## Carrizozo Lodge No. 41 A. F. & A. M. Dedicated.

## A Buggy Load of Rabbits.

Sunday morning last Frank Gray and Joe D. Adams, armed for bear, bird or jackrabbit, took a trip to Jake's Springs, southwest of here. They returned late in the afternoon with as mixed a load of bi-peds and quadrupeds as was ever seen in Carrizozo. The load comprised for the most part jackrabbits, plentifully interspersed with cottontails, a few sparrow hawks, and a number of other members of the feathered tribe which, in the gathering twilight, it was impossible to say to what species they belonged, but they certainly looked good enough to eat. The hunters encountered several large wolves, but failed to bring them down, although they claim to have crippled one of them. They would have enjoyed the hunt far better, if it were not for the piercingly cold east wind which prevailed during the day. The jackrabbits numbered 29, the cottontails about half that number, while the birds completed the buggy load.

### A NEW SCHOOL NEEDED.

The Wright brothers are quoted as saying that they will build an aeroplane for \$7,500 for anybody who wants one. Now that they have demonstrated so thoroughly the fine qualities of their machine—its great speed and its birdlike ability to rise and sink while sweeping over hills and valleys, there must be a number of adventurous spirits who would like to own one. The automobilists, whose recreation is interfered with by bad roads and by other vehicles would like to try the smooth and vacant pathways of the air, to fly as the bird flies, and float over the ponds or lakes instead of having to travel around them. There is a practical difficulty as yet, says the Chicago Tribune. No one can buy with the machine the skill to operate it, and there are no aeroplane chauffeurs nor is there any one to teach them. Orville Wright is going abroad to interest foreign governments in the American invention. His brother will teach some army officers how to handle the aeroplane the government has bought of him. After having attended to that he will devote himself to the business of aeroplane construction. Along with that should go the establishment of a school where a capable aviator could give instruction to eager pupils.

And now come dispatches from Winnipeg announcing that the yield of wheat in the prairie provinces of Canada this year will reach 130,000,000 bushels. In the World Almanac for 1909 the whole wheat crop of Canada for 1907 is stated to have been 96,606,000 bushels. This caused some doubt to be expressed as to the authenticity of extracts from a United States consul's reports as to the increase of wheat production in the northwest provinces which were published during the excitement attending the recent wheat corner. The increase of wheat production in the Canadian northwest has been almost sufficient to stagger belief. It will be a great blessing to the crowded cities of the earth whose cry goes up for bread.

The Russian ministry of commerce has prepared an elaborate plan providing for the general improvement of all the seaports of the empire at a cost of \$110,896,237. The amounts which it is planned to expend at Baltic ports aggregate \$14,911,562. This is a large amount of money, but Russia will get more in return for it than if she were to spend it all in the race for naval supremacy. Navies can be obtained fast enough when nations are prosperous; and the only way in which prosperity can be secured is by enterprise such as that indicated in the determination to give Russia seaports that will accommodate the commerce of the world.

The announcement from Norway that an electrician of that country has devised a storage battery which solves the problem that Thomas A. Edison has been attacking assiduously for some years past may compel Mr. Edison to bring out the battery whose invention he announced a short time ago. Inventive genius is working along the same lines, and it would not be surprising were the storage battery to come out with several promoters, as did the telephone.

## FOUR KILLED AS BALLOON BURSTS

FRENCH ARMY OFFICERS CATA-  
PULTED TO EARTH FROM  
DIRIGIBLE CRAFT.

### GREAT GAS BAG EXPLODES

Victims Have No Chance for Their  
Lives When the Envelope Sud-  
denly Bursts High in  
the Air.

Moulins, France.—While thousands of persons were cheering enthusiastically the flight of the French dirigible military balloon *Republique*, the great gas bag collapsed suddenly, and the four men aboard were dashed to death. The balloon itself was rent to tatters and went hurtling from an altitude of between 500 and 600 feet to the ground, crushing the victims in a frightful manner.

The big balloon was in charge of Capt. Marchal. The other occupants were Lieut. Phaure and Sub-Lieut. Vincent and Reux.

The *Republique* had been engaged in the recent army maneuvers at La Pallasse. She left there at seven o'clock in the morning and was going at high

speed five miles from Moulins when the accident happened.

It was the intention of Capt. Marchal to stop at Nevers, and an automobile containing mechanics was following the balloon. It was almost directly beneath it when the disaster occurred. The car fell straight down, carrying the fluttering remnants of the envelope and the occupants were buried beneath the wreckage. All were dead except Lieut. Phaure, but he lived only a few minutes after being removed. The bodies were taken to the Chateau d'Avrilly, the property of Marquis de Charannes.

Lieut. Tixier, in command of the automobile, says the balloon suddenly burst and collapsed. It seemed to oscillate violently a moment before this, as though it had been struck, and fell with the rapidity of a stone. When he reached the wreckage the car was completely covered with the envelope, and not a sound came from beneath.

With the aid of Marquis de Charannes and peasants who hurried from surrounding fields, the envelope was removed. The spectacle was appall-

ing. The car had been literally crushed, and amid the mass of tangled steel and wire every man except Phaure could be seen at his post. Capt. Marchal was in a sitting posture, his body thrown back. His skull was crushed. The bodies of the sub-lieutenants lay mangled beneath the cylinder of the motor. Phaure's body was lying half outside, as if he had tried to jump during the descent. Apparently death in the case of the three had been instantaneous.

An examination of the airship disclosed the cause of the accident. The axle of the right propeller had broken and the propeller has passed through the envelope, falling in a field about 150 yards away.

The *Republique*, belonging to the French war department, made her initial flight at Solas on June 24, 1908. On that occasion the dirigible carried a cargo of 2,800 pounds, including the crew, and remained in the air 35 minutes. Early in September the *Republique* was seriously damaged in a windstorm at Nevers, France, on her way to Meudon, where it was intended to take part in the autumn military maneuvers.

### WAGERS HIS LIFE; LOSES

Mine Owner Tosses Coin to Decide  
Whether He or His Guide  
Should Die.

Los Angeles, Cal.—David Eldridge, wealthy mine owner, staked his life on the toss of a coin. He lost. The prospector died from thirst and exhaustion in the California desert, while Malapal Mike, his guide, rode to water and safety.

Search for the miner has been unavailing and all hope for his life abandoned. It is believed that he wandered desperately about the barren waste until he fell in his tracks and death relieved him from torture.

Eldridge, the son of Benjamin Eldridge, a wealthy Illinois sewing machine manufacturer, had for some years been interested in mining. Several weeks ago he heard of a rich streak of gold on Telescope peak, across the California desert.

Enlisting the services of Malapal Mike, an experienced guide and prospector, he hastened to start an expedition to the new El Dorado. The men were supposedly plentifully supplied with water, food and burros.

Day after day was spent in the tortuous march through the wilderness. One after one the burros died, until but one was left. Slowly the food supply dwindled until there was but a few days' short rations in the haversacks. Gallon after gallon the water was consumed, until but six gallons remained.

That night the miner and his guide conferred. After reading each other's thoughts, Eldridge broke the silence. "Mike," said he, "it's either you or me. Let's toss a coin. The winner takes the burro."

"Heads," called Mike.  
Heads it came.

The guide left five gallons of water and practically all the food supplies behind.

**Victory for English Women.**  
Women will soon have no bar in the way of becoming surgeons in England. The home secretary has signified to the council of the Royal College of Surgeons his decision to approve its by-laws regarding the admission of women to examinations for the diplomas of the college. He will, he says, sign the formal document which is to be submitted to him after the council meets. The formalities will be completed in time to permit women to enter for the examinations of the Royal college in January next.

## NEED NOT BE THROWN AWAY

Mayonnaise That Has Curdled in the Making Can Easily Be Put Right.

That mayonnaise, curdled in the making, can be set to rights at once by the addition of a tablespoonful of very cold water is the useful discovery of one housewife. Whether this would be effectual in all recipes for making the epicurean dressing has not been ascertained, but it never fails to be so in her formula, which is a delicious one, as follows:

One raw yolk, one hard-boiled one, both very cold, mixed in a bowl with the addition of a little salt, and if liked a saltspoonful of mustard. Stir in at least half a pint of pure olive oil, afterward thinning to the desired consistency with vinegar or lemon juice. The oil may be put in by the dessertspoonful and stirred very quickly, contrary to the usual laborious process of adding it drop by drop. If all the ingredients and bowl and spoon are well chilled it will not curdle. If this accident should ever occur through any mischance add the cold water and it will be rectified.

## MOTH PESTS IN THE FALL

Solution of Carbolic Acid Will Help Housekeepers in Fighting Their Enemy.

Many housekeepers, even experienced ones, feel that if they have succeeded in outwitting the voracious moth during the summer months there is nothing more to fear from him. In point of fact, the fall months are dangerous, particularly where a town house is not opened until late.

If one finds moths around in the fall and does not wish to go to the trouble of getting more camphor or tar balls for a comparatively short period, let them try the carbolic acid cure.

Wipe off the wood work, shelves and floor of closet or wherever danger of moths lies, with a solution of carbolic acid. Be careful in doing this that none gets on the hands, as it burns badly when too strong.

After wiping down the woodwork a little of the acid may be put in the cup of a small alcohol stove. The heating causes the fumes to rise through the closet and helps in the moth fighting.

### Veal Cutlets Spanish Style.

Place two or three thin slices of ham in a saucepan with a tablespoonful of chopped parsley, half a chopped bay leaf, a pinch of thyme and a little butter. Trim the cutlets, sprinkle with salt and pepper, lay them on top of the ham and fry over a moderate fire. Drain the fat off and pour over the cutlets a Spanish sauce made as follows: Mix together half a cupful of butter and two tablespoonfuls of flour in a hot saucepan. When brown pour in a pint of stock and let simmer for half an hour, skimming it often until clear. Then boil briskly for a few moments and strain through a sieve.

### Roly-Poly.

Take one quart of flour, make good biscuit crust, roll out one-half inch thick and spread with any kind of fruit, fresh or preserved; fold so that the fruit will not run out; dip cloth in to boiling water and flour it and lay around the pudding closely, leaving room to swell; steam one or one and one-half hours; serve with boiled sauce; or lay in steamer without a cloth and steam for one hour.

### Sweet Omelet.

Beat separately the whites and yolks of six eggs. Flavor the yolks with any desired flavoring and add two tablespoonfuls of sugar. Add the whites to the yolks and beat well. Mix in four or five tablespoonfuls of milk and a little salt. Cook as you would an ordinary omelet, turn out on a flat platter, sprinkle with powdered sugar, pass a salamander over it and serve. Dot with currant jelly.

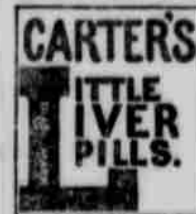

## The Gubernatorial Change.

Last week we stated that the new appointee for governor, Chief Justice W. J. Mills, was credited with being a member of the gang and everybody in New Mexico knew what that meant. We do not wish to be understood as voicing the sentiment that the gang contains no good men, but we do say that it does number among its adherents so many that certainly cannot be classed in that category that we are doubtful of every man who owes allegiance to the gang. Further than this, we have the authoritative statement that Judge Mills was entirely acceptable to Solomon Luna, the uncrowned King of Valencia county, and the force behind the corrupt ring of New Mexico politicians; and still further that Mr. Luna and others intimidated—some say ordered—President Taft not to appoint Judge Abbott to the position.

Now, there was nothing against Judge Abbott, save he had made a good Judge and had fought clear of the intrigues and dark doings that characterized republican rule in this territory. He would not do and the president was bluntly told so. And the president, good fellow that he is, agreed, and as a result we have a man who the plunderband says will make us a splendid governor. We trust that they are correct in the statement, but we must "Beware of the Greek's beaming gifts." Ex-Governor Otero says its a good appointment and that it means statehood. Whether we get statehood or not we would like to have good government in the meantime, and meantime is likely to be quite awhile.

We trust that the new governor will prove to be all his friends claim for him, but we are afraid: "More strange than true; I never may believe These antique fables, nor the fairy toys."

\* The mid-winter carnival of horse-racing opened at Juarez on Wednesday. Stalls to accommodate 1600 horses have been erected close to the grounds, and it is estimated that there are already 800 thoroughbreds there, and others are arriving by the carload daily from the east, south and west. The meeting will continue up to March. It is believed by many that the city of Juarez will eventually become a second Monto Carlo.

A prophet seldom finds honor in his own country. Henry George, the father of the "single tax" theory and author of "Poverty versus Protection," many years ago in order to equalize taxation advocated taxing land values and not improvements. For instance: Two people own adjoining town lots; one improves his lot by erecting a building on it, and is taxed for the improvements. The other holds his lot until others increase its value by surrounding it with buildings, and escapes taxation. The English House of Lords this week vetoed the government's budget, which was framed after the ideas of the great American economist. This means a dissolution of parliament and a general election will be called, and the budget will go before the people for their endorsement or rejection. Should the people endorse the government it will then be up to the new parliament to put a crimp in the power of the House of Lords. As that great commoner, Wm. E. Gladstone, said on one occasion when a bill was sent to the upper house for its approval: "If the lords veto this bill it will be bad for the people and bad for the lords." The House of Commons can by a vote curtail the powers of the lords, or abolish it altogether. We will anxiously await the result of the election.

rose.

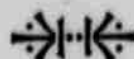

## RECIPES AT HAND

SIMPLE DEVICE THAT SAVES MUCH TIME.

**Veteran Housekeeper Explains Means by Which She Is Never at a Loss in Any Emergency That May Arise.**

An old housekeeper said that at the time of her marriage, years ago, she was presented with a hanging recipe book, that was invaluable to her. It was fastened on the kitchen door, and the leaves could be turned back and a recipe found at a minute's notice.

Someone stole this treasure, and it could never be replaced. A friend, knowing how it was missed, improvised a book that was even more of a treasure, as it had tried recipes from sources that could not be found in any printed book.

At a wholesale paper place she had cut a number of sheets of stiff yellow paper that would not tear easily and soils less than white paper. These were indented on one edge, as an alphabet book, but instead of letters, the divisions were, Bread, Sauces, Salads, Soups, Desserts, Left-overs, Cheese Dishes, Sandwiches, Emergency Dishes, Invalid's Food, and so on. Each housekeeper can make her divisions to suit her special needs.

Each sheet was supplied with recipes typewritten in purple ink on white paper, the title being done in caps in red ink. The recipes were then grouped on the page, leaving 1/4-inch-wide margin at sides and bottom, and two inches at the top to allow for the sheets being thrown back. They were pasted with photographer's paste.

At the same place where the sheets were cut they had five holes punched across the top of each sheet a half-inch below the upper edge. When placed together red cords were run through these holes, and the book was fastened in five places to a strip of wood, supplied with five screw hooks opposite the cord loops. In this way the book could be kept firm, yet turned back like a hanging calendar.

One of the groups that was invaluable both to housekeeper and maid was entitled "Table Service." Under it was grouped the proper way to set a table, down to smallest details; rules of service, and also suggestions for table decoration for different occasions. The housewife later added another list, including her own china and the uses to which it was to be put both for formal and informal occasions.

Another useful grouping was Cleaning Hints. These included trustworthy recipes for doing over all sorts of household belongings, washing laces, muslins, spot removing, doing up fine lingerie and renovations of every description.

By tying the sheets together, instead of fastening them, new ones could be added as needed. To provide for this emergency, with the book was given a number of blank sheets, cut the proper size and punched ready for the pasted recipes.

## Pineapple Pie.

Line a pie plate with pastry. Mix lightly together the well beaten yolks of four eggs, one cupful of granulated sugar, one cupful of grated pineapple and the stiffly beaten whites of two eggs. Bake till ready in a moderate oven. Cover with a meringue made with the whites of three eggs stiffly beaten and three tablespoonfuls of sugar added. Serve hot or cold.

## Removing Ink Stains.

Soak the stains in a weak solution of tincture of chloride and rinse immediately afterward in water. The tincture of salt is also reliable in removing iron rust and quicker in action than oxalic acid; or mix salt with lemon juice and apply to the spots. Either is good. This is, of course, only used on linen or cotton.

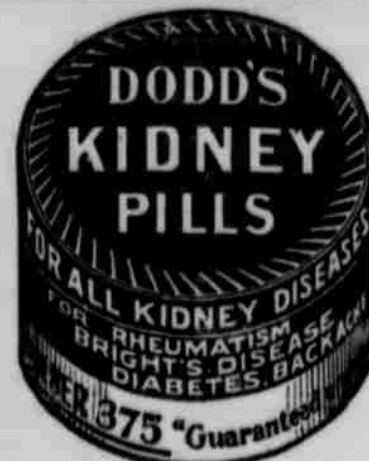

## FOR COLD MORNINGS

### HOW TO PREPARE DELICIOUS HOT WAFFLES.

The Knowledge That This Delicacy Is Awaiting Them Will Bring the Children from Bed in a Hurry.

As the mornings become more and more crisp, and the children come downstairs ravenous after their cold plunge, they begin to long for griddle cakes and maple syrup. Now, while I do not believe that a breakfast entirely of even such "filling" food as pancakes are known to be will sustain man or child throughout the forenoon's work, it will add flesh to top off a meal of cereal and steak or sausages with just one or two of the delicately browned dainties. Waffles will therefore not prove such a tax on the cook's time as most people seem to think. For this reason, and because few housewives need to be told how to prepare regular griddle cakes, I have selected a couple of delicious waffle recipes that many will not know.

The first essential to the making of good waffles is that the waffle iron should fit snugly over the stove hole, for it must be used smoking hot. Beef suet does very well for greasing them. With the side on which the batter is to be poured sizzling hot, and both sides thoroughly greased, pour on the batter with one movement of your batter pitcher, close the iron and turn it immediately. You will have to do the work quickly or the cake will burn. In a very few seconds the other side is done, and you are ready to remove the waffle. Butter it at once—the quickest way is to use partially melted butter—and send to the table before it loses its crispness. If you have a large iron, one waffle may be divided into four portions, and no one will have to wait.

**Quick Waffles.**—Sift one pint of flour three times and add a teaspoonful of salt. Beat the yolks of two eggs very light, add a cupful of rich milk, stir into the flour, together with a tablespoonful of melted butter, and beat until light and smooth. Beat the whites of the eggs to a stiff dry froth, add to the batter and beat again. When ready to bake, add a teaspoonful of baking powder, put the batter in a pitcher, have the iron very hot, and bake as directed above.

**Raised Waffles.**—The best waffles are the southern kind, raised with yeast. These call for a quart of milk heated boiling hot, then cooled till lukewarm, a quart and a cupful of flour, two well-beaten eggs and half a cupful of butter. Stir the butter into the hot milk, pour it gradually, when lukewarm, into the flour, beating out all the lumps, add the beaten eggs, a teaspoonful of salt and a teaspoonful of sugar, and then half a yeast cake dissolved in half a cupful of lukewarm water. Beat the batter thoroughly and let it rise over night, beat it again in the morning and let it rise for 30 minutes more. Fill the irons two-thirds full, and when baked as directed, serve with maple syrup, maple sugar and rich cream, thick white sugar syrup or some sweet marmalade.—Boston Herald.

#### Coffee.

The greatest secret of successful coffee is the thorough washing of the pot every time it is used, as there is a bitter oil or residuum which fills every available seam in the pot, and, one day old, spoils the best efforts at coffee making. The best guides make their coffee in a clean tin pail, commencing it in cold water and shoving it forward to a boil about the time the rest of the meal is ready to serve, taking care not to let the aroma boil away. When ready to serve dash a cup of cold water on it to settle the grounds. The proportions of coffee to use is a tablespoonful for each person and then an extra tablespoonful.

## LEFT THEIR SEATS HASTILY

Fair School Teachers Blissfully Unaware of Contents of Box on Which They Rested.

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### Lincoln County Teachers Meet.

The Lincoln County Teachers' Association met in regular session in the Carrizozo school house Saturday. A number of teachers from various parts of the county attended the session and the townspeople swelled the crowd in the afternoon. The programme was carried out, practically as published, though some substitution was necessary. Some excellent talks were made, and the general discussion developed many ideas that will be of benefit to teachers. Lack of space, as well as the absence of notes, prevents the reproduction of the addresses of Mr. McDonald and Dr. Miller, as it does also of the interesting discussions of the day. However, the paper by Miss Elsie Kauffman Mountz, on "Literature," which was an able exposition of the subject, and most beautifully written, and which, by request, we secured for publication, is herewith presented.

#### LITERATURE.

In one sense literature comprises all the books ever written; books on philosophy, science, text-books on all subjects, as well as poetry, essays and fiction. But by general understanding there has come to be a division in the world of books; and the department of poetry, fiction, and the elegant classics is separated from the more profound and scientific order of writings. This first department is sometimes called pure literature, or polite literature. The French have a better word than we; they say belles lettres, meaning beautiful literature.

It is worthy of a more prominent place in our schools than it now occupies. Many studies while they develop the intellect have scarcely any influence on the heart—notably mathematics.

One live person is of more value to one than a thousand inanimate objects. It is human nature that people like to read about: the plots, the adventures, the sweet love scenes serve only to bring out the human traits of the character. Under the pen of a ready writer the mystery and yearning of love is touched with fresh charm; the beauty of a summer night, and the thrill of a kiss take on new witchery.

The real music of verses may be illustrated by the following:

"Now thou art gone; but still in dreams  
I hear thy voice and soft foot-fall;  
Again I live the happy time  
When life was love and love was all.  
"And though another one may claim  
The tones and glances that are thine;  
May claim thy love, yes, even thee—  
No matter what, thou still art mine."

We might go through Europe writing newspaper letters about the cathedrals, art galleries, the beautiful snow-capped peaks of the Alps, and nobody will read more than ten lines. Why? Because there is nothing there to touch the heart.

But go into some peasant's cottage and describe the family and their mode of life; the old mother watching over her sick girl, the boy eating his breakfast of chestnuts, the father tilling

his little garden. This touches the heart and the pocket. What made Shakespeare and Thackeray and Dickens great? First their knowledge of human nature and ability to tell it in an interesting way.

Mark Twain and Alice Hegan Rice make us laugh. Ella Wheeler Wilcox in "Maurine" and Dickens in some of his works make us weep, but since laughter lightens hearts and tears brighten vision, their books will be welcomed round many an evening lamp.

No one can study the better part of our literature without being much refueled, or having the finer feelings of our natures quickened. This is especially true of poems. The poet makes even common things seem rich; and if he puts a noble spirit in his verse, makes life seem purer and higher. How many have felt the thrill of patriotism quickened by Scott's "Breathes there a man with soul so dead," &c?

Some one has said "Let me make the songs of a nation and I care not who makes the laws."

The songs of a nation are an important part of its literature. Think of the souls inspired by "America" and the "Star Spangled Banner."

Our hymns are no small part of our church literature. Could we wisely dispense with them?

The literature of our country and other countries is all that is purest and best preserved for us. The wealth of Greece—the wealth of Rome is gone forever. Their literature remains and will continue as long as time shall last.

Alfred the Great of England was one of the first men to begin the education of the masses and that previous to this the English Literature was mostly legendary and poets read and sang their verses and only the rich and great were educated.

Civilization in its youth dealt in epic and visionary heroes, just as children do, and has grown from its cradle songs to something more substantial. In order to understand the English Language and Literature thoroughly, we need a certain familiarity with the geography and history of England and other parts of Europe.

The cheapness of literature, or books, brings it within the reach of all. So the poor can enjoy it as well as those possessed with abundance. The teacher's duty is to guide in the choice of books.

The great standard of Literature, as to purity and exactness of style, is the Bible. Besides giving us the history of all time, it furnishes the best thoughts of the best men that ever lived. The poetry of David, the prophecies of Israel, the proverbs of Solomon, the story of Ruth, Johnathan and David, the writings of Him "who spake as never man spake." These will endure. They have inspired, encouraged, blessed and comforted millions. Their influence will continue and as the ages roll on, they will continue to bless mankind, with increased ratio until there is not another heart to bless.

There are many examples of good men and their writings

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which have influenced their own and future generations, but none but what have been made sweeter and better by drinking at the fountain of all life.

So LITERATURE should be stud-

ied in all schools as being the one study that influences our lives more than any other—that makes for our destiny here and reaches to eternity.
