Deaths in Shakespeare.

Somebody has taken the pains to count up the deaths in Shakespeare, either on the stage or behind the scenes, and finds the number ninety. The variety of causes is great. Cold steel accounts for about two-thirds. twelve are old age and decay, seven persons are beheaded, five die by poison, two of suffocation, two of strangling, one of a fall, one by drowning, three by snake bite, and one is thumped to death with a sandhag. The compiler of this curious table has overlooked one of the most affecting in all the plays-that of Mamillius of "The Winter's Tale." Mamillius, son of Queen Hermoine, died of a broken heart caused by grief over the supposed perfidy of his mother.

Sneezing Competition.

A sneezing competition between half a dozen old women took place recently in a certain Lancashire (Eng.) town. The competitors were at liberty to use any means of bringing about a sneeze, a tin of the best snuff being actually provided for the purpose. Intoxication for Sparrows. "HEART OF THE HOME."

In Those Words Clubwoman Aptly

Describes the Kitchen. "Domestic science seems to be the solution of several vexed questions, such as the servant problem, divorce, and temperance. If more money were expended by cities in introducing domestic science into the schools less money would need to be spent on insane asylums, poorhouses and penitentiaries," said Miss Ella G. Neave in her address on "The Progress of Domestic Science" before the department of the household economics and education of the Woman's Club. "The kitchen is the heart of the home. The woman who holds the comfort of a man battling with the world in her hands has responsibility as great as that of a commander of a battleship. The only remedy for the evils of bad cooking and lack of good homes is in the schools of domestic science which are established in the public schools." -Cincinnati Commercial Tribune.

### Protection for the Worker

insurance for workingmen is considered important, and in at least a dozen countries a practical solution of the question has been found and applied. The systems, though similar, are varied.

United States Consul Haynes, at Rouen, France, has gathered and sent to the Department of Labor and Commerce the main facts concerning work men's insurance in a dozen countries.

in Belgium the insurance against accident and disability is obligatory for miners. Moreover, since Jan. 1. 1900, the government has a national fund for retiring pensions, which is voluntary, and insures to each of its members when sixty-five years of age a pension of \$69.50 annually.

The insurance of miners has also been compulsory in Austria since 1889. The minimum insurance is, for men, \$41, for women \$20.50. Insurance against sickness and accident is also obligatory for those engaged in industrial and agricultural pursuits. But in no case can accident insurance exceed 60 per cent of the annual

In the German Empire there are three insurances for workmen, all of which are obligatory and under the authority of the Imperial Insurance Office. They are accident, sickness and old age, or infirmity. The insurance is mutual and its administration is autonomous under state control. ### Antitoxin for Laziness

According to Berlin reports, a scienhas been facetiously termed an antitoxin for laziness. The doctor thinks his discovery will be of importance in the treatment of neurasthenia or nervous exhaustion and the convalescence from acute dizeases. His experiments are described as follows: A guinea pig was drawn backward on a rough carpet, by means of a string, until it no longer resisted interference with its motion and was totally exhausted. Stimulation was continued, by means of electricity, until the animal was in a state of autointoxication, that is to say, a condition of infection from the toxin or polson generated by itself. During the experiment, the temperature of the guinea pig fell very greatly. When exhaustion could be carried no further, the animal was air, the toxin was found to consist of very stable and had to be kept in and energy.

#### New York's Building Boom.

With plans for new building valued at more than \$2,000,000 filed April 6th, all records of the kind for New York City were broken except in a few instances, when plans for a great hotel or office building were recorded. Of the sum mentioned the most exensive building reaches the figure of only \$300,000, and the plans include wenty-two six-story brick apartment ouses and tenements.

So far this year plans have been reorded in Manhattan alone for 645 uildings, valued at \$33,732,732. A year ago at the corresponding time plans had been filed for only 343 buildings, valued at \$18,677.010.



No Legitimate Basis for Estimates

The chief of the Weather Bureau has recently placed before the public a pamphlet entitled Long Range Weather Forecasts, by Prof. E. B. Gar-riott, that is full of interesting things to one who is a seeker after the truth regarding these delusions. A great many things in it are worthy of fur-ther publication but we wish, at this to twelve tons. The weight borne or

time, simply to give its conclusions: That systems of long range weather forecasting that depend upor planetary meteorology; moon phases cycles, positions, or movements; stell ar influences, or star divinations; in dications afforded by observations of animals; birds, and plants, and estimates based upon days, months, seasons, and years have no legitimate ba-

That meteorologists have made exhaustive examinations and comparisons for the purpose of associating the weather with the various phases and positions of the moon in an earn est endeavor to make advances in the science along the line of practical forecasting, and have found that while the moon, and perhaps the planets, exert some influence upon atmospheric tides, the influence is too slight and obscure to justify a consideration of lunar and planetary effects in the actual work of weather forecasting.
3. That the stars have no apprecia-

ble influence upon the weather.
4. That animals, birds, and plants show by their condition the character of past weather, and by their actions the influence of present weather an the character of weather changes that may occur within a few hours.

That the weather of days, months, seasons, and years affords no indications of future weather further than showing present abnormal condi-tions that the future may adjust.

6. That six and seven-day weather periods are too ill-defined and irregular to be applicable to the actual work of forecasting.

That advances in the period and accuracy of weather forecasts depend upon a more exact study and under standing of atmospheric pressure over great areas and a determination of the influences, probably solar, that are responsible for normal and abnormal distributions of atmospheric pressure over the earth's surface.

That meteorologists are not antagonistic to honest, well directed ef-forts to solve the problem of longrange forecasting; that, on the con-trary, they encourage all work in this field and condemn only those who, for notoriety or profit or through misdi rected zeal and unwarranted assumptions, bring the science of meteorology into disrepute.

9. That meteorologists appreciate the importance to the world at large of advances in the period of forecast-ing and are inclined to believe that the twentieth century will mark the beginning of another period in meteor-ological science,

The wage of this person is to be \$50 a year, but he must lodge out and furnish his own meals, except dinner.

#### Opening of the Uintah Indian Reservation.

The Uintah Indian Reservation in Utah, containing 2,425,000 acres of arable land, to be opened up for settlement on September 1, 1905, is described in a pamphlet just issued by the passenger department of the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad company. A valuable map, showing the country to be opened up and the various routes by which it can be reached, is published for the first time in this pamphlet, which may be obtained by addressing General Passenger Agent
