RESEARCHERS at UNM's MIND Imaging Center are discovering new, very distinctive expressions of gender-specific neurological function as they probe deeper into the body's most mysterious organ – the brain. Earlier this year, UNM and the UC-Irvine concluded in a study, which was detailed in the scientific journal NeuroImage, that men and women achieve similar IQs through fundamentally different regions and pathways in the brain.

Martinet's interest was first piqued by a published report in the journal Environmental Science and Technology in 2002. The article reported results from the first nationwide reconnaissance of the occurrence of pharmaceuticals, hormones and other organic wastewater contaminants in 139 streams across 30 states.
