the state penitentiary. Smith was accused of having embezzled \$1.125 from the city while he was city clerk. Witnesses for the prosecution at the trial testified that total embezzlements Smith would amount to thousands of dollars although he was tried for only the \$1,125 item.

Ten bales of Durango cotton from seven acres of unfertilized land is what W. Harry Wheatley raised on his farm. N. M. He received 22 cents a pound, f. o. b. Las Cruces, or \$1,100 for the crop. L. L. Mayfield, who came to Las Cruces from Mt. Olive, Miss., is aver aging a bale an acre from seventy acres. No fertilizer was used. It is estimated that from 5,000 to 7,500 acres will be planted in cotton next year. The acreage this season is 418 as against 5,000 in 1920.

The State Corporation Commission of Arizona issued an order authorizing the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company to increase certain toll rates. The order was signed by Commissioners A. A. Betts and D. F. Johnson, but Commissioner Loren F. Vaughn filed a dissenting opinion objecting to the increase in rates.

## HARDING SIGNS BILLS

MANY NOMINATIONS BY PRESI-DENT LEFT TO DIE BY SENATE ADJOURNEMENT.

(Western Newspaper Union News Service.)

Washington.-The first and specia session of the Sixty-seventh Congress ended after President Harding had visited the capital and signed meas ires enacted in the closing hours. The House was the first to close up shop.

Chief among the measures signed by Mr. Harding were the tax revision and maternity bills. After finally disposing of the tax bill, the Senate turned to clean up some 500-odd presidential Camp Stephen D. Little, Nogales, Ariz. nominations. But nearly half of the number were left to die under the law. Most of these were minor postmastership appointments. It was understood attempts to put through the last minute nominations had been blocked largely through charges of several senators that an effort was being made to 'railroad" appointments.

Meanwhile the House was awaiting announcement that the President had signed the tax and maternity bills and had no other communications, and when so informed, adjourned. The Senate finished its executive business and followed the House in adjourn-

El Paso, Texas.—Representatives of the Mexican government came here to confer with Chief Charles Washhresha. who represents 10,000 American Indians who are contemplating establishing a colony in northern Mexico. "There are five or six tribes in this country who will move to Mexico with us if we can find the right sort of land," said Chief Washbresha. He explained that the land held by the Indians in Oklahoma no longer is fit for cultivation because of oil seepage from the many wells.

#### Merchants Take Corn.

Madelia, Minn.-Merchants of Madelia have decided to accept corn as payment of debts and for purchases of merchandise. This action followed complaint of farmers that they were unable to meet financial obligations, and held the low market price of corn made it impractical for them to haul grain to market. Merchants came forward with an offer that they will accept corn as payment of debts and for payment of current purchases.

#### Intoxication Increasing.

New York.—There have been more cases of public intoxication this summer than at any time in the history of the Fifth Avenue Court in Brooklyn, either before or since prohibition. In October there have been 156 arrests made for drunkenness. In September there were only sixty-five. In one day fourteen men said to be in a "hangover" state were arraigned there before Magistrate Reynolds and given fines and short juil terms.





United States in 1920 was 33,798,800,-000 feet, which is 2.2 per cent less than In 1919, and 27 per cent less than the peak in 1907.

The average price of lumber at the mill increased to \$38.42 per thousand, which is a raise of 150 per cent since 1910. The aggregate value of the cut is \$1,299,000,000. These are the highest annual valuations ever recorded, but do not indicate present conditions. They merely reflect the extremely high peak in the post-war lumber prices which was passed in the first quarter of 1920.

These are the principal statis-tics obtained by the Forest Service. U. S. Department of Agriculture, in Its 1920 canvas of American sawmills. They are based upon reports from 15, 978 active mills out of 23,243 estimated to have been in operation. Several thousand mills cutting less than 50, 000 feet were not tabulated, though allowance was made for their cut. Com-parisons with 1919 are published by permission of the Bureau of the Cen-

sus, U. S. Department of Commerce. tables show that the states which increased their cut are all in the Pacific Coast group and the Rocky

Approximately 234,000 files of different species were dusted with powdered, red chalk and liberated. Fly traps, baited with food highly relished by files, were placed at various distances. By this means the direction and flight of different species were determined.

Some of the files traveled 1,000 feet in a few minutes. The screw-worm covered a distance of half a mile in three hours, while the black blowfly covered anywhere from half a mile to eleven miles in two days. The house fly covered over six miles in less than one day.



"TREACLE."

HOSE who have stumbled across the reference in Waller's ode to Charles II to "treacle yielded by your vipers" have naturally been puzzled to see the connection between a poisonous snake and the English name for sirup or melasses, a connection which dates back to the days of legendary lore.
"Treacle" was originally a

Greek word and, wrapped up in it, was the once popular belief that the best antidote for the sting of a snake was a concoction made from the tissues of the snake itself-a sort of "hair of the dog is good for the bite" idea. Milton speaks of the sovereign "treacle of sound doctrine," while "Venice-treacle" or 'viper wine" was a common name for a supposed antidote against all poisons. Treacle, meaning first this antidote, was first broadened in meaning to include any cure through medicine; then contracted to mean only those medicines which were of a sweet sirup nature and, finally, restricted to the particular sirup which is called by that name today—a sirup which, however, has no medicinal properties whatever.
