COMMISSIONERS HOLD BUSY SESSION

Petition Asking that the Census of Carrizozo be Taken Looking Forward to Town Incorporation was Granted

ACTS ON PETITION CALLING PROHIBITION ELECTION

The Commissioners of the County have just closed a busy three days' session in which a number of important measures were considered. Besides the regular routine of the approval of bills against the county, hearing of complaints, etc., two petitions, one originating with the voters of this precinct and those immediately adjoining and the other from the town of Carrizozo were considered and a favorable decision reached.

The first petition requested the ordering of an election to determine whether the prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors should be made in the three precincts containing the towns of Oacuro, White Oaks and Carrizozo. The petition was accordingly granted and the date for the election set for May 8th, next.

The second petition called for the ordering of a census of the town of Carrizozo to be taken to determine whether a population of fifteen hundred could be registered, with a view to full incorporation as a town, the legal requirement being the above mentioned population. Favorable action resulting, steps will be taken for the enumeration of the number of residents in the proposed corporate limits, and no apprehension is felt concerning the outcome of the count.

This petition was signed by practically every voter in the prescribed limits and when the question comes to a vote a generous majority will unquestionably be accorded the measure. The people of Carrizozo are anxious for incorporation, since they want some definite government of the mutual affairs of the community. The old saying that "Everybody's business is nobody's business" was never more true than in the management of public enterprise. The town has made wonderful progress, even though handicapped by a state of unincorporation, but the advancement made can all be attributed to a peculiarly progressive bunch of business men, willing to dig up the dollars for the general good.

Under the new regime, there will be a mayor and a board of aldermen—the official trustees of the town of Carrizozo and responsible for its general development. Before them all complaints will be dealt with directly and all propaganda for local betterment find their proper promoters. What the results of the new order will be can only be guessed at, but it is a safe wager that the benefits accruing from incorporation will be more than the most enthusiastic promoters have imagined.

THE DANGERS OF AUTOMOBILE TRAFFIC

And How we Might Help to Prevent Them. Many Drivers go to Fast. Pedestrians Should not Walk in Street

MIDDLE OF STREET THE VEHICULAR RIGHT-OF-WAY

Following is an interesting article by Mrs. J. B. French read at the Civic League meeting Tuesday afternoon.

The rapidly increasing motor traffic on the streets of our town, while it shows the prosperous condition of the community, also brings with it a certain element of danger.

There are two reasons for this danger here.

(1) Many drivers drive too fast, especially at crossings, around corners, and when passing other vehicles.

(2) Pedestrians walk in the middle of the street—that part of the road which is the vehicular right of way.

There is a movement on foot now, I understand, for incorporation, and many people seem to think if this carries and the town is incorporated that motor traffic, as well as many other things, can be easily controlled. Doubtless incorporation would help in many ways provided we elected men to fill the various offices who would enforce the laws but what assurance have we that we would get the laws enforced then any more than we do now? We have on our statute book at the present time the following state laws: From Chapter X—Article 388 Date of March, 1913.

Use of Highways. "Every person operating or driving a motor vehicle on the public highway shall (Also) when approaching an intersection or cross roads, or when passing another motor or other vehicle, or herd of cattle, sheep, horses or other animals, slow down to at least 15 miles per hour, and shall signal in such manner as to give warning of his approach."

Same Chapter Article 389 Same date.

A person operating or driving a motor vehicle shall on signal by raising the hand from a person riding leading or driving a horse or horses or other animals bring such motor vehicle to a stop, and if traveling in the opposite direction remain stationary so long as may be reasonable to allow such person to pass, and if traveling in the same direction use reasonable caution in passing."

Same Chapter—Article 394. Same date.

Duties of Peace Officers.—It shall also be the duty of the Secretary of State to require of sheriffs, constables and other police officers an enforcement of the provisions of this chapter.

Now if all motor drivers observed the first of these laws and slowed down to 15 miles per hour when approaching cross roads, rounding corners, and passing other vehicles, and "touted their horns" before they were right on the crossing most of the danger at all corners and crossings would be averted.

There are some who think 15 miles too fast for cross roads and if we had incorporation that limit could be cut down to 10, 8 or whatever rate of speed those in authority thought expedient. But if we can't enforce a law we now have limiting the speed to 15 miles what hope have we of enforcing a law of a slower rate of speed?

I agree with the statement who said "An unenforced law is worse than no law at all" and I respectfully suggest that The Civic League of Carrizozo draw up a petition re-

questing the rigid enforcement of Articles 388 and 389 of Chapter X on our statute book and send a copy of said petition to the sheriff.

Let us now consider the second cause for danger from motor traffic as stated above—pedestrians and especially children walking in the middle of the street. Of course the principle reason for this is because we have no pavements, but in many instances it is merely force of habit. Many of our streets now are just as level and good to walk on at the sides as in the middle so let us set the good example by taking the sides ourselves and let us impress on the children the desirability of walking on the sides of the street and not leisurely sauntering in danger's pathway—the automobile right-of-way.

The truth there are places where the motor tract is the smoothest, if not the safest, part of the street but if we would take this matter up earnestly and by common consent would select a place to walk either at one or at both sides of the streets and all pedestrians used it could we not in a short time have reasonably good walkways or at least pathways parallel to but not identical with that of the vehicular traffic?

Would it be impossible for us to raise a little money to be applied toward moving the bumps and ruts along the sides of some of our more important streets? I'm sure the teachers of our public schools would be glad to co-operate with us in this matter and would talk to the children in a body about the dangers of going to and from school on that part of the street mostly used by automobiles.

How many of us have had the blood freeze in our veins as we have seen a car dash up behind a group of children and see them scatter right and left, then as the car gets closer some little tot wanting to join brother, sister or friend rush across the road escaping eternity only by inches.

There is a splendid article on this very subject in the American Magazine for April which doubtless some of you have read. It says in part "The automobile is a locomotive operated on the public thoroughfare. It has most of the speed and much of the killing power of a locomotive, but has one supreme advantage over the locomotive in the matter of saving the lives of those who encroach on its legitimate right of way—the automobile can almost invariably dodge the pedestrian who insists on risking his life." But the article goes on to say as long as girls and boys are allowed to run and play in that part of the street where cars constantly run often to fall sprawling in front of a rapidly moving machine, dart unexpectantly from behind a wagon, or rush across the street at the least expected moment that no degree of skill can prevent sooner or later injury to some of them."

The article further says—"There was a time when the driver of an automobile or a motor truck was more or less in conflict with the drivers of horse vehicles but that day has passed. Even the push cart man knows and conforms to his proper rights in swifter moving traffic. But how about the pedestrian? How about the fathers and mothers of scores of children who play in the street? Are the just rights of these to the use of the street properly defined and properly enforced?"

Laws will help but we must have incorporation before we can get the laws and after incorporation is an assured fact it takes a year before the machinery of the law is in working order.

What then may happen in a year? Summer is coming on, which means there will be more cars on the streets and unless we, as mothers, take this matter up there will be more children on the streets in

NEW MEXICO LAND BEING TAKEN RAPIDLY

Those Looking for a Location in the Southwest Should not Delay Their Coming to This State too Long

MANY LAND GRANTS IN NEW MEXICO OF VARIOUS KINDS

(By ROBT. F. ERIEVEN, Gen. Public Lands)

Land in New Mexico during the past two years has been taken up at a very rapid rate, and it would be well for those that may be looking to the southwest for a location, not to delay their coming to this state too long. But come and investigate conditions first, and then bring your family if you decide to stay.

There are many land grants in New Mexico, of various kinds peculiar to the west. Among them are some that were made to individuals and to communities by the Spanish and Mexican governments, respectively, and later confirmed by the United States. There are large Indian reservations and grants to Pueblo Indians; military reservations; National Forests; grants to railroads; coal and oil lands temporarily withdrawn from entry by the Government, and lands set aside for school purposes, but beside these there yet remain open to the entryman a magnificent acreage awaiting his coming.

Among the numerous inquiries reaching the State Land Office, there is none more insisted than that which pertains to the preliminary proceedings necessary to the acquiring of state lands by purchase, and for this reason the explanations herein given are very explicit in order that those unfamiliar with such matters may be fully informed on the subject.

In the first place it must be understood that the twelve million acres originally granted to the State of New Mexico, to which reference is heretofore made under the caption "Finances and Taxation," were not set aside in any particular section of the state, but have been selected from unoccupied lands of the U. S. Government, located in the various counties of the state. The State Land Office has no complete list of these lands for distribution, as it is awaiting final action by the U. S. Government on approximately three million acres which have not yet been cleared, (which is equivalent to a patent) to the state.

Acerca de la Guerra.

Una pelea violenta continua entre los Rusos y los Teutones en la frontera oriental desde Riga hacia el Sud.

El General Funston dió la orden para que se le envíen ocho aeroplanos además de los que tiene ahora. Abriendo su camino hacia el sitio de Verdun por un bombardeo terrible, los Alemanes alrededor de esa ciudad han capturado la pequeña loma de Haucourt.

Seis biplanos primer escuadrón en comando del Capitán B. D. Foulke, llegaron a Columbus, N. M., y van a explorar los montes con el objeto de descubrir al bandido Villa.

Los Austriacos fueron obligados a salir de Czernowitz, capital de Bukovina, Ispahan, Persia, fué capturada de los Turcos, que están huyendo ante los Rusos siempre adelantando.

Rusia ha empezado una ofensiva que puede tener gran importancia en la frente del noreste. Las tropas del Zar capturaron tres líneas de trincheras alemanas en la región de la orilla del suroeste del lago Narocz y están continuando su marcha al otro lado de las posiciones capturadas.

El General Luis Herrera se habría separado del General Carranza declarando que resistirá con toda su fuerza la entrada de los Americanos en Méjico, aunque quede todavía opuesto a la causa de Villa, según reportes procedentes de fuentes consideradas dignas de fe y recibidos en El Paso, Tex.

Oeste.

El tren de pasajeros N° 5 de "Clover Leaf," viajante comercial, fué descarrilado por el viento cuatro millas al este de Marián, Ind., durante un ciclón.

Los arrestos de los partidarios de Villa en El Paso, Tex., y en otros puntos al largo de la frontera han alcanzado proporciones al por mayor.

El cónsul García el jueves por la noche anunció que había recibido un telegrama en El Paso, Tex., del Gen. Bertani diciendo que Villa estaba rodeado en El Oso, cinco millas al sud de Namiqualpa, por las tropas americanas y carranzistas, y que era inminente la batalla esperada. Bertani dice que las tropas americanas llegaron después del vencimiento de las tropas de Villa por las de Carranza.

Extranjero.

Una tentativa, que no tuvo buen éxito, fué la de asesinar al primer ministro de Bulgaria, Radoslavoff.

Unos revolucionistas dispararon armas de fuego sobre el vapor Tachun en el Yang-Tse-Kiang, cerca de Feng-Tu-Hai.

Sir Charles Wyndham, director de actores, se casó con la Señorita Mary Moore, prima dona de su compañía, en Londres.

Henry P. Fletcher, el nuevo embajador de América a Méjico, saltó de Panamá a bordo del vapor Gorillo para Nueva York en su rumbo a Washington violando de su puesto en Santiago de Chile.

Sport.

Forest Duffy y Frank Bishop, jugadores de pelota muy bien conocidos en Denver, firmaron contratos para jugar con los del Club de Crested Butte, Colo., esta estación.

Fred Banger, capitán del juego de balón cinco de la temporada de 1915, de la Universidad de Denver, fué reelegido a la posición para 1917 por los hombres de letra de la cuadrilla.

General.

El aguacil Ruby Rivera de Rawlins, Wyo., saltó para Nueva York, en contestación a una carta de "Bob" Meldrum, asesino de "Chick" Bowen, un cowboy, en Baggs, Wyo., por quien están todavía buenas las promesas de una recompensa agregando la suma de \$1,000, diciéndole que está en la ciudad y que se rendirá a llegada del oficial, que es su paisano y amigo desde mucho tiempo.

SOME WESTERN CANADA GRAIN REPORTS

In its issue of February 24th, 1916, the Wadena (Minn.) Pioneer Journal has the following letter from Western Canada written by Walter Gloeden, who is renewing his subscription to his home paper:

"The times we are having up here are very good in spite of the war. I have had very good crops this fall and we are having very good markets for it all. Wheat went from 30 to 60 bu. to the acre, oats from 50 to 100 bu. to the acre. I had an 18-acre field of oats which yielded me 115 bu. per acre by machine measure, so I think this is a pretty prosperous country. I have purchased another quarter section, which makes me now the owner of three-quarters of a section of land. The weather was very nice this fall up to Christmas, then we had quite severe weather, but at the present time it is very nice again."

"I lived many years in Alberta; filed a homestead in the Edmonton district; own property in several parts of Alberta. I found it one of the best countries I ever saw; its banking system is better than that of the United States; one quarter section I own, with about \$4,000.00 worth of improvements, pays \$18.00 a year taxes. All tax is on the land; implements and personals are not taxed. I was secretary-treasurer of Aspelund school district for two years. My duties were to assess all the land in the district, collect the tax, expend it (\$1,000.00 a year), hire a teacher, etc., for the sum of \$25.00 a year. Some economy, eh?"

"All school and road taxes are expended in the districts where they are collected. There are no other taxes. Land titles are guaranteed by the government and an abstract costs fifty cents. WATCHFUL PURSUING

I am here in the interest of my country. Our country's policy in Mexico has changed. The Captain of our ship of State has changed his mind. The time has come to strike; but we must find the man to hit before we shoot. The policy has changed from watchful waiting to watchful pursuing. It is the patriotic duty of every citizen to help watch.

I have packed my grip and am on the wing, without any authority from the head of our government; but stirred up by what seems to me a patriotic duty I am putting up here at a second class hotel because I have to pay my own expenses. I had arranged for a meeting of the citizens and I will make at that meeting the following stirring address:

Fellow Peekers: It has seemed to me that the attitude of your location has put you in an especially advantageous position to aid our country, which I urge upon you as a patriotic duty. It is no time now to criticize the policy of watchful pursuit. When we were waiting for something we didn't know what, it was well enough to criticize. But now fellow Peekers, the time has come to strike and we must watch to find what to hit.

It is with no feeling of disrespect that I address you as Peekers. Peeking in the sense used here is just as honorable as watching. Peeking means the same as spying. Some of the greatest services to our country in times past were by spys. It is only when peeking is not justifiable that it becomes contemptible. Spying enabled my wife to get a divorce and I have no respect for the spyer.

Peeking implies that the person watched is not aware of it. I would arouse you to take advantage of your location and peek over the border into Mexico and locate a man by the name of Villa. Our country wants him and wants him bad. He has been the actor in many scenes of bloodshed in our distracted neighbor republic. He came into prominent notice when our country made it impossible for Huerta to bring peace out of the turmoil in Mexico.

It may have appeared to you as it did to me, unwise for this country to enter into the internal disputes in Mexico. Of course there was the justification of the cause in the idea that Huerta had been instrumental in Madero's taking off. If that were true it was a matter for Mexico to settle herself. In attempting to settle that question for her this country got into the same fix as the fellow who stepped into protect the defender's female whose husband was whipping her. The last heard of the defender of the wife was that he was on the run and the wife after him.

When Huerta did not receive the recognition of the U. S. he would not salute our flag. He felt a good deal like a man when the prohibitionists want to keep from the enjoyment of his favorite beverage. In my own case I never had contracted an appetite for whiskey until the prohibitionists tried to keep me from it. No man can truthfully say that my nose was too red before that.

Speaking of a red nose reminds me of an incident in the life of Petroleum V. Nasby, whose letters written from the Confederate X Roads in the time of the civil war were read by Abraham Lincoln and as Artemus Ward would say caused the President to say: "His nose was so red and prominent that it

SHEEP FEEDING

The owners of small herds of sheep and growers of feed crops, will be pleased to learn of the unqualified success of the extensive feeding experiments conducted by F. A. Hubbell, of Albuquerque, on his farm below that city.

When put in the feeding pens last November 15th, they averaged in weight 54 pounds, and the highest market price of the lambs was \$3.50 per head. When weighed into the stock yards at Albuquerque on March 20th they weighed an average of 82 pounds strong, and were worth more than nine dollars a head.

This result was secured by methods of feeding and handling easily duplicated by any small farmer or herd owner in the state who has the feed, or can secure the financial backing to buy the corn, producing his own rough feed.

There can be no mistake about the feeding being profitable, as Mr. Hubbell used more than three thousand head for the experiment thereby removing all elements of chance possible, and making the results more representative. The lambs used were considered rather under than over the average, being purposely selected under. The pens were in the open, no shelters from the weather being used, but they were so arranged that the men could accomplish much with the least effort. Every pound of feed used was carefully weighed and the data to be given out by Mr. Hubbell as soon as the lambs have been turned into money will be of absolute value to those contemplating picking up some of the promising profits of the business.

Mr. Hubbell believes that an industry handling more than twenty five millions of dollars annually can easily be built up in the state on sheep feeding alone, and that the cattle feeding will add many more millions. He will feed about fifteen thousand sheep and three or four hundred head of cattle the coming season.

LISTEN TO THIS

Listen to what Herman Rosenfield, advertising manager of Sears, Roebuck & Co. recently told the members of the American Ad Club at a convention:

"We have a bureau whose duty it is to read each week the country newspapers from all over the country. There is not a paper of any consequence in our trade territory that our bureau does not get. "YOU TOLD ME THE TRUTH AND I WANT THE PEOPLE TO KNOW IT"

The following unsolicited letter has been received from Mr. J. F. Ward of Donald, Alberta. It is a plain statement of conditions as Mr. Ward has found them:

A Settler's Plain Letter.

"It is with pleasure I drop a line to you. We had a good year. Off of 65 acres, oats and wheat, I got over 2,500 bushels of wheat and oats. If you should tell the people of Toledo of this it would get some of them thinking. The soil is a rich black loam, and a pleasure to work it.

"We have a good farm. We have a flowing well with soft water. It is the best water in the country. Some people think they got to go to war when they come out here. They need not be afraid of war. There is no war tax on land; only school tax, \$12.00 on 160 acres, and road tax of two days with your team. I tell you the truth, there is no land in or around Toledo as good as our land here in Alberta. If anybody wants to write us, give them our address.

"We have had nice weather. We have had it quite cold for one week, but no rain and sleet, and the sun shines nearly every day, and it is hot in the sun. Coal is \$2.25 per ton. The people are very nice and good here. We are well enjoying the West. The horses and cows are feeding on the prairies all the winter. We just have two horses in the stable to go to town with. Yours truly, (Sgd.) J. F. WARD, Donald, Alberta, Feb. 9, 1916."

"I was born in Wisconsin, but moved with my parents when a boy to Stephen Co., Iowa. I was there farming for 50 years. I sold my land there for over \$200 an acre. I moved to Saskatchewan, and located near Brercrest in the spring of 1912. I bought a half section of land. I have good neighbors. I feel quite at home here the same as in Iowa. We have perfect safety and no trouble in living up to the laws in force. My taxes are about \$65 a year on the half section for everything. I have had splendid crops. Wheat in 1915 yielded me over 50 bushels to the acre. That is more than I have ever had in Iowa, and yet the land there costs four times as much as it does here. The man who comes here now and buys land at \$50 an acre or less gets a bargain. (Sgd.) J. F. WARD, Donald, Alberta, February 9th, 1916."
