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adequacy of the public cannot be explained in that manner. Nevertheless more water than that afforded by the seasonal rainfall would be necessary for successful farming.

There is good hunting in the nearby Sandias and San Pedro ranges. The buildings were constructed of blocks of Pennsylvanian limestone (Hogdona formation) and of the Red Abo formation from the Sandia heights.

Because of a change of plans, work at Parko was discontinued after six periods of excavation, in favor of Bendall's 'Puaray'.

INTERNATIONAL SYMPOSIUM IN PHILADELPHIA

A program of the Symposium at Philadelphia is in Dr. Erdridge's office and is available to those who are interested in that concern. As far as is known the New Mexican attendance has been limited to three: Mr. Burnett of Burnett Cave fame, Uncle Will Ecker of western Oklahoma who has worked in the Clovis area, and Donovan Senter of Harvard. There will be a volume of the papers presented at the Symposium published later under the sponsorship of the Academy of Natural Sciences of Philadelphia. More explicit information on this will be forthcoming shortly. See "Science" of March 26 and "Life" of April 5 for accounts of the development of the symposium.

The United States Geological Survey, according to J. J. Hendron, M.A. '35, Park Service, Rito de los Frijoles, in making the new topographic survey of Bendeliers South Mesa has located eighty-odd ruins in about 2 1/2 square miles between the hotel and Emperor crossing. There are about six square miles in the whole, the remainder to be surveyed. This abundance of ruins infers a large aboriginal population of the area, and should give the Park Service archaeologist plenty to do in the future.

The Department of Anthropology of the University of Chicago has announced two lecture and four research courses for the Summer Quarter, 1937. Dr. Hoiyer is to give both lecture courses - "General Introduction to Linguistics" and "The American Indian". The research courses under Drs. Cole, Redfield and Hoiyer are in the fields of Social Anthropology, Ethnology, Archaeology and Linguistics.
