EARLY DETECTION IMPROVES chances of success in cancer treatment. Edward Flynn and fellow researchers at the UNM Cancer Center are using nanotechnology to detect breast cancer cells earlier and more effectively than conventional methods like mammograms. The new technology may allow doctors to detect breast cancer up to two and a half years earlier than conventional screening methods. <http://news.unm.edu/?p=15267>
