## COMMISSIONERS COURT

Proceedings of the October Session and Minutes of Business Transacted.

Be it remembered that on the 4th day of October A. D. 1909, the Board of County Commissioners of Eddy County, New Mexico met in regular session and that the following proceedings were had:

Present, A. C. Heard, District No. 1, chairman; Joe H. Graham, District No. 2; C. W. Beeman, District No. 3; A. R. O'Quinn, clerk.

Moved by Beeman and carried that the order made on June 8th regarding the Hearst Trophy Cup awarded at the Albuquerque Fair be rescinded.

Moved by Beeman and carried that the petition of the following order in the matter of the assessment of the valuation of the lands belonging to the P. V. Beet Sugar Company, the Colateral Trust Co., and the Pecos Irrigation Co. Valuation as fixed by the Board having appealed to the Territorial Board of Equalization and the appeal sustained reducing the valuation of said land from \$17.50 as fixed by the Board of County Commissioners to \$4.00 per acre. It is the sense of the Board that the Territorial Board of Equalization has no jurisdiction in this matter under the opinion of the Attorney General of April 9th, 1909, construing Chapter 724 of the Laws of 1909, The Collector and Treasurer of Eddy County was therefore instructed to fix the value of said lands at \$17.50 per acre and proceed to the collection of the taxes on said land as fixed by this Board.

Moved and carried that in the matter of the raise of taxation on the W. R. Owens' assessment, owing to the fact that said W. R. Owens having shown to the Board that they had, through error in their estimates, raised said assessment \$660 to much that the Treasurer and Collector be instructed to reduce the valuation of said W. R. Owens' assessment \$660.

The section having been advertised according to law for the establishment of the public highway, beginning at the town of Enosie and running West on the most direct line to San Wells connecting with Highway running from Artesia to San Wells, it was moved and carried that said petition be granted and that W. W. O'Neill, Jack Heard and John Newbush be appointed viewers for said Public Highway.

In the matter of the road petition by the citizens of Hope, New Mexico, it was moved and carried that said petition be laid over, for the report from the viewers.

The petition having been filed with this Board asking this Board to declare certain section lines public highways of not less than 40 feet in width, it was moved and carried that the following section lines be and are hereby made public highways 40 feet in width, the north lines of sections 30, 29, 28, 27, 26 and 25; the north lines of sections 31, 32, 33 and 34; the east lines of sections 33, 28, 31 and 30 in Township 16 south Range 38 East N. M. P. Meridian; the township line between Townships 16 and 17 south from the southwest corner of Section 34 to the southwest corner of section 31 Township 16 south Range 38 East N. M. P. M.; the north line of sections 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35 and 36 and the east line of sections 10, 15, 22, 27, 34, 31, 30, 19, 18, 7 and 6; Township lines on east, west and south boundaries of Township 17 south Range 38 East.

A petition having been presented requesting the discontinuance of certain public road beginning at the southeast corner of section 3 township 17 south range 38 East and running between sections 3 and

southeast corner of section 3 township and range as above described. It was moved and carried that said petition be rejected.

It was moved and carried that the Artesia Club be requested to recommend some good competent man to be appointed by the board to superintend the construction of the Artesia Bridge.

It was moved and carried that the board adjourn until the 6th day of October.

Be it remembered that on this 5th day of October 1909 in pursuance of the adjournment had October 4th the Board of County Commissioners met in regular session, members present as before.

It having been shown to the Board that Eddy County's appointee to the scholarship in the New Mexico University had resigned and the Board having had a petition from members of the School Board of School District No. 10, recommending Ernest Paris for the appointment to said scholarship, it was moved and carried that Ernest Paris be appointed.

An application having been presented from Dr. T. B. Quirey for the appointment as County Health Officer, was moved and carried that Dr. T. B. Quirey be appointed County Health Officer.

It was moved and carried that R. D. Brown be appointed teacher for Eddy County, Comm. House at a salary of \$25 per month.

Moved and carried that the following order be passed:

It being represented to the Board that taxes on the West half of Northwest quarter of section 8, and the East half of the Northeast quarter of section 7, all in Township 24 South Range 28 East, on tax rolls for years 1891 and 1892 are not definitely shown to be fully paid for said two years, but that said said tax rolls do show definitely that about 138 to 140 acres of said tract was sold on for said two years, and whereas the old town of Lakout was platted in said place mentioned tract and hence, said said on a portion of said town lots for said two years, but the said rolls do not describe which particular lots or what portion of said tract was sold on for said two years, and it appearing to the Board that the principal portion and perhaps all of said 140 acre tract above described, was sold on for said two years.

It is hereby ordered by the Board for the purpose of clearing the record on said above described tract of land, that the whole of said tract, viz: W. 1/2 of NW 1/4, Section 8 and E 1/2 of NE 1/4, Section 7, Twp. 24 S., R. 28 East, N. M. P. M., be hereby declared to be free and clear of all taxes for said years 1891 and 1892, and that the tax for said years on each and every portion of said above described tract which may not be paid is hereby rebated.

By order of the Board of County Commissioners, at Carlsbad, New Mexico, this 6th day of October, 1909.

Moved and carried that the following order be passed:

It being represented to the Board that the taxes on certain property assessed for the year 1893 to Wm. P. Bonbright, on page 3, lines 19 to 30 inclusive, are not definitely shown to be paid, and the County Treasurer and Collector is unable to state definitely from the records in his office whether or not said tax has been paid on account of the manner in which the receipt number opposite said assessment is entered on said tax rolls, though the present Treasurer and Collector states that he is of the opinion that said tax is paid.

It is therefore ordered by the Board for the purpose of clearing the record on said above described tract of land, that the whole of said tract, viz: W. 1/2 of NW 1/4, Section 8 and E 1/2 of NE 1/4, Section 7, Twp. 24 S., R. 28 East, N. M. P. M., be hereby declared to be free and clear of all taxes for said years 1891 and 1892, and that the tax for said years on each and every portion of said above described tract which may not be paid is hereby rebated.

Upon motion the Board adjourned until Thursday, October 7th.

Be it remembered that on this 7th day of October, 1909, in pursuance of an adjournment had yesterday, the Board of County Commissioners met in regular session. Present, Commissioners and Clerks as day before.

Moved and carried that the following resolution be passed:

Whereas the County Superintendent of Eddy County, by petition from certain of its citizens, segregated a portion of the Lakewood School District No. 7 and added the same to the Lone Tree School District No. 13, and

Whereas said citizens of said district have petitioned the Board of County Commissioners to place any school lands which may have been changed from the Lakewood

School District No. 7 and placed in the funds of the Lone Tree School District No. 13 by reason of such change in said districts back into the Lakewood School District No. 7 just as though no such change had ever been made.

Moved by Beeman and carried that the following resolution be passed.

Whereas, by order of this Board heretofore made, this Board has sold to Coffin & Crawford, of Chicago, Illinois, \$51,500.00 Refunding bonds, and

Whereas it is the desire of both this Board and of Messrs. Coffin & Crawford that the transactions be closed without delay, and

Whereas it is necessary for this Board to call in for redemption the outstanding indebtedness of Eddy County which now may be paid off by the County.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Treasurer of this County and Clerk of this Board are hereby instructed to give notice to the holders of said bonds in the manner and form required by law, to present the same for redemption at such place and time as shall be designated by the District Attorney for this District.

The District Attorney, for this District, is hereby authorized to designate the time and place where said bonds shall be

## OFF-YEAR ELECTIONS

A Synopsis of Returns From the Several State and Municipal Elections.

New York, Nov. 3. Complete returns for mayor show Gaynor 250,678, Baughman 177,662 and Hearst 153,843. Gaynor's plurality is 73,016.

The forces of fusion will be in practical control of New York City's government after Jan. 1, although the democratic mayor, Wm. J. Gaynor, was elected.

With that exception the fusion sweep was complete. Not a single democratic candidate on the city or county tickets won. The fusion forces, by electing their candidates for comptroller and president of the board of aldermen, together with the victory of the fusion and anti-Tammany candidates for president in all five boroughs, gave them an opportunity to Tammany. This, an out of 16 votes in the anti-Tammany board of aldermen. This, however, will increase the hands during its term of office the expenditure of practically a million dollars.

On the county ticket the fusionists elected their candidates for district attorney, county clerk register and city court judge, which will place nearly every out of patronage in the greater city in their hands.

The board of aldermen will be composed of 42 democrats and 36 fusionists. Charles F. Murphy, the leader of Tammany Hall, would not discuss the report that he was going to resign as Tammany leader.

Later when Mr. Murphy was pressed for a statement regarding his reported resignation, he said: "I have no intention of resigning."

The returns from the municipal elections in Indiana show that a majority of the contests were won by the democrats, although the republicans were victorious in some of the larger cities notably Indianapolis, Fort Wayne, Evansville. The campaign in most of the cities was waged on the liquor issue. The more liberal element was supporting the democratic ticket in most cases.

Tom Johnson, the popular mayor of Cleveland, Ohio, was defeated by Baehr, a republican, by 3,700 votes.

The republicans swept Nebraska, even in Douglas and Lancaster counties, both of which went democratic a year ago.

The democrats made a healthy gain in Massachusetts cutting a republican majority from 60,000 to 8,000.

Kentucky went democratic in every county, electing enough democrats to make the leg-

ature more than two-thirds democratic.

Rhode Island went republican 11,834.

F. J. Heney was defeated for prosecuting attorney in San Francisco by C. M. Fickert. Majority 13,000. McCarthy, the union labor candidate for mayor won by 8,000.

Pennsylvania elected the republicans, state treasurer, auditor general and judge of the supreme court by a majority of 100,000.

### Garrett Reed Passes Away

Garrett Reed died at his home on South Canyon street Monday, Nov. 1, at 4:30 p. m., of dropsy, and the funeral was held Tuesday at 2 p. m., from the family residence and conducted by Rev. Palmer, the Christian minister who came here from Kentucky last spring.

Mr. Reed arrived from London in 1865, and resided in that city until 1868, when he came to this country and resided in the city of New York until 1871, when he came to Carlsbad, N. M., where he resided until his death. He was married to Miss Maggie Smith in March 1865, and they had four children, two sons and two daughters, all of whom are alive.

Mr. and Mrs. Reed moved to Eddy county, Texas, from Kentucky in 1885 where they lived a short time, then to Stonewall county, and to Crosby county the fall of 1890 and to Eddy county, New Mexico, in July 1900. Since coming here Mr. Reed has labored incessantly to win his good wife, has gone much to assist in building this new country, having built a good hotel structure of rock and brick that will be a monument to his memory for many years. Mr. Reed had many friends and the funeral was largely attended.

## Strong for Curry.

Two prominent business men of New Mexico, who are now in Washington, express belief that there is no real good reason or ground for the charges filed against Governor Curry.

"I have known Governor Curry for many years," said John W. Pate, president of the Citizens National Bank of Roswell, N. M., at the New Willard hotel today, "and I have always found him an honest official, whose sole interest was the welfare of the territory over which he was appointed governor by President Roosevelt."

"The charges which were filed against him are general charges, not itemized; no names, dates, places, whys, and wherefores seem to be mentioned, judging from the newspaper accounts. Anybody can make a blanket charge, and it is my firm belief that his political enemies are back of this movement to discredit him and force him out of office."

Smith Lea, of Roswell, who has been in attendance at the Scottish Rite Masons' convention here, and who is a thirty-second degree Mason, said today he did not believe Governor Curry would use his office to advance his own political interest; that, on the contrary, New Mexico had never had a more efficient and conscientious governor. "I don't believe a word of it," declared Mr. Lea, "and I speak from personal experience and intimate acquaintance with Governor Curry." — Albuquerque Journal.

## BIG COMMITTEE COMING

A Committee of United States Senate to Visit the Carlsbad Project About Nov. 19.

The following letter from Governor Curry concerning the proposed visit of a committee of the United States Senate to the various reclamation projects of the West was received this morning by Mr. C. H. McLenathen:

Santa Fe, Nov. 3, 1909.

My Dear McLenathen:

I am glad the senate committee has decided to visit the Pecos Valley. Unless the itinerary is changed the committee will arrive at El Paso on Wednesday, Nov. 17th, spend the afternoon and evening there, leaving early the next morning for Las Cruces, where they will have breakfast and meet the people of Mesilla Valley. They will leave Las Cruces about 11 o'clock, take lunch at Rincon, then go to Engle, where they will take carriages for the dam site, returning to El Paso for supper. Immediately after supper they will be taken on a special over the Del Rio cut-off arriving in Roswell for breakfast, and spend a few hours with the people there, and then go to Carlsbad where they will arrive in time for lunch, spending the afternoon and evening there. It would be proper for you to arrange for a dinner for them that evening. The afternoon will be spent in visiting the irrigation projects and meeting the people. Either Mr. Jaffa or myself will accompany the party, and we will wire you at least two or three days ahead of time the exact number in the party. I think it advisable to have a committee of your Water Users' Association meet the party at Roswell and go down with them, so you would have a chance to explain a great many things to them enroute to Carlsbad. Senator Carter or Mr. Newell can be reached by telegram at Orland, Cal., Nov. 7, and at Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 10. If you wire or write them, send it in care of the Reclamation service.
