For the Fiscal Year July 1, 1974 - June 30, 1975

The Journal continued to attract new subscribers during its 14th year of publication, and although many new periodicals have been launched with a view toward climbing onto the environmental bandwagon, the Journal remains a leader in the field of scholarly resource law and economics publications.

Review of Publication Year

The January 1975 issue was devoted in its entirety to an International Symposium on the Salinity of the Colorado River, which was the proceedings of a conference at Oaxtepec, Mexico, in March 1974, sponsored jointly by the Natural Resources Journal and the American Society of International Law. The July and October 1974 and April 1975 issues were of varied, general content, carrying articles on the topics of administrative law, common law, comparative law, economics, energy, environmental control, history, indians, international law, land-use planning, mines and mining, oil and gas, public lands, taxation, and water and watercourses.

Finances

The half-time clerical position needs to be amended to 25 hours per week beginning July 1, 1976, and should be budgeted for accordingly.

No three-year subscriptions were accepted during the reporting year, due to the unpredictability of inflationary trends. Subscription rates will be increased to \$13. per year, and \$24. for two years, effective January 1, 1976.

Four issues were published during the year at a printing cost of \$15,459.04, plus reprints from those issues costing \$1,447.84. Based on 7,950 copies printed, the printing cost per single copy was \$2.12, or \$8.48 per volume. This represents an increase of \$.68 per volume over the printing cost during fiscal year 1973-74.
