Annual Report

For the Fiscal Year July 1, 1972 - June 30, 1973

A very strong growth year brought increases of 10% in total paid subscriptions, which included an increase of 35% in foreign subscriptions, and of 12% in subscription fee revenues. Foreign countries represented by at least one subscriber were: Argentina, Australia, Austria, Belgium, Brazil, Chile, Costa Rica, England, Ethiopia, Finland, Formosa, France, East Germany, West Germany, Greece, Hong Kong, India, Ireland, Northern Ireland, Israel, Italy, Jamaica, Japan, Jordan, Kenya, Korea, Malaysia, Mexico, Netherlands, New Zealand, Nigeria, Norway, Philippines, Scotland, Singapore, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Thailand, Trinidad, U.S.S.R., Venezuela, Yugoslavia, and, of course, Canada.

This year, for the first time, the Journal elected to display its wares at two periodical displays, one of which was held in the United States at Las Vegas, Nevada, and also at New York City, under the auspices of The Combined Book Exhibit of Scarborough, New York; the other at Frankfurt, Germany, sponsored by the Turner International Subscription Agency. Additionally, a bulk mail solicitation for new subscribers was sent out during summer, 1972.

Praeger Press in New York is publishing the April 1973 issue as a book, INTERNATIONAL ENVIRONMENTAL LAW, and the UNM Press is publishing the October 1972 issue, POLLUTION AND POLITICAL BOUNDARIES, as a paperback. Early in 1973, Praeger Press had also published as a book the July 1972 issue, ENVIRONMENTAL POLICY. Books such as these help to enlarge the size of the Journal's readership.

## Staff and Operating Policy

A half-time clerk-typist was added to paid staff February 1, 1973. Hired specifically to prepare renewal notices and invoices, receive and deposit payments, update mailing list, file orders, prepare bulk mailings, and duplicate manuscripts, she will also assist in some retyping of manuscripts, and in various other details, time permitting.

## Finances

Four issues were billed during the year, with charges for the April 1973 issue estimated and charged in June. Total billed printing cost for the four issues was \$15,085.94. Reprints from three issues were billed at \$1,264.00. An additional \$733.55 on the April issue, which includes reprints on that issue plus additional costs beyond that estimated in June, will be billed in fiscal 73-74. It became clear as the year progressed that the budgeted figure of \$2,950. per issue plus \$255. for reprints was too low and, therefore, rates for subscriptions were increased effective January 1, 1973, so that the 73-74 budget can allow a more realistic printing cost figure. If it should be necessary to again raise the rates in January 1974, we will do so. Issue printing costs for 72-73 (\$15,085.94 for four issues) were 28 1/2% higher than in 71-72 (\$14,555.25 for five issues). Broken down to per page cost, it was \$16.96 per page during fiscal year 71-72, and \$18.74 per page during fiscal year 72-73 - a 16.7% increase.
