PROHIBITED.

BILL INTRODUCED TO PROHIBIT PLAYING IN PUBLIC PLACES.

Chaves of Sierra Fathers Act to Exterminate Long-eared Pests.

Santa Fe, N. M., Jan. 22.—The house went the council one better yesterday and did not adjourn until Monday, as was expected. Instead it met for an hour's session this morning, then adjourned over till Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. To day's session was spent in unloading more bills, which were read for the first and second time and referred to the proper committees. The bills follow:

House bill No. 8, by Mullins, an Act to fix additional causes for divorce and annulment of marriage in New Mexico.

House bill No. 9, by R. L. Baca, an Act to establish a university for women.

House bill No. 10, by Santiago Garcia, an Act to amend section 3, chapter 82, session laws of 1905.

House bill No. 11, by Chaves of Sierra, an Act to provide bounties on jack rabbits.

House bill No. 12, by Moffat, by request, an Act to prohibit card playing in public places.

House bill No. 14, by Chaves of Sierra, an Act in relation to sale of personal property to satisfy loans.

The house passed council joint resolution No. 6, providing for the printing of the rules of both houses in one pamphlet.

Should house bill No. 13 become a law, it would put a stop to card playing in saloons, pool halls, clubs and other public places for drinks and cigars.

This phase of gambling does not come within the provisions of the anti-gambling law.

House employees numbering about sixty were sworn in this morning. The total number of employees in both the houses is between ninety and a hundred.

The legislature expects to get down to steady work, beginning Monday. Most of the members left for home this afternoon to remain over Sunday.

Council bill No. 6, by McBeck: "An Act defining the Rights of occupying claimants of agricultural lands and defining the remedy for the enforcement of their rights."

Council bill No. 7, by Hewitt: "An Act providing for the incorporation of villages."

Council bill No. 1, carrying an appropriation to reimburse Albuquerque citizens for advancing funds to complete the national guard armory at that place.

Council bill No. 2, the Spiess local option bill was referred to the committee on judiciary.

Council joint resolution No. 6, by Catron, providing for the printing of the rules and list of committees.

Council bill No. 3, providing a penalty for unauthorized wearing of badges, name and title of officers, etc.

Council bill No. 4, an act to invalidate the incorporation of certain towns.

Only two of the governor's recommendations have been covered by the bills offered up to the present time. These two are the local option bill and the bill to fix additional causes for obtaining divorces and annulments of marriages in New Mexico. The first named bill was introduced by Representative Mullins in the house.

The way the legislators have so far acted on the governor's recommendations made in his message to the assembly, would indicate that few, if any of them are to meet with strenuous opposition. That the executive's message has met with the approbation of the people at large also is evidenced by many telegrams he has received congratulating him upon his message.

Santa Fe, N. M., January 23.—With the first week of the thirty-eighth legislative assembly over, the organization of both the council and the house complete, and committee assignment completed by both President Spiess of the council and Speaker Miara of the house, it is safe to predict that legislative proceedings will be in full blast beginning with the first of next week.

In the meantime a goodly sized bunch of bills has been piled in for committee attention. These include twelve council bills, fourteen house bills, six council joint resolutions and three council joint memorials. Taking the entire list it contains not more than a score of propositions for amendment or of addition to the existing code. Neither does it contain anything that might be termed radical unless the local option bill might be placed in that category. Indeed most of the measures propose only minor changes in existing laws.

It is already evident that the local option bill and county division projects are to furnish the most interesting fights of the present session. While the temperance advocates are confident of the enactment of a satisfactory local option law, their joy is perhaps a little premature, as this measure, although introduced, and in committee, is yet in its infancy. Rumor says several prohibition measures all having for their purpose local option instead of strict prohibition, are to be introduced. Therefore matters on this subject might become so mixed as to defeat the passage of such a law altogether. Even now a majority of the members of both houses are non-committal regarding their views on the question regulating the traffic in liquor. Most of them prefer to wait until they have a chance to fully inform themselves as to the views of their constituents regarding such a law.

With the county division bills it is different. Already hostility to the measures proposed has cropped out and by the time the legislature resumes work on Monday it is expected that delegations from both Mora and Roosevelt counties will be on hand to fight the bills already introduced having for their purpose the creation of new counties out of portions of Mora, Guadalupe and Union and Roosevelt and Quay. The first by A. S. Bushkevitch, the many titled statesman from Mora county, and the second by Representative Baca of Santa Fe county, whose bill reads, "introduced by request." It is expected that ere long bills providing for the creation of a new county

will be introduced. The official announcement of Apostolic Delegate Falciorio was received here last Tuesday afternoon by telegraph from Washington, that Bishop J. B. Pitaval had been appointed Archbishop of Santa Fe. A vacancy had existed since the death of Archbishop Bourgade in Chicago last May and the appointment of an archbishop had been expected for some time.

The appointment of Bishop Pitaval to this high position in the church will be received among the members of the church and the public generally with a great deal of satisfaction. Bishop Pitaval has been here about six years and in that time has endeared himself to the people of Santa Fe and the territory in general.

Archbishop Bourgade died in Chicago on May 17, of last year, after having been archbishop here for a period of a little over 9 years, having been appointed to succeed Archbishop Chappelle. About the time of the death of

out of that part of Grant, of which Lordsburg is the center, Chaves and Eddy of which Artesa is the most accessible point, and one or two others, which are not fully known, will be introduced.

Closely upon the heels of the proposition to establish a territorial university for women, comes the plan to create another normal school or university. The promoters of the latter are Willard S. Belknap, a legal light of the rapidly growing town of Nara Vista in Quay county, and N. H. Crumpton, a druggist there. Both of these gentlemen arrived in the capitol in the middle of the week and have been busy interviewing legislators since the interests of the proposed school. They claim to have made several converts among the law makers.

The employment question has been settled good it is believed, and the federal appropriation will not be exceeded. Although the employees number close to one hundred, all but about twenty will be employed in name only unless drawing a salary can be termed work. But then the present assembly, as far as the extra employment question is concerned, is a model one, compared with former sessions. Gov. Curry's ultimatum made known at the opening of the session is in a great measure for the happy solution.

Just what the legislature will do next week is rather uncertain, except as to a few matters. Doubtless there will be much committee work at both ends of the capitol as a fair sized batch of bills awaits consideration.

Owing to the fact that winter weather in this portion of the Pecos Valley is generally fine, the papers seldom mention the subject. Unless the severe cold in the north from the effects of a protracted blizzard in the Panhandle of Texas finally gets down here and causes the thermometer to drop to a few degrees below the freezing point, people away from here would not know that the general run of weather here was like June in Wisconsin or Michigan. During the past two weeks no frost has shown and many kinds of vegetables have grown faster than in Wisconsin in May. People here drive out without overcoat or wraps and ladies may be seen out horseback any day in summer garments, or, what would be summer garments in the north. Those who do not like the chilly and frozen north are missing much by not coming to the Pecos Valley. Here the air is a cure for asthma and those who come for that disease seldom fail to become entirely cured.

Land prospectors and others should beware of so-called land companies who represent that land under the canal not carrying water rights will shortly be allotted water. This is a false statement, for all of the officials of the reclamation service, from Carlisle down, state that no more water will be allotted for the next ten years.

No all stories to the contrary, there will not be water for any of the lands under the Carlsbad project except the 20,000 acres now allotted. Fakirs, grafters, swindlers and worse than thieves have sold lands that can never carry a water right, and sold them at prices that lands with water rights can be had for.

The best land under the project without water right, can be had at \$10 per acre, land that, if ever water is allotted, will get the water for it is first in line, because having abstracts and applications deposited with the reclamation officials. Other lands that are no account even if irrigated are being sold on a kind of lottery scheme that should be prohibited from using the mails for such.

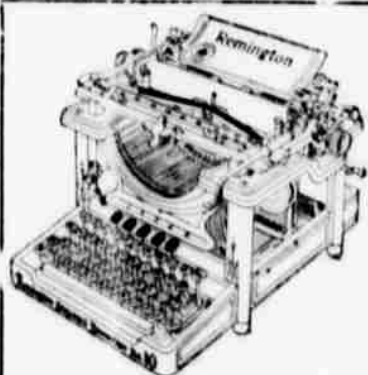

WESTERN NEWS

The New York Times reports that the United States government has received information from a reliable source that the German government is planning to send a large number of troops to the Mexican border.

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WRECK VICTIMS SAFELY LANDED

BALTIC RESCUES 1,650 PASSENGERS OFF FLORIDA AND REPUBLIC.

VALUE OF WIRELESS

ONLY SEVENTY-TWO HOURS BETWEEN THE CRASH AND LANDING.

New York, Jan. 15.—The rescue of the wrecked liner, the Baltic, was a feat of wireless telegraphy. The ship, which was wrecked off the coast of Florida, was rescued by the Republic, which was only seventy-two hours away from the crash and landing.

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NEW MEXICO NEWS SUMMARY

New Mexico Legislative Assembly.

Single, not divided, were the members that attended the convening of the Thirty-eighth Legislative Assembly January 14th. Members, as well as the public which crowded both the Council chamber and the House of Representatives, listened intently with the sense of importance of this session. In all sessions, the first order of business is the reading of the report of the Governor and the report of the Council.

The Council was the first to be organized. The members were all present when Territorial Secretary Nathan Jaffa, in accordance with the national statute, called the assembly to order. Every member of the Territorial Assembly, Governor, Council, and House of Representatives, was present. The Council, under the leadership of Governor Curry, organized the assembly.

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County Commissioners' Meeting.

Governor Curry has sent to each of the county commissioners of the territory the following call:

"My Dear Sir:—At the recent meeting of the Territorial Board of Equalization, steps were taken whereby there will be a material increase in the assessment of property in the territory, and in the proper action by the Territorial Legislature and the various Boards of County Commissioners in the territory we will be able to materially reduce the rate of taxation.

"In order to have more perfect harmony between the territorial and county officials in this important matter, at the request of the Territorial Board of Equalization, I have decided to issue a call for a meeting of the Board of County Commissioners of all the counties in the territory, to be held in the city of Santa Fe, Monday, the 1st day of February, 1908.

If the chairman of the Board of County Commissioners in any of the counties cannot attend in person, they may designate some other member of the board in their stead and if that is not possible, their name and percentage may represent them.

In addition to the matters referred to above, the question of good roads legislation, affecting your interests, will be discussed. I sincerely hope that your county will be represented and I believe that what a good deal of good work may be accomplished in this meeting.

Legislature Organized.

At a joint session of the New Mexico Legislature Monday, the 14th inst., Governor Curry read and encouraged telegrams from the President and from members of Congress on the statehood situation, which indicated that the enabling act would pass the House Thursday.

He then proceeded with his message, which was interrupted by frequent applause.

The Thirty-eighth Assembly organized at noon. The Council, consisting of nine Republicans and three Democrats, elected Charles A. Miers, president; William F. Brogan, chief clerk; Apolonia A. Sena, enrolling and engrossing clerk; Thomas P. Gable, sergeant-at-arms; and Rev. Gabino Rendón, chaplain; Jose Gallegos, mess-sender; Porfirio Olguen, watchman.

The house elected E. A. Miers speaker.

Cruel Practical Joke.

A Las Vegas dispatch of the 16th inst. says: As a result of a senseless practical joke played upon him by some seatter-brained fellow workers, Earl West, formerly of Roberts, Ill., lies in the local Santa Fe hospital in a precarious condition. Having been in Las Vegas less than a month, West some time ago went to work in the Santa Fe shops as a boilerwasher. Yesterday his co-workers in order that they might as they termed it, "properly initiate him," set to work to play a practical joke on him. They told him to remove the base plug from a locomotive that the boiler might be washed out, and he, without the slightest suspicion, complied. As he removed the plug, a jet of scalding water shot forth, fearfully burning him. Though suffering in great agony, his recovery is looked for.

CARLSBAD CONTRIBUTION

Receives Credit from King of Italy's Representative for Initiating "Queen Helena Fund" for Widows and Orphans of Victims of Messina Disaster.

Fund Already Amounts to More Than Seven Thousand Dollars Still Growing.

The Rev. E. McQueen Gray of Carlsbad, the well known Episcopal divine who started the "Queen Helena Fund" for the relief of the widows and orphans of the victims of the Straits of Messina disaster, has received a letter from the Italian Ambassador in which the Baron des Planches states that the fund initiated by Rev. Gray already amounts to more than seven thousand dollars, the \$500 contributed by Carlsbad, New Mexico, having formed the nucleus of a special fund to be placed in the hands of the Queen of Italy. The second draft from Carlsbad includes \$20.30 from Kenia collected by Mrs. Cowgill. It is to be hoped that the other communities will lose no time in forwarding the same contributed to Rev. Gray for transmission to the Queen of Italy.

A translation of a part of the Ambassador's letter is as follows:

"Royal Italian Embassy, Washington.

January 20th, 1909.

"My dear and Reverend Friend,

I have just received your kindly letter of the 14th instant, in which you are so kind as to send me another draft this time for \$100 towards the "Queen Helena Fund."

In such sorrowful circumstances, every contribution is welcome, and the sums you have sent me are by no means insignificant as from your letter, you would have them appear."

This "Queen Helena Fund," started by the first contribution from Carlsbad, has now reached more than seven thousand dollars, the principal contributions being the Italian ladies in Washington, and the "Christian Herald" which is calling for subscriptions through the medium of its columns.

The letter concludes, as follows: "Renewing to you the expression of my sincere gratitude for the help which, thanks to your generous initiative, has been received for those unfortunate victims of the earthquake. I seized the opportunity to convey to you the assurance of my most distinguished consideration and my friendliest regard.
