GOV. CURRY WILL RESIGN

Action Will Not Be Taken Upon
His Resignation Until Next
Session of Congress.

REASON SPECULATED ON

Governor Calls Territorial Officials
Into His Office and
Breaks the News

Santa Fe, N. M., Oct. 23.—Although rumor had it that Governor Curry would today hand in his resignation to Secretary of the Interior Ballinger, the day passed without any definite announcement from official sources. Ballinger arrived late last night and today received various visitors at the executive mansion. He was in close conference with Governor Curry, but nothing was given out for publication. It is intimated that Curry told Ballinger he would resign within a month.

It is alleged that on Sept. 11 A. M. Jackley of Alamogordo filed charges against the governor, placing evidence in the hands of Ballinger. Jackley was not called into conference during the day by Ballinger, but left with the secretary on the 7:30 train. He will accompany Ballinger as far as Kansas City and en route the charges will be thoroughly gone over and future action decided upon. Other charges are said to have been preferred by prominent Republicans, and it is known that Jackley is being backed by some leading Republicans.

It has been known to but very few that charges had been filed with Secretary Ballinger by Jackley.

Jackley is a man thoroughly familiar with the territory and the form of government and is well posted on all political matters. His charges in the main accuse Curry of being too lenient in administering the affairs of state.

Enemies of the governor declare he should have ordered a thorough investigation of the affairs of the territorial penitentiary and held up the resignation of Captain John Green, the superintendent, until this investigation had been made.

The case of William Martin, who was clerk in the court of Judge Frank Parker at Las Cruces, is also mentioned. A United States special agent found an alleged deficiency in the funds of the federal court and it was alleged that there was also a tangle in the affairs of the territorial court, but no investigation took place. Criticism is also made in the charges regarding the fact that Curry has appointed men to office who have court records. In this matter direct cases have been cited.

There have been frequent rumors that Curry intended resigning, but each time the governor denied emphatically that he would resign. Curry only became aware of the seriousness of the attack upon him and the identity of the parties making the attack a few days ago. An effort is said to have been made to call off the men seeking the retirement of Curry, but without avail.

Of late the governor is said to have appointed many men to office who secretly have been opposed to his interests. That many of his alleged friends have been playing him false, is current rumor, although none has placed any charges against him at Washington.

During the last legislature the governor did not work in perfect harmony with H. O. Bursum, who hitherto has things his own way; in fact it is openly avowed that at the last legislature Bursum was seriously crossed for the first time in his political career. Rumor also has it that C.

cently had a serious falling out with Leader Bursum. Delegate to Congress Andrews is also said to be on unfavorable footing with Curry.

A choice variety of candidates have already been mentioned as Governor Curry's successor, but it is a much mooted question as to who the real man will be. M. A. Otero, former governor of the territory is said to have the inside track. Elvi A. Hughes, a prominent Santa Fe wool merchant, is likewise mentioned as a formidable candidate.

The Pennsylvania brother of Delegate to Congress W. H. Andrews is also listed, as are many others, including Paul A. F. Walter. The strongest story afloat, however, has it that the vacancy is to be filled with an outsider and that the man is no other than Third Assistant Postmaster A. L. Lawshe. This latter story has gained currency from the fact that only recently Lawshe resigned his position at the national capital and has declared his intention of coming to live in New Mexico. The fact that Lawshe's determination to resign as assistant postmaster general and settle in New Mexico came at a time when the charges made against Curry pending at Washington, leads to a natural inference and conclusion that there may be more truth than fiction in the idea that New Mexico's next chief executive will be a former postal official.—Denver Post.

Was it Cook or Peary?

Commander Peary gives, in today's press, his reasons for alleging that Dr. Cook has been handing the public a "gold brick" in announcing to it that he reached the north pole. Mr. Peary declared that Cook was not within many hundred miles of the north pole. The testimony upon which he bases the assertion is the report of what the two Eskimos are alleged to have divulged to members of his, Peary's party. That is not in writing and it is not given so far as shown, with the knowledge or consent or approval of the two Eskimos. It is evidence, which if we understand it aright, would hardly be admissible, at least, not as to many of its features, in any court. In view of the fact that much of what Peary, Mr. Whitney and others have offered, apparently corroborating Dr. Cook's minute description of the expedition and of the polar conditions, it would seem that Mr. Peary weakens, rather than helps his cause. It remains for the commission recently decided upon by various geographic societies to investigate impartially and to give us their findings.—G. I. (Neb.) Independent.

ANOTHER RAILROAD

Rumors Afloat of Some Very
Important Railroad Construction Soon.

SOUTHERN NEW MEXICO

The Santa Fe Surveyors Are Now
in Field Between Rincon
and Carlsbad.

A rumor going the rounds in railroad circles just now and which is receiving considerable attention, points to important railroad construction in southern New Mexico in the near future. It has been impossible to obtain authority for the rumor, but its persistence makes it of interest. It is to the effect that a corps of Santa Fe surveyors are now in the field between Rincon and Carlsbad, New Mexico, locating a line which will form a new Santa Fe transcontinental line across southern New Mexico and Arizona. The line, it is said, will connect up the present Silver City line at Rincon with a point in Texas.

Town Board Meeting.

Be it remembered, that on the 20th day of October, A. D. 1909, a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the town of Carlsbad, N. M. was held in the Mayor's office at 7:30 p. m.

Present were J. M. Dye, mayor; W. G. Woerner, J. D. Rackley and T. C. Horne, members of board; J. B. Harvey, recorder; J. C. Gordon, marshal.

The following proceedings were had, to wit:

The treasurer's report was received and approved.

The Mayor declared nominations in order for the election of a member of the board to fill the unexpired term of W. J. Barber, resigned. W. G. Woerner placed in nomination J. R. Linn. This nomination was seconded by T. C. Horne. A motion was made and duly seconded that Mr. Linn be elected by acclamation and the following vote was cast: Year: W. G. Woerner, J. D. Rackley, T. C. Horne and Mayor J. M. Dye. Nay: None. Whereupon the motion was by the Mayor declared passed by unanimous vote, and J. R. Linn elected a member of said Board of Trustees.

A motion was made by W. G. Woerner and seconded by J. D. Rackley that the Mayor and Recorder be instructed and empowered to execute the license by the town of Carlsbad to the Eastern Railway Company of New Mexico for the crossing of the railroad right-of-way with the sanitary sewer system as proposed by the said railway company. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

A motion was made by T. C. Horne, seconded by J. D. Rackley that the Town Board dispense with the services of the ditch man. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

Thereupon W. G. Woerner called up for passage Ordinance No. 96 was introduced, read and ordered published at a meeting of the Board on the 6th day of September, 1909. The Recorder presented publisher's affidavit of publication of said ordinance in the Carlsbad Current, a weekly newspaper published and of general circulation in the town, in issue of September 6, 1908. The ordinance was then read for the second time for amendment.

An amendment was offered to amend section 9 changing the length of numerals to three inches instead of four as specified in the original ordinance. The amendment was carried by unanimous vote.

Motion was made, seconded and carried that the rules be suspended and that said Ordinance No. 96 entitled "An Ordinance Regulating the Speed of Automobiles" be referred to the school.

biles, etc." To read for the third time. Motion was made by W. G. Woerner seconded by J. D. Rackley that said Ordinance No. 96 be passed as a whole. On call of the roll those voting ye were W. G. Woerner, J. D. Rackley and T. C. Horne. Those voting nay, none. Whereupon the motion was by the mayor declared passed by unanimous vote.

A. J. Murry, D. W. Morgan and Mr. Peck were present and offered some timely suggestions relative to the extension of the water main on Canal Street to Church Street and other things. After considerable discussion, the following resolution was offered by Trustee W. G. Woerner and seconded by Trustee J. D. Rackley:

Whereas, the public necessities of the town of Carlsbad require that a water main not less than two inches in diameter be laid in Canal street in said town, extending from the present water main at the intersection of said Canal and Lucky streets in said town, north to Church street; and the Board of Trustees of said town being of the opinion that enough persons residing on and along said line of extension will take and use enough water to reasonably warrant the extension of said water main by the Public Utilities Co.

It is therefore hereby ordered by the Board of Trustees of said town of Carlsbad that said Public Utilities Company extend its said line of water main in Canal street in said town from Lucky Street, north to Church street, the water main laid to be not less than two inches in diameter, the same to be laid according to the franchise of said Public Utilities Company within two weeks from this date. On call of the roll on said resolution, those voting in favor of same were Trustees W. G. Woerner, T. C. Horne and J. D. Rackley and the mayor, James M. Dye. Nay vote, none.

Whereupon the resolution was by the mayor declared unanimously adopted.

The bill of the United States Reclamation Service for water furnished the town of Carlsbad during the month of September amounting to \$12.08 was presented and ordered paid.

The meeting then closed subject to the call of the mayor.

The above minutes were read and approved this 20th day of October A. D. 1909.

Gov. Curry has forwarded his resignation to President Taft who will probably not act on it some time during the next sixty days.

The cause given by the governor is that he wishes to devote his time to private business at Tallahassee. Quite a number are spoken of as probable successors among them Nathan Jaffa and H. J. Hagerman, but it is probable that Bill Andrews will name the man who is to be governor.

There has been considerable talk about the bridges to span the Pecos at Carlsbad, some claiming that it will, under the present plans, be a low bridge. To prove that these reports are false and misleading the dimensions are given as follows:

Length 310 feet, width at base 24 feet, width at top 20 feet, height from end to end 16 feet.

The height brings the bridge nearly up to the bank on the west, being only from four to six feet lower than the railway track. There will be ample room in the arches to carry any ordinary flood and a big flood will run over the top and through the arches and as it will be of reinforced concrete the water cannot effect it any more than it does Tansill dam or the Damians dam, neither of which are longer than the proposed bridge.

Dennis Duncan returned last night from Morenci, Arizona, whither he went ten days ago to attend to the burial of his son, Elmer, who was killed by being caught in a belt in running machinery of the Detroit Copper Mining Company. He found that Elmer was killed instantly, his body being broken apart, but his legs and arms were still in the machinery. The remains were taken to the home of his cousin Bill Duncan, and were buried after the arrival of his father who feared the effect of bringing the body home might have on Mrs. Duncan, the mother of the young man, who was present at the first hearing of her son's death. Mr. Duncan says he received much kindness and sympathy from the employees of Elmer and all the people of Morenci, who had cared for his son's remains and had them embalmed. The many friends of the family extend sympathy in this awful affliction.

Work on the Carlsbad bridge across the Pecos still hangs fire but the interest on the bonds goes merrily on while the tax payer foots the bill. The milk man, Mr. Wersell, still fords the river four to six times daily and hundreds of others continue to endanger life and limb by nearly swimming the river rather than go around. When the bridge is built (if it ever is) there will be more travel on it than on all other bridges in Eddy county combined and it is the greatest necessity today except the road across the sand to the Plains. That the material should be delivered for bridges at Artesia and Malaga before the bridge at Carlsbad, is a disgrace and injustice, for the bridge here is ten times as necessary as any other. Then what is becoming of the interest on the bonds? Who gets the use of the cash? Who profits by the tax payer's loss? Has it come to this that we are to do without a bridge and still pay the interest on the bonds? Why not order the Midland Bridge Company to build the bridge at once or forfeit all contracts?

A SHOWING UP OF THE FACTS

A Refutation of the Many False Charges and Misstatements Made by an Enemy of Carlsbad, on Grand Jury

It is not the purpose of this paper to defend the liquor evil any more than the social evil or any other evil but when a few Artesia grand jurors can hood-wink the others and use them to defend the name of Carlsbad it is time that some one shows the facts, that a recitation of such report be not made in the future. An example should be made of some one and the facts brought out in court so the public and those outside Eddy county might be put wise on this question. If the innocent grand jurors wish to clear their skirts of a prejudiced report they can do so over their signature by simply stating the facts which very likely are that they endorsed a report and took for granted an untrue statement of an Artesia boomer intent on knocking Carlsbad.

The last grand jury to sit in Eddy county made a report from which the following extract is copied verbatim:

The grand jurors have made an investigation as to the cause of crime within the county and to such an extent as allowed in the limited time for so doing. We find that more than one-half the crime committed within Eddy county is a direct result of the liquor traffic, and while we appreciate that the expenses to the county of the prosecution of

offenses is considerable in comparison with the evil of having such crimes committed within this district, yet from this standpoint we call the court's attention to the fact that the liquor traffic is a very unprofitable one from a financial point of view notwithstanding the licenses paid. For a comparison, we will take the towns of Carlsbad and Artesia, each of said towns being about the same in population. The town of Carlsbad has three saloons. In the town of Carlsbad for the quarter ending July 1 the expenses of justice of the peace fees alone were \$158.45. For the same period the expenses to the county for the town of Artesia for justice of the peace fees were \$3.95; for the quarter ending Sept. 30, 1909, in the town of Carlsbad the expenses to the county for justice of the peace fees were \$234.65, and for the same period the expenses for justice of the peace fees in the town of Artesia were nothing.

To show that the grand jury made no investigation as to the cause of crime in Eddy county but instead innocently took the word of some lying, falsifying, perjured author of the report the following report of Justice of the Peace N. Cunningham for July, August and September, 1909, is printed in full:

The grand jurors who endorsed the report of course supposed the author of the report had made the investigation—he said he had for it could hardly be supposed any citizen would deliberately lie to say nothing of being the instrument by which others would be made criminals with him. The facts are, no investigation was

made or even the dockets of the justices of the peace examined or the trouble taken to look up the various reports of the justices to the county of Eddy.

As the above report shows that in Precinct No. 1, Eddy county paid \$501.89 for crimes caused by other than the liquor traffic and the small sum of \$34.05 was caused by the liquor

traffic under a system of legal restriction. During the same three months, the liquor traffic was restricted and held in check better than in any other town on earth, whether prohibition or not and paid in Carlsbad alone \$900.00 to the county schools and city of Carlsbad.

No person can make an investigation of the cause of crime in Eddy county and find that the statement above of the justice docket is not correct and consequently the grand jury investigation was never made and the written report is a deliberate misstatement of facts.
