EASTERN END NOTES.

Word has reached Capitan that most of the goat breeders in the eastern part of the county have lost very heavily by the recent snow storm. Robt. A. Hurt, the county assessor, is reported to have only 120 left out of a flock of about 1600. John and Jim Hobbs of Ruidoso lost 1200 head. Hurt's and Hobbs' flocks were in the hills south of Ruidoso, and had been recently shorn. Frank Matney is reported to have lost about 400, Henry Fritz 250, Henry Stutz 350, and J. G. Riggle about 400 head. These flocks were in the vicinity of Lincoln. Teofilo Sisneros of Hondo and Cruz Herrera of San Patricio lost about 250 head each. Other owners of smaller flocks report losses of about 50 per cent of their flocks. Most of the animals lost had been recently shorn, and in huddling together for warmth suffocated the weaker ones. The snow is reported to have not reached farther than what is known as "the border," about ten miles east of Picacho, or about the eastern boundary of the county on the east, and about six or eight miles west of Nogal on the west.

About 22 inches of snow fell in the Capitan valleys, and considerably more in the adjacent hills. Over 30 inches fell on the Nogal mesa, and 40 inches around Alto. The sheep and cattlemen and cattlemen and farmers are in high spirits over the prospects of early and abundant grass and water and favorable conditions.

The recent heavy snow has been pretty "tuff" on the goat men, but it is "makin" of the rest of struggling humanity in the arid region.

The justice of the peace court of Capitan precinct has been the scene of considerable activity during the past month. Besides a large number of local cases of various degrees of criminality, several more or less important matters from the eastern and southern parts of the county have been brought before Justice Hightower, whose decisions seem to meet with general approval.

Young E. Hurt of Capitan was arrested by Sheriff Stevens last Friday at the request of the sheriff at Abilene, Texas. He is being held to await the arrival of

the Texas officer. However, from a complication of circumstances, it is doubtful if a requisition for his removal will be honored.

Attorney H. B. Hamilton has about closed a deal whereby he will become a property owner in Capitan, and make it his permanent residence. Mr. Hamilton has resided temporarily in Capitan for some time.

KILLED BOB-CAT AND WOLF.

Edgar D. Park, representing the Sante Fe Realty Syndicate, who has been in Carrizozo the past month, and Tom Maney and R. O. Ficht, locomotive machinists, took a walk to the Mal Pais, four mile west of here, Sunday afternoon to view the famous lava beds. They took guns along in case they might run onto a rabbit. The walk was pleasant but uneventful until they reached the Mal Pais, when they espied what looked like a dog. They decided to take a shot at it, and simultaneously opened fire with their long-range guns. Sixteen shots were fired, and when the smoke cleared away they cautiously approached the object and were pleasantly surprised to find a full-grown lobo wolf dead. The animal was potted in so many places, it was impossible to determine to whose deadly aim it fell a victim, but it was finally agreed that it must have been Ficht, as he had the longer gun. Their sporting blood being aroused, they went on a still hunt for big game, and later treed a wild cat, and perforated it from head to tail. It was unanimously agreed that the cat was Park's meat on account of the rapidity with which he worked his pump gun. They dragged the carcasses to the ranch of M. B. Foreman, who agreed to prepare the pelts. It was the most exciting afternoon these gentlemen had since coming to the territory.

GOAT MEN LOSE HEAVILY.

The storm of last week proved to be more disastrous to the goat men of this county than any season in the history of the industry. The chief difficulty was that the goats had just been shorn, and the storm caught them without their winter clothes.

Nearly every goat man in the county suffered slight losses of

old goats and kids, but the most disastrous losses so far reported in this county were in the flocks of Walker and Hall, of this place, who were holding their goats in the Oscuros, and Robert A. Hurt, of Capitan, who was running his flock near the Capitan mountains. Walker and Hall, out of a flock of 1400 grown goats, lost 900 head, besides about 100 kids; and Hurt, so report hath it, lost 1200 out of a total of 1600. There is a chance, however, for this latter report to be an exaggeration—and we most sincerely hope it is—but in the former there is no room for doubt; for Mr. Walker was in town this week and told how he and his help labored throughout the stormy night of the 10th in an endeavor to save a portion of his flock; how the dead were piled in heaps after the storm had spent its force, and that only 530 were saved.

In December, 1898, Frank Tatti, he and his brother Joe being the pioneer Angora goat men of this county, lost a large number of fine goats in a similar storm to the one just passed. At that time Mr. Tatti's goats were full-fleeced, and the loss was occasioned by the goats drifting into a box canyon, piling in on top of one another, those on top trampling and smothering those underneath.

District attorneys for the various districts have been named, save the one in which Lincoln county is situated, which was held back pending a rearrangement of the district.

W. C. McDonald, of Carrizozo, Cattle Sanitary Board;

Jno. A. Haley, of Carrizozo, to the Bureau of Immigration.

The two last named are reappointments.

The El Paso Herald of the 17th inst., contained the following:

"Announcement is made of the approaching marriage on April 14 of Mrs. Letitia Fitzpatrick to George Lee Ulrick, of Carrizozo, N. M. The ceremony will occur at the home of the bride in the Bassett flats, and will be witnessed only by a few friends.

"The wedding is the culmination of a romance beginning in childhood, the marriage having been prevented at that time by the opposition of parents. The bride was sent off to Europe on a long trip, and Mr. Ulrick, after a time, came west.

"Mr. Ulrick and Mrs. Fitzpatrick both belong to old families of Louisiana.

"Mrs. Fitzpatrick, who came to El Paso five years ago, is well known. She has for some time been connected with a local paper in the capacity of society editor, and has been a contributor at different times to magazines and periodicals. She has been prominently identified with the Civic Improvement league.

"Mr. Ulrick is a prominent business man of Carrizozo, N. M. He is vicepresident of the Exchange Bank at that place, and is also vice president of the Carrizozo Trading company."

Free Public Lectures.

It is not uncommon to hear cultivated men and women of middle age lament the decline of the lyceum system, which did much to raise the standard of taste and knowledge a generation ago. There are still courses of public lectures and entertainments which enliven winter evenings in many small towns and in the cities, but the old system has changed its characteristics and lost a measure of its influence. In its place, however, has risen something which may be even more important—the free lecture courses maintained by many of the larger municipalities, such as New York, Chicago and Boston. The old lyceum lecture dealt frequently with philosophical subjects, and was usually delivered by some one of wide reputation. An admission fee was charged, and the illustrations, if there were any, and that was not often, were produced by the magic lantern. The patrons were drawn mainly from the cultivated and well-to-do. The modern municipal lectures are free, and are usually delivered in the public school-houses. The audiences, says Youth's Companion, are composed largely of persons who cannot afford to pay much for the instruction and entertainment they receive, but who eagerly embrace the opportunity for mental culture. The subjects of the lectures cover an immense range. The courses are frequently diversified by evenings which are given to music or other wholesome entertainment. They enjoy the great advantage of the stereopticon and the vitascope, and enlist the services of many eminent specialists. Their purpose is to reach those into whose lives comes the least of healthful joy and the smallest opportunity for knowledge. New York city alone has more than a hundred of these lecture centers, all well-known and well patronized. Although free to the audiences, these lectures and other entertainments are, of course, not free to the municipalities which maintain them. Yet they are so useful, and so admirably adapted to educating, entertaining and uplifting the people, that even the country town could spend money wisely by the organization of such courses.

So even the Esperantists intend to abolish the "world language" which they sought to introduce. The New York Esperanto has decided that the language is too full of logical "defects" to be worth wasting any more time on. This is giving the "world language" the cold shake. And really there does not seem to be much room for it. Some one who has been making a lingual census reports that there are now 70,000 more words in the English tongue than in French, German, Spanish and Italian combined, and at the rate English is growing in popularity it bids fair to become a pretty satisfactory world's language itself. Then there is the baseball language, the golf language, football lingo, "horse talk" and a whole lot of others. Esperanto never will be missed.

From New York comes the report that the English sparrows there are migrating south to avoid a severe winter, while other places report animals giving signs by their actions that the winter is to be mild and open. There must be some nature-faking going on in the animal world as well as in the human.

Having received the icy mitt, the Duc d'Abruzzi will not mind a little trip to the Arctic regions.

IS IT MISSING LINK?

PARIS PROFESSOR DISCUSSES
VALUE OF RECENT FIND.Skelet in a Cavern Which Resem-
bles Man and Ape—Skull Like
a Man, But Traveled on
All Fours.

Paris. — Wide interest has been aroused among men of science by the recent discovery in the provinces of the nearest approach to the missing link of Darwin yet known. Fragments of a skull and a skeleton were unearthed by two priests, Abbes Bouyassini and Bardon, in a cavern near the Chapelle-aux-Saints, in the Correze district. These were sold to the Paris Museum of Natural History, and Prof. Marcellin Boule, head of the paleontological laboratory, immediately set about reconstructing the skull. After he finished the work he drew up

a report, which was read a few days ago before the Academy of Sciences by Mr. Perrier, the director of the Museum of Natural History.

"It is impossible to say how old these remains are," Prof. Boule explained in his laboratory. "Certainly they date from a period much more remote than 10,000 years ago. Every time I examine them I am inclined to put them back a few hundred years more. This prehistoric man may have lived 150 centuries ago, who knows?"

"What we can say with certainty is that it is the most ancient specimen of the human race—if you can call it that—yet brought before the attention of the scientific world. These fragments of human bones unearthed in America are all of comparatively recent date. The nearest approaches to the missing link have been found in Europe. About 1867 a skull was dug up in the Neanderthal in Germany. It differed slightly from the skull of the chimpanzee and the gorilla, but since the entire bones of the face were lacking there wasn't much to draw reliable deductions from. Since then savants have decided that if this skull bone belonged to a man, he must have been half-witted. Another skull bone was discovered at Spy, in Belgium, in 1890.

"However, this reconstructed skull has the advantage of being almost intact." He picked up the recently discovered specimen, which lay with a number of others on a table. "There are two reasons," he continued, "why we can affirm its great age, and one is the extreme thickness of the skull bone. We have many skulls dating from the time of the Roman republics, and they are much thinner. Only bones that come down from a hundred centuries reach such a high state of petrification. Another reason that we can be sure of its antiquity is the remains of animals which were discovered in the same stratum of rock.

Near by were teeth of a rhinoceros, showing that this prehistoric man existed at a time when the climate of France was tropical. And this rhinoceros was of a species that hasn't lived for centuries. This period was also the period of the long-haired mammoth and a certain kind of stag.

"The skull's main point of resemblance with the human race is the chin bone," Prof. Boule pointed to the skull of a twentieth century Frenchman. "You see that this chin bone comes down from the teeth in a line almost perpendicular. This is never the case with any variety of ape. They invariably have receding chins.

"This is the most striking point of resemblance, although there are minor less apparent ones. In the main, however, this skull shows a close parentage to chimpanzee. You observe the enormous development of the frontal bone, the long skull bone which gives hardly any suggestion of the human forehead. The distance from the top of the skull to the neck is much shorter than in the usual human skull. And the cavity of the nose is noticeably larger."

MAY CROSS OCEAN IN BALLOON.

Intrepid Aeronaut Planning on Dan-
gerous Voyage.

London.—"If I can get a balloon large enough and any degree of assurance of a steady east to northeast wind I will cross the Atlantic from London to the United States. Such a trip has been my life's ambition, and I will do it before I die."

This statement recently was made by Prof. A. E. Gaudron, one of the most intrepid and experienced balloonists in the world, who has just justified his claim to at least one of these titles in breaking the long distance over sea record by piloting his balloon from Alexandra palace, London, to New Alexandrovsky, Russia, a distance of 1,117 miles as the crow flies.

If any man in the world warrants by his extraordinary career the statement that he has the necessary daring and venturesomeness for this seemingly foolhardy feat, it is this aeronaut. Few men have made so many ascents; he long ago lost count of the actual number, but he possesses records of no less than 3,000. He has risked

death so often that his familiarity with danger has bred contempt of it, and he now speaks of his ascents as being but little more hazardous than the vocation of the ordinary man in the street. He can boast of having viewed this earth from a greater distance than any other individual, for from the St. Louis exhibition grounds he ascended more than 20,000 feet, establishing a record that has stood ever since. Ballooning to him is an absolute passion.

HERE IS A FRENCH DAINTY.

Chicken en Casserole Popular with Our Gallic Cousins.

Select a plump spring chicken; clean it and truss it as for roasting. Place in a casserole two tablespoonfuls butter, a carrot and an onion (both cut into slices), two bay leaves and a sprig of thyme. Set the casserole on top of the stove for about ten minutes or until the vegetables are lightly browned in the butter. Pour in then a pint of well seasoned consommé, cover the casserole closely, put it into the oven and braise the chicken for three-quarters of an hour. Ten minutes before the time is up, add two tablespoonfuls of sherry or Madeira and cover again. At the end of three-quarters of an hour drop into the gravy a dozen or more of small potato balls which have been cut from the raw potatoes with a Parisian cutter, and then brown, or saute in butter. At the same time, add an equal number of French champignons. Season gravy with pepper and salt and leave the cover off the casserole that the chicken may brown. After removing it from the oven, sprinkle finely minced parsley over chicken and send it to the table in the casserole.

COFFEE IS DISPLACING TEA.

Takes Place of Latter Beverage at Afternoon Functions.

The number of alluring coffee sets as Christmas presents point to the fact that this drink is becoming more fashionable than tea for the afternoon.

This is a German and a Dutch fashion, and a palatable one. Americans are coffee drinkers, and are quite willing to add another cup to their usual supply. Just how healthful it is left for the doctors to say.

Certainly afternoon tea is an indigestible thing as most people can drink. It takes off the appetite for dinner and creates as much nervousness as coffee.

The afternoon tea habit, however, has never gotten a strong hold upon any large class of people. Whether the afternoon coffee habit will must be left to the future.

To all men, and to the majority of women, it is a far more palatable and stimulating drink than five-o'clock tea.

At any rate girls are serving it in fashionable parlors, people at the restaurants are drinking it, and all sorts of ware is being made up into afternoon coffee sets.

The person who knows good coffee knows too much to make or serve it in anything except earthen or china ware. The metal coffee pot is injurious to the taste and should be avoided.

Oyster Pie.

Line a dish with puff paste. Lay a plate the same size as the dish on top of it; over this put the top crust; the dish supporting it, as the paste must go into the oven before the oysters are put in.

Prepare oysters while crust is cooking. Strain the liquor; thicken it with the yolks of eggs, boiled hard and grated; add a piece of butter and a few fine breadcrumbs; season with pepper, salt and nutmeg.

Stew for five minutes. As soon as the crust is done remove the cover, take out the plate, pour in the oysters and gravy and replace the cover. Serve at once hot.

Frozen Tomato Salad.

From a can of tomatoes take all the large pieces of pulp, press them through a sieve and season highly with salt, pepper, a little tarragon vinegar and a few drops of onion juice. Put this mixture in the freezer as for a water ice. Take out the dasher, work down well in the can, re-pack the freezer and put in the cellar for a couple of hours. Grate or chop fine some English walnuts. Serve the frozen tomato in a bed of lettuce leaves and sprinkle thickly with the walnuts. Serve with mayonnaise in a bowl.

Deep plowing is as essential to the production of crops in an arid country as sunshine is to plant growth. Our farmers can scarcely expect to successfully grow crops in this country without plowing their land deep in the fall and winter. The ground should be broken not less than eight inches, and twelve would be better. Ground that is plowed deep will not only catch more moisture as it falls, but will attract moisture from below.

The snow storms of last week, while disagreeable at the time and causing considerable loss to stockmen in various parts, means more during the year for the stockman and farmer than any one thing else that could have happened. It means green grass and weeds for the sheepman for his lambing season; also some for the cowman and for the farmer moisture enough to bring up his crops and keep them going until the regular rainy season.

The snow in the mountains, before the late storm, was so light that farmers on the eastern slope, that had irrigated farms, were afraid of a shortage of water for irrigating purposes. Fears were also entertained by the rail road people that the supply for the pipe line would be limited. All this is now changed: the mountains are piled sky-high with snow, and there will be an abundant supply of water for everybody.

THE TERRITORIAL LEGISLATURE.

The New Mexico legislature adjourned last night, after having been in session sixty days. It is impossible now to give a just estimate of the legislature's actions, because so many bills were presented and so many killed that until the laws are printed and distributed, which will be a good two months hence, what the assembly has really done will not be definitely known.

One thing stands out boldly, however, even from a superficial observation, and that is: more good bills were killed than were passed. We do not wish to be understood as saying that no good legislation was enacted: far from it. But we do say that a number of good measures in which the people were interested, though introduced, were allowed to die in committee or were killed outright.

Among them might be mentioned, a good road law; the election of territorial officials; a new election law, to replace the farce we now have on the statutes, and a three-cent passenger rate. Another measure that was demanded by the people was a local option law—not prohibition—so that the people in various communities might decide the question as to the sale of intoxicants.

There are a number of new laws that are simply reenactments of antiquated conditions, and shows that this legislature took a step backward instead of forward, which must also be a disappointment to the people. It requires time, as stated above, to sift the good from the bad, and in the meantime we must content ourselves with what is and not pine for what is not.

DINNER OF BAKED THINGS.

With Fish, Lamb or Pork as the Piece de Resistance.

Take a medium sized fish (fresh), wash clean, stuff with dressing. As for turkey sew up, rub with flour, pepper and salt, lay slices of bacon on top, put a little water in pan, bake often, bake in hot oven half to three-quarters of hour. Serve with drawn butter sauce.

Baked Potatoes.—Eight or nine medium potatoes washed in warm water, rub well with lard or butter. Bake three-quarters hour.

Baked Corn and Tomatoes.—Cut the kernels from six ears of corn, take six ripe tomatoes, with skin removed, slice one inch thick, have ready a baking dish, put a layer of corn, one pepper and salt on top, then tomatoes prepared in same manner, then corn and so on until dish is full, put lots of butter and bread crumbs or bits of shredded wheat on top. Bake half an hour in hot oven.

Baked Apple Cottage Pudding.—Beat half a cup of sugar and half a cup of butter (or lard mixed) to a cream, one teaspoonful vanilla, one beaten egg, three-quarters cup of milk, one heaping teaspoonful baking powder sifted in two cups of flour; place slices of pared apple in greased pan and pour mixture over them; bake half an hour in not too hot oven. Serve hot with whipped cream flavored with vanilla.

If fish is not desired a shoulder of lamb or pork with bone removed and stuffed in like manner is also delicious.

FOR THE LUNCHEON TABLE.

Dishes That the "Kiddies" Will Be Sure to Enjoy.

Brown Bean Soup.—Soak one pint brown beans over night, cook three hours in slowly boiling water, mash well, add milk to thin, then butter, pepper, salt, and sugar in such quantity as to cut the crude taste of beans. When in tureen slice over a lemon. Serve with toasted, buttered crackers.

Beet Hash.—Several cold beets chopped, equal amount of cold potatoes, boiled if possible in corned beef liquor and chopped. Mix as for meat hash and heat, seasoning with butter pepper and salt.

Hamburger Steak.—Get 15 cents' worth of round steak and have it run through the machine. Over an equal quantity of stale bread pour sufficient milk to soften; mix meat and bread together, season with salt and pepper; shape into cakes and fry brown. In mixing be careful not to mix bread and meat until they become soggy.

Suet Pudding.—Three cups flour, two teaspoonfuls baking powder, one cup chopped suet, one cup stiff batter. Pour into well greased double boiler and cook three hours. Serve with liquid sauce.

Plowed Field.

Plowed Field is a favorite college girls' fudge. It is made as follows: Two cupfuls of soft (light brown) sugar, one-half cupful of milk, two tablespoonfuls of grated chocolate, one tablespoonful of butter. Stir to dissolve, then boil without stirring to a soft ball (about five minutes). Add one teaspoonful of vanilla. Set in a pan of cold water and stir until it begins to thicken, then pour out quickly as above and score in squares. The addition of a half pound of marshmallows, cut in small pieces, after removing from the fire, suggests that same plowed field mottled with snow.—Montreal Herald.

Baltimore Whip.

Grate the rind of two lemons and squeeze out the juice; add two teaspoonfuls of vanilla, one cup of pulverized sugar, whites of two eggs, and the yolks of four eggs. Beat for ten minutes. Dissolve two boxes of gelatine in a cup of warm water; when cool add to other ingredients drop by drop, then fold in the well-beaten whites of four eggs, beating constantly. Serve with orange juice, sweetened, and marshmallows.

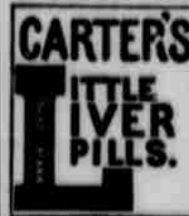

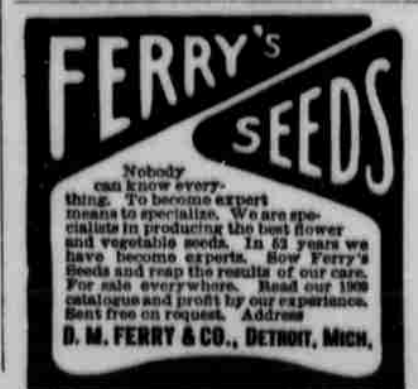

FAVORITE DISH IN HUNGARY.

Ingredients That Go to Make Up the Succulent Goulash.

Flank steak, onions, tomatoes and potatoes go into the making of this popular Hungarian dish. Cut about two pounds of the meat into small cubes and place a layer on the bottom of a perfectly flat-bottomed kettle of good size. Over this put a layer of sliced onion, and so on until the kettle is as full as desired. Add enough cold water to cover the upper layer of meat.

Then put over the fire and let the contents come to a boil. Allow two cupsful sliced or canned tomatoes to each quart of the onion and meat mixture, and after the onions and meat reach the boiling point (on no account before) pour the tomato over the mixture, but do not stir. Then push the kettle back on the stove or over the gas simmerer, where it will simply bubble on one side. Simmer two hours. Have ready some small potatoes of uniform size, peeled, and put into the kettle, pushing the meat and onions gently to one side to make room for them. The contents of the pot must not be disturbed more than is absolutely necessary. As soon as the potatoes are done, which should be in 20 or 25 minutes, serve.

MINCE MEAT FOR PIES.

How to Make the Filling That is So Popular Just Now.

Two pounds of beef suet, two pounds and a half of chopped raisins, one pound and a half of cleaned currants, two pounds of chopped apples, two pounds of brown sugar, half a teaspoonful of salt, half a pound of mixed peel, one teaspoonful of ginger, one teaspoonful of cinnamon, one teaspoonful of ground cloves, three lemons, four tablespoonfuls of chopped almonds, half a cupful of brandy and a half cupful of port or home-made wine. Clean the fruits and put them into a dry jar; add the suet, apples, peel and almonds chopped fine, sugar, salt, rind and strained juice of lemons, brandy and wine. Mix all thoroughly together and keep well covered.

Snowballs.

These are attractive in appearance and delicious to the taste. Beat the yolks of three eggs, add three tea spoons of sugar and beat again; then add two tablespoonfuls of white wine, one-quarter teaspoon grated lemon rind, one-half teaspoon vanilla and two cups sifted flour. Orange juice and rind may be substituted for the wine and lemon rind if preferred. Knead the dough, then roll out quickly into a thin sheet and cut into circles with a biscuit cutter and fry at once in deep fat (using a wire basket if possible), until a delicate brown. Drain on paper and roll in powdered sugar.

English Molded Meat.

This makes a good emergency dish: Soak a quarter ounce of gelatine in a half cup good stock. Add when softened to one pound minced beef or veal (cooked), with herbs and seasoned to taste. Warm up, then pour into molds and let stand until cold. When ready to serve, turn out, decorating with hard-boiled eggs, a little chopped parsley and savory jelly.

Lamb Fritters.

Chop a cup of cold cooked lamb. Make a batter of one egg well beaten, two-thirds cup of milk, one-fourth teaspoon salt and one and one-third cup of flour sifted with one rounding teaspoon baking powder. Add the chopped lamb and stir well; drop from spoon into deep hot lard and fry to a nice brown. These are nice for supper on a cold night.

Cocoonut Sauce.

Fry lightly together in a stewpan two ounces of fine flour and two ounces of butter, then mix in three-quarters of a pint of veal or chicken stock, and stir till it boils; add a quarter of a good-sized grated cocoonut and a gill of cream, boil together for about ten minutes, strain and serve.

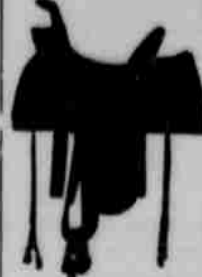
