## RELEASED ON HABEAS CORPUS.

Judge Mann, yesterday at Alamo-gordo, ordered the release of William Klinck, John Connor, and William Letendris, the three prisoners sent from here last week on the charge of rioting. These men, it will be remembered, were the companions of the man killed here Sunday night, the 13th of this month, and were subsequently tried and remanded to jail in default of bond.

Attorney Geo. W. Hall instituted habeas corpus proceedings in behalf of his clients, and secured an order from Judge Mann to have the men brought before him. Sheriff Stevens, accordingly, took the men to Alamo-gordo, the written evidence was read by the court, and the order issued for the release of the men. The order not only released the men, but directed the sheriff to bring them to Carrizozo, where they were apprehended and turn them loose.

## AN OVER-DOSE OF MORPHINE.

A switchman in the local yards, by the name of Rivers, died at the Grandview Hotel this morning at 8:30, from the effects of morphine poisoning. Dr. Walker was called at 8 o'clock, but the man was then dying. Deceased is supposed to have taken the morphine last night, but it was not discovered until this morning and it is not known whether it was an over-dose of the drug or whether it was taken with suicidal intent. The dead man's relatives live in El Paso.

## TWO GAMES.

The Oscuro ball team is to come up Saturday afternoon and cross bats with the locals. The Fort Stanton team will meet our boys on the local diamond the following day, Sunday. The Carrizozo boys are arranging for a dance in Wetmore hall Saturday night to entertain the visitors.

## ARID LANDS OPEN TO ENTRY.

On June 12, the Secretary of the Interior designated 270,000 acres of land in New Mexico as coming within the provision of the 320 acre homestead law. The lands are semi-arid, while fertile if properly cultivated, and must be farmed according to the "dry-farming" methods. The object of the government in giving large farms is to make possible biennial farming.

## FIRE AT DURAN.

Wednesday night at about 10 o'clock a fire occurred at Duran that came near wiping out the whole town. The railroad boys assisted in putting out the fire by hauling tanks of water. A hotel, rooming house, general store, printing office and black smith shop were completely destroyed, besides five or six smaller buildings. Duran had made arrangements for a great blow out on the Fourth, but the fire Wednesday evening will probably put a damper on the proposed celebration.

## A WARM BALL GAME.

Lincoln and Fort Stanton had a hot game of ball last Sunday, Stanton winning by a score of 7 to 2. Grover Hightower, Captain's sixteen-year old pitcher, twirled the leather for Lincoln, and he is said to have pitched a marvelous game. If the boy keeps up his work he has the making of one of the best pitchers in this section. He proved his right to a title as a pitcher Sunday, when he fanned a large number of Stanton's sluggers, who are acknowledged adepts with the stick.

## A RABID DOG.

The "dog days" are approaching. Constable John Adams killed two canines this week, both of them showing unmistakable signs of rabies. There are a number of other dogs running loose around town that seem to have no particular masters, and the town has no real use for them. Dogs "go mad" less frequently in higher than in lower altitudes, but occasionally, even in this altitude, they are affected, and an "ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." Rid the town of stray curs.

### MRS. COTTLE'S RULE.

Mrs. Franklin D. Cottle of New York city celebrated her one hundredth birthday recently by taking a long automobile ride and giving a long newspaper interview. On the subject of her extraordinary longevity she uttered words that should give hope and consolation to the many who are daily harassed and pestered by all sorts of experts telling them to be sure to do this and to be sure not to do that under penalty of shortening their lives. She said: "I never lived by rule. I ate what I liked, wore what I liked and lived a Christian life." To be sure. She did what she liked that became a Christian woman in a Christian land and with moderation. She had no fixed rules beyond these, and she looks back over a hundred years, with their joys and their sorrows, with contentment, and forward to the future with tranquillity. We question that there is a better line of conduct for a long and happy life, or a better rule of life, than a due combining of Christian virtues and common sense.

The whole matter of tipping is wrong. The man who is compelled to give is mulcted and the man who is asked to receive is insulted, whether he knows it or not. It may never be possible to correct the evil of tipping by legislative enactments, but it can be curtailed by individual habit. The sentiment against it is growing. People will continue to make small presents to faithful servants as long as some men are born to serve and some to be served, but the time is coming when they will do so only through choice and not from compulsion. The porter, like the waiter and the barber and the hackman, has been led to look upon the tip as his right, and one to play or fight for. In the revulsion of feeling which has come over the public because of the growing demands for tips on the part of the serving classes, the porter must suffer with his fellows.

Florida, while not new in the naval stores industry among her sister states of the south, was among the latest of them to develop the business on a wide scale by a liberal employment of capital; but she has forged to the front by leaps and bounds, says the New York Commercial, and to-day easily leads the group of eight states in the volume and the value of her turpentine and rosin industry—a great achievement, considering the fact that not so very many years ago orange and other citrus-fruit culture claimed the attention of the great majority of her agriculturists, while the winter-resort hotel business was regarded as chief among the cash-producing enterprises.

## COWBOY IN CABINET

### New Secretary of Interior Was Once a Plainsman.

Richard A. Ballinger Prepared Himself for College While Driving Cattle—Classmate of His Predecessor, Garfield.

Washington. — Biographies have been published, and stories have been told of Richard A. Ballinger, former commissioner of the general land office and former mayor of Seattle, now secretary of the interior in President Taft's cabinet, but not one of these accounts tells of Judge Ballinger's life as a cowboy upon the plains of southwestern Kansas 30 years ago.

Three years he spent in the saddle, herding droves of cattle across the range, and to this day he recounts interesting experiences that his fellow cabinet officers will doubtless call upon him to repeat. On one occasion he was almost killed by the hoofs of an unruly broncho.

During these years he studied the classic languages, riding many miles across the plains each week to recite his lessons, and by his own efforts he prepared himself for college, where he was a classmate of James R. Garfield, who, a quarter of a century later, made him general land commissioner.

and whose seat he has taken in the cabinet room.

This interesting episode of the frontier in Judge Ballinger's life is best told in his own words—and he remembers most distinctly the incidents of his cowboy days.

"When I was 15 years old—in 1873—my father moved from Virden, Ill., to Larned, Kan., and as that was in the center of the cattle country, I soon was a 'cowboy,' Judge Ballinger relates:

"My most memorable experience as a knight of the plains came when a wild horse got the better of me. That was at Spring creek. I wanted another horse, and went into the corral to lasso one, for I had gained considerable skill with a rope, and in the enthusiasm of my youth thought I was invincible.

"I got the thong rope over the animal's head, all right, and managed to get him up to the snubbing post, where the horses are branded. Gradually I worked up the untrained steed until I was within ten feet of him. With a motion as quick as lightning—so it seemed to me—he raised himself on his hind legs and struck me to the earth.

"When I came to, which was some little time afterward, the horse was gone and I needed medical attention.

"For two years I served in the county offices at Larned, first as deputy county clerk, and then as deputy

treasurer. While I was in the treasurer's office, acting as treasurer, I exposed the shortage of a county official to the board of commissioners, but though no arrests were made the scandal attracted wide attention, and I was threatened with personal violence for my activity.

"While I was on the range I rode seven miles every Sunday to recite Latin to the steward at Fort Larned, where several companies of soldiers were stationed. I was grateful for this assistance and also for the interest taken in me by a minister, who lived three miles or more from our ranch, and who was willing to impart to me his smattering of Greek.

While at Washburn young Ballinger met Senator John J. Ingalls, who advised him to take a course at Williams college. He followed the advice, and graduated with the class of 1884, of which young Garfield was a member.

For two years following his graduation Ballinger studied in the law office of S. Corning Judd, a prominent Chicago attorney, and then he went to Kankakee, Ill., where he became city attorney. Later he was city attorney of Decatur, Ala., after which he went to the state of Washington.

He was for four years on the superior bench of Jefferson county, residing in Port Townsend, after which he went to Seattle. His term as mayor extended over a period of two years, and at its conclusion he was prevailed upon, reluctantly because of his private interests, to take charge of the reorganization of the general land office.

### Use for Irish "Wild Flax."

Some local men of enterprise, in Connemara, Ireland, are wondering if the plant known as "wild flax" which grows extensively in the mountains of Connemara, could be developed into a native industry. It is said that if the flax was put through a proper course of preparation it would stand the test of the best manufactured rope or twine. Steps are being taken to organize a syndicate to try to develop the growth of the plant by the peasantry. It is thought that the texture being so good in its wild state, cultivation would greatly improve it.

### The Kiss of History.

The ancient Teutons observed the kiss solely as a symbol of love and friendship. With them, as with the Anglo-Saxon race to-day, the firm handshake was the usual form of salutation in public. In medieval times the kiss became the symbol of other sentiments. The vassal had to kiss the sword of his feudal lord. The "osculum gladii" correcti was the symbol of fealty. In courts of justice the crucifix on the Bible was kissed, a custom still extant.

## TOLD OF RUSSIANS

SUBJECTS OF THE CZAR ARE  
STRANGELY INCONSISTENT.

Seem Equal Mixture of Ferocity and  
Gentleness—Story That Reveals  
Their Queer Ideas in Mat-  
ters of Discipline.

No one can be long associated with Russians without reaching a condition of utter amazement at the extraordinary inconsistency of their mental make-up. The kindest of men seem to receive placidly the most blood-curdling doctrines; they enforce the cruelest of laws in the gentlest way or vice versa. They are perfectly charming to individuals in groups of two or three and utterly bloodthirsty to exactly similar individuals in groups of twenty or thirty. Certain Jews after great massacres have testified that peasants have said to them: "Poor brothers, we must kill you!" An odd tale, illustrating their queer ideas of discipline, is told by a revolutionist who has just come to this country. By those who ought to know, it is said to be typical of a singular simplicity of mind which is also said to be peculiar to the Russians.

A follower of Tolstoy was called on for military service. He presented himself to the army officers as required and explained that he could not serve because of his beliefs.

"Ah," said the officer in charge politely, "but you understand that this means prison?"

"Of course."

"You will be sent," continued the officer, "to the Caucasus," naming a prison of dreadful repute. "The guard will have to start at once with you."

He turned to several other officers and discussed the matter of the guard for a few minutes. Then he had a happy thought.

"Why send a guard at all!" he said. "You," turning to the young man, "you can find your way there alone, can't you?"

"Yes."

"Well, then, that saves a lot of trouble," exclaimed the officers, delighted. So they wrote him a careful letter of introduction to the governor of the prison, explaining that the bearer was to be locked up as soon as he arrived, in a most unpleasant cell.

"That's all right," they said in great satisfaction. "We hope your journey won't be too tiresome." And they parted with great cordiality.

The young man did as he was told and is now in prison. The chances are probably even that he and the governor will become sincere friends or that an order to put him to death will arrive and be executed in the same impersonal, eminently Russian manner.

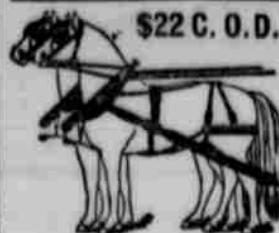

On the theory that "the greatest good to the greatest number" is correct, Carrizozo should have the county seat. About 62 per cent of the population lives nearer Carrizozo than Lincoln.

If the county seat of Lincoln county was in Carrizozo instead of Lincoln, the cost of running the county would be \$500 to \$750 less each year. In thirty years this would make a rather comfortable sum.

The board of equalization endeavored to save the railroad companies all they could on taxes. They assessed the local line at \$7,500 per mile but excluded all pipe lines, side tracks, section houses, depots, shops, round-houses and machinery. The Lincoln County board of commissioners wouldn't stand for it, and the company's schedule was raised. This county would suffer materially if the action of the board of equalization had been endorsed.

By reference to the proceedings of the county commissioners published last week, it will be seen that the board refused to be hornswoggled by the board of equalization. The board of equalization attempted to exempt all railroad property from taxation except the main line of the road; but the Lincoln County board of commissioners took the matter up with the Attorney General, who, in effect, told them the board had exceeded its authority. The board proceeded to assess the company on its pipe line, buildings, etc., all of which the board of equalization had exempted.

We have become accustomed to the railroads running the territorial legislature, but we should certainly enter a protest when the railroads attempt to say what property belonging to them shall be assessed. The law exempts railroads from taxation for six years after they have been built. Many dispute the wisdom of such a policy; but allowing that such a law is justified, in order to build up a new country, who will defend the action of the board of equalization in trying to aid the railroads to escape paying taxes on a large portion of their property, after they have already profited by a six year exemption.

How the mighty have fallen! Theodore Roosevelt, the hunter, the rough rider and all-round sport has had his trotters knocked from under him, and by a woman. The puny ride of 120 miles made by President Roosevelt and army officers was only a jaunt. The new pace set by Mrs. Wardsworth of 159 miles will make the African nimrod die of shame when he hears of it. The lady was in the saddle for sixteen hours, with the exception of time spent for taking meals, and used eight horses during the time. The famous ex-president has by many been termed a four-flusher, but this is the hardest blow his vanity has encountered.

President Taft sent a message to congress, recommending the incorporation of a corporation tax in the tariff bill. The president also announces his faith in the justice of an income tax, but doubts the wisdom of enacting such a law without an amendment to the constitution, as the Supreme court has once turned down the law. A tax on corporations is probably a good proposition, and is a long step toward a system of taxation that will place the burdens where they can be most easily borne. An income tax is a necessity, notwithstanding the adoption of the incorporation tax, and when enacted into law will relieve the burden on the necessities of life.

The Gould family continues to furnish a great portion of the sensational reading matter of the day. Howard Gould is now having his troubles with his wife aired in the courts. The evidence shows that Mistress Katherine is fond of the cup that cheers, and when she has partaken of about five martinis, a like number of brandies and soda and two or three quarts of claret thrown in for a chaser that few, if any, exist who are worthy, or at least capable, of trying her slippers. She is accredited with many feats, in fact, there was only one that it was said she was unable to perform, and that was to navigate the stairs after having attempted to absorb all the wet goods in her immediate vicinity.

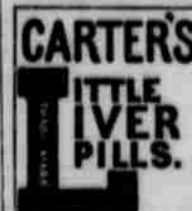

#### ABOUT NORMAL SCHOOLS

The News is in receipt of a clipping from a Missouri newspaper, furnished by a subscriber at White Oaks, which deals with Normal schools and also rural schools. We are heartily in accord with a statement in the clipping which says "We need more money for rural districts;" for if that is true in Missouri how much more true it is in New Mexico, where the territorial institutions flourish at the expense of the rural schools? As to the Normals, of which the article treats, they are quite different in Missouri from those in New Mexico, but as the clipping meets the general situation here, it is reproduced. It reads:

"I note your comment in today's paper on the Maryville (Mo.) normal matter. You have sounded the proper keynote. There is entirely too much money wasted on these institutions, which has apparently escaped all attention, and not enough used for the rural districts where it is so sorely needed. What is needed is a closer supervision and more economical administration of the Normal affairs, run on business principles for the general good.

We need more money for the rural districts, thus enabling us to better prepare the students for entrance to the Normals. This will raise the standard of our normals. There are many who enter the normals too soon or before they are as well equipped as they should be. Students are turned out of some of our normals not as well prepared as they should be, for the reason that the institutions lack the progressive business management, so essential to the success of any undertaking. The evidence of lack of business principles is seen in the fact that there is no apparent discrimination or attention paid to the matter of furnishing recommendations of students leaving these institutions, or some of them, as the poorest student is furnished the best letter, a recommendation as good as the best student. This is misleading to boards employing teachers and very harmful to the student. More attention is absolutely necessary on these important matters."

#### OF INTEREST TO MINERS.

The attention of the Department of the Interior has been called to the last clause of paragraph 41 of the mining regulations, approved March 29, 1909, which provides as follows:

"The vein or lode must be fully described, the description to include a statement as to the kind and character of mineral, the extent thereof, whether ore has been extracted and of what amount and value and such other facts as will support the applicants allegation that the claim contains a valuable mineral deposit."

It seems that the expression,

"the extent thereof" is being construed as meaning that the applicant must affirmatively show by proof of exploration that the vein exists in fact throughout the whole length of the claim.

This construction of the paragraph is erroneous. By the words quoted it was intended to require the claimant to show the existence of a vein in such workings as he relied on to establish a discovery. By the extent of the vein was meant its size and quality as disclosed. That being done, the presumption exists that the vein extends on its strike throughout the whole length of the claim as located.

The sole purpose of that part of paragraph 41 quoted was to enable the land department to know so far as applicant can reasonably show, the definite facts upon which the right to the patent is predicated as to determine whether a valuable mineral deposit exists in the land claimed.
