SOME NEW LAWS.

Acts of the 25th Assembly of Interest to the People.

An act to repeal and amend certain sections of the Compiled Laws of 1884 in accordance with the recommendations of the commissioners appointed to compile the laws.

Section 1.—That sections 900, 901, 202, 903 and 904, of the Compiled Laws of 1884, relating to vagrants, be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 2.—That section 2014 of the said Compiled Laws be amended by striking out therefrom the words, "or any two justices of the peace of the county where the petitioner shall be in jail."

Sec. 3.—That section 2932 of the said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 4.—That section 1157 of the said Compiled Laws be amended by inserting therein, after the words prescribed elections in the fourth line of said section, the word "such person" and also by adding after the words six months, at the end of said section, the words "and shall be forever disfranchised and disqualified from voting or holding office in New Mexico," so that the said section as amended shall read as follows: "If any person offers or gives any money, property or other bribe to any voter of this territory to induce him to vote for or against any person or question, or abstain from voting at any of the prescribed elections, such person and the persons receiving said bribe or inducement, on conviction, shall be sentenced to pay a fine of not less than \$50, or be imprisoned for a term not less than six months, and shall be forever disfranchised and disqualified from voting or holding office in New Mexico."

Sec. 5.—That section 85 of the said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 6.—That section 485 of the said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 7.—That section 677 of the said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed, and in lieu thereof the following language be adopted as section 677 of said Compiled Laws, to-wit: "In all cases of imprisonment in the county jails of this territory it shall be lawful for the jailers to compel prisoners after conviction to labor at some useful employment, and to secure such convicts so as to prevent their escape during the period of their confinement."

Sec. 8.—That section 479 and 480 of said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 9.—That section 814 of said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 10.—That section 859 of said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 11.—That section 500 of said Compiled Laws be amended by striking out the words in any county offices, and inserting in their stead "in any board of county commissioners," so that said section as amended shall read as follows: "Where any vacancy may exist in any board of county commissioners within this territory, the governor shall appoint and fill such vacancy until their successor or successors be elected and qualified."

Section 12.—That section 271 of the said Compiled Laws be amended so that the same shall read as follows: "In the event of any vacancy in any county office now existing, or which may hereafter occur, in any county (except boards of county commissioners) or in any precinct or demarcation in any county, by reason of death, resignation, removal, or otherwise, the county commissioners of said county shall have power to fill such vacancy by appointment until an election can be held as now provided by law."

Sec. 13.—That section 1212 of the said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 14.—That section 1224 of the said Compiled Laws be amended by adding after the words respective counties in the 8th line of said section, the following words, "at least one of whom shall belong to a different political party from that of the majority of the said board of county commissioners."

Sec. 15.—That section 1453 of said Compiled Laws be amended by striking out the figures 676 in the last line of said section and inserting the figures "666" in lieu thereof.

Sec. 16.—That section 2096 of the said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 17.—That section 2771 of the said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 18.—That section 2742 of the said Compiled Laws be amended by striking out the words made or used or introduced in evidence.

Sec. 19.—That sections 2336 and 2337 of said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 20.—That section 725 of the said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 21.—That section 727 of the said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed and that there be adopted, in lieu thereof, the following as such section: 727, that is to say: Every person convicted of the offense of assault and battery shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$100 or by imprisonment in the county jail not less than five days not more than 100 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court trying the cause."

Sec. 22.—That section 971 of said Compiled Laws be amended so as to read as follows, that is to say: "Every person who, in a rude, insolent or angry manner shall unlawfully touch another, shall be deemed guilty of an assault and battery."

Sec. 23.—That section 582 of the said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto the following words; "provided that where two or more persons are jointly indicted and jointly tried, each additional person shall be entitled to two more peremptory challenges and the territory shall be entitled to six peremptory challenges in capital cases, and to three peremptory challenges in other cases, and no more; provided further, that no defendant shall be required to exercise any peremptory challenge as to any particular juror until the territory shall have finally passed upon and accepted such juror."

Sec. 24.—That section 2501 of the said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 25.—That section 2347 of said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 26.—That section 2347 of said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 27.—That section 429 of said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 28.—That section 1905 of said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 29.—That section 2347 of said Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 30.—All acts and parts of acts in conflict with this act are hereby repealed; and this act shall take effect from and be in force from and after its passage.

Approved by the governor January 31, 1889.

A Magnetic Ore Separator.

Edison has perfected an apparatus for concentrating and separating ores that are magnetic. According to the Electric Review, the broken ore is elevated to a raised platform by conveyors, and is delivered to continuously operating crushers, which deliver the finely divided ore and gangue into an inclined rotating screen. The fine dust is thus eliminated, and the solid particles of ore and gangue are delivered at the month of the screen to inclined bucket conveyors, which take the material up and drop it into V-shaped hopper. The latter has a long delivery slot at the bottom, the width of which is adjustable. At a point somewhat below this slot, and a little out of the vertical line therewith, are presented two wide electro-magnets, both adjustable. These are deflected toward the magnets sufficiently to cause them to fall in a separate stream, while the unadroit material containing no iron falls straight down. On the floor of the pit beneath a partition plate is set at a position such as to stand between the two streams and permit of the heaps being removed without the possibility of getting mixed. The second magnet acts to prolong the pull on the falling falling magnetic particles; and thus infuse more certain and complete separation from the gangue, and also causes the two streams to fall farther apart.

How to Eat Soft-Boiled Eggs.

The very easiest way of eating a soft-boiled egg is from the shell, says Table Talk, of Philadelphia. Place the small end of the egg in an egg cup, or you may stand it in a small napkin ring. The large or butt end of the egg should have the shell removed from it; then if you take away a small piece of the white you have ample room for salt, pepper and a small piece of butter, which may be mixed with the egg without difficulty. Long-necked porcelain teapots are the easiest and only proper things to serve soft-boiled eggs. Soft-boiled eggs may also be eaten from a heated egg-glass; the top is opened carefully and turned into the glass. Salt, black pepper and butter are the proper seasonings.
