1. BLACK ISSUES IN HIGHER EDUCATION magazine recently named its top 100 minority degree producers. UNM ranks second in producing American Indian baccalaureates in the biological sciences. The magazine is the only national analysis to use the most recent data from the U.S. Department of Education (2002-03 academic year). The top 100 appeared in the June 2, 2004 edition.
2. THE UNM STAFF COUNCIL has established a new, weeklong event, "Celebrating UNM Staff Week," to be held on campus July 19-24. The opening event features an art exhibition and reception highlighting the diverse artistic talents of UNM staff.
