Special Meeting of Board of County Commissioners.

The following is a report of the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln county, N. M., held Tuesday, November 23, 1909, at Carrizozo, Lincoln county, N. Mexico.

Present—Hon. R. H. Taylor, chairman; Chas. W. Wingfield, member; Leo Oswald, deputy sheriff; J. G. Riggle, clerk.

This meeting was an adjourned meeting for the purpose of receiving bids for courthouse and jail bonds.

Bids were received as follows:

Bid No. 1.—J. H. Causey & Co. for the \$28,000 courthouse bonds which you intend to issue, bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, both principal and interest payable at the office of the county treasurer or in the city of New York at the option of the holder, bonds to be dated approximately January 1st, 1910, due in thirty years from the date, optional for redemption after twenty years from the date, denomination \$1,000 each, we will pay par and accrued interest to date of delivery, and a premium of eight hundred and forty-seven dollars (\$847.00), and will furnish the blank bonds at our expense.

Bid No. 2.—The bid of Coffin & Crawford by their attorney, J. H. Canning.—We hereby propose to purchase from you \$28,000.00 courthouse bonds, maturing 30 years after their date, but subject to call for payment at any time after 20 years from their date, said bonds to be issued in strict compliance with the laws of the territory of New Mexico now in force, to be in denominations of \$1,000.00, interest to be payable semi-annually at the office of the county treasurer or in the city of New York. For such bonds on delivery to us at the Central Trust Company of Illinois, Chicago, Illinois, bearing 5 per cent interest, we will give you the sum of \$28,924.00 and accrued interest. If you will issue such bonds bearing 4½ per cent interest we will give you the par or face value thereof, plus a premium of \$12.50.

Bid No. 3.—The bid of John Nuveen & Co.—For the \$28,000 legally-issued courthouse and jail bonds of Lincoln county, New Mexico, delivered to us in Chicago,

in denominations of \$1000, dated when issued and due thirty years after date, optional twenty years after date, bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, both principal and semi-annual interest payable at some bank mutually satisfactory, we will pay you \$30,031.00, and in addition will furnish the county free of expense the lithographed blank bonds and draft of further proceedings to be taken in issuing the bonds. This bid is accompanied by a certified check of \$1,250.

Bid No. 4.—Bid of Wooden, McNear & Moore for \$28,000.00 courthouse and jail bonds to be sold by Lincoln county, New Mexico, November 23, 1909, to bear date of December 1, 1909, and to become due and payable 30 years from date, optional 20 years from date, to bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, both principal and interest to be made payable at the county clerk's office, Carrizozo, New Mexico, in denominations of \$1,000 each, we will pay you thirty thousand and twenty-nine and 45-100 dollars (\$30,029.45).

Bid No. 5.—The bid of Otis & Hough, by C. V. Saffad, of Cleveland, Ohio.—I offer for the Lincoln county 5 per cent, 20-30, interest payable semi annually, courthouse bonds, to be sold next Monday; par, accrued interest to date of delivery, and a premium of \$1,435.60. This bid is made subject to the approval of the attorneys of Otis & Hough, as to regularity and legality of procedure under which these bonds are issued, and also as to form of bonds. This bid is accompanied by a certified check of \$200.

Board adjourned to 1 p. m.

Board met as per adjournment. Members present as before.

J. V. Bergen, tax commissioner E. P. & N. E. and E. P. & R. I. Ry., appears before the board and asked that the raise made by this board be reduced to the amount as returned by the above tax commissioner. Under due consideration of the board, is retained as before.

After due consideration of all bids herewith submitted, a record of which has been made, and in conformity with the premises, the bid of Coffin & Crawford, of

FORGETS NAME AS MEMORY VANISHES

MAN'S PAST LIFE STRANGELY LEAVES HIS MIND IN A FLASH.

HE FINALLY IS IDENTIFIED

Harry C. Green Bereft of Mental Power as He Hears a Band Concert—His Case Baffles the Doctors.

Beaumont, Tex.—One of the most remarkable cases of lapse of memory on record is that of the man who came suddenly to realize the fact that he was unable to recall his past life. This unfortunate man has recently been identified as Harry C. Green, formerly of Columbus, O., but more recently of Dallas, Tex., and who was a salesman.

While in Keith park here, immediately after a band concert, he suddenly lost his memory. He didn't know where he lived, nor what his name was; could not remember whether he was married or what his business was.

After walking about town for an hour or two, talking to various men,

and all the time fully aware of his predicament, but unable to come to himself, he at last inquired the way to the police station, and there explained his misfortune. He was turned over to the county physicians, who tried to bring him to remembrance of his past life, but were baffled in every effort. He knew nothing whatever of the world; could spell the names of various countries and cities, but knew not where they were, nor what they represented.

For some time no trace of his identity could be discovered, but the name of the manufacturers of his suit of clothes, D. M. Moore & Sons, Columbus, O., was taken and they were written to, and his measure sent to them. They identified him and notified his brother, Charles C. Green, of that place, who made preparations to come to Beaumont. Meanwhile this brother had communication with the unfortunate man's wife, who had previously wired him that her husband had mysteriously disappeared, and that she was unable to locate him. The anxious woman came here, but her husband showed no signs of recognition and was absolutely unable to recall any of the many events of their past life, to which she patiently referred. He evinced no knowledge whatever

of their five children; though he seems to have confidence in the truth of her statement that she is his wife, and tries as hard as any one to make some step toward a recognition of the past, but so far has not been able to get any encouragement from his muddled brain.

He has a very vivid recollection of everything that has happened since that Friday night; can recollect the names of dozens of Beaumont people who have called on and conversed with him; and in short, is in every way all right with the exception of the absolute blank in his mind regarding the past. He is perfectly aware of his predicament, but is unable to remedy it. He seems to rack his brain for some clue to the past, but no ray of light has yet dawned on his memory.

It seems that Green left Dallas August 23 on his usual sales trip, but it is thought the heat must have caused a derangement of his faculties, and that he wandered down to Galveston, and then to Beaumont. He, his wife and his brother will probably return to Dallas shortly, and it is thought a long rest with his family will restore his normal condition.

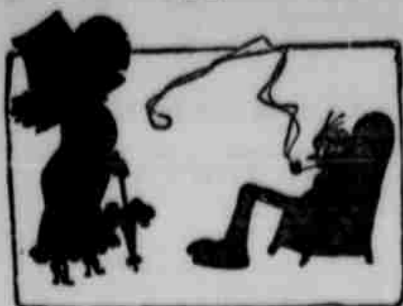

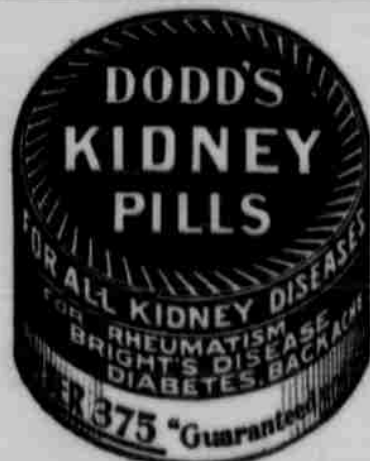

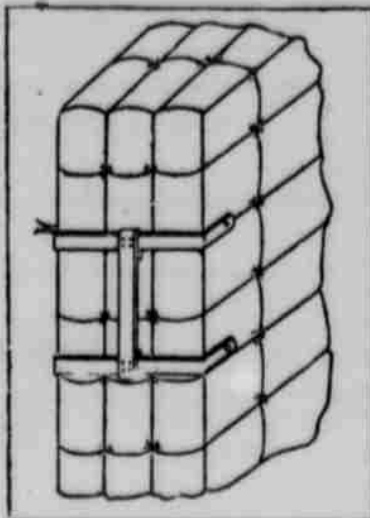

CARRIER FOR THE MATTRESS

Handle Provides a Simple Method by Which They Can Be Easily Moved.

When the housewife essays to re-arrange the mattress on the bed she knows that she has a big job on her hands. A mattress is not heavy, but, as everybody knows, it is exceedingly cumbersome and difficult to handle, being too thick to grasp in the hands and has no projecting edge by which it can be grasped. An Ohio man overcomes these shortcomings of a mat-



tress by the simple addition of small handles near the corners. He thinks so well of the idea that he has had it patented. A glance at the accompanying illustration will show the reader how readily a mattress equipped with such handles can be handled.

By grasping one of these handles the mattress can be pulled around the room or to any place desired with practically no effort. In fact, a handle at each corner is not essential; one handle would pull sufficient for all purposes.

ARE USED INSTEAD OF SOAP

Old Newspapers Can Be Employed and the Cost of Much Soap Saved.

How many pounds of old newspapers are tossed into the garbage, burned or given away by the average city family? How many pounds of soap at an average of five cents a bar are bought by the same family, when the old newspapers might well be made to do much of its work.

Fragments of dampened newspaper scattered rather thickly over bare floor, carpets or rugs make sweeping much less disagreeable. The results are manifold: Less dust thrown into the air to settle for hours afterward into every conceivable crevice and cranny, with its accompanying germs; less danger to the lungs and throat of the sweeper; fewer mops and dust-cloths necessary to remove dust from floors, walls and furniture; less soap to cleanse these cloths; and the printer's ink, a terror to all evildoers, brought to the attention of lurking moth.

Prepare all vegetables and fruits on paper; wrap up refuse tightly and place in garbage can and flies are not invited nor the eye offended.

Use your old papers and think of other ways to make them help save time, labor and costly necessities, like ice, soap and cloths.

Stuffed Eggs.

Boil three eggs very hard, shell and cut in halves lengthwise. Take out yolks and wash them fine, mix with 1½ tablespoons olive oil, one small teaspoon of mustard, add pepper and salt, and enough vinegar to thin sufficiently. Cut a little parsley very fine and mix in dressing. Fill cavities with dressing. Take two toothpicks and run through egg slantwise so they cross each other in center. They can be removed by the one who is to partake of the stuffed eggs. These can be varied by mincing two sardines very fine and adding to mixture before stuffing the egg.

The New Governor.

W. J. Mills, chief justice of the territorial supreme court, has been appointed governor of New Mexico. Judge W. H. Pope, of Roswell, has been elevated to the chief justiceship. Judge Mills is credited with being a gang rule man, and, if so, we can congratulate ourselves only on securing an absolutely able, just and fearless chief justice.

Court House Bonds Sold.

The board of county commissioners met here Tuesday to open bids for bonds, which had been called for at a previous meeting, in the sum of \$28,000 for the purpose of erecting a court house and jail at Carrizozo. The bids are published elsewhere in these columns, and all of them show that Lincoln county securities are classed with the best in the market.

The lowest bid received offered a premium of \$847 on the issue at 5 per cent, while the highest bid, at the same rate, was a premium of \$2,081. The bid, however, that was accepted by the board was that of Coffin & Crawford, of Chicago, at the rate of 4½ per cent, they paying par for the issue, plus a premium of \$12.50. This makes a difference of \$756.50 in favor of the 4½ per cent bid, in a period of twenty years; provided interest is not calculated on the premium, or of \$2,181.50 in thirty years. The saving to the county, in interest, by the board disposing of the bonds at the rate named, is \$140 per annum.

On the other hand, if the board had felt that more money was needed to complete and furnish the buildings, it would have been policy to have accepted the 5 per cent bid, carrying with it the handsome premium of \$2,081, for that would have given the county the use of that sum over the full issue at a very low rate of interest; but, as has been stated, would have necessitated the payment of \$140 more in annual interest. Therefore, the board figured that the bid at the lower rate was the more satisfactory, particularly as \$28,000 was deemed sufficient for all needs, and the obligation resting upon the county in the matter of interest could be more easily met.

The board accepted the afore-

said bid conditionally, one of the conditions requiring the successful bidders to deposit \$1,500 with the county treasurer by noon yesterday as a guaranty of good faith. The bidders were notified by wire of the action of the board, and Wednesday morning the deposit was made. As soon as the preliminaries can be arranged the bonds will be issued and delivered and the money placed to the credit of the county for the purposes named.

The premiums offered and the low rate of interest proposed certainly should cause a feeling of pride to the citizens of Lincoln county. Bond buyers who are willing to take our securities at such rates of interest must deem Lincoln county bonds a first class investment; and we know of no reason why they should not. We have an assessed valuation of over \$2,000,000, which probably means that the county has property that actually amounts to \$5,000,000 in value; and with only about a \$50,000 bonded indebtedness our burdens are comparatively light.

As soon as plans and specifications have been submitted and accepted, calls for which have been issued, calls for bids for the construction of a court house and jail, in conformity with plans and specifications adopted, will be made, and actual work on the buildings will probably begin in February. The money is in sight, the material is at hand and we feel highly gratified that Lincoln county is soon to have substantial public buildings, and that the people will have little difficulty in meeting the obligations imposed for this much-needed improvement.

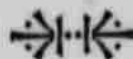

District Court Ends.

The Lincoln county district court closed for the term, Saturday night about 10 o'clock. Judge Alford W. Cooley, District Clerk Downs and Stenographer Ungles left the next morning for Alamogordo, to be present at the opening of Otero county court as well as United States court, Monday. District Attorney Llewellyn left Sunday afternoon for El Paso, from which point he went to his home at Las Cruces. Sheriff Stevens also left Sunday for his home at Lincoln.

During the session a number of cases, both civil and criminal, were disposed of, notwithstanding the difficulties encountered, with which our readers are familiar. Since our last issue the following cases were heard:

Edwin Darling, charged with unlawfully disposing of mortgaged property. The case occupied most of the day Friday, and in the end resulted in the Judge instructing the jury to return a verdict of not guilty, the territory having failed to substantiate its allegations. Saturday was devoted to the trial of John Adams on the charge of assault. At 10 o'clock that night the jury returned a verdict of not guilty. In the Sunday closing cases

against Campbell and Gleason, the cases against Gleason were annulled, the defendant having died; a plea of guilty was entered by Campbell in five cases and a fine of \$10 and costs assessed in each. An attractive bag to hold handkerchiefs, neckties and other small articles for the laundry, was made by a girl for a friend, who was going abroad on her wedding trip.

To make the bag dainty and at the same time serviceable was something of a problem. Six sheer handkerchiefs with a graceful vine, in light blue, as a border were picked up at a sale, also some fine linen insertion that washed well.

The six handkerchiefs were joined by strips of the insertion, one strip running lengthwise and two across. This put two handkerchiefs side by side in each of the three rows.

The strip was doubled over through the middle row of handkerchiefs and the outer edges overcast together in tiny stitches. The bag was lined with lawn and color of the blue vine and the ends were bound in an inch-wide facing of the lawn, which was used as a casing. A good quality of blue wash ribbon was used for a draw string.

In the center of the upper left hand handkerchief was worked the initials of the bride-to-be in a heavy padded monogram.

Cleaning Wall Paper.—To brighten wall paper that is stained and dirty, apply a cleanser made of equal parts of cornstarch, whiting and Fuller's earth. Mix these ingredients well and put them into a pail. This cleanser is rubbed on the walls with a pad, made by covering the end of a mop handle with cheesecloth. This pad should be about six inches long and four inches wide, and must be soft.

Dip it in the powder and rub it on the paper, making the strokes only up and down. When the surface has been thoroughly rubbed, wipe with fresh cheesecloth.

Grease spots will frequently disappear before a combination of ammonia and Fuller's earth. Make a thin paste of the two and spread it over the stain. Let it remain until dry and brush off.

Bread Baking.

"After many years at bread baking," said a woman, "I found my bread long in rising in winter after working it on the bread board, which was usually cold. I bought a tin one, heated it before the fire and have never since chilled the bread. Instead of using a pan, which quickly chills, I bought a wide crock, always had it heated on the stove, placed my bread in it and covered with a piece of woolen blanket, with the result my bread was ready to bake much sooner than it was when this precaution was not taken."

A slate slab, such as is used for roofing, also makes an excellent bread board, and it is often procurable for nothing. It can be heated very hot and placed under a crock or pan of dough to assist slow bread in rising on a very cold day.

Washing Stockings.

New colored stockings should be soaked a half hour in a gallon of cold water containing either a cup of salt or a tablespoonful of turpentine to set the colors. Do not mix brown and black ones together when washing them. Add a large amount of bluing to black ones and they will not turn an ugly brown; dry brown ones in the shade.

Hot-Water Sponge Cake.

Beat together three eggs and one cup of sugar. Sift together one cup of flour (sifted), one teaspoon cream of tartar, one-half teaspoon salt. Beat it into the eggs and sugar. Put into a cup one-half teaspoon soda and fill one-half full with boiling water. Mix quickly and beat well. Flavor.

They will hold their celebration of the surrender of Cornwallis in the state which gave to the American Revolution its greatest soldier and the first president of the United States. Virginia has many battlefields, but none of them of broader historic interest than the field of Yorktown.
