FRASER MOUNTAIN COPPER COMPANY

As Seen By the Editor of the Taos Cresset on a Trip to the Booming Camp of Twining.

The Fraser Mountain Copper Company is now employing directly about sixty-five men and indirectly quite a number more.

The large mill and smelter building is nearly completed and the machinery is being arranged and the smelter put in.

All the machinery, which includes five concentrators, five roll-two compressors, two water wheels, electric dynamos and all the smelter apparatus is now in the building.

The pipe lines from the two branches of the Hondo, which furnish the water for power are nearly completed.

The track, horizontal and incline, is all laid and work has been resumed in the mines, three shifts being employed at one place and a like number will be put on two other places shortly, to take out ore and extend drifts and cuts.

All the buildings are wired for electric lights and the wires are now being strung in the tunnels and other openings in the mines and the lights will be in use in a few days.

The telephone between the office and the mine are in operation now.

Ore will be moving in a few days to the bins at the mill which have a capacity of about fourteen hundred tons.

A additional cabins and rooming houses are being constructed for more men and many other improvements are being made and the camp certainly presents a lively appearance.

Six hundred and thirty thousand pounds of machinery, as shown by the freight bills, have been brought in and used in the erection of the plant, which is undoubtedly a great deal more than has ever been used in any other mining operations in New Mexico.

Everything will be completed and put in operation shortly after the first of June and from present indications there is little doubt but what the output will be large and continuous.

The immense vein, or ledge of ore, one hundred and fifty feet wide, will give the large plant, or a larger one, all it can do for years to come and we confidently expect to see the production of metals in Taos county exceed that of any other section of the Territory from the time the mill of the Fraser Mountain Copper Company starts.

COURT DECISION.

Entry in Land Office Prevents Relocation While It Stands.—After the entry of a mining claim in the office a relocation of the premises cannot be made by another so long as that entry stands, and such relocation acquires no rights of possession or otherwise which will sustain a suit by him in the courts to compel a conveyance to him of the legal title. PERT AND PERSONAL.

The strength of the staff of the Governor of the Territory is 20 soldiers. It is related of Samuel Alvin Sperry, who has just died in Reno county, Kansas, that he was one of a family of 14 children, all of whom lived to be more than 75 years old.

Dillon Boone, of Albany, was one day talking to a druggist and a surgeon, while nearby stood an undertaker's wagon. A friend hurried along, and as he shot by he murmured: "Driest, dearest, surgeon and undertaker's wagon; all pass."

Dr. Robert J. Irvine, physician in charge of the Sing Sing hospital, advocates an indeterminate sentence for criminals, so that those who show no evidence of reform need not be released. He says the present system sends prisoners out worse morally than when they go in.

Dr. Max Uthe, of the University of California, recently returned from Peru, where he explored many ancient ruins of cities and valleys never before seen by the eyes of a white man. He hopes shortly to go still further into the dim past with the hope of uncovering the sources of the first American civilization.

The execution of the body of the late Dr. Robert Grimes, of Cheyenne, has revealed the bullet received by him at the Meeker massacre, where he distinguished himself, as in many other Indian engagements as "Fighting a Peb, the doctor." Then it was thought the wound would be fatal, but Dr. Grimes recovered and for 28 years carried the missile which the surgeons were unable to locate. The lead button weighed more than the ashes of the deceased.

EUROPEAN FCHOES.

There are 5,189,000 Hebrews in Russia, according to the latest census returns.

No less than 725 castles, more or less ancient, stand upon the hills overlooking the Rhine.

A Glasgow steamship which had to travel 450 miles had to pay \$4,500, or ten pounds a mile, for assistance.

From the northern terminus of Norway's most northern railway the sun is constantly in sight from June 5 to July 11.

In Paris male domestic servants are encouraged to marry, as they are observed to be more settled and attentive to their duty than when bachelors. In London such marriages are discouraged, as rendering servants more attentive to their families than to those of their masters.

NOTES FROM ENGLAND.

The metropolitan police of London took after 8,200 miles of roads and streets.

Of the 6,700 Britons killed at their work during the year 1900, no less than 2,800 were women.

There are in the United Kingdom for each 100 people 120 horses, 25 cattle, 70 sheep and 100 pigs.

London's 20 leading hotels accommodate about 2,000 visitors every night and constantly employ 1,500 servants.

Of the 1,000 changes in wages of British workmen during 1900, 1,270 were increases. These changes affected 2,750,000 of workmen.

Swarcston had the coldest day of any recorded in Britain during last year. On January 12, the thermometer marked 10 degrees below zero.

Among the Treasuries at a Indian's funeral was a small quantity of gold in the middle of which was a large diamond.

The average age of the British mill-honors was just last year was 72; of those who died in 1900, 74; years. Baron Armstrong, aged 90, was the oldest.

The corporation of Dover recently discussed the circumstances of the arbitration proceeding between the municipality and the Kent county council. The sum in dispute between the town and the county authorities is only about £200, while the tax costs amount to nearly £2,500. Sir Walsaton Knocker, the town clerk, reported the cost of the arbitration worked out at over one pound per minute.
