"Buffalo" Jones Buys Horses.

"Buffalo" Jones, of Albuquerque, spent several days here this week buying cow ponies to take with him to British East Africa, for which country he will sail about the end of the month. He picked up about ten cow ponies here, and as many more in Capitan, paying fancy prices for them. He will pick up another bunch at Dalhart as he passes through. He will also take along a number of expert ropers. The object of his mission, it is said, is to relegate to the shade the exploits of Bwana Tumbo & Co., the mighty hunters, as "Buffalo's" combination will depend altogether on the lariat, in hunting large game on the Dark Continent. He is being backed by a Motion Picture Co., who will send a number of machines and expert operators with the outfit to take pictures on the ground. The animals captured will net "Buffalo" a fortune and his share in the pictures will net him another. He expects to sail from New York to Liverpool on December 30, where he will be joined by a number of wealthy Englishmen. From Liverpool they start for Hamburg, from which point they will proceed direct to Africa. While here "Buffalo" was the center of attraction. Ed. Kelley, of this town, and William Loveless, of Capitan, will accompany the expedition as ropers, both of whom are adepts with the lariat. They signed contracts for six months, at large salaries and expenses.

Saturday's Grind.

The justice court was busy Saturday. Murdock Kelly, who is more or less known to the business men here, had a hearing on a charge preferred by the Carrizozo Trading company of obtaining money under false pretenses. He was bound over to await the action of the grand jury in the sum of \$500, and in default of bond was taken to the Lincoln jail. Other charges of a similar nature will be made against the same defendant in case he should fill the above bond.

Watchman Cook arrested four hoboes Friday night and turned them over to Deputy Sheriff Oswald. On being searched two of them were found to be armed with pistols. They were found guilty and sent to jail to work out their fines on the public roads.

The Carrizozo-Roswell Road.

Work was begun last week on the Carrizozo-Roswell road under the supervision of Engineer Lewis of Roswell. A large force of men and teams are at work on the big hill between Roswell and Picacho. When they get through with it, they will move camp to the Nogal hill, twelve miles east of this town. By eliminating the heavy grades on the two hills mentioned, the most difficult part of the work will have been accomplished. The rest of the road as now in existence will then be worked over. Bridges will be put in where necessary, and a good highway between Carrizozo and Roswell will result. Lincoln county has not only contributed \$2,500 towards building this road, but its road supervisors have donated all the work in their districts towards the enterprise. The territory has agreed, on its part, to expend a similar sum, and more if necessary, to complete the road.

TRAIN IN THRILLING RACE WITH FLOOD

PASSENGERS ON SANTA FE EXPRESS SAVED FROM DEATH BY SPEED.

\$1,000,000 DAM GIVES WAY

Wall of Raging Water Nearly Over-takes Train as it Dashes Madly Up Grade and Escapes Destruction.

Prescott, Ariz.—Passengers and crew of the California Limited, the Santa Fe's finest and swiftest train, had a thrilling and agonizing experience in a tremendous flood that carried death through the Rio Puerco valley in northwestern New Mexico.

The flood came from the bursting of a million dollar dam in the uplands of the valley. A wall of raging waters rushed down the valley, tearing up mile after mile of the Santa Fe tracks and speeding on toward the limited train. It tore up trees and swept away every house in its path, and finally reached the speeding train.

It was realized by the trainmen that to stop meant certain death in the torrent, and that the only chance was to proceed on the submerged rails as far as possible with the hope that the bulk of the flood might be outdistanced.

As the train rushed along through the fast rising waters several ranch houses and every sort of debris struck against it, breaking the windows of the coaches.

The passengers were panic-stricken, running wildly about with nowhere to turn, or frozen in terror to their seats. Finally an up grade was reached and the train escaped with every one on board safe.

When the dam burst, couriers rode through the valley warning ranchmen and others of the coming water.

The Santa Fe main line in the valley was out of commission for a week.

PUTS VALUE OF \$5,000 ON HIS LEAP FOR LIFE

Buffalo Man Who Jumped Chasm of Jackknife Bridge on Bicycle Seeks Damages.

Buffalo, N. Y.—City Attorney Ryan took a little walk down to the Michigan street jackknife bridge a few days ago simply for not health. The main purpose was to look over the situation there and get the picture in mind so that he may more easily defend the damage action brought against the city by James Morrissey for injuries said to have been received

in an accident on the bridge on July 7, 1908.

According to the complaint, Morrissey was riding his bicycle down Michigan street, his purpose being to cross the bridge. Now the bridge is one which opens in the middle and swings skyward to let vessels pass under. It was just giving way to one such rising tendency when Morrissey came pedaling along on his bicycle. He felt that he could make the opposite side if he tried hard enough. While the bridge rose he scooted up the incline.

When he reached the top he saw a small chasm opening onto the river. The other side of the bridge was several feet distant, and the distance was increasing. Morrissey couldn't have stopped had he wanted to, so across the open space he shot—an imitation, it was, of the leap for life in the melodramas—and he landed on the decline of the other side of the bridge.

This decline was steeper than the incline he had just surmounted, so that it was unfamiliar traveling to him. The consequences arrived immediately, for he overturned and rolled down, with the wheel, not as a bicycle should normally roll, but sideways. He thinks the city ought to pay \$5,000 for its part in the affair.

ON GIRLISH LINES

TWO SIMPLE AND PRETTY JUVENILE COSTUMES.

Designed for Young Lady Who Has Not Yet Made Her Formal Entry into Society—Some New Effects Shown.

The illustration on the left shows a very pretty home dress for a girl of 16 to 18 years; it is a style that makes up well for morning wear, in beige, alpaca or velvet; the skirt has two tucks about the hem, all being about two inches in depth. Braid is carried down each side front, and at top of tucks.

The bodice, which fastens at the



back, has a deep yoke of tucked silk muslin; it is only tucked into the bodice so that it can be easily removed for washing, and as easily replaced.

Two tucks are made each side, and braid with buttons and simulated buttonholes forms the trimming.

MEANS WARMTH IN WINTER

Dotted Challis Waist is Just the Garment Most Needed by the Schoolgirl.

The dotted challis waist is very new, very light in weight and very warm. Indeed, it is well worth a second thought, and it invites the sensible woman or, better still, the sensible mother. Daughters are not warmly clad these days, and it might be well to take some time for the consideration of the fairly warm winter waist, be it shirtwaist or blouse.

There is not the least objection to the non-washable blouse if it can be made of material that is not bulky, and worn on the right occasions. It involves more care than the durable white linen waist, and should be made with the idea of an occasional bath in warm, soapy water. Almost all challis will stand this treatment occasionally. This year there is a beautiful little model shown at an exclusive shop. It is made of this pretty, soft material, embroidered by hand over its entire surface; but there are evidences of carelessness in its make-up.

The little dots have, quite apparently, been embroidered first, since the seams cut them off at certain points. The ideal way to get around this difficulty, which really amounts to a defect, is to first cut out the blouse and fit it; then, with the seam lines marked, to embroider the separate pieces and remake the blouse. The small dots on the pretty sage-green challis were done in darker silk to bring it into harmony with its skirt.

On some woolen shirtwaists a single line of dots only appears down

wristbands that are trimmed with braid.

The bodice and skirt are both mounted into the same band.

Materials required: Six yards 48 inches wide, about eight yards braid, 1½ yards bodice lining, one-half yard silk muslin 40 inches wide.

The other costume is for a girl of 14 to 16 years. Our model being for present wear, is in the golden brown linen; the skirt is arranged in plaits each side front; they are stitched two-thirds the length, and are ornamented with buttons; a fancy cotton galloon in shades of brown forms the trimming.

The unlined bodice has a small yoke of finely tucked net outlined with galloon.

The sleeves are tucked in sets of threes the entire length; buttons trim the front, and a dark brown kid waistband is worn.

Hat of burnt straw trimmed with golden brown silk.

Materials required: Six yards linen 40 inches wide, five-eighths yard tucked net, 20 buttons, 4½ yards galloon.

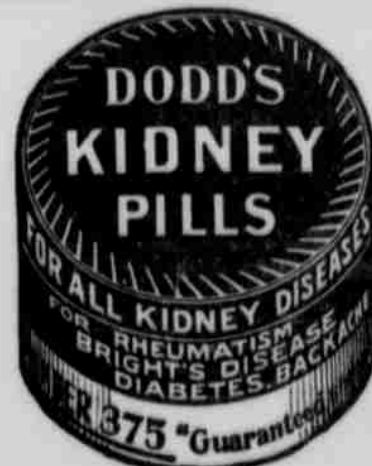

George A. Puckett, editor of the Roswell Record, died in Roswell this week. Mr. Puckett went to Roswell in 1903, suffering from tuberculosis, and while the climate did not cure his malady, his life was no doubt prolonged. He was a very intelligent and vigorous writer, and absolutely uncompromising on a question of principle. The newspaper profession lost a strong and worthy member when George A. Puckett answered the last summons.

It is the opinion of this office that a week would be reasonable for the holiday vacation in most cases, and should not be longer than that, particularly in the schools where only a short term is being taught, but it might be convenient to go slightly beyond that time in order to cover the entire holiday period.

She was laid to rest in the Nogal cemetery. Rev. J. H. Skinner conducting the burial services.

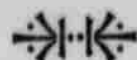

In the quaint lettering and emblems of her famous "jewel," this devotion has been impressed. It is a heart of gold two or three inches across, enriched with gems and enamel. It has hidden springs and revolving doors, angels and death's heads, clasped hands and a phoenix, flames and darts and rhyming mottoes. A London paper says: "It needs whole pages properly to describe and explain the cryptic work, and it is easy to believe that it is more quaint and curious than beautiful. But, in spite of its oddity, it clearly tells its pathetic story of Lennox's devotion and Lennox's love. Dominating all its mysterious fancies one sees the plain device, a marguerite flower turning to the setting sun." Lady Margaret wore this "jewel" till her death.

St. Paul Man Needlework Champion.

Charles C. Olson of Charles street, St. Paul, is the needlework champion at the state fair this year, for he was awarded first honors for a framed embroidery picture, an eagle perched on two American flags, exquisitely done even to the heavy padding of cotton under the bird, which gives it lifelike contour.

The entire design is in filo silk and is worked solidly. Each section of the bird is outlined in gold thread and "E Pluribus" is heavily embroidered in gold.

Mr. Olsen is not the only man who has entered needlework for competition. The exhibit shows the work of 10 men and the public interested in fancy work recognizes with pleasure centerpieces and pillow designs which it has admired at former fairs.—Minneapolis Journal.

Beginning of Bird Migration.

Flocks of migratory birds are passing over the city nightly now, going south from northern points where they have spent the summer. A great many of these birds, among them the robin and the blackbird, come to South Carolina from the Blue Ridge and other mountains, where they nest in the summer, and other birds are now en route to points further south—Florida and the islands off the coast. The journey south is begun about this time each year and the birds all leave the northern points before the severity of winter there has set in. The mild climate of the south in winter suits them better and they come here in great droves.—Anderson Mail.

Graphite Replacing Lead.

The growing exclusion of lead from paint on the ground of its poisonous character, has led to the introduction of graphite as a substitute, particularly in the place of red lead in the painting of iron. Mixed with linseed oil, graphite protects the iron well against rust, and is much cheaper than red lead. So many new uses have been found for graphite, which not long ago was employed almost exclusively for the manufacture of lead pencils, that large quantities are now made with the electric furnace, the natural deposits of the mineral not being sufficient to supply the demand.

BRAINS CAUSED HER RISE



Former Countess Sophia Chotek, morganatic wife of Archduke Francis Ferdinand, her presumptive to the Austro-Hungarian crown, has become the most prominent figure in Europe. Her greatest admirer cannot say she is beautiful, but those who hate her most—and they are all women—must admit that she has brains and tact and force.

So in all human probability this lady, always noble in character, to marry whom her husband once renounced claims to the throne, will reign as empress of Austria. Morganatic wife, left-handed wife no longer, she will sit on the throne as empress at her lord and master's left hand.

A series of unfortunate events, which made Francis Joseph the unhappiest man in Europe, opened her path to the throne, which the good sense and diplomacy of the coming empress at once broadened and smoothed. Only recently Archduke Francis Ferdinand, himself a man of brains, and his wife were invited by the Emperor William of Germany to attend the autumn maneuvers of the German army in Wurtemberg.

At the moment Emperor William's invitation was made public Emperor Francis Joseph raised Archduke Francis Ferdinand's wife to the rank of archduchess, with the title of imperial highness. That creation was regarded as a precursor to the removal of the disability against Archduke Francis Ferdinand's children.

TO FIGHT YANKEE INVASION



The Countess of Egerton, widow of Earl Egerton of Tatton, whose first husband was the Duke of Buckingham, according to report, has planned a movement among titled English women to resist the "Yankee invasion," by which the most eligible of England's unmarried nobles are being captured by the daughters of aspiring American millionaires.

The plans of the countess contemplate nothing less than a campaign of education among women members of the English aristocracy, particularly the mothers, with a view to securing united and intelligent action to influence their sons and brothers against marrying American girls.

Under the countess' plan, it is said, the mothers will begin to inculcate in their sons at an early age scorn for American girls and women who come to England and sell themselves for titles and contempt for Englishmen who sell their titles.

The young noblemen will also be taught better ideas of economy in the hope that they will not waste their ancestral estates and thus be inclined to turn fortune-hunters.

An important part of the plan is said to be a sort of polite, but none the less effective, boycott of American wives of English nobles, the most of whom are said to have a demoralizing effect on British society because of their lack of refinement, culture, and their fondness for wine, gambling and flirtations.

The young sons of these titled English mothers will be informed as they reach maturity of the many marital scandals that have followed the alliances of English noblemen with rich American girls, and no effort will be spared to teach them that for the sake of their own happiness, for the honor of their houses, and the preservation of the high standards of their caste, they should wed only the properly reared daughters of British aristocracy, whose culture and refinement are not mere veneer, but the results of centuries of good breeding.

GRAFT FOE FOR PRESIDENT



Joseph W. Folk, who broke up the boodle combine in St. Louis and was rewarded by election to the office of governor, is being boomed for president in 1912, and it is practically certain that the Missouri delegation to the next Democratic national convention will carry Folk instructions.

Missouri Democrats are free to confess that they are sick at heart over the fact that "Democratic Missouri" is represented at Washington by one Republican United States senator and that the state government at Jefferson City is in Republican control. Upon a harmony basis it is now clear that the old factional fighting has been abandoned within party lines and that former Governor Folk will be made Missouri's presidential candidate in 1912.

Practically all of the influential leaders in Democratic politics are now committed to the Folk candidacy, it appears from a close study of the situation in St. Louis, Kansas City, and, as reported, from over the state.

Men who are in position to know what they are talking about say the time is ripe for beginning a real campaign for Folk. Plans are under way to perfect an organization in his behalf and headquarters will be opened within a short while.

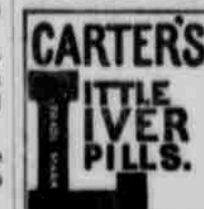

Although the Picnic Season is Over,
Housekeepers Will Find Suggest-
ions Here to Be of Great
Value.

Olive Sandwiches.—Stone and pound to a paste two dozen large olives or pimientos and blend into it a small cupful of mayonnaise dressing. Butter thin slices of graham or brown bread, spread with the filling and form sandwiches. As the sandwiches are made pile them together compactly, trim off the crust with a sharp knife and cut into halves.

Baked Bean Sandwiches.—Mash a cupful of baked beans, add a tea-spoonful of chopped parsley, a tea-spoonful of onion juice and a little prepared mustard. Season to taste with salt and white pepper. Butter white bread on the loaf, cut into thin slices and spread with the filling. Trim off the crusts and cut into shapes.

Ginger and Nut Sandwiches.—Cut up very fine one part of preserved ginger to two parts of nuts, moisten with syrup of the ginger or with thick cream and spread between slices of white bread.

Nut Sandwiches.—Chop fine English walnuts, add enough mayonnaise dressing to make a paste and spread between thin slices of wheat bread.

Dill and Ham Sandwiches.—Cut thin slices of rye or graham bread, butter evenly and lay between them two thin slices of lean ham and thin slices of dill pickle cut the long way.

Pimento and Meat Sandwiches.—Take any cold meat, grind a cupful, add a dozen chopped pimentos, season with pepper and salt and spread between thin slices of graham bread.

Ham Sandwiches.—Chop very fine some lean cold ham, mix and spread between slices of white bread cut thin and buttered.

Cucumber Sandwiches.—Chop a cucumber fine, place in a cloth and squeeze out all moisture, then mix it with mayonnaise dressing and spread on a lettuce leaf between buttered slices of bread.

Anchovy Sandwiches.—Rub the yolks of hard boiled eggs to a paste moisten with soft butter and season with anchovy essence. Spread the mixture between slices of bread thinly buttered.

Brown Bread Sandwiches.—Brown bread to be used for sandwiches should be steamed in a square tin or in one pound baking powder cans. Spread with butter, cut thin and put between the slices layers of chopped peanuts creamed with mayonnaise or equal quantities of soft cheese and English walnuts.—The Housekeeper.

Economic Stew.

Put into a pot a knuckle of young beef, add a quart of boiling water, and start cooking, removing any scum that rises. Then slice an onion into a hot skillet, with some dripping in it, cover and heat, stirring once or twice, till the onion changes color. Pour in a little boiling water; slice in two or three carrots, cover and cook ten minutes. Turn this into the pot, cover closely and let it stew or simmer very slowly for three hours, or until the meat is ready to slip from the bone. In finishing, add a little chopped parsley or other sweet herbs. Then dish, thicken the gravy with a trifle of browned flour, boil up a moment, and pour it over the joint; or you may have ready some slices of toast, place the meat on it and pour the gravy over.

Layer Cake.

Sift together in your mixing bowl one cupful of sugar, two cupfuls of flour, one teaspoonful of cream tartar, one-half teaspoonful of soda, break one egg in teneup and fill with sweet milk; pour in center of mixing bowl, add three tablespoonfuls melted butter, beat thoroughly, bake in three layers.

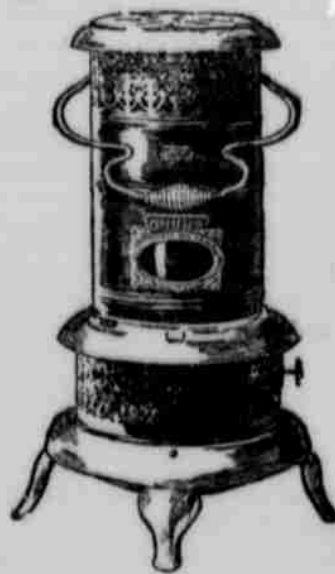
