The Claude Wensell Co. has just unpacked a large shipment of heaters, cutglass and pyrex glass baking dishes for their Holiday trade.

Last week was very beautiful again in Wagon Mound. We are still enjoying a real Indian Summer, but this is not unusual in this part of New Mexico.

The A. MacArthur Co. shipped three cars of beans last week making a total of seven cars for the season. They will ship several more cars as soon as repairs come for their bean cleaning machine.

Corn and oats are being brought in quite freely to our merchants by farmers in this vicinity. Most of this grain of which a great quantity was raised here will have to be shipped to foreign markets as there is not enough local demand for it in this vicinity.

Stanley Taylor, who was formerly connected with The A. MacArthur Co., has now accepted a position with The Claude Wensell Co.

A party of local sportsmen went out hunting last week and what do you think they brought home? It certainly was the rarest, the most valuable, the most prized catch that could be found anywhere in this vicinity, in New Mexico and in the United States of America. It was one dozen of fresh eggs.

Claude Wensell Co. advises that on account of extra heavy business they have been obliged to add new help to their selling force. After December 1st we expect to see new faces behind their counters.

The Claude Wensell Co. disposed of two cars of beans last week and will ship another car this week.

From experienced beans growers we hear that our pinto bean, of which, despite what was said in a daily paper, Wagon Mound was the first promotor and distributor of any note, is not as large nor quite of as good color as the earlier bean. This means that our farmers ought to look for new seed. The Editor inspected a sample of the Colorado pinto, which was shown him by the A. MacArthur Co., and found it to be a beautiful bean, large, smooth and of good color, a much better looking bean, in fact, than our local product. We suggest that our farmers, if they intend to continue planting beans, would do well in getting some of this seed, or as good a seed, for next year planting. The results will more than pay the outlay and trouble.

If you have something to sell and can't find a market for it, go to the Claude Wensell Co. They buy everything.

The Sentinel is moving to larger quarters. In preparation for the great improvements that we expect to realize in our plant, we have decided to rent the building where the Pantagraph is now located and which was recently purchased by two of our stockholders, Messrs. Sabino Lopez and Manuel Valdez. As soon as this issue of The Sentinel is out of the press we will start the removal of our plant. Our patrons will find us at our new stand always ready to serve them.

**TREATY DEFEATED; SENATE ENDS SESSION.**

During a prolonged and bitter struggle in the Senate last week the peace treaty was defeated, and that document, including the Covenant of the League of Nations, is, so far as the United States is concerned, dead for the present at least. No doubt an effort to revive it will be made at the next session of Congress by the resubmission of the treaty Act for Stimulation of Mineral Production.

In the meantime there is a marked change in the attitude of the Senators of both parties with reference to treaty reservations, the chance of ratification at such time may be but little if any better than heretofore.

As to politics, it was decided to remain true to our watchword: "ON GUARD IN THE INTEREST OF THE PEOPLE." We wear nobody's collar and have no particular ax to grind except to fight the people's fight. Our stockholders, being from the people, are also heart and soul for the people.

On the other hand, we hope the people in Wagon Mound will rally ungrudgingly to our support and reward us for our sacrifices by patronizing generously our publications and printing establishment.

## TREATY REJECTION CONTINUES IMPORTANT WAR-TIME LAWS.

While many will regret the failure of the Senate to approve the peace treaty, there will apparently be some immediate temporary benefits to the country as a result of such failure, due to the fact that such action continues in effect a number of important wartime laws. Among these is the Lever food and fuel control bill, the nullification of which at this time might have proved embarrassing to the Government in dealing with the coal-strike situation. It is under this law that the Government acquires its power to fix the price of coal. Another law which will continue in effect as a result of the treaty failure is the espionage act, which is considered as of special importance at the present time in dealing with the Reds. Other acts which are affected by the continuance of the state of war through the failure of the treaty are: Wartime Prohibition Act; War Trade Board and Export Control Act; Act creating the office of Alien Property Custodian; Agricultural Stimulation Act; Housing Construction Act; Railway Control Act; War Finance Corporation Act; Overman Act; Ship Construction Act; Act creating Aircraft Board and the Act for Stimulation of Mineral Production.

## Luna County Farm Bureau Planning to Push Sweet Potato Industry in 1920.

Deming, New Mexico, Nov. 24. In reorganizing the various lines of work to be handled by the Farm Bureau for next year the farmers in Luna County want the sweet potato industry pushed to the limit. Indications are that there will be a big acreage grown next year and community curing and storage houses will be built at central shipping points to properly care for the crop.

The executive committee of this farm bureau have planned a rather intensive membership campaign for November 28 December 12, when it is expected that fully 80 per cent of the farmers and stockmen will get into the organization.

## Farm Bureau Smut Campaign Worth \$75,000 to Curry County.

Clovis, New Mexico, Nov. 24. Reports just tabulated by the executive committee and county agent of the Curry County Farm Bureau indicate that the campaign for the control of smut in wheat, sorghums, broom corn and other non-saccharine sorghums grown in the county has been worth \$75,000 to the growers during the past year.

The report goes on to say that, due to the efforts of the Farm Bureau 75 percent of the seed wheat planted in Curry County last fall was treated for smut. As a result of this 75 percent of the wheat crop is free from smut saving to the farmers over \$75,000 and the wheat is topping the market. Also it is expected that fully 90 percent of the farmers will treat their seed wheat this fall.

The report also mentions a case where one farmer, C. C. Merria saved \$480 on eighteen acres of broom corn by treating the seed for smut. They have estimated that fully 60,000 bushels of the grain sorghums can be saved annually in Curry county thru the proper treatment of seed.

## Farm Bureau Membership Campaign, November 28-Dec. 13.

State College, New Mexico, Nov. 24. A preliminary report of farm bureau activities in New Mexico covering the past eight months shows a gain of over two millions dollars to the agricultural industry of the state.

The work of the eighteen farm bureaus have been of such great value to the farmers and stockmen that a campaign will soon be launched to increase the membership in these organizations and to develop plans of action for 1920.

Details of the campaign have already been perfected and the various county executive committees are now meeting to make final arrangements.

A plan is under way to federate the eighteen county farm bureaus into a state farm bureau at the time of the Farmer-Stockmen-Homemakers' Week at State College, January 12-17.

## GENERAL SMUTS SENDS AFRICA'S APPEAL FOR TREATY

Just after word came from Washington that the Senate had adjourned without acting on the treaty, an appeal came to New York from Lieut. Gen. Jan Christian Smuts, British member of the League of Nations Commission, in a message from South Africa to America appealing to America "not to blast the hopes of the world by rejecting the treaty."

Part of the General's appeal reads as follows: "No nation put more faith, more effort into the construction of the league than America. It now only remains to ratify and pass the covenant. Other nations have approved it. Even distant Asia is represented. Japan has given her approval while America only hesitates and falters... I cannot believe that America will after all block the way, that the American viewpoint will be allowed to override the wider interests and necessities of our civilization."

## LA TERQUEDAD REPUBLICANA

El hecho que trascasara la ratificación del tratado de paz por terquedad de la mayoría republicana en el Senado envuelve en sí las más graves consecuencias para el país.

En primer lugar, sigue para esta nación el estado de guerra y continúan en fuerza las graves leyes redactadas ~~en el intento de llevar la guerra a fausto éxito~~. Consecuentemente se mantiene el país en una situación de incertidumbre extremamente peligrosa para sus mejores intereses; los negocios no pueden reasumir su curso normal y mientras tanto reina la inquietud en la nación.

Peor todavía, otra vez esta asomándose el horrible espectro de la guerra en Europa. Tan pronto como se supo que nuestro Senado había faltado en ratificar el tratado de paz, Francia anunció que para protegerse a sí misma se veía precisada a apoderarse de las provincias alemanas situadas al poniente del Rin y establecer su frontera en ese río, puesto que ya le faltaba el amparo a ella prometido por la Liga de Naciones. Por otra parte, en Alemania, el partido imperialista levanta otra vez la cabeza y apela a la nación para resistir por fuerza de armas a las ambiciones de Francia.

Italia solapadamente fomenta las expediciones filibusteras de su poeta d'Annunzio en territorios acordados a Jugo-Eslavia por el tratado de paz, y Jugo-Eslavia, cansada de los repetidos atropellos a sus derechos, está movilizando sus ejércitos para repeler la invasión Italiana.

Todo lo cual entraña posibilidades de guerras en las que otra vez quedaremos enredados, y todo lo cual resulta de la dilación en establecer un tribunal internacional, como proveido en el pacto de la Liga de Naciones, para mantener la paz y concordia entre las naciones, así como nues-

#### La Situación en Europa

Se anuncia de Inglaterra que el proceso criminal del ex-emperador de Alemania comenzará temprano el año entrante y se verificará en Londres. Tan pronto como se ratifique el tratado de paz, los aliados tomarán pasos para pedir la extradición de Guillermo II, ahora refugiado en Holanda.

El aventurero poeta Gabriele d'Annunzio después de apoderarse de la ciudad de Fiume está preparando una expedición para conquistar el vecino territorio de Dalmacia y anuncia que intentará la conquista de Montenegro. Sin embargo, el resultado de las elecciones en Italia, las cuales fueron favorables a los socialistas, ha enfriado el entusiasmo de los secuaces del poeta, puesto que los Socialistas están opuestos a la política de engrandecimiento nacional a costa de los otros pueblos.

#### EN LOS ESTADOS UNIDOS

Una interesante correspondencia concerniente el conflicto minero acaba de tenerse entre el ex Secretario de la Tesorería, Wm. G. McAdoo y los dueños de minas de carbón. El Sr. McAdoo en un telegrama dirigido al Administrador Federal de Combustibles, Sr. Garfield, acusaba a las Compañías mineras de haber realizado ganancias exorbitantes en el año de 1917, las que alegaba ser de 15 hasta 2.000 por ciento sobre el capital invertido, según lo manifestaban los mismos retornos de impuestos sobre rentas. Añadía el Sr. McAdoo que creía que los mineros estaban derechos a un aumento de sueldo y que las mismas Compañías habían de sufragar el costo y no el público; sugería además que se hiciera público el retorno de las ganancias de las Compañías por el año de 1918 con el fin de que el pueblo se enterase de la situación verdadera.

#### EN NUEVO MEXICO.

Abrán Contreras, un rico ganadero de La Joya, condado de Socorro, fué hallado baleado y atado a una silla en su casa. Se dice que fué asaltado por seis ladrones quienes intentaron robarle su dinero que guardaba en su casa, pero no lograron su objeto habiendo sido ahuyentados por el hijo de la víctima.

#### MEXICO

El General Felipe Angeles, uno de los más grandes caudillos de la Revolución Mexicana y últimamente asociado con Villa en la revolución contra del Gobierno de Carranza, fué sentenciado a muerte por una corte marcial compuesta de cuatro generales Carrancistas, en Chihuahua, el martes de esta semana y fusilado el miércoles en la madrugada.

Prominentes ciudadanos de México procuraron interceder por él y obtener commutación de sentencia del Presidente Carranza, pero fué en vano. El general manifestó un valor extraordinario en el tiempo transcurrido entre su condenación y su ejecución, él mismo hizo los arreglos de fusilamiento con los oficiales Carrancistas y platicó todo la noche con sus amigos y escribió cartas a su esposa a sus hijos hasta el fatal momento de ejecutarse la sentencia. Un oficial y un soldado que habían sido capturados con él recibieron solamente sentencias de prisión. Don Felipe Angeles se consideraba ser uno de los mejores Generales del ejército mexicano, especialmente se consideraba sin igual en la artillería.

A consecuencia del encarcelamiento de nuestro agente consular en Puebla, México, las relaciones entre nuestro Gobierno y el Gobierno de Carranza quedan extremadamente tirantes. Los Estados Unidos varias veces han pedido la libertad del Sr. Jenkins, pero hasta la presente fecha no ha recibido contesta. Se alega que Jenkins estaba de acuerdo con los bandidos que lo arrebataron de su casa por un rescate de \$150,000.

## AMERICA MUST HAVE COAL

Again last week the conference at Washington between the miners and coal operators adjourned without having reached anything like a definitive agreement. When John L. Lewis, Acting President of the United State Mine Workers, left the conference, he said the miners were still in a receptive mood, but that the operators had failed to submit any proposal. It had been hoped that the appeal made by Fuel Administrator H. A. Garfield, in which he declared that the public, "the chief party in interest" in the controversy, "was not in a mood to tolerate either excessive prices or prolonged stoppage of production," would have beneficial results in the effort to bring about an agreement between the miners and the operators, but in this the situation was disappointing. The hope is still expressed that an agreement will soon be reached but meanwhile the country's coal supply is rapidly decreasing and winter is at hand. It would seem, therefore, that the time has arrived for prompt and effective action by the Government in the matter. It will not do to let the country freeze and to permit our industries to shut down because of shortage while the coal operators and the miners' representatives at the Washington conference squabble about terms. The country must have coal, and the coal must be mined at once in order that it may be distributed before the winter snows make such distribution impossible, and frightful suffering and enormous economic losses are caused. As to how the coal is to be mined, that is a matter for the Government to determine. The Administration still has its war-time powers and could use such powers, if necessary, to take over the mines at once and operate them to their full capacity. It could also even go to the extent of granting the miners' demands, in order to induce them to go back to work, or it might quickly hire other men for the purpose. At any rate coal must be produced at once and in sufficient quantity for the country's needs, and it is up to the Administration to take effective action to this end without delay.

We would suggest that the Government use his war time power and, in case the operators do not compromise, place the mines under Government management.

## A MAN WHO KNOWS

In the pending controversy between the mine owners and their employers, the light thrown on the situation by Mr. McAdoo ought to have some weight on the balance of public opinion.

Mr. McAdoo says that the owners' profits, as shown by their income taxes returns, examined by him as Secretary of the Treasury in 1918, showed earnings on capital stock of 15 to 20.00 per cent. "I am convinced," says he, "that the wage increases proposed for the mine workers are just and reasonable." McAdoo further suggests that no increase in price of coal to consumers be allowed and that the income tax returns of the soft coal owners be made public.

It seems to us that this is the logical step to take in the matter, and that the mere suggestion of it will greatly help in causing the mine operators to come to a quick understanding.

Meanwhile, Mr. McAdoo renders a great service to his country by pointing out the worst bunch of profiteers in the United States, and he knows what he is talking about.
