## Striking Paragraphs in Message.

The following paragraphs are taken from the president's message to congress.

"Perhaps the most important question presented to this administration is that of economy in expenditure and sufficiency of revenue."

The president says the cost of living has increased, but does not blame the tariff for it.

## BOND ISSUE RECOMMENDED.

"The report of the secretary shows that the ordinary expenditures for the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1910, will exceed the receipts by \$34,075,620. If to this deficit is added the sum to be disbursed for the Panama canal, amounting to \$38,000,000, and \$1,000,000 to be paid on the public debt, the deficit of ordinary receipts and expenditures will be increased to a total deficit of \$73,075,620. This deficit the secretary proposes to meet by the proceeds of bonds issued to pay the cost of constructing the Panama canal. I approve this proposal."

The president says the cost of engineering and constructing the canal, which will be completed January 1, 1915, will be \$297,766,000, as originally estimated. Other expenses increase the cost by \$75,435,000 to a total of \$375,201,000.

## URGES POSTAL SAVINGS BANKS.

"They will furnish a satisfactory substitute for the system of a government guaranty of deposits which, with deference to those who advocate it, seems to me to have in it the seeds of demoralization to conservative banking and certain financial disaster."

The president earnestly recommended the passage of a ship subsidy bill.

## Campaign Expense Publicity.

"I urgently recommend to congress that a law be passed requiring that candidates for members of the house of representatives and committees in charge of their candidacy and campaign, file in a proper office of the U. S. government, a statement of the contributions received and of the expenditures incurred in the campaign for such elections and that similar legislation be enacted in regard to all other elections which are constitutionally within the control of congress.

## The Statehood Paragraph.

In his annual message to congress, President Taft makes the following recommendation with reference to statehood:

"The successful party in the last election in its national platform declared in favor of the admission as separate states of New Mexico and Arizona and I recommend that legislation appropriate to this end be adopted. I urge, however, that care be exercised in the preparation of the legislation affecting each territory to secure deliberation in the selection of persons as members of the convention to draft a constitution for the incoming states, and I earnestly advise that such constitution after adoption by the convention shall be submitted to the people of the territories for their approval at an election in which the sole issue shall be the merits of the proposed constitution and if the constitution is defeated by popular vote, means shall be provided in the enabling act for a new convention and the drafting of a new constitution. I think it vital that the issue as to the merits of the constitution should not be mixed up with the selection of state officers and that no election of state officers should be had until after the constitution has been fully approved and finally settled upon."

## Teachers' Examination.

The regular mid-winter examination of teachers will be held in the public school building at Carrizozo, N. M., on Friday and Saturday, January 14th and 15th, 1910. All permits expire on the date of this examination, and all teachers holding permits and desiring to continue teaching are required to secure a certificate at this examination. The issuance of two permits in succession is forbidden; hence the necessity for holders of permits to secure a certificate in order to draw salary from the public school fund. The Territorial Board expects to furnish questions for first, second and third grade certificates. The examination will begin at eight o'clock, Friday morning, and a specifically allotted time will be given to each subject until the examination is completed.

# THIS QUEEN WORKS

How Paris Chooses a Fete Sovereign Each Year.

Mlle. Lucienne Joly, a Hard-Working Seamstress Was Queen of the French Capital's Autumn Feast This Year.

Paris.—Although France is now a republic for the third time, her people still seem to hanker after royalty and their taste runs in the direction of queens. They can't have a regular queen, of course, so they must be contented with queens of a lower degree, who are chosen in various trades and various parts of France with all due ceremony.

From time immemorial the tradespeople of Paris have celebrated each carnival by electing a queen from among the work people, whose chief

merit is unusual beauty, the pride of birth being quite an unimportant factor.

The vegetable women select their queen, the grocers theirs, the fishmarket makes its choice and so on. Then these several chosen queens are brought together for an appointed committee to pass judgment on them. The queen receiving the largest number of votes is raised to the highest honor and her title is—Queen of the Queens. It is a strange fact that for several years, with one exception, the fish market has furnished the Queen of Queens for this joyous fete.

This year the business men of Paris inaugurated a Fete d'Automne (autumn feast), and October 2 and 3 were chosen as the days for the celebration.

A very ceremonious meeting was held in the chamber of marriages at the city hall at which the delegates of the various business associations assembled a few days ago for the difficult undertaking of electing an ephemeral sovereign to preside over this fete. The delegates on arriving at the hall found 15 beauties sitting in state awaiting the decision of the judges. The idle, butterfly type was not represented, for the young woman who was to attain the supreme dignity of queen had to be taken from the ranks of the business women.

After a moment's contemplation the president of the committee, M. Chalancon, arose and in carefully selected words set forth the ideas which first inspired the business men to bring into existence this autumn feast. The delegates were then asked to vote for the queen of the fete. The situation was most embarrassing. Gallantry is proverbial with the Frenchman, and to his chivalrous mind it was almost treason to select one to the discredit of the other candidates. A choice had to be made, however. Above each

candidate was a number and each delegate simply wrote the number of his preference on the slip provided for him and dropped it into a box.

The first count showed that the delegates were of diverse opinions and no one of the candidates had a majority. This necessitated another ballot. A signal was given to the brass band in attendance, and in a twinkling it was thrilling the assembled people with one of the most exciting popular airs. The music gave courage to the timid and faltering judges, so that it was only a question of few minutes before the final vote was cast and counted. This formality over, M. Grandon, master of ceremonies, announced the result and proclaimed the chosen queen to be Mlle. Lucienne Joly, queen of the dressmakers, a Juno-like brunette who had received 41 votes, thus making her Queen of the Autumn Feast.

Blushing with pleasure and greatly agitated, the reigning sovereign thanked the assembly for the honor conferred on her, and the committee then escorted her and her 14 maids of honor to a restaurant, where the chosen one was congratulated demonstratively by her relatives and companions.

## SKELETON MILITARY MAST


Picturesque Feature of the Battleship Is Being Supplanted By a Structure of Steel.

Boston.—One of the most picturesque features of the battleship is rapidly on its way to the scrap heap. The military mast, that heavy steel column of which most ships of Uncle Sam's navy carried a pair, fore and aft, which had fighting tops from the platforms of which machine guns could be used to pop away at torpedo boats or like craft, is being regarded as obsolete.

The military mast was considered not so very long ago, a formidable feature of the equipment of a battleship. Now, it is being supplanted by a skeleton mast, a stranded structure of steel sufficiently open in its interlacing of supports to permit of the least possible damage from the shots of the enemy.

It has been shown by experiments that this form of structure will stand the greatest amount of puncture from shots before it collapses, and so the navy department is replacing the more or less solid structures with this grapevine arrangement.

The new mast, while rising to the height of the topmast of the old style, is only about one-fifth of the weight,

averaging about 7,000 pounds, as against 34,000 pounds of most masts of the old style. The height of the new masts from the water to the lookout is about 120 feet, or approximately the same as the old ones, but the "eye" of the ship is infinitely safer on the top of the new masts than it was on the top of the old wooden topmasts.

The illustration very adequately shows the masts on the battleship Missouri recently fitted at the Charlestown navy yard, the foremast being the new model and the main mast the old.

# WOMAN'S INTERESTS

## SMART NEW FABRICS

### MATERIAL CHANGE NOTED IN SEASON'S GOODS.

Lustrous Designs for House Gowns and Rough, Shaggy Ones for Every Other Use Is the Edict in a Nutshell.

There is a well-defined change in the materials for this season. This is as startling as the change to normal in the silhouette.

A woman may manage to rearrange an empire waist line into a moynan age one, but she can't change a smooth broadcloth into a rough chevot.

It is decreed that the lustrous fabrics shall be used for elaborate house gowns, and rough, shaggy ones for every other use.

Dress as nearly like an Eskimo as you can seems to be the advice handed down by the designers. Not that the north pole has anything to do with it. This decree went out last January, before the Peary-Cook episode enlarged the map, but these same designers are patting their own heads that fashion and sensation got together so neatly.

The new fabrics go under the names of wide wale serge, chevot, zibelline, homespun, and basket cloth. The surface of each is hairy. The mesh is loose and open and the finish is dull. Fortunately, for health's sake, the manufacturers have done away with weight. Heavy as the fabrics look, they are easy to carry by a slender person. As skirts are again unlined, except for evening wear, the doctor need not disapprove. It is they who have steadily preached the doctrine of light-weight clothes.

Colors for street wear are black, with gray and black a good second, then raisin, chicory, tilleul, walnut, mahogany and fir green.

Green in several dark, vivid, unnamed tones will be distinctly fashionable for street and house fabrics; and so will the quaint dyes of blue, in which purple or red or black is generously mixed.

Velvet will be preferred to satin for evening gowns by some great designers, though the thinner fabric holds its own better than was expected. Changeable taffeta with great bouquets of flowers is the new-old fabric that Paris is preferring, and flowered gauzes in black, gray, and white are

shown and advocated by all the authorities. The most artistic design so far is a cobweb black gauze, with morning glories in dull gold and purple.

These flowered fabrics will be widely used for the colonial gowns, which will be the direct change from all that has been worn during the past few years.

No fabric is in fashion for evening that does not have the metal woven in it or combined with it. Threads and flowers of it are frequent. Black net with lines of copper is one of the novelties, and copper net with stripes of jet is another.

## GRAY CLOTH AND CHIFFON

Gray cloth and chiffon are combined in the figure. The skirt is a plain one, somewhat high waisted and finished with a peculiar belt. There is, in fact, no separate belt, but the skirt of the gown is pulled around the waist into a smooth effect with the long tails sloping at the back toward a deep point. The costume is not becoming to every figure, but when it is becoming it is strikingly so.

### Sweater Buttons.

The last touch on the new sweater is the button mould covered with crocheted or knitted wool to match the garment.

If the bone moulds cannot be found, those of wood should be avoided, since they sometimes stain the covering, and the round or ball-shaped button be stuffed tightly with white wool. Should the sweater be dark, the wool is first covered over with thin silk to match.

Bone buttons also, and large pearl ones, are used on sweaters.

Large collars and deep closings are among the most notable features of autumn coats.



The bi-ennial statehood bill has been introduced in the house and contains about the usual provisions. If it passes the house it will either be amended or killed in the senate.

The insurgents are going after the reactionists, but as the reactionists in both houses of congress are in full control, and have the slicing of the pie, the insurgents have an up-hill fight.

Congress assembled in the National capital, Monday, for the long term. Many important measures will be introduced, but for the passage Uncle Joe and Boss Aldrich will have to be consulted. Men may propose but these bosses will dispose.

The lower house of parliament in England goes to the people for vindication; in this country Aldrich and Cannon say the people be damned. Ours is the much easier form of government—the people don't have to bother themselves—they only pay the taxes.

The Territorial Educational Association meets at Roswell on 28th, 29th and 30th of December. A large number of teachers from all parts of the territory will be present at this gathering. The teachers of Lincoln county are urged to attend and take part in the discussions that will come before the association.

The unpleasantness existing between the United States and Nicaragua seems to be in a fair way for an amicable settlement. Charles E. Magoon, former governor of Cuba, and Enrique Creel, former Mexican ambassador at Washington, are said to have been agreed upon as commissioners to adjust matters. If this is done, Uncle Sam will call off his war dogs and Zelaya will probably escape with his life. There is little question that Zelaya needed a drubbing, but the manner in which Secretary Knox was going after him had the appearance of a big bully bluffing a dwarf.

The gift-bearing season—Christmas—is only two short weeks off, and many who desire to remember their friends will get left if they wait until that time arrives. The wise ones have already done their Christmas

shopping; for they know that early shopping gives them a better assortment to select from besides more leisure in which to make their selections. Don't wait until the last minute and when you see a neighbor walking off with a choice gift be chock full of regrets. Do your shopping now.

### Cattle Condemned and Killed.

The last legislature enacted a law for the stamping out of diseases among stock, and particularly diseases of dairy cattle, and empowered the Cattle Sanitary Board, in conjunction with the Bureau of Animal Industry, to adopt drastic measures wherever disease is found to exist. Tuberculosis in dairy cattle is, of course the most dangerous, as more people are affected, and a rigid inspection of this class of stock is now being made.

This week Inspector Tucker, of Alamogordo, has visited places in this vicinity where cattle are kept, and is testing them by the tuberculin process. Veterinarian Pine, of this place, is assisting him. The inspectors yesterday visited the dairy of Sam Potts and found four of his dairy cows infected with tuberculosis, which they condemned and ordered killed. They also found a cow of Charles Spence's infected and the same measures were followed.

The inspectors will test any dairy cows where the owners have cause to suspect they are suffering from disease, and they solicit the co-operation of the public in their work. Owners of condemned cattle will receive from the territory two-thirds of their appraised value, not, however, to exceed \$60.



For the small family of simple tastes, nothing could be more appropriate for a residence than a bungalow built according to the design here shown.

This is a bungalow designed in the true western and southern spirit, but so modified as to make it a substantial and comfortable residence for the severest climates.

The exterior is sided with boards, 3/4 inches wide, left with a rough finish and stained a soft olive green. This style of siding is very effective in

## IN THE PRESERVING SEASON

**Little Hints That if Observed Will Result in Satisfaction to the Housewife.**

Pears must be cooked until tender before sugar is added, and one or two pieces of ginger root gives a very pleasant flavor.

Always cook fruit rapidly and in small quantities if wanted especially fine, either for canning or immediate use.

Glass jars with tops should be well sterilized before using by putting into cold water and bringing to a boil. Better to have new rubbers every season.

Apple sauce is much more savory if apples are sweetened before beginning to cook. They should always be thoroughly cooked.

Tomatoes canned in glass sometimes become insipid, but if salted and peppered before canning and are well wrapped in paper to exclude the light they will keep fresh and sweet.

If tin cans are used for tomatoes salt and pepper should never be put in before canning, because of the action of the salt upon the tin, and great care should be observed in having the cans bright and new and perfectly free from rust.

Peaches should always be carefully washed before eating, as the fuzz on the skin is said to cause sore throat and they are much more easily and comfortably handled if washed before peeling for canning or preserving.

### Creole Court Bouillon.

Select about five or six pounds of fresh red fish, take one tablespoonful of butter, one of flour, three chopped onions, fresh tomatoes, equal to about a can, three or four whole cloves and allspice, red and green peppers and salt. Fry the onions in the butter or olive oil, then add the tomatoes and cloves. Let them stew together for 30 minutes. Then add the flour; then add a pint claret. Let this boil, stirring constantly about five minutes until flour is thoroughly cooked; then strain the sauce and return to the fire in a saucepan. Lay the fish cut in steaks and let it simmer gently until cooked, which will require from ten to fifteen minutes. A nice way to serve is to have ready in a deep dish slices of dry toast enough to cover the bottom of the dish. When done lay the slices of fish on the toast, pour the sauce over the fish and serve. A piece of sweet pepper chopped may be added to the above sauce if preferred, also more spices.

### Rabbit and Batter Pudding.

Prepare a batter in this way an hour or two before you want to use it. Sift a quarter-pound of flour into a basin with half a teaspoonful of salt. Break an egg into the center, and pour in quarter cupful of milk. Beat till perfectly smooth with a wooden spoon, then gradually add one cupful of milk, beating all the time.

Set this batter aside for one hour. Melt a heaping tablespoonful of dripping in a deep tin or pudding dish, when hot lay in one canned rabbit.

Season with a little salt and pepper, and pour the batter over. Bake in a hot oven for half an hour. It will puff up beautifully and be nicely browned if the oven is hot enough. Serve at once.

### Casserole of Rice and Meat.

Wash and boil in the usual way one cupful of rice, and drain in the colander. Line the bottom and sides of the casserole with two-thirds of the rice. Take one pint of any cold meat and run it through the chopper. Mix with it two well beaten eggs, two tablespoonfuls of bread crumbs, one tablespoonful of grated onion, two tablespoonfuls of melted butter and sweet herbs, salt and pepper to taste. Mix thoroughly and add sufficient gravy or stock to make quite moist and pack in the center of the casserole. Spread the top with the third of rice left, cover closely and bake in a moderate oven about one hour. Serve with tomato sauce.



#### Of Interest to Stock Men.

The Cattle Sanitary Board furnishes the following:

The last legislature passed a law known as Council Bill No. 34, which provides for the repression of contagious and infectious diseases among cattle and horses and provides for the extirpation of such diseases and to protect the public health. The Cattle Sanitary Board is charged with the responsibility of enforcing the provisions of this law.

The Cattle Sanitary Board has secured the co-operation of the U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry in conducting a tuberculin test of the dairy cattle of the Territory. The work has been organized and the testing is now being done by competent veterinarians. During the winter all dairy cattle in towns having a population of 500 or more inhabitants, and all dairy cattle from which products are sold in said towns, will be tested for tuberculosis.

The symptoms of tuberculosis are not sufficiently prominent, except in advanced stages, to enable one to diagnose the disease by physical examination. The cattle may be in apparently good health and yet have tuberculosis in such form that they are capable of spreading the disease.

The tuberculin used in making the tests is the sterilized and filtered glycerin extract of pure cultures of tuberculosis germs. It is the cooked product of the germs but does not contain any of the germs. It cannot, therefore produce the disease and is as harmless as so much distilled water. When injected into a healthy animal no results whatever follow, but if the animal has any tuberculosis, a decided reaction takes place and the temperature of the animal rises.

All animals which are found to be tuberculous will be condemned and destroyed and the owner paid for such animals on a basis provided for in the law.

This is a matter in which every inhabitant is interested and the public should fully support and co-operate with the authorities in the work.
