FOR THE FISCAL YEAR JULY 1, 1975 - JUNE 30, 1976

During its 15th year of publication, the Journal printed more pages than ever before, while simultaneously reaching a new high in subscription sales income which increased over 10%. In spring, 1976, the NRJ co-sponsored, along with the Instituto Mexicano Matias Romero de Estudios Diplomaticos; the Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum; and the American Society of International Law, a Conference on the Ecology of the Gulf of California, held at Kino Bay, Sonora, Mexico. The proceedings of this Conference will be published in the July 1976 issue.

Review of Publication Year

Each of the four issues published this year featured a symposium, although in most instances the symposium was accompanied by one or more articles on topics of varied, general interest.

In July, 1975, articles on "Legal Institutions and Pollution: Some Intersections Between Law and History" and "Urban Water Management of an International River: The Case of El Paso-Juarez" shared that issue with a symposium on "Land Use Planning." The October, 1975, issue was devoted to a symposium on "Natural Resource Property Rights," plus "Conservation of Extinctible Species." In January, 1976, an issue with W. R. Derrick Sewell of the University of Victoria and Timothy J. O'Riordan of the University of East Anglia serving as co-editors was focused on "Public Participation in Resource Decisionmaking." That issue is being republished as a paperback book by the Westview Press of Boulder, Colorado. The April, 1976 issue contained a symposium on "Environmental Impact Statements," put together by Associate Editor Helen Ingram of the University of Arizona, plus an article by Dr. Mel Eisenstadt, a June 1976 graduate of this Law School as well as a chemical engineer, with Professor Al Utton, on "Solar Property Rights."

The April 1977 issue will be of varied content, including among others articles entitled "An Economic Analysis of Transfer of Development Rights," "Higher Education, the Church, and Environmental Values," "Regulatory Policy-Making: Toward a Framework of Analysis," and "The Iceberg Cometh: International Law Related to Iceberg Exploitation."

Finances

The half-time position needs to be increased to 25-30 hours per week, and should be budgeted for accordingly for fiscal year 1977-78.

8,200 copies of four issues containing 916 pages were published at a total billed printing cost of \$19,398.41, including reprints. The April 1976 issue was delayed in publication, and billed only an estimated \$4,000.; therefore, approximately \$655. of unbilled charges on that issue will be billed against fiscal year 1976-77.

Because of the increase in the amount of printed pages over the previous year's 780, as well as higher paper costs and labor charges, the per copy cost increased by \$.24 to \$2.36 each. Volume cost therefore increased to \$9.44 per volume, derived from actual printing costs plus delayed billing charges.

Rates will once again be raised by \$1. per year to \$14. annually, or \$26. for a two-year subscription, effective January 1977. Price of single copies of back issues also will be raised. Additionally, the total number of pages printed during the fiscal year will not be increased.
