PEACE DELEGATES WILL PROPOSE ELIMINATION OF HUERTA

Niagara Falls, Ontario, May 19.—On the eve of the opening tomorrow of the mediation conference for the settlement of difficulties between the United States and the Huerta government in Mexico, practically everything was in readiness for the proceedings to begin. Three o'clock Thursday afternoon was the hour set for the formal opening of the first session.

With the arrival late tonight from Washington of the two American delegates, Justice Joseph R. Lamar and Frederick W. Lehmann, the personnel of the conference awaited for its completion the third mediator, Eduardo Suarez, the Chilean minister, and the three Mexican delegates, Rabasa, Rodriguez and Elguero. The latter are due from New York early tomorrow. Mr. Suarez was expected tonight, but as he had failed to arrive at a late hour it was assumed he had delayed his journey and would not reach the scene until tomorrow.

Elimination of Huerta First.

While the mediators continued to maintain strict reticence as to the nature of the mediation proposals, it was generally accepted tonight as extremely probable that the elimination of Huerta would be the first suggestion the mediators would present.

The broad international scope of the proceedings and the importance which is attached to them by the other countries of South and Central America, was evidenced by the arrival today of Mr. Gonzales C. Cordova, minister from Ecuador to the United States. He intends to inform his government by cable of all important developments during the conference. It is understood that Dr. Alberto Membreno, minister from Honduras, and other Latin-American diplomats or their representatives also will be on the scene.

Wants Another Post.

El Paso, Texas, May 19.—It was reported here today that Marion F. Letcher, United States consul at Chihuahua, Mexico, had requested the state department that he be transferred to another consular post. Mr. Letcher has taken a prominent part in negotiations between the United States and the revolutionary parties which have sprung up in northern Mexico in the last three years.

Fighting Near Saltillo.

El Paso, Texas, May 19.—Desperate fighting undoubtedly is in progress before Saltillo, but the wires direct from the front, silent, it is believed, under the stern order of General Francisco Villa, have brought no details of the engagements. Whether Villa has crashed his way through the outer defenses of the federal stronghold and now is knocking at the gates of Saltillo itself or whether a desperate defense of the positions north of the town has sufficed to check for a time the constitutional advance, was eagerly discussed here today by constitutionalist officials, foreign refugees and federal sympathizers.

The only direct information which reached here, however, was contained in a dispatch from Isidro Fabela, acting minister of foreign affairs in the constitutionalist government, which informed the constitutionalist junta here that Villa had engaged and decisively defeated a force of 5,000 federalists at Paredon, inflicting heavy casualties, capturing 800

prisoners, several machine guns, 600,000 rounds of ammunition and other valuable munitions of war. Two federalist generals were among those said to have been killed.

Serious Situation in Mexico City Reported.

Mexico City, May 19.—The situation in the capital is considered serious and it is feared that a rising will occur within a few days.

The resignation of the minister of communication, Jose Maria Lozano, has been accepted, but his successor has not been named.

The telegraph wires to San Luis Potosi have been cut and it is believed that the federalists in that district have been defeated.

The constitutionalists, it is reported, are about to attack Guadalupe, capital of the state of Jalisco. There is great distress among the poor of Mexico City and the rich families are distributing food.

Sir Lionel Carden, the British minister, held a prolonged conference with Provisional President Huerta today, which has caused considerable speculation.

Minister of War Blanquet, in a statement tonight, talked of the situation in the north.

"There is no news regarding the reported evacuation of Saltillo by the federalists and the advance of the revolutionists southward from that place," he said.

"The department of government informs me that many rebel wounded have arrived in Torreon from the battle that has been going on in Ramos Arispe.

"Rodriguez Quevedo, the counter-revolutionary leader, is attacking Casas Grandes in Chihuahua."

Jarales Old Enough to Have Sidetrack

The state corporation commission has written Superintendent Summers, of the Santa Fe railway asking for a personal interview on the request of J. D. Cordova, of Jarales, N. M., to have a side track put in there. Mr. Cordova writes that Jarales was settled 250 years ago by the Spaniards, has been seldom injured by an overflow of the Rio Grande, is there to stay on the map and ought to have a side track.

Prosperity at Gallup

Gallup, May 18.—To supply 1,500 small loaves of bread a week for the 4,900 Mexican internes and 300 U. S. soldiers at Fort Wingate the local bakeshops are running night and day and all other lines of trade are on the jump as a result of the establishment of the big camp. Several thousand pair of shoes were sold by local merchants in the past week. At the post there are six bake ovens going night and day and turning out 660 loaves of bread at a baking.

Serious Fire in St. Louis.

St. Louis, May 20.—Fire at Boesker Lumber company tonight resulted in property damage estimated at \$115,000 and serious injury to several firemen and spectators.

OLD SANTA FE TURNED INTO FAIRYLAND ON MAY DAY

State Fair to Have Swell Amusements

Albuquerque, May 18.—At a meeting of the state fair commission yesterday it was decided to ask Albuquerque to raise \$10,000 in addition to the \$5,000 appropriation by the state and the Commercial Club will start a canvassing campaign soon. The fair this year is going to make high class thrillers and amusements the strong card, including a railroad collision staged in front of the grandstand.

The idea is to get a record breaking crowd. Thirty four wells are to be drilled on the new mesa fair grounds which will be put in shape for the 1915 fair.

Important Decision

United States District Judge William H. Pope ruled orally the other day that all Pueblo Indian lands, including not only lands reserved for the use of the Pueblos by executive proclamation, but all lands included in patents to Pueblos are "reservations" within the meaning of the act of congress; and that crimes committed on these lands in which Indians are concerned come under the exclusive jurisdiction of the federal court.

The court overruled a demurrer set up by counsel for San Juan Garcia, charged with the murder of Albert Leeds, an Acoma Indian, on these grounds and announced that it would proceed with the trial of this case, with another Pueblo murder case on the docket and with other cases of alleged crimes committed on Pueblo lands in which Indians are concerned.

The decision is of the utmost importance. A contrary ruling would throw out of court, it is said, a large number of indictments returned by the federal grand jury and greatly lessen the scope of authority of the federal tribunal among the Indians. The government, which has been armed by the United States supreme court in the Sandoval decision with the authority to carry out vigorously the campaign against the Indian liquor traffic desired by the Indian department considers, it is understood, that it has gained another important victory. The attorneys for San Juan Garcia denied the jurisdiction of the federal court, claiming that the alleged crime was one which should come before a district court of the state.

Santa Fe Will Spend \$225,000 at Gallup

Gallup, May 18.—The Santa Fe railroad announces that on June 1 work will begin on a new Santa Fe station, Harvey House and express office building here to cost \$225,000 and to be one of the finest on the system. The Harvey House, which will be built in the mission style to conform with others along the line will have 27 guest rooms and 20 rooms for employees.

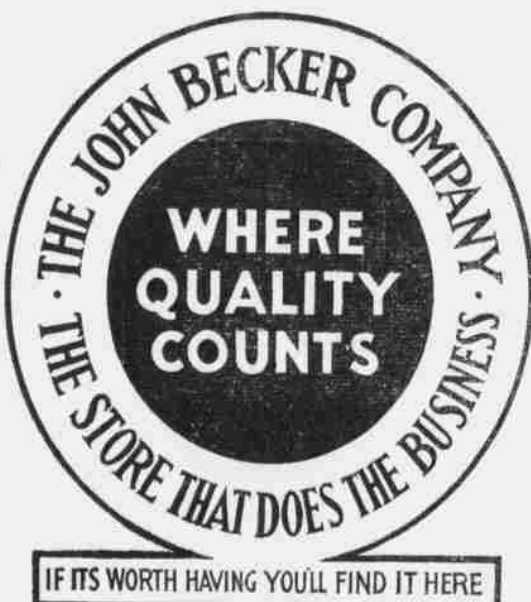

Poisonous Weed Fatal at Las Vegas

Las Vegas, May 19.—"Waco" weed, a species of wild parsnip and poisonous in the extreme, caused one death here this week and came very near causing several others.

Florencio Maes, aged 8 years, is dead, and Francisco Romero and Juan Licon, about the same age, are convalescing from an illness that nearly proved fatal. The other boys were discovered to be ill when they reached home. Physicians were summoned, and their lives were saved by the prompt administration of emetics.

It is said that two children died a few days ago at Manuelitas as the result of drinking water through some poisonous reeds they found growing on the bank of a stream.
