The war tank in the interest of Victory Loan arrived in town last Sunday morning at 7:30 a. m. and gave exhibition until 11 a. m. There were 20 persons in charge of the tank and they were entertained at breakfast at Frye hotel by the men's and ladies local Victory Loan committee.

The tank was named "Mud Puppy," has a speed capacity of 8 miles an hour, weighed 700 tons and had 400 horse power engine; the tank had seen actual service in France and was camouflaged in yellow and green. Judge Holloman of Santa Fe introduced Captain Barker, who made an address. Captain Barker had seen 15 months service in France, 8 months of which was in the trenches; he lost an arm two weeks before armistice was signed, at Arronnes. He smiled over the loss of his arm and said he believed he took the loss better than some people who gave up \$50. for Victory Bond. Gov. Larrazolo made an excellent address; he spoke particularly to the boys and girls; told them to be honest and practice thrift; that they were all Americana and the right to become president of the United States; that he was a poor boy and was now governor and who knows but what some day one of the boys in the audience might not some day be governor, senator or president. He urged all to support the Victory Loan and buy liberally. The high school glee club sang several songs. Many people came in from the surrounding country to hear the speakers and see the tank.

THE CHARITY OF AGE.

In these days of vicious criticism and scathing denunciation, if one almost loses faith in democracy, he should turn to the wisdom of years for the light that never fails.

"How can you stand by the administration?" was asked of an old G. A. R. man of Las Vegas.

"Wilson is our president" was the quick reply, "and it is the duty of every true American to stand by him."

That simple statement involves the foundation principles of democracy.

The president of the United States represents the United States. No matter how bitter political partisanship before election, the successful candidate when he takes the presidential chair ceases to be of any party. He becomes the head of all. He will make mistakes; he will not please everybody. The opportunity for criticism is as endless as ignorance. But every true American will "stand by the president."

Another G. A. R. man of Las Vegas, a rabid republican all his life, now past three score years and ten, sums the situation up thus: "We have had three great wars; God has given us a great man to guide us through each; Washington, Lincoln and Wilson. Every one should thank God for the right man in the hour of our nation's trial."

When one stops to consider the herculean tasks accomplished, the amazing results achieved, he is small indeed if he can not get a perspective that enables him to see the debt he owes to those who have borne the tremendous responsibility of the world's war. Small indeed is the man who can see only the mistakes of his fellow-man.

It is a poor business policy to put anyone at the head of a business, then distrust him, oppose him, work against him, double cross him, and harrow the life out of him in every way possible, yet that is just what people do who fail to stand by the men the nation has chosen to represent it.

Americans, all! Stand by the president!

Do you think that Jeff will ever be as tall as Mutt?

412 New Mexico Men Have Given Up Lives in War.

Santa Fe, N. M.—The total number of men from New Mexico who died in military service is 412 thus far, according to the New Mexico board of historical service. Of these 144 have Spanish names which is greater than the proportion of men with Spanish names in the service during the great war, for out of 16,000 men on the rolls of the board of historical service, a few over 5,000 have Spanish names. There is not a county that has not contributed at least one man with Spanish name. Roosevelt county having sent one such with its 275 men.

In twenty-three counties tabulated, sending 12,379 men, 3,740 have Spanish names. The counties lacking in the tabulated are Chaves, Lea, Bernalillo, Santa Fe, and San Miguel. Curry county sent three men with Spanish names out of 537 men; Eddy thirteen out of 527; San Juan forty pine out of 320; Valencia 133 out of 217; Union 160 out of 770; San doval, 220 out of 287; Sierra, 89 out of 212; Otero, 69 out of 473; McKinley, 83 out of 507; De Baca, 37 out of 263; Torrance, 69 out of 243; Rio Arriba, 407 out of 484; Grant, 199 out of 1,372; Guadalupe, 194 out of 165; Dona Ana, 22 out of 528; Colfax, 265 out of 1,182; Socorro 526 out of 924 and Mora 249 out of 588.

These proportions may give some sort of an answer to the question so often asked: "What is the proportion of the Spanish-American people in the state at this time?" The question might be easier to answer if there were an agreement as to who is a Spanish-American. Is it a person with a Spanish sur-name? That would exclude everyone who has a Spanish-American mother but a father with a name not Spanish. There are many thousand such in the state. It would exclude some with seven-eighth Spanish-American blood and include others with only one-eighth Spanish blood. Under the law of averages there would be a set-off, and it may be safely argued that every person with Spanish name ought to be set down as a Spanish-American. If that is the case, a careful canvass of the names taken in the census of 1910 indicated that the Spanish-Americans numbered not quite 40 per cent of New Mexico's population.

Today, judging from the registration lists and also from the enlistments, the Spanish-American population is about 35 per cent of the whole. However, the poll lists indicate that the number of Spanish-Americans who cast ballots on election day is almost one-half of the total cast, which seems to indicate that large numbers of the population in the eastern counties especially, are of the shifting class, who have not been long enough in the state to acquire the right to vote or do not care enough about New Mexico politics to cast their ballots.

At a meeting of geologists in Texas it was stated that the future would prove that New Mexico contained more oil than all the other states combined, and that it was only a matter of time when development work would begin on a large scale in New Mexico. We feel this way about it also, and further feel that around Wagon Mound will be found the best oil wells. However, just at present it would be best to invest in Victory bonds, and after paying for the bonds hold on to them; hold them tight and Uncle Sam will pay you the interest when it becomes due, and the amount of the bond when it becomes due. That's sure.

EDITORIALES.

LIBERTAD EXCESIVA.

Se ha detenido Ud. a considerar lo que es un país libre; o ha Ud. simplemente encojido sus hombros, o ha Ud. repudiado cualquier consideración del asunto, sintiéndose que con ser Ud. un Americano está libre y en un país libre.

Se ha mantenido Ud. al tanto durante los pocos años pasados de lo que sucede todos los días aquí en la América; o han los eventos del mundo llamado toda su atención suficientemente para cegar sus ojos o entristecer su mente de lo que ha habido o está ocurriendo en este país?

Piensa Ud. que porque la América es un país libre, que el país está inmune de hechos de agitación de mentes insanas, de gentes que viven y tratan de tirar al gobierno para que la anarquía pueda gobernar, y el infierno sea movido de abajo a este suelo?

Si Ud. cree que la libertad realmente conoce vivir en paz adentro de la ley; dando todo lo que la ley pide, y recibiendo en retorno protección de vida, libertad y propiedad, Ud. es un ciudadano de los Estados Unidos de América; y creyendo como aquí establecido, Ud. espera que otros vivan en los Estados Unidos para dar y recibir de la misma manera, o ser llamado a dar cuenta según la ley. Y Ud. no puede creer o convenir por silencio o consentimiento que libertad da a entender el transferir la ley y orden a una condición que no es reconocida por ley ni justicia, y que cada uno haga como le guste bien o mal.

Se puede decir que libertad es como se llama libertad y eso es más que hondo cutis. Cuando uno se descuida de la ley para exceder su libertad debe ser castigado; cuando uno atenta tirar al gobierno, uno como el de los Estados Unidos por violencia excede de su libertad se hace un traidor, y debe ser tratado como tal.

Por lo tanto cuando leemos de una clase de seres en este país llamándose ellos mismos

I. W. W. y otros nombres, pero que del todo están de mente quienes agitan contra la ley, sociedad y gobierno, nos admiramos que manera de oficiales están bajo manejo del gobierno que no toman acción al momento para castigarlos.

Noventa por ciento de tales seres están de mente, y el otro uno por ciento están buscando notoriedad y poder en el nombre de libertad. El permitir verdadera libertad como definida por nuestra constitución es de permitir a ellos cuando negamos a huéspedes de asilos de locos y penitenciarías.

Ya es tiempo de recordar al hecho de lo que se llama libertad excesiva, y acción evasiva debe ser tomada para curar a los violadores de la definición de esa palabra.

EXCLUSION DE MEXICO.

Entre las razones para no animar a México de entrar en la liga de naciones mientras que Caranza este a la cabeza del gobierno, es la mala fe de su gobierno. Desde 1913 los intereses en deudas nacionales no han sido pagados en México.

Mientras apoderándose de ciertos bonos poseidos por extranjeros, o forzar levas sobre ellos, el gobierno ha tomado para sí ferrocarriles nacionales, carros de calles, líneas que corren a la capital, y líneas de alambres, todas las cuales pertenecen en gran parte a extranjeros. Estas utilidades han sido operadas en una pérdida anual de \$95,000, y no se han pagado a menos que en bonos en los cuales el interés esta en defalco. Estas propiedades tambien han sido injuriadas. Indudablemente el Americano y otros dueños extranjeros de terrenos de aceite y norias están usando su influencia en París para evitar la confiscación amenazante de sus terrenos. Muchos de estos terrenos de aceite fueron comprados años atrás, pero es el plan de Caranza de hacerse dueño de ellos.

VISITA DEL TANQUE.

El tanque de guerra en el interés del Préstamo de Victoria llegó a la villa el Domingo en la mañana a las 7:30, y dió exhibición hasta las once. Había veinte personas que estaban al cargo del tanque, y se les dió su almuerzo en el Hotel Frye por el comité de señores y señoras local del Préstamo de Victoria. Al tanque se le daba el nombre de "Mud Puppy," tiene una capacidad en rapidez de ocho millas por hora, pesa 700 toneladas y tiene un poder el ingenio de 400 caballos; el tanque vio servicio actual en Francia y fué pintado en verde y amarillo. El Juez Holloman, de Santa Fe introdujo al Capitán Barker, quien hizo un discurso. El Capitán Barker vio quince meses de servicio en Francia, ocho meses de los cuales se estuvo en las trincheras, perdió un brazo dos semanas antes de firmarse el armisticio en Argonne. El Gobernador Larrazolo hizo un elocuente discurso, habló particularmente a los niños y niñas, les dijo que fueran honestos y practicarán la economía, y que todos eramos Americanos y tenemos derecho de ser presidentes de los Estados Unidos; que él fué un joven pobre y ahora era gobernador del estado de Nuevo México, y nadie podría adivinar si alguno de los que estaban allí presentes en esa audiencia, podría ser gobernador, senador o presidente. Urgió a todos presentes de soportar el Préstamo de Victoria y que compraran liberalmente. El Glee Club de la escuela alta se entono en varios cantos. Mucha gente vino de las inmediaciones a oír los discursos y a ver el tanque.

EL TRATADO DE PAZ LISTO.

Todo está dispuesto para presentarse el Miércoles en la tarde el tratado de paz a los Alemanes. Los pequeños poderes han sido informados de los contenidos del documento, o todo lo que queda es de llamar a los delegados Alemanes ante el congreso de paz en Versalles y entregarles el tratado.

Los términos concedidos serán duros para los Alemanes, pero se asegura que no hay mas que un camino para ellos de seguir si tiene que obtener el retorno de paz y la chanza de rehabilitarse ella misma económicamente, allanarse aun a la demanda para el juicio de maestro imperial Hohenzollern, el cual se entiende de haber sido incorporado en el tratado es de requerirse. Reportes dicen de la completa desacreditada economía de los países ha sido considerada si Alemania rehusa poner su firma al tratado. Todavía hay disensión entre los Aliados y poderes asociados sobre algunas provisiones del tratado. Principales entre los objetores es la Italia, el punto de disputa. Los delegados principales de Italia a la conferencia de paz no visitaron Versalles, cuando el tratado fué leído a los pequeños poderes, pero se espera que estén presentes el próximo Miércoles. Sus credenciales ya fueron entregadas a los Alemanes. La representación Italiana el Martes por Signor Crespi, quien hizo reservaciones concerniente a cualquier revisión del tratado de paz que no es aceptable a Italia.

Nada oficial se ha hecho público según el convenio bajo el cual Italia consintió a empezar su interrumpida participación en la conferencia de paz. Un reporte llegó a London, no obstante, declara que se propone de hacer de Flume un puerto neutral por el periodo de dos años, después de ese tiempo de ser devuelto a Italia.

Periódicos Alemanes imprimen reportes de Versalles al efecto que los representantes Alemanes han servido noticia a los aliados que mas dilación en la presentación del tratado de paz resultara en que los Alemanes se vayan a Berlin. No ha habido ninguna intimidación de París en que los Alemanes demanden acción inmediata o que ninguno de los delegados se hayan ido.

Marshal Foen tambien expreso oposición al tratado según está, y dijo que era su opinion privada de no firmarse como que la seguridad militar dada a Francia es inadecuada.

La junta final del consejo de tres antes de la presentación del tratado de paz a los Alemanes fué tenida hoy. Se entiende que los últimos detalles de la ceremonia de presentar el tratado fué discutido, como tambien los arreglos para la sesión plenaria.

Tambien está bajo discusión el tiempo y método de hacer público el tratado de paz para ser presentado y se manifestará a todos el mundo.

FREEDOM RAMPANT.

Have you ever stop to consider just what is a free country; or have you merely shrugged your shoulder and dismissed any consideration of the matter, feeling that being an American you were free in a free country?

Have you been keeping yourself posted during the past few years on the happenings of every day right here in America; or have the world events attracted all of your consideration sufficient to blind your eyes and dull your brain to what has been and is occurring in this country?

Do you think that because America is a free country that the country is immune from acts of agitation from crazy-minded people who are living and scheming to overthrow the government in order that anarchy will rule and hell be moved from below to this earth?

If you believe that freedom really means living in peace within the law; giving all that the law calls for and receiving in return protection of life, liberty and property, you are truly a citizen of the United States of America; and believing as here stated you expect all others living in the U. S. A. to give and receive likewise or be called to account according to the law. And you can not believe, or agree by silence or consent, that freedom means the transfer of law and order to a condition of no recognition of law or justice, and every one do as they please, right or wrong.

We might say that freedom is as freedom does and that it is more than skin deep. When one disregards the law he exceeds his freedom and should be punished; when one attempts to overthrow government like the government of the United States by violence he exceeds his freedom, and becomes a traitor and should be dealt with as such.

Therefore, when we read of a class of beings in this country calling themselves I. W. W.'s and other names (but who are crazy fools) who agitate against law, society and government, we wonder what manner of officials are in control of the government who do not take speedy action to punish them.

Ninety-nine per cent of such beings are crazy-minded, and

the other one per cent are seeking notoriety and power in the name of freedom. To allow them real freedom as defined by our constitution is to allow what we deny the inmates of insane asylums and penitentiaries.

It is time to become awake to the fact that so-called freedom is rampant, and every action must be taken to cure the violators of the real meaning of that word.

RESUME OF COVENANT OF LEAGUE OF NATIONS.

The full text of the covenant of the league of nations has been published, and herewith follows a resume of the same.

The covenant provides who shall be original members of the league, which includes, following namely:—United States of America, Belgium, Bolivia, Brazil, British Empire, Canada, Australia, South Africa, New South Wales, India, China, Cuba, Czecho-Slovakia, Ecuador, France, Greece, Guatemala, Haiti, Hedjaz, Honduras, Panama, Italy, Japan, Peru, Poland, Portugal, Rumania, Servia, Siam, Uruguay. The following are invited to accede to the covenant, namely:—Argentina Republic, Chile, Columbia, Denmark, Netherlands, Norway, Paraguay, Persia, Salvador, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Venezuela; that any fully self-governing state, dominion or colony not named above may become a member of the league if its admission is agreed by two-thirds of the assembly, provided it shall give effective guarantee of its sincere intention to observe its international obligation and shall accept such regulations as may be prescribed by the league in regard to its military and naval forces and armaments; that any member of the league may after two years' notice withdraw from the league; that the league shall be effective through the instrumentality of an assembly and a council, with permanent secretariat; that the assembly shall meet at stated intervals, at the seat of the league; that the council shall consist of representatives from four other members of the league to be selected later; the council shall meet from time to time and deal at its meetings with any

matter within the sphere of action of the league or effecting the peace of the world; that all matters of procedure at meetings of assembly and council shall be regulated by said bodies. That the first meeting of the assembly and council shall be summoned by the president of the United States; that a permanent secretariat is to be established at seat of league and expense of same shall be borne by members of league; that the seat of league shall be at Geneva but that council may at any time decide the seat to be established elsewhere; that all positions under or in connection with the league, including the secretariat shall be open equally to men and women; that the maintenance of peace requires the reduction of national armaments to the lowest point consistent with national safety and the council shall formulate plans for such reduction and such plans shall be subject to reconsideration and revision at least every ten years; that the manufacture by private enterprise of munitions and implements of war is open to grave objections and the council shall advise how the evil effects attendant upon such manufacture can be prevented; that the league will undertake to respect and preserve as against external aggression the territorial integrity and existing political independence of all members of the league; that any war or threat of war is declared a matter of concern to the whole league and the league shall take any action that may be deemed wise and effectual to safeguard the peace of nations; that the members agree to submit to arbitration any dispute that may arise between them and agree in no case to resort to war until three months after the award by the arbitrators; that the council shall formulate plans for establishment of a permanent court of international justice; that should any member resort to war in disregard of the covenants it shall ipso facto be deemed to have committed an act of war against all other members of the league who will immediately sever all trade or financial relations with said member; that any member violating any covenant of the league may be declared to be no longer a member of the league; that the members of the league agree that this covenant is accepted as abrogating all obligations or understandings which are inconsistent with the terms thereof and will not hereafter enter into any engagements inconsistent with terms thereof; that nothing in this covenant shall be deemed to affect the validity of international engagements such as treaties of arbitration or regional understandings like the Monroe Doctrine for securing the maintenance of peace; that those colonies and territories as a consequence of the late war have ceased to be under the sovereignty of the states which formerly governed them and inhabited by people

not yet able to stand by themselves, shall be placed under the tutelage of people of advanced nations; that the members will endeavor to secure and maintain fair and humane conditions of labor for men, women and children throughout the world and will have general supervision in regard to traffic in women and children and traffic in opium and other dangerous drugs; that the members agree to encourage and promote the establishment of a national Red Cross organization having for its purposes, the improvement of health, the prevention of disease and the mitigation of suffering throughout the world.
