### Annual Report

For the Fiscal Year July 1, 1972 - June 30, 1973

The American Society of Planning Officials announced in March 1973 that the article "The Tenant's Rights Movement", by Ms. Tova Indritz, published in 1 New Mexico Law Review 1 (1971) had been awarded first prize in their annual competition to select outstanding law student articles and comments on planning, land use, and environmental law. The Law Review received an award of \$150. from the A.S.P.O.

Readership of the Law Review stood at 590 at the close of its third year of publication, during which the July 1972 and January 1973 issues were printed with Thomas Olson serving as Editor. A solicitation of U.S. law libraries, and of members of the New Mexico Bar will be mailed during August 1973 as part of a continuing effort to obtain additional paid subscribers.

### Review of Publication Year

A symposium issue on "The New Mexico Equal Rights Amendment - Assessing Its Impact" was published just prior to the opening of the Legislature in January, 1973. Other lead articles during the year were: "Economic Side of Wrongful Death in New Mexico," "The Law of Standing in New Mexico," "Indians and Federal Income Taxation," "Ad Valorem Tax Status of Private Lessee's Interest in Publicly Owned Property: Taxability of Possessory Interests in Industrial Projects Under the New Mexico Industrial Revenue Bond Act," and "The Grand Jury: True Tribunal of the People, or Administrative Agency of the Prosecutor," by third-year law student James A. Shannon.
