DECISION OF DISTRICT COURT IS SUSTAINED

Contractors should have been made Party to the Suit

The supreme court handed down two opinions today, the one of the most importance being the suit against the commissioners of Valencia county to restrain them from building the court house and jail at Los Lunas, the action being brought by Frank L. Walrath, a taxpayer. The supreme court upheld the lower court which had found for the commissioners, principally for the reason that Walrath did not make the contractors who had the construction in charge a party to the suit. The opinion follows:

No. 1549. Frank L. Walrath, Appellant, vs. Board of County Commissioners, et al., Appellees. From Valencia county.

This is an action by Frank L. Walrath against the Board of County Commissioners of Valencia county, and the individual members of the board to restrain them from carrying into execution a contract for the construction of a court house and jail at the county seat of said county. The pleadings show that the board of county commissioners had entered into a contract with Campbell Bros., by which the latter were to construct and complete a court house and jail, in accordance with the plans and specifications, and that the said contractors had begun work under said contract and had expended large sums of money and labor thereon. The said Campbell Bros., although within the jurisdiction of the court, were not made parties to the suit. The petition was filed to test the validity of an act of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory, approved March 8th, 1909, being chapter 19 S. L., 1909, whereby the legislature attempted to confer upon the county of Valencia authority to use the proceeds of bonds received by it from the county of Torrance, for the purpose of constructing a court house and jail. Appellees filed an answer to the merits, upon the incoming of which appellant filed a motion for judgment on the pleadings. His motion was overruled by the court, and he elected to stand upon said motion and demanded judgment upon the pleadings. The court found that appellant was not entitled to the relief prayed for in his complaint and dismissed the same. From such judgment this appeal was taken.

SYLLABUS.

Where a county has contracted with a party to construct a court house and jail, and a tax payer seeks to enjoin the board of county commissioners from paying said contractor for work and labor performed and to be performed, under said contract, the contractor is an indispensable party to the suit, and where such contractor was not made a party the court properly dismissed the petition. —New Mexican.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Roads and Bridges Receive Principal Attention of Board

July 7th, 1913

The meeting was called to order at 10 o'clock A. M. with the following persons present:—Eugene Kempenich, Chairman, Fernin Marquez, Perfecto Gabaldon, J. M. Luna, Clerk and Ruperto Jaramillo Sheriff.

The minutes of previous meetings were read and approved. A request was presented by the Commissioners of the Acequia Vieja de Belen for a roadway 15 feet wide from the land of Patrocinio Gabaldon to the land of Juan Jose Chaves. The following named gentlemen were appointed as viewers to look into the matter and report to the Board of County Commissioners: Estanislado Otero, Federico Sanchez and Demetrio Vallejos.

A petition was presented by the citizens of Los Lunas and Los Lentes calling attention to the bad condition of the Los Lentes road and asking that the same have attention. The above named gentlemen were also appointed to view this road and report on the same to the Board of County Commissioners.

A petition from various residents of Belen for a road from Valencia Avenue direct to the Belen Bridge was tabled and in that connection the Board hereby instructs Mr. J. G. Doane to make an estimate of cost of the various highways as shown by three maps, which will be furnished him, and he is further instructed to make recommendation as to the best, most feasible and economical road from both traffic and construction standpoints, and report to this Board on August 4th, 1913.

A petition was presented, which was signed by a number of the residents of Los Chavez precinct, asking for a road from a point North East of the property of Mr. Bartley McTague to connect with the main road at Los Chavez at a point where said main road crosses the Railroad Track at Los Chavez. The following gentlemen were instructed to act as viewers in this case and report to the Board:—Estanislado Otero, Federico Sanchez and Demetrio Vallejos. A certain piece of road, from the East end of the County bridge near Los Lunas to the Valencia Church, as shown by a map marked "A" on file with the County Clerk, is hereby declared a Public Road, and the Clerk is instructed to forward a blue print of this map to the road board so they may proceed with the work on said road.

The report of the Board of Condemnation, appointed to condemn lands for roads at Laguna, is hereby approved and the clerk is instructed to draw warrants in favor of the parties whose land has been condemned, for the amounts as recommended by the Board of Condemnation.

Resolved: That all Liquor Licenses issued by the County of Valencia are hereby declared to be Non Transferrable; Also that in the future, all applications for Liquor Licenses must state specifically the proposed location of the saloon, and said location can only be changed within the boundaries of the precinct in which

THE 4-A'S LOSE TO THE HOME TEAM

Various Tactics Resorted to, but Visitors are Outclassed. Final Score is 8 to 6

The 4-A's of Albuquerque met their match Sunday afternoon when they went up against the local ball team here. It was evident at various instances of the game that the visitors had come down to defeat the locals by fair means or foul, but the final score showed that they had failed by a score of 8 to 6.

Hartline and Valdevalde were the batteries for the visitors, while Spencer and Gilbert officiated for the home team.

The first half of the first inning gave the visitors, two scores, and the visitors seemed to think they had a snap of the game, especially when the local players failed to score during their half. The second inning added two more goose eggs, one for each side. The local boys took a fall out of Hartline in the third, by hitting him easily, scoring three times. The 4th, 5th and 6th added goose eggs for both sides and showed good ball playing.

In the 7th Gonzales for the visitors struck the ball to left field, and attempted to make third, to which he was beaten by a safe throw. He was called out by the umpires, when Manager Matthews showed the yellow streak, by starting a wrangle. The visitors decided to have the decision or not play, and had already put away their bats. The local boys magnanimously asked the umpire to give them the decision, so that the game might proceed. The next man went out at first. This petitioning only nerved our boys to great effort, resulting in hitting Hartline all over the field during the last of the 7th. When the smoke cleared away, the score stood 8 to 2 in favor of Belen, which the 8th failed to change. In the 9th, Matthews again tried a trick, that of substituting a man at bat, but was caught before the player had connected with the ball. His sheepish grin showed only too plainly that he was trying to put one over on us. Four scores were added by the visitors in this inning, making the total 8 to 6.

Features of the game which called forth especial applause were the stealing of bases by Voelker and the taking in of a foul by Gilbert, in which he had to run into the fans crowding close on the lines to make the catch.

GALLUP CAN GET GAME IF SHE WANTS IT

But apparently, she Doesn't want it as bad as she Lets on

The Gallup baseball team issues a challenge to the Belen club to play at Gallup, Belen or Albuquerque, the latter city preferred, according to a letter to the sporting editor of the Journal from R. C. Beddow, manager of the Gallup club.

Beddow says his team will put up from \$200 to \$500 as a side bet that it can beat Belen. He also says that Gallup for some time has been trying to get Belen to meet its representatives, but they have been unable to agree upon the terms, although Gallup has offered the "cut-off" manager \$75 to bring his team to Gallup. Belen, he says, would not pay half of the Gallup team's expenses to go there.

Gallup and Belen undoubtedly would stage a classy game. Both cities have walloped Albuquerque teams. Owing to the fact that Belen and Gallup have been unable to play in either of the home cities the match, if it is settled, probably will be staged here.

The fact that Albuquerque would be neutral and that the attendance would be greater here probably will influence the playing of the game here.

The above from Wednesday's Albuquerque Morning Journal is part true and part misleading. It is true that the Gallup team has offered our team the \$75 to come to their city and play their team, but our boys did not feel that they could accept this proposition as the amount would not cover the expense of the boys on the trip. As to the statement that our team "would not pay half of the Gallup team's expenses" to come to Belen, this is not true, as our boys have offered to meet the whole of the expense of the Gallup team if they would come here.

Our boys did offer to pay half the expenses of the Gallup team when they intended coming here to play and then going to San Marcial, the understanding being that Belen and San Marcial would divide the total expense between the two teams, which is no more than fair.

On Tuesday of this week Secretary A. R. Wetmore of the Belen Association sent three different wires to the Gallup boys, trying to arrange a meet for next Sunday, but received no response at all. Our boys are ready to go to Gallup, if their expenses are guaranteed, or will guarantee the expenses of the Gallup team if they will come here and play. As for the side bet, our boys are not interested in gambling, but they are interested in good clean sport. It is up to the Gallup team to come across one way or the other at once.

A ball game has been arranged for next Sunday afternoon between the Belen Juniors and the Los Lunas team, on the local grounds. Two weeks ago, the same team met at Los Lunas, the resulting score being 11 to 10, in favor of Los Lunas. The Juniors are expecting to change the score that they will hold the larger end of the score at the end of this game.

Cisterns that are properly con-

To Clean White Shoes

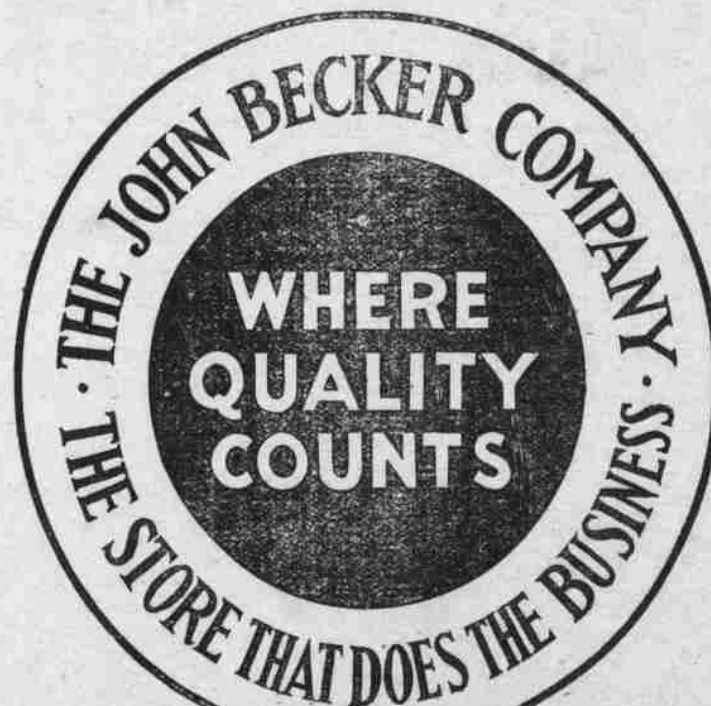
