Huerta Resigns

Francisco Carabajal Assumes the Presidency of Mexico.

Mexico City, July 15.—Gen. Victoriano Huerta resigned from the provisional presidency of the Mexican republic this evening and his resignation was accepted by the senate and chamber of deputies, 212 to 17.

Francisco Carabajal was then appointed president and took the oath of office at the joint session of deputies and senators.

Huerta's resignation was submitted through the department of foreign relations. It was read in the house and was greeted with cries of "Viva Huerta."

It was then referred to the joint committee of gubernacion. After brief consideration, the committee reported accepting the resignation in the following terms:

"Article 1.—We accept the resignation presented by Gen. Victoriano Huerta as president of the Mexican united states.

"Article 2.—We call Licentiate Francisco Carabajal, minister of foreign relations, to assume the presidency."

A ballot was taken and the joint session approved the report.

President Carabajal proceeded to the national palace under an escort of presidential guards and all along the way was greeted with tumultuous cheering.

The new executive passed through double files of troops as he proceeded to the national palace. The military band played the national hymn while the troops presented arms and rendered presidential honors.

Two deputies spoke vigorously against the acceptance of Huerta's resignation, one of them calling it "weak submission to the United States."

Two other deputies spoke in favor of acceptance declaring that it was the only way to save the country and save the fratricidal strife.

Gen. Aureliano Blanquet, Huerta's minister of war, several other generals and the ministers of communication, public instruction and interior in the Huerta cabinet, Arturo Alvarado Garcia Naranjo, Ignacio Alcocer, respectively, as well as other high officials of the former administration, left the capital this afternoon.

A special committee composed of Jesus Urueta, Enrique Bordes, Manuel and Jose Inez Novelo, former members of the chamber of deputies, left tonight to arrange with the constitutionalist leaders for a peaceful entry into the capital.

It was reported that General Huerta was preparing to leave for Europe. The members of his family passed through Cordoba this afternoon on their way to Puerto, Mexico.

The streets of the capital were crowded until a late hour tonight, but no disturbance has been reported. The governor of the federal district issued orders to the police to check every demonstra-

tion rigorously. The streets are patrolled by mounted police who have orders to use drastic measures if necessary.

As President Carabajal emerged from the chamber of deputies an immense crowd blocked the streets, making it difficult for the presidential carriage to pass. The troops were obliged to clear the way. The dense crowds issuing from the chamber were momentarily halted, hundreds turning back into the building.

A panic was narrowly averted, the trouble being caused by some man in the street raising a cry against the deputies who refused to vote for the acceptance of Huerta's resignation. The manifestants showed an ugly disposition and attempted to attack the deputies, but the troops leveled their guns and dispersed them.

In view of possible disturbances as a result of the change in the government, placards are being posted on the walls along the main streets, signed by Eduardo Iturbide, governor of the federal district calling upon the people not to hold demonstrations, to preserve the peace and to act as becomes a cultured nation. The proclamation says that the governor will suppress disorders at any cost.

Shortly after 8 o'clock tonight, General Huerta, accompanied by a few friends, entered the French cafe, which he has been in the habit of visiting several times daily for the past year or more, and took his usual place near the entrance.

An immense crowd followed the ex-president to the cafe, shouting "vivas" for him. Many shook him by the hand, while others embraced and kissed him on the cheek.

The stern old soldier was overcome and tears filled his eyes. He raised his glass and said:

"This will be my last toast in my favorite resort and I drink to the new president of Mexico."

Huerta and General Blanquet left the capital tonight. They boarded a train on the Mexican railway a few miles beyond the city. It is thought they are going to Puerto, Mexico.

Before his departure Huerta went to the national palace to pay his respects to President Carabajal.

There was complete lack of disorder in the capital tonight and the theaters and cafes were crowded. The populace is now hopeful that peace is in sight. Huerta's popularity apparently increased greatly after his resignation as Mexicans now look upon him as a good loser.

A petition is being circulated among traveling men urging the renomination of Hugh H. Williams to be state corporation commissioner on the ground that it takes at least two years to learn the duties of the office; that Williams gave up his job as Santa Fe conductor with the expectation of having a longer tenure of office than two years, the short term; that he has made a good record and proven himself the friend of the traveling public.

THE HIGH SCHOOL AT BELEN

On the 27th of the present month of July the people of Valencia County will have to vote in favor or against the High School at Belen. According to the progress of education so in like manner the demands for educational institutions are augmented and the day is near when we will be able to educate our children in our own town without having to spend big sums of money in order to send them away from our homes to be educated and it often happens that we spend our money in vain, our children go merely to warm up the seat in many of these educational institutions.

A High School in Belen will result in great benefit to the children of this town and is surroundings.

We need not go very far into the matter, as the parents of families are the better judges in the matter will give their verdict on election day, be it in favor or against.

We are in favor of Belen and very naturally we wish its progress and welfare, we would like to see the parents of families that they must procure the facilities of education for their children, because a people without education is worthless.

SOUTH AND EAST NEW MEXICO IN FINE SHAPE

The Albuquerque Journal says that after traveling for a month in a motor car through the eastern and southern tier of counties, Dr. C. E. Lukens, of the Children's Home society, is back in Albuquerque, and reports conditions were never more prosperous in those parts of the state visited during the overland trip.

"Over in Curry county I found the farmers growing 20,000 acres of wheat, which averages 20 bushels to the acre," said Dr. Lukens. "The dry farmers in that section are enjoying their most prosperous year. Near Portales and Elida in Roosevelt county, I saw range grass five feet high. The rains have been so heavy in parts of the dry farming district that the sale value of alfalfa has been injured. Some farmers are gathering 7 tons of alfalfa to the acre, first crop.

"In Dona Ana county I found fine progress in farming and in building good roads. Dona Ana county has spent a \$100,000 bond issue on roads, a \$30,000 state appropriation and now has voted another \$50,000 bond issued. Dona Ana county is a rival of southern California for good roads and agricultural development. There are more good roads in Dona Ana county than all other counties in the state put together."

Dr. Lukens made the trip from Roswell to Carrizozo, Alamogordo and Las Cruces in a machine and says that the roads are splendid and that motorists should not hesitate to travel in that section.

During his journey, Dr. Lukens found homes for an even dozen homeless boys and girls.

A Clash in Bernalillo County.

There is a clash of authority between Elfege Baca, chairman of the republican executive committee of Bernalillo county, and Jesus Romero, chairman of the county central committee, of which the executive committee is a creation for campaign purposes only.

Mr. Baca has called his executive committee to meet next Monday, it is said, for the purpose of calling primaries, designating the polling places and naming the officers and judges of election to hold the primaries. Also to call a county convention.

Mr. Romero has stated emphatically that no primaries will be called until the republican county central committee meets in open session at the court house and takes formal action on all the matters which Mr. Baca proposes to handle through the executive committee.

The county central committee is the only authority of the republican party in the county. The executive committee, some of the members of which are not even members of the central committee, has absolutely no power and the meeting called by Mr. Baca is worse than useless, as any assumption of authority by it will result in another split in the republican party in Bernalillo county.

Chairman Romero alone has power to call the central committee together, and the central committee alone has power to call primaries and arrange as to how they should be conducted, or to call a convention.

Since the coalition of the two committees, it is reported that Mr. Baca has spread the news among the native people that he is the man with the power and that Mr. Romero is only a figurehead. His action in calling the executive committee for the purpose of assuming the functions of the county central committee seems to confirm the truth of such reports.

As we have said before, the day of the boss is passed. What is done must be done fairly and regularly, or the voters will rebel at the polls where they can find a remedy always by defeating a boss-named ticket.—Albuquerque Morning Journal.

Good Alteration

On July 1 the postoffice department made effective an alteration of the method of drawing money orders which will make the postoffice order as pliable as the travelers' check. Under the new plan a postoffice order will be payable at any postoffice which is authorized to do business of this character, which will facilitate the transfer of money throughout the government offices tremendously. This will make it possible for the traveler on the road to cash his remittances from headquarters wherever he happens to be. Similarly it will enable the pleasure traveler and tourist to carry his money in government orders if he prefers to have it that way instead of in currency.

Will Vote to Amend State Constitution

At the election to be held in November of this year the question of amending the constitution of the state of New Mexico will come before the voters. The proposed amendments are as follows:

Joint Resolution No. 12.—Joint Resolution providing for the amendment of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, entitled "Taxation and Revenue," S. Sub. S. J. R. No. 12; filed March 15, 1913.

Be it resolved by the legislature of the state of New Mexico:

That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, entitled "Taxation and Revenue," be and the same hereby is amended so as to read as follows:

ARTICLE VIII—TAXATION AND REVENUE.

Section 1. Taxes levied upon tangible property shall be in proportion to the value thereof, and taxes shall be equal and uniform upon subjects of taxation of the same class.

Sec. 2. Taxes levied upon real or personal property for state revenue shall not exceed four mills annually on each dollar of the assessed valuation thereon except for the support of the educational, penal and charitable institutions of the state, payment of the same debt and interest thereon; and the total annual tax levy upon such property for all state purposes exclusive of necessary levies for the state debt shall not exceed ten mills.

Sec. 3. The property of the United States, the state and all counties, towns, cities and school districts, and other municipal corporations, public libraries, community ditches and all laterals thereof, all church property, all property used for educational or charitable purposes, all cemeteries not used or held for private or corporate profit, and all bonds of the state of New Mexico, and of the counties, municipalities and districts thereof shall be exempt from taxation.

Sec. 4. Any public officer making any profit out of public monies or using the same for any purpose not authorized by law, shall be deemed guilty of a felony and shall be punished as provided by law, and shall be disqualified to hold public office. All public monies not invested in interest bearing securities shall be deposited in National Banks in the state or in banks or trust companies incorporated under the laws of the state, and the interest derived therefrom shall be applied in the manner prescribed by law.

Sec. 5. The legislature may exempt from taxation property of each head of a family to the amount of two hundred dollars.

Sec. 6. Lands held in large tracts shall not be assessed for taxation at any lower value per acre than (than) lands of the same character or quality and similarly situated, held in small tracts. The plowing of land

shall not be considered as adding value thereto for the purpose of taxation.

Sec. 7. No execution shall issue upon any judgment rendered against the board of county commissioners of any county, or against any incorporated city, town or village, school district or board of education; or against any officer of any county, incorporated city, town or village, school district or board of education, upon any judgment recovered against him in his official capacity and for which the county, incorporated city, town or village, school district or board of education, is liable, but the same shall be paid out of the proceeds of a tax levy as other liabilities of counties, incorporated cities, towns or villages, school districts or boards of education, and when so called shall be paid by the county treasurer to the judgment creditor.

Proposing an Amendment of (to) Section Two of Article Ten of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico.

S. Sub. S. J. R. No. 10; filed March 15, 1913.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico: That Section Two of Article Ten of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, be amended so as to read as follows:

ARTICLE X.

Section 2. All county officers shall be elected for a term of two years, and after having served two consecutive terms, shall be ineligible to hold any county office for two years thereafter.

Proposing An Amendment of (to) Section One of Article Five of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico.

S. J. R. No. 19; filed March 17, 1913.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico: That Section One of Article Five of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, be amended so as to read as follows:

ARTICLE V.

Section 1. The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, state auditor, state treasurer, attorney general, superintendent of public instruction and commissioner or (of) public lands, who shall be elected for the term of two years beginning on the first day of January next after their election.

Such officers shall, after having served two consecutive terms, be ineligible to hold any state office for two years thereafter.

The officers of the executive department, except the lieutenant governor, shall, during their terms of office, reside and keep the public records, books, papers and seals of office at the seat of government.

Under the present terms of the constitution, county officers are elected for a term of four years, which is too long in case an official prove incompetent.

The proposed amendment will give the voters of New Mexico an opportunity to retire an unsatisfactory official at the end of two years, and to elect one in his place who will do the work of the office in a manner satisfactory to the electors.

Call for Republican Convention

By order of the Republican State Central Committee a delegate convention of the republican party of the state of New Mexico is hereby called to meet at the city of Santa Fe on the twenty-fourth day of August, A. D. 1914, at Salmon's theater, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m. of said day for the purpose of nominating a candidate for representative, from New Mexico, in the 64th congress of the United States; a candidate for member of the state corporation commission; of considering and acting upon the resolution adopted in December, 1913, by the republican national committee as a proposed basis for the call for the national convention in 1916, and of transacting such other business as may regularly come before the convention.

In all legislative or judicial districts composed of two or more counties, the joint memberships of the delegates selected to the state convention under this call from the counties composing any such district shall meet at the city of Santa Fe, not later than August twenty-fifth, A. D. 1914, and there hold district conventions for the purpose of nominating candidates for legislative or judicial district officers.

Legislative candidates from all other legislative districts shall be nominated by the county conventions called hereunder for the purpose of selecting delegates to the state convention.

All county conventions called for the purpose of selecting delegates to the state convention shall be held not later than August the fifteenth, 1914.

The credentials of all delegates to the state convention, and all notices of contests, must be in the hands of either the chairman or secretary of this committee at or before twelve o'clock noon on Friday, August 21, 1914.

In any county in which there is no republican county chairman the county convention shall be called by a member of the state central committee.

Proxies for delegates will not be recognized except when held by persons who are residents of the county from which delegates are selected.

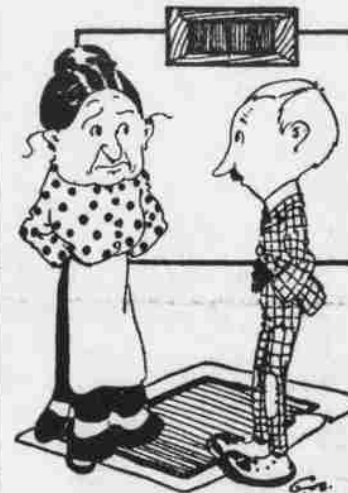
