The board of county commissioners met at Lincoln, on Monday, April 5th, 1909, in regular session.

Present: Robt. H. Taylor, chairman; R. A. Duran and C. W. Wingfield, commissioners; J. G. Riggie, clerk, and Chas. A. Stevens, sheriff.

The minutes of last minutes were read and approved.

In the tax matter of Lin. Branum, it is ordered by the board that he be allowed \$200.00 exemption, and the collector is ordered to correct tax roll accordingly. In the matter of the Colorado Telephone Co. surrender of the Warnack franchise the clerk is hereby instructed to return the same for correction.

## FOR FIRE PROTECTION

A meeting was called last night for the purpose of meeting a representative of the Howe Engine Co., and to listen to what he had to say as to the merits of his engine for fighting fire. The representative proposed to give a practical demonstration of what his engine could do, provided he could properly interest our people. Accordingly, a committee was appointed to see the people of the town and solicit subscriptions for the purpose of purchasing the engine.

The engine, besides having pump, hose, ladders and places for sixteen men, has a chemical attachment which can be used in connection. Any well, at a depth of not more than 25 ft. may be used as a water supply, and there are few places in town but what would have a sufficient water supply at a time of emergency. It is also hoped and believed that the railroad company can be interested, and that mains may be laid in the main streets, which would give an additional water supply.

The proposition is to locate the engine house centrally, have a volunteer fire department and arrange the most practicable way in giving fire alarms when their services are needed. There is no question of the necessity of fire protection, and if the test proves satisfactory let's have it.

## A VETERAN SHOWMAN

JOHN F. SUTTON, WHO HELPED MAKE BARNUM FAMOUS.

Also Contributed Greatly to Success of Jenny Lind, Patti, Tom Thumb and Others—Now Living in Retirement.

Baltimore, Md.—Only a short distance from this city lives the pioneer "press agent" of America, Mr. John F. Sutton. He is also a famous showman and impresario. Much of the success of Jenny Lind, Adelina Patti, Artemus Ward, General Tom Thumb and the famous Barnum himself was due to the fertile imagination, initiative and earnest efforts of Mr. Sutton. Now, at the ripe old age of 84, he is living a retired life in his country home, Gunston Lodge at Monkton.

The veteran of the amusement profession, while past the eighties, is exceedingly active for a man of his age, being a well-preserved and cultured

English gentleman. He is quick in conversation, and is still able to deal with any situation with the same acuteness that attracted the attention of P. T. Barnum, the great circus man, when Sutton was but a printer's lad of 14. Barnum got Sutton to go into the show business and afterward promoted him by degrees, until he managed the entire circus, and acted as treasurer and press agent in conjunction. Mr. Sutton tells a story that once when they were short of clowns he and P. T. Barnum dressed up and got into the ring and played clowns. It was a long time afterwards he said, that Barnum let it be known that he kept an audience in an uproar, while it thought him a \$25-a-week clown.

Sutton seemed to be born to execute the plans of Barnum's genius. The great showman decided that there was money in a baby show in New York. Accordingly, the press agent of the Barnum show was sent over the United States to look for babies, and get them together for an exhibition. There were babies tall and babies short. It is a strange fact that one of the prize-winners at the baby show secured by Sutton was Bates, afterward called the American giant, who traveled with Barnum in his older days.

Mr. Sutton was the courier for the famous Jenny Lind. Yankee genius is a boasted topic in this country, but it was this London man who first suggested the idea of placing advertisements on soap and other available articles. It was thus he advertised Jenny Lind. Pocket mirrors, match boxes and pocket combs were distributed freely in this way for advertising the great singer.

When Tom Thumb went on the stage, coming from the hut of a fisherman, it was Sutton who first booked him and started him on a tour. Tom went to the court of Queen Victoria,

and Prince Albert, then a lad, was given a peep at the dwarf, the nurse bringing in her little charge while Sutton made Tom Thumb talk to the prince. Napoleon II., was attracted by the genius of Sutton and the old gentleman holds letters and testimonials from the last emperor of France as a proof of the monarch's friendship to him.

Mr. Sutton handled the advertising and did the newspaper work for the first tour of Adelina Patti with such success that the name of Patti will live forever probably. Sutton was the first man to introduce the electric light into the show business. This was in New York in the early seventies. The lights were placed on the top of the main tent pole and at the front entrance of the Barnum show. They proved of much curiosity to the public and proved a good business investment. After many years in the show business and Mr. Sutton had acquired considerable wealth he retired and purchased the famous painting "Nana" and put it on exhibition. The painting attracted great attention and he made a large fortune out of it.

### CITY HAS CEMETERY FOR DOGS.

Regular Plot at Cripple Creek, Col., for Interment of Canines.

Denver, Col.—Paris may lead the world with its fads and fancies, but out in the wild and woolly west is a city that is at least only one jump behind the queen of fads and follies. Although until a few years ago Cripple Creek was a rough mining camp, it now has culture a-plenty, and one of its manifestations is a dog cemetery, a luxury which the French capital has had but a short time.

The Colorado city has a regular plot of ground for the interment of canines, and what is more, the grounds are kept up in the most careful manner. Cripple Creek cannot boast of so very many birthdays, but the cemetery for the burial of dogs was one of the early projects. It was started in the days when men who had been poor all their lives suddenly found themselves to be millionaires in this great gold camp, and being poor men just a few days before, they still loved the dogs who had gone on long prospecting tours with them and shared their sorrows and hardships. One of the early pioneers of the camp who left a fortune behind him, bequeathed the sum of \$100 a year to the maintenance of the grave of his faithful dog "Sylvanite."

The belles of Paris may make much over their pampered pets and have

their remains laid away with no little pomp, but the funeral of a well known dog of a wealthy Cripple Creek miner is a state occasion. The casket and other trimmings are of the best material. One of the leading mine owners of the camp recently was greatly put out because he could not secure the services of a regular hearse in which to convey to the grave the body of his dead canine friend. As a result of the refusal, he chartered all the hacks in the city, the leading vehicle serving as a conveyance for Towser.

## TO SERVE AT LUNCHEON.

Some Standbys Which May Always Be Called Upon by Hostess.

Eggs a la Martin, named after the famous restaurant in New York, is a very good luncheon or supper dish and easy of accomplishment.

Poach the desired number of eggs (one to each person) in muffin rings; allow to get cold in the rings, then pour over them, into the rings, a strong chicken or beef stock and put on ice to harden.

Cut rounds of boiled ham the size of the muffin rings, and when the eggs are jellied remove from the rings, and placing an egg on each round of ham, decorate across each with a narrow strip of either red or green pepper laid crosswise. Place in a bed of cress on each plate.

Baked rice is a great standby, too, but the rice must be perfectly boiled to insure its success.

In the bottom of a baking dish put eight or ten bits of butter, then a layer of well-boiled rice, next to a layer of butter, and so alternating rice and butter, till the last layer is butter; then put in the oven and watch till the top rice is crisp and golden brown when it must be served hot.

The coffee may be served in the dining room or in the drawing room afterward, when little groups form for more intimate talk.

Unless cards are to be played it is not necessary to provide after luncheon amusement for your guests.

## AN AFTER-DINNER DELICACY.

Macaroni the Chief Ingredient of the "Roman Pudding."

Line a well buttered pudding dish with strips of cooked macaroni, laying the pieces close together in circles in bottom of pan and against the sides to look like "logs" when pudding is turned upside down to serve. Cook one-fourth of a cup of bread crumbs in a cup of milk five minutes; add two tablespoonfuls of butter and two cupfuls of Brussels sprouts that have been boiled tender in salt water and well drained. Add a tablespoonful each of chopped parsley and grated onion, two well beaten eggs, and pepper and salt to taste. Mix and turn into prepared mold; sprinkle over the top three tablespoonfuls of grated cheese and cover with chopped cooked macaroni. Put on a lid and bake in a pan of hot water for 30 minutes. Turn out carefully on a dish, bottom uppermost, and pour over or around it the following tomato sauce:

Boil tomatoes and onions together, add salt and red pepper, whole cloves. When done strain through colander and thicken with flour as for gravy and add a piece of butter.

The dish may be garnished with sprays of parsley.

### To Make Hard Soap.

Take one five-pound can of clarified grease, put it in a tin pan and melt slowly. Take one pound can of lye, put it in either a large earthen bowl or pitcher and pour a quart of cold water on it; stir occasionally with a wooden stick until it is dissolved, then let stand till cool. Put one tablespoonful borax in a cup and add one tablespoonful turpentine, one tablespoonful ammonia and one tablespoonful kerosene oil; stir till borax is dissolved. Pour the lye into the melted grease, stirring constantly; then add the borax mixture and stir ten minutes or longer, the longer the better, till it gets thick andropy. Let it stand till about half congealed, then cut with a knife into convenient pieces. Let stand over night and it will be hard and white.

### Raspberry Omelet.

Beat the yolks of five eggs light with a heaping teaspoonful of pulverized sugar. Into this stir two teaspoonfuls of corn starch, dissolved in four tablespoonfuls of cream, then the stiffened whites of the eggs. Cook in a frying pan until set, spread with red raspberry jam, fold, sprinkle with pulverized sugar and serve hot as a dessert.

The wealth of the Territory increased \$25,000,000 in 1908. It is the land of the orchard fruits, alfalfa and garden vegetables. Irrigation plants completed, or in the course of construction, will water 500,000 acres. These are government plants. One of them contemplates the largest storage reservoirs in the world.—Earth.

# SON OF INDIAN RAJAH

WORLD'S RICHEST PRINCE A STUDENT AT HARVARD.

Jaisingrao Gaikwar, Who Will Some Day Rule 3,000,000 People of Baroda, Preparing Himself for Future Position.

Boston.—The future ruler of 3,000,000 subjects and the heir of riches that make the famed wealth of Midas pale into insignificance, Prince Jaisingrao Gaikwar, the son of an Indian rajah, is now preparing himself at Harvard for his future position.

When the Gaikwar of Baroda, second in importance among the rajahs, visited America two years ago, he was so pleased with the methods of teaching at Harvard that his last word to President Eliot was that his sons would be sent to finish their education at Cambridge.

Accordingly, Jaisingrao Gaikwar, 19 years old, elder son of the rajah, is

now installed in a sumptuous suite of rooms in upper Westmorley court, one of the most exclusive "outside" dormitories.

The heir to an annual income of \$12,000,000. Prince Gaikwar, as he is known, asserts his democracy by a comparatively modest college existence, and an attitude of good fellowship which has already made him popular among Harvard men.

Among the many heirs to vast fortunes who have attended Harvard, the future rajah of Gaikwar can probably boast of the most fabulously wealthy father.

To-day the maharajah's public revenues reach a total of \$6,000,000 a year, while his private resources are said to bring him as much more.

The education of the young ruler to American ways is but a step in the revolution of the Baroda state.

Born of a race which once delighted in most inhuman cruelty, the Gaikwar of Baroda now seeks to give his people the best that modern civilization of the west has to offer. He comes from fighting ancestry, being a descendant of that great Mahratta soldier, Damaji Gaikwar. His title, Shamsheer Bahadur, was won by that warrior at the battle of Bellapore, at the end of the seventeenth century, when the imperial army of Delhi was defeated. The title was conferred by the shahu raja of Satara in admiration of his bravery.

He declares that American prosperity is the result of one of the most equitable forms of government in the world, and he hints that the future progress of Baroda will owe much to the example which is held up by this country.

College he likes. He says that he enjoys it as much as anyone else, and from the large number of friends that he has already acquired it is safe to say that the prince is liked by the college.

In personal appearance Prince Gaikwar is olive-complexioned, with oval face, plump cheeks, lips a little thicker than those of the average American, and with luminous, dark eyes. He is slightly undersized in height, but usually carries himself erect and square-shouldered.

Prince Jaisingrao's studies at Harvard have been selected with a view to the responsibilities which will fall to him when he returns to the far east. As the elder son he is fitting himself to carry on the work of ruling the destinies of the 3,000,000 subjects over whom his father is now absolute ruler.

In the '70's Mulhar Rao, Gaikwar, spent enormous sums of money upon contests of athletes and animals. He was passionately fond of cruel sports in which the lives of men were endangered, and personally superintended the arrangements that concerned them. Elephant fights and rhinoceros fights were of almost daily occurrence. He kept in his courts many perfect athletes, celebrated throughout the whole of India, and wrestlers who came from the Punjab and Travancore.

## RACE HORSES TO A CHURCHMAN.

The Queer Legacy Left to a Paris Archbishop.

Paris.—In all ages devout Catholics have bequeathed legacies of differing size and description to popes, cardinals and archbishops, but it is safe to say that no prelate ever was more thoroughly astounded than the archbishop of Paris when he awoke some time ago to find himself the possessor of a celebrated racing stable.

"I beg pardon for intruding," Monsig. Amette's secretary came into the archbishop's study with an air of much perturbation one morning, "but a woman, the Viscountess de Raineville, has just died and left her fortune of several millions, including a racing stable, to your excellency."

When Monsigneur Amette understood that the legacy was left to him personally and not to the church, he refused to accept it. But just after his secretary had left the archbishopric to communicate Monsigneur Amette's decision to the executors of the will, word came that the court had ratified the bequest, so there was nothing to do but to accept the legacy, including the embarrassing item of the race horses.

The archbishop immediately gave orders for the sale of the stud, also of the viscountess' properties, comprising much real estate, a breeding farm and a historic chateau at Allenville in Normandy. The legacy, converted into cash, will be used for various charitable organizations.

If the august and unwilling owner of race track favorites fancied that he could wash his hands of proprietary duties so easily, he soon discovered his mistake. His man of affairs soon came to him with a complication. The horses were to be put at auction at a big establishment in the Rue de Pontillon. But some critics had pointed out to this man of affairs that the auctioneer was a Jew. Was this a serious enough consideration to warrant the intervention of the archbishop? It evidently was, for a few days later the honor of auctioneering the horses was awarded to a rival establishment, where the sale is to take place shortly.

During the last years of her life the viscountess, a woman in her seventies, very naturally had not taken as much interest in the horses as her husband had done. He was a staunch royalist deputy and his wife apparently was a strong sympathizer with his anti-republican ideas, for she delighted in giving names which were caricatures of prominent governmental personalities to her horses. Clemenceau was transformed into Clemenceotte and Caillaux became Caillalette.

Because of the viscountess' lack of interest in race track triumphs or defeats, very few of the horses which will be auctioneered are particularly celebrated, although former victories of the De Raineville stable still are remembered in sporting circles.

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# News From The Capital

## First White House Auto for Mrs. Taft



WASHINGTON.—In the eyes of feminine visitors to the national capital an object of pre-eminent interest just now is the handsome new \$7,000 automobile in which Mrs. William H. Taft may be daily seen spinning about the streets of Washington. Not only is the new car the first vehicle of the kind ever maintained for a first lady of the land, but it is practically the first automobile used by a mistress of the White House, for Mrs. Roosevelt rarely entered an automobile, being in full sympathy with her husband's well-known prejudices on the subject.

The automobile which has been installed as Mrs. Taft's equipage of state is distinctly the property of the new mistress of the presidential mansion. President Taft has a steam automobile of the regulation touring car type, and another of the same description will be added later, these two machines being purchased with the recent congressional appropriation of \$12,000 and being applied to official

conveyances—that is, for the use of the president and his secretaries in the discharge of their duties.

Mrs. Taft's new \$7,000 gasoline automobile of the limousine type is the personal property of the new tenants of the White House, purchased from their private funds and designed for use on all occasions when their journeyings about Washington and in the suburbs have no official significance.

Mrs. Taft's car, like the other White House automobiles, has the right of way over all vehicles in Washington, and will not be compelled to observe any speed limit. Her car is upholstered in dark blue broadcloth and her chauffeur wears a neat and unostentatious livery of corresponding tint. On either side at the front are mirrors, which enable the chauffeur to keep constantly informed as to what vehicles are following him, and thus minimize the danger of collisions at turns.

The interior of the car is the embodiment of luxury. There is an electric dome light, supplied with current from the storage battery of sufficient capacity to keep it aglow for 24 hours. Occupants of the tonneau can communicate with the chauffeur by means of a speaking tube, or may employ an annunciator, which causes to flash up before the eyes of the car driver such signals as "start," "stop," "slow," "faster," "right," "left," "home," etc.

## Women Walking to Improve the Figure



PEDESTRIANISM has hundreds of devotees among persons of wealth and distinction in Washington society. Women, in particular, who recognize in this form of exercise an antidote for late hours and errors of diet, as well as a remedy for the elimination of that modern bugbear, superfluous flesh, are taking it up with a will.

Mrs. Knox, wife of the secretary of state, is especially fond of a brisk walk, although a splendid automobile and other conveyances are ready for her call. Mrs. George von L. Meyer, wife of the secretary of the navy, is another cabinet hostess who is frequently seen in the streets of the northwest or with her face turned toward the suburbs. Mrs. John B. Hen-

derson often walks from Boundary Castle, her home, far out in Sixteenth street to the shopping district. The Baroness Mayor des Planches, wife of the Italian ambassador, is another excellent walker.

MISS ALICE BLECH, clerk in the bureau of American republics, has been selected by Mrs. Taft as her secretary. Miss Hagner, who served Mrs. Roosevelt in a similar capacity, has been transferred to a position in the bureau of trade relations in the state department.

Miss Alice Blech, besides being a good stenographer, speaks German fluently and has also a knowledge of

French and Spanish, all of which will be extremely useful to her in the duties of her new position.

This position has come to Miss Blech through no influence, her appointment being governed entirely by her unusual capabilities to fill the position of secretary to Mrs. Taft.

During her several years' association with the bureau of American republics she has gradually risen in salary and position. The director of the bureau speaks of her in the highest terms as a clerk, laying particular stress on her fitness as a secretary. Correspondence was her chief work in her former position, and her systematic handling of letters of different natures will be beneficial to her in her new position at the White House.
