ANNUAL REPORT
For the Fiscal Year July 1, 1969 - June 30, 1970

At the close of its 9th and final fiscal year of solo publication, the JOURNAL stands as a nationally known and respected resource-law journal, looking forward to the January 1971 inauguration of the NEW MEXICO LAW REVIEW, and trusting that many of our current subscribers will additionally subscribe to the new law review.

6.2% Increase in Number of Paid Subscriptions

The past year brought a 6.2% increase in the number of paid general subscriptions, which now total 1175. Processing of renewals was also 6.2% higher than in the previous fiscal year. Back issue sales accounted for about 14% of our total income, with 19 full sets sold, in addition to 430 single copies. The JOURNAL is now indexed and/or abstracted in twenty-four publications, an increase of two over last year.

100% Increase in Requests for Permission to Reprint

Requests for permission to reprint articles in their entirety and/or excerpts therefrom were received from twice as many sources this year as in the prior year, testifying to wider readership and the continued pertinence of content. Review of Publication Year

The July 1969 issue contained articles on water salinity problems and sea water intrusion; and the January 1970 issue was a symposium on federal treatment of oil production. This symposium issue received wide attention and has been published in book form by the UNM Press under the title NATIONAL PETROLEUM POLICY: A CRITICAL REVIEW. The October and April issues were of general interest content, with articles on weather modification; solar house heating; the federal marine science program; flood plain zoning; resource conservation; multiple use; purchasing quotas for public timber; river purification; and public land policy.

The New Mexico Section published a student symposium of comments on the New Mexico Constitutional Convention in the July 1969 issue. In October an article on "The New Mexico Professional Corporation" by Professor Desiderio with Hugh J. Ault and James W. Smith was published, along with "Existing Legislation and Proposed Model Flood Plain Ordinance for New Mexico Municipalities" by Professor Utton with Ed Walterscheid and Wayne Smith, and a Comment on "Control of Industrial Water Pollution in New Mexico" by Gregory Pease. Judge Howard C. Bratton contributed an article entitled "Standards for the Administration of Criminal Justice" to the January 1970 issue; and the April 1970 issue included an article by Professor Leo Kanowitz called "Love Lust in New Mexico and the Emerging Law of Obscenity."

Outline of Publication Plans for Next Year

A symposium on Environmental Quality Residuals Management is planned for the October 1970 issue. The July 1970 and January 1971 issues will contain articles of varied general interest, such as:
