## The Statehood Question.

A dispatch from Washington, dated Dec. 26, says that the Senate favors delaying action until the 1910 census is taken, and the Spanish grants in New Mexico and Arizona are investigated. Therefore, it is safe to say that very little will be done as regards statehood before next year. The dispatch states further:

Statehood legislation at the present session of congress will not go beyond giving authority to the people of New Mexico and Arizona to hold constitutional conventions and provide the means for such conventions, if the wishes of the leading members of congress dictate the policy. This program is in harmony with the message of President Taft.

During the last session of the Sixtieth Congress, the House passed a bill to admit both New Mexico and Arizona as separate states. It was predicted that the measure would go through the Senate in short order. Such was not the case, however. One meeting of the conference was held and the sentiment was entirely against hasty action.

Some of the members of the Senate committee did not like the looks of certain land grants to individuals which had been received under Territorial administration. Some of the claims for large holdings under Spanish grants were also viewed with suspicion. Furthermore, the estimates coming from the Territories as to population, both as to numbers and class, were not accepted, and it was thought best to delay action until 1910 census.

## The Doll Contest.

The drawing for the big doll given away by the Carrizozo Trading Co., took place at the Carrizozo Pool Hall on the afternoon of Friday, the 24th. inst.

All the tickets given out, numbering 1427, were placed in a box and were well shaken up. It was agreed by those present that the fiftieth drawn out of the box would be the winning ticket, and in the event that this ticket failed to be presented by the 15th of January, the seventy-fifth ticket drawn should be the winner, and in case that both of these tickets failed to be presented by the first of February, the one-hundredth ticket would take the prize. These precautions, however, were unnecessary as the holder of the fiftieth ticket that came out, which was 1042, was Mrs. James, the popular day clerk at the Railroad Hotel. Morgan Riely drew the tickets out of the box, which was checked over by Clarence Spence and C. W. Hyde, while Fred W. Smith, of the White House Restaurant, kept a list of the numbers as they were drawn from the box.

## Masonic Installation.

On Monday night, at the Masonic Hall, Carrizozo Lodge No. 41, A. F. & A. M., held its first installation of officers, to which the public was invited. The installation ceremony of this order is very impressive and was nicely carried out. A large number of outsiders were present. The installation was conducted by Past Master Wm. D. Martin of Oscura, assisted by Dr. R. E. Blair, as marshal.

The officers are: Worshipful Master, Wm. F. A. Gierke; Senior Warden, W. O. Miller; Junior Warden, S. F. Miller; Treasurer, Wayne Van Schopch; Secretary, G. Ranniger; Senior Deacon, E. H. B. Chew; Senior Steward, Harry Chant; Junior Steward, G. B. Greer. The Junior Deacon elect, F. M. Goodin, and the Tyler elect, J. J. Cavender, were not present.

A proposition to organize an Eastern Star lodge was discussed after the installation ceremony was over, and was favorably considered. The Right Worshipful Master appointed the following committee to investigate the proposition and report at the next regular communication of the lodge: Mesdames W. D. Martin, S. F. Miller, W. C. Miller and E. H. B. Clew; Messrs. G. Ranniger, S. F. Miller and W. C. Miller.

## Jaffa to Resign.

Santa Fe, N. M., Dec. 27.—A report emanating from semi-official circles here is to the effect that Nathan Jaffa is going to resign as secretary of the territory before the end of Gov. Curry's term and that W. C. Winters, of Los Vegas, is spoken of as favorable to Judge Mills as his successor. The report is given further credence here on account of the fact that so far Mr. Jaffa seems not to have received any proffers of further official position.

## The "Statehood Getter."

Poor Bull Andrews, after having held the idea out to us that he was the one and only great original statehood getter, has not even been permitted to outline the most important features of the statehood bill, much less father it. However, there is consolation in this, he can employ his great talents on one Senator Penrose with whom he is supposed to have great influence, and maybe by devoting his time to this one object he can succeed to have the Pennsylvania senator vote for instead of against statehood as he did on the 3rd day of last March, when a Democratic senator forced a vote on the statehood bill. — Farmington-Times-Hustler.

### YOUNG MAN HAD EASY THING

Additional Proof, if Any Is Needed,  
That Our Language Is Fearful  
and Wonderful.

Just by way of showing how easy it is for some men to pick up a few dollars by their wits, a young fellow strolled into a Chestnut street cafe the other afternoon, and, joining in a conversation that was being carried on by convivial spirits, declared he was the most "fortunate" individual on earth. He immediately began telling a story of his personal troubles, but before he had got the narrative well under way there was a chorus of interruptions, and the talkative young man was politely informed that his English needed revising, since he should have used the word "unfortunate," instead of "fortunate." The newcomer insisted that unfortunate was the correct word to use, and the argument waxed warm. Finally, with a show of heat, the young man who started the trouble declared that, while he had only a few dollars, he would wager them that he was correct. So anxious were his friends to lay wagers with him that he did not have money enough to meet all the demands, but he succeeded in putting up \$15 in separate small bets. The men who were certain that the garrulous young man was wrong in the use of the word unfortunate sent out for a dictionary, only to find that they had been "stung" on a "sure thing" bet, the big book on spelling showing that unfortunate is perfectly proper and means unfortunate. "Yes," said the winner of the bets, as he pocketed his new portion of wealth, "I have won money on that before; I collected \$10 this afternoon on a similar wager." Then, just to show that there were no hard feelings, he "bought" for the crowd.—Philadelphia Record.

#### Tropical Shells in Far North.

One of the things which I secured was a large nautilus shell, such as is supposed to exist only in tropical countries. I found it 600 feet above the water level. Such specimens clearly prove the volcanic upheaval of this soil and further show that the climate must at one time have been very different from what it now is. In some of the shells the petrified organisms can be discerned, as though the process took place very rapidly. During the summer, I also found the skeleton of a right whale, a species that rarely goes higher than 60 degrees; but I found it at 82 degrees on the land. It was in a sort of ravine, where the water and ice had passed over it, and the whalebone was worn to long threads and strings, showing that it must have been there many years. The traces of friction showed plainly on the whole skeleton.—Capt. Edwin Coffin's story of the Ziegler Polar Expedition in National Magazine.

## TALKS ON BEAUTY

She is intent on her work and we are intent on the picture she makes. It is probably a very fine, up-to-date sewing machine, but it could stay in that window for many weeks and not attract a crowd."

"The man whose business it is to sell that machine knows his business and knows it well. The combination of girl and machine is a pleasing one and the impression is lasting."

"Further down the street there is a shop with big windows, through which we see heaps of confections, and we



can see, too, a dainty blonde miss of exquisite feature and coloring who seems to have little in the world to do except to sit just where the passing throngs can get glimpse of her fresh loveliness. Why is that store crowded with customers while another confectionery shop further down the street languishes for want of trade? The sweets in the one shop may be no better than those in the other, but the attractiveness of the blonde saleswoman furnishes the one thing needful in business—the initiative.

"In these days of greatest competition among merchants, it was a clever man indeed who first realized the tremendous attraction of a pretty woman's face for shoppers, women as well as men. For, don't for a moment think

### STAMPS FOR THE RED CROSS

Sixty Millions of Christmas "Stickers" to Be Sold to Aid Tuberculosis War.

Washington.—Thirty million 1909 Merry Christmas stamps have been ordered by the American Red Cross society to be sold to raise funds for the war on tuberculosis. Thirty million more stamps will be ordered later and by December 15 it is expected that these 60,000,000 bullets will be fired in the national battle against the White Plague.

President Taft is the sponsor for the Red Cross movement. He is now the

president of the society. The stamp this year is similar in design to the one used last year. The 1908 stamp sale netted the society \$140,000, all of which was used in the fight against the tubercular bacilli.

The stamps are sold to Christmas shoppers who in their turn put them on all the packages and Christmas greetings which they send to their friends and relatives.

#### Phosphorescent Forests.

The phosphorescence of certain agarics of Borneo has more than once demoralized the superstitious natives and astonished whites. Some years ago a party of English engineers found it necessary to survey a tract of low lying country which was almost impenetrable, and to blaze the trail natives were employed to work at night, others during the day. The former came into camp one night stating that they could not go through a portion of the bush or forest, strange "spirits" on the trees telling them that evil would befall them if they continued. The "spirits" proved to be a magnificent display of phosphorescence emanating from agarics growing upon the dead limbs of the trees. These vegetable fire bodies were traced for a considerable distance, producing a most remarkable exhibition, the light in some places being so brilliant that it was difficult to believe that the forest was not afire. To test the brilliancy the men held papers near the most brilliant portions and read by the light.

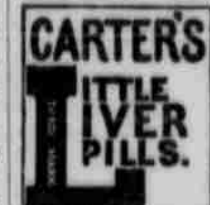

## NEED OF ACCURACY

IF ONE WOULD GET SUCCESSFUL RESULTS IN COOKING.

Good Materials and Correct Measurements Absolutely Necessary—Measuring Spoons and Cups Best for Beginner.

Successful results in cooking can only be obtained by the use of good materials and correct measurements. One may have cooked enough to be able to measure with a fair degree of accuracy with the eye, but a beginner will do well to go back to first principles and use measuring spoons and cups.

It is not worth while to try to memorize many recipes, but it is a good plan to have some measurements in the mind upon which to work, in case one has not a recipe at hand.

Using the griddle cake as a batter foundation, the proportion of bread flour will be 1½ parts of flour to two parts of wetting.

For a muffin, 1½ parts of flour to one part of wetting.

For a plain cake, two cups of pastry flour to one-half cup of wetting.

In doughs, just enough flour to knead.

Because of the variation in flours the wetting should be held back, making the flour the basis of the mixture.

In the use of baking powder, the rule is one level teaspoon of baking powder to one cup of wheat flour, 1½ teaspoons of baking powder to one cup of corn meal, and four-fifths teaspoonful of soda to two cups of sour milk. If milk is only slightly sour, two-thirds of a teaspoon to two cups of milk will be a sufficiency.

Eggs and shortening may be varied to suit conditions. Batter mixtures can be made without eggs, but are of course not so good. Butterine can be used in place of butter and the results are just as good.

Crumb Griddle Cakes.

One cup flour, one-half teaspoon soda, one-half teaspoon salt, one teaspoon baking powder. Sift together.

One cup sour milk, one cup stale bread crumbs, one cup sweet milk. Mash together and allow to stand until soft; then sift in flour and leavening agents.

### Simplicity in Dress.

A great French authority on dress asserted once that no ornament in the way of a bow or even a button should be allowed to appear on a dress without some definite object. He argued, with a great show of reason, that the bow should tie the two pieces of ribbon together, and that the button should actually pass through a buttonhole. It would be as well sometimes if these principles could be carried into practice, if only to prevent such foolish forms of trimming as those long rows of many buttons which played a conspicuous part on many of the summer gowns, in some cases giving them exactly the appearance of a draper's show card, upon which samples of buttons are displayed.

### Potato Fricassee.

If you are tired of the old ways of cooking the inevitable potato, which in most families forms part of the daily menu, despite doctors and dread of flesh, why not try a fricassee? It is a favorite method of cooking them in a certain Italian family, and is delicious.

Cut new potatoes, which have been peeled, into small squares or flute them with a fluting knife. Put a tablespoonful of butter in a saucepan, fry in it a small onion, sliced, salt and plenty of paprika. Cook onion until a light brown; then add potatoes; cover with water and cook until the water has boiled away, when the potatoes should be soft and mealy.

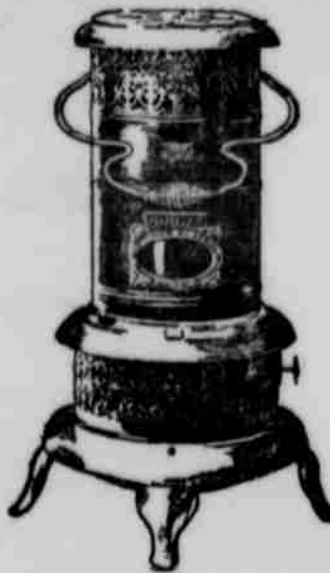

This being a division on the railroad, naturally many hoboes are landed here, and though they are just as anxious to go on, because this character of town has no attraction for them; yet, if they are apprehended and are brought before the justice on the charge of vagrancy, it is not difficult to see that our jail will soon be full and the county in the "hole," particularly as long as the expense of taking them to Lincoln is incurred. The justice is sustained by the law in imposing a fine, but if it is carried out who is the winner? Does the situation justify the expense? The hobo is not badly hurt; he gets a free ride to Lincoln, free bed and board and the county foots the bill. But of the bill the justice gets a very small whack.

Now, we are quite free to say that we believe the county should be relieved of all possible expense, and that the justice, in a large measure, can aid. And in furtherance of this plan, we offer this suggestion: If hoboes are charged with no graver offense than being "busted," send them about their business, suspending judgment long enough for them to get out of town. If they refuse to go, put them under guard and work them on the roads. Build a local prison substantial enough to hold them, and two or three days of that kind of medicine, will, we think, produce an effective cure, and send them on their way. Treat other frivolous infractions of the law in the same manner, and soon Carrizozo will be free of that character of petty troubles and the county relieved of a large portion of the expense.

A healthy public sentiment, backing the justice of the peace, can accomplish this desired result; and, we believe, the sentiment exists and that Justice Scoggin is quite willing to harken unto it. The trips to Lincoln, and boarding the prisoners after they get there, is what is using up the funds of this county.

## HOW TO IRON SEAMS IN SILK

Hints for Home Dressmaker Who is Engaged in Pressing New Blouses.

The making of a silk blouse is rendered all the more difficult, where the home dressmaker is concerned, by the fact that the seam to lie flat must be ironed, while a hot iron is only too apt to mark the silk indelibly.

By far the best course to pursue is that of passing the same in turn over the upturned edge of a warm iron, the latter being wedged firmly by the simple method of catching it securely in a half-closed drawer or between a chair back and the table, unless some one is at hand to hold it in the reverse position.

With both hands the seam should be pulled taut and slowly passed over the iron, care being taken to avoid touching more than the seam with the point or the side, and thereby marking the material underneath.

## PREPARING THE GLACE NUTS

Explicit Directions That Will Result in Perfection of This Delicate Confection.

Glaze nuts require two cupfuls of sugar, one cupful of boiling water and one-eighth of a teaspoonful of cream of tartar. Put the ingredients in a smooth saucepan, stir, place on a range and heat to boiling point. Boil without stirring until the syrup begins to discolor, which is 310 degrees Fahrenheit. Wash off the sugar which adheres to the sides of the saucepan, as in making fondant. Remove the saucepan from the fire and place in a large pan of cold water to instantly stop boiling. Remove from the cold water and place in a saucepan of hot water during dripping. Take the nuts separately on a long pin, dip in syrup to cover, remove from syrup and place on oiled paper.—Woman's Home Companion.

### Tomato Kromesies.

Beat lightly the yolk of one egg, add three tablespoonfuls of cold water, one-half a cup of sifted flour, and one-quarter teaspoonful of salt. Stir in one teaspoonful of melted butter, then beat until the batter is smooth and bubbly. Stir in lightly the stiffly beaten white of the egg, then set away in a cool place for several hours.

Choose ten tomatoes which are firm and as small as possible. Scald and peel them. Have ready some grated cheese, seasoned, using for each cupful of the cheese a quarter of a teaspoonful of salt, one-third of a teaspoonful of paprika, one-quarter of a teaspoonful of ground mustard, a small pinch each of thyme and ground cloves. Roll each tomato in the prepared cheese until thickly coated, let stand for about 15 minutes, then dip carefully in the batter already prepared and plunge into smoking hot fat. Fry a golden brown, drain, and serve garnished with parsley.

### Cream Cones.

Take two cupfuls of flour, four teaspoonfuls of baking powder, two tablespoonfuls of sugar, four tablespoonfuls of butter, one-third cupful of milk or cream. Mix and sift dry materials (flour, baking powder, sugar, and salt). Cut in the butter with a knife; add the eggs, well beaten, and milk. Put on a floured board and roll to three-fourths of an inch in thickness. Cut in squares. Brush whites of egg on them and then sprinkle with sugar. Bake in a hot oven over 15 minutes. You will find that these are quite dainty and delicious.

### Chili Sauce.

One peck ripe tomatoes, one quarter peck of onions, four red peppers, one stalk of celery; chop all these. One quart of vinegar, one cupful of sugar, one-half cupful of salt, one teaspoonful of celery seed, one teaspoonful of red pepper, whole cloves cinnamon, and all-spice tied in a rag and boil in vinegar. Boil slowly two and one-half hours.

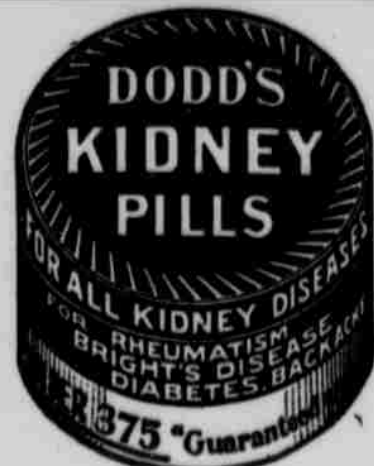

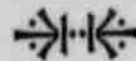

### A LITTORAL DEFENSE CORPS.

Recent developments suggest the thought that the time may have arrived for the creation of a littoral defense corps as a distinct branch of the military establishment. The strength of the movement to exclude the marines from naval vessels and confine their functions to the guarding of navy yards and bases seems to have become apparent even to the marines themselves, says the New York Tribune. The Tribune's Washington bureau reports that the commissioned personnel of the marine corps seriously contemplates asking congress to transfer the entire corps to the army, with the hope of finding there more congenial surroundings. Gen. Murray, chief of artillery, after an extended inspection of the coast defenses, announces the necessity of an additional force to guard "the back doors" of the modern fortifications and those portions of the coast beyond the reach of the fortified ordnance. The amalgamation of the marine and coast defense corps in a littoral defense corps might solve all the difficulties. The marines under such an arrangement would retain sufficient mobility to enable them to guard naval bases, the rear approaches to the fortifications and unfortified portions of the littoral, while practically the entire supervision of that important branch of defense could be confined to a single head of the newly created corps, who in turn could be made responsible to either the secretary of the navy or the secretary of war, as circumstances might dictate.

Coaling seems to be destined to become a matter of vital importance to warships, not only because of the absolute necessity of the fuel, but because of the dangers which have been revealed by the fact that high explosives have been found in a number of instances, of late, in the coal for the bunkers of British war vessels. Unless coal supplies are closely guarded night and day, and every bushel put aboard is closely inspected, it would be comparatively easy to destroy the mightiest of ships with sticks of explosive properly adjusted in lumps of the fuel. This danger has received more or less consideration during times of war, but never in days of peaceful service have ships been menaced as British cruisers and battleships seem to be at the present time.

Darker grows the shadow over Spain. Following the troubles in Morocco comes the prediction of a revolution and the overthrow of the monarchy. But as the prophecy comes from a socialistic source much allowance must be made. Socialism of the stripe marking most of the agitation in continental Europe is not usually the kind that would be satisfactory even if successful.

## OUSTED AS TEACHER

### Mrs. Stetson Barred from Teaching Christian Science.

Her License Revoked Because She Gave Students in New York Wrong Idea of the Eddy Doctrines.

Boston.—Mrs. Augusta E. Stetson, of New York, has not been "expelled" or "dismissed" from the Christian Science church, according to a statement from Alfred Harlow, Chairman of the Mother church committee on publication, but has had her license as a practitioner revoked. Mrs. Stetson still retains her membership in the church.

The move is the result of a long inquiry in the methods employed by her in teaching. The board of directors in its report finds that Mrs. Stetson teaches her students that the New York branch of the church, with which she is connected, is the only legitimate Christian Science church in that city, that she has been teaching an erroneous sense of the doctrines, that Mrs. Stetson has so far strayed from the right as to be unfit for the work of a Christian Science teacher.

The trustees of the church have adopted amendments to the by-laws of the church that will prevent, it is believed, a recurrence of exactly the same troubles experienced by the trustees in the case of Mrs. Stetson.

Section 2 of article 3, on the care of pupils, is amended to read as follows:

"Christian Scientists who are teachers shall carefully select for pupils only such as have good past records and promising proclivities toward



Christian Science. A teacher shall not assume personal control of or attempt to dominate his pupils, but he shall hold himself morally obligated to promote their progress in the understanding of divine principle not only during the class term but after it, and to watch well that they prove sound in sentiment and practical in Christian Science.

"He shall persistently and patiently counsel his pupils in conformity with the unerring laws of God and shall enjoin them habitually to study the scriptures and Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures, as a help thereto."

## NEW RAILROAD PRESIDENT

Ira G. Rawn Works Up from Telegraph Operator to Chief Executive of the Monon.

New York.—At a meeting of the directors of the Chicago, Indianapolis & Louisville (Monon) railroad in New York, October 14, Ira G. Rawn, vice-president of the Illinois Central, was chosen president of the road. He succeeded W. H. McDoel, who retired from the presidency on November 1, but who retains his place in the directorate and as a member of the executive committee.

Mr. Rawn has been connected with the Illinois Central since 1903, having been made assistant to J. T. Harahan at that time. He rapidly was

advanced through the offices of general superintendent of transportation, assistant general manager, and general manager.

Before going to the Illinois Central he was general superintendent of the Baltimore & Ohio. He started his railroad service as a telegraph operator on the Baltimore & Ohio at Cincinnati, 29 years ago. He is now 61 years old.

### Boat Runs into School of Shiners.

On the last trip of the independent steamer American into Mobile the boat plowed through a school of shiners and minnows for several miles.

The wheel of the boat hurled the fish on to the decks of the vessel and Capt. Lou Keene says that the fish were so thick on the sides of the boat that he had to put deck hands to work shoveling them back into the water. A number of good fish were carried back to the cook room and every one on board enjoyed a bit of fresh water fish.—Mobile Register.

### Cost of Modern War.

The Anglo-German crisis is only one phase of the question in which every nation, America included, is vitally concerned. The impoverishment of the world by war—even by war which is never fought—is the most imminent peril now threatening the race.

It costs \$10,000,000 to build a warship of the latest type. Each broadside fired by such a vessel in practice or at an enemy costs \$10,000 and her guns are capable of discharging six rounds a minute.

## TO SERVE WITH DAINTY TEA

Edibles That Should Accompany Repast so Popular in Fashionable Circles.

Sandwiches, salads, cakes and creams comprise the principal menu of the smart tea. It is no uncommon thing to deck meat dishes, and especially pasts of sweet butter, with rims of field flowers; and when nasturtiums are in season, since they are edible, they are put in many salads.

Herb Sandwiches.—These are made of buttered bread of various sorts, with the addition of such herbs as are in season. Lettuce, pepper grass, water cress, peppermint, chives, etc., are all used, the filling merely salted and peppered, or mixed with mayonnaise. The strongly flavored herbs are finely minced and sprinkled lightly over one buttered slice, and when the other slice is put on the sandwich is trimmed into shape, no ragged end of green being allowed to show.

Other herbs which may be used in this way are parsley, sorrel, chervil, dandelion, basil, thyme, horseradish (the leaves), tarragon, etc. Chopped olives, green pickles and curry powder may also be employed. Gluten and graham bread go best with the filling containing mayonnaise.

Yellow Tomato Salad.—Here is a very blithe dish for the outdoor tea, for, artistically arranged, the golden vegetables are as pretty as a bouquet. Choose the small, bright egg tomatoes, scald, peel carefully, chill and arrange in a pointed pyramid on tender lettuce leaves on a yellow or green dish. Pour over them French dressing or add a pat of mayonnaise when serving each plate.



A boiled egg which dries quickly on the shell when taken from the saucepan is fresh.

When the color has been taken out of silks by fruit stains, ammonia will usually restore it.

Fine old lace can be made to look like new if laid away in dry starch for several hours and then hung on the clothes line on a sunny day for a short time.

"To feed pared apple to the baby," says a woman, "run a white tape or cord through the apple and hang the cord around baby's neck. The apple cannot get away."

Gold rings, brooches and other articles of jewelry that are set with precious stones can be cleaned with warm water, soap, a very little ammonia and a soft old tooth brush.

Stains can sometimes be removed from wall paper by an application of starch; while this always handy article makes a very good substitute for whitening when washing windows.

## New Idea in Teapots.

A strainer occupies one-half of the upper part of a new teapot and in this is placed the tea leaves. The pot is then set in its vertical position and the boiling water is poured in until the lower part is filled almost to the height of the bottom of the strainer. The pot is then tipped backward onto its back and in this horizontal position the water floods the strainer and is impregnated with the tea. When the infusion is thought to be sufficient, the pot is again righted, this action separating the tea from the tea leaves.—Popular Mechanics.

## Economy Cake.

When a cake has been a failure on account of being too rich, do not throw out, but take one-half cupful of sugar, one small tablespoonful of butter, one egg, and two cupfuls of milk. Break cake up in small pieces and stir all thoroughly until smooth. To one cup of flour add one heaping teaspoonful of baking powder and flavor to taste. This is especially good as nut cake.

# Gossip of Washington

What Is Going On at the National Capital.

## Lost Money Orders Worth Millions



WASHINGTON.—A Washington woman discovered some days ago that her German nurse was destroying the money orders she purchased to remit to the Fatherland. She had torn up within the last five years more than \$500 of money orders, thinking they were receipts for the money deposited in the office at Washington and that the money had been duly sent to her old mother in Germany.

This incident recalls the fact that there has accumulated in the national treasury millions of dollars, possibly ten millions, since the establishment of the present system in 1864. The government assumes the role of trustee for the safe transfer of money from one individual to another, and the protection is nearly perfect, yet Uncle Sam cannot always remedy the carelessness or ignorance of persons buying money orders.

An official, speaking of the system, said: "This vast accumulation of money is steadily being augmented from year to year, and unless the peo-

ple become better acquainted with the character of a money order transaction the accumulated sum promises to become almost fabulous. This money has accumulated through no fault of the United States. The system is perfect and instructions are clear and ample.

"For one thing it is known that persons purchasing money orders ignorantly destroy them, believing that the order constitutes nothing more than a receipt. Many persons also are in the habit of purchasing money orders before travelling from one place to another, with a view of converting them into cash as needed, and these are lost through carelessness, by fire, etc.

"It also frequently happens that orders are sent to wrong addresses, and after repeated attempts on the part of the postoffice department to find the payee or remitter, are sent to the department, together with advices, as unpaid.

"In one instance a claim for the payment of a lost postal note was allowed 25 years after it became invalid. It will be seen that as trustee for its citizens in the transfer of private funds the United States exercises diligence in an attempt to find the rightful owner. And yet millions are still outstanding for which claimants will never appear. This vast sum is held in suspense by the government."

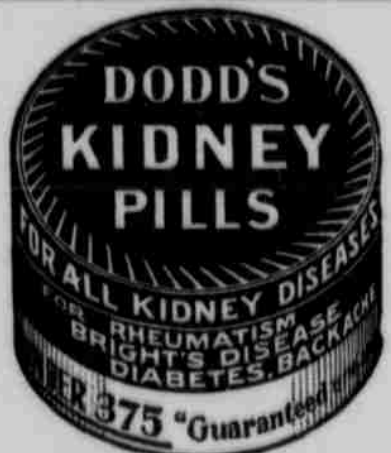

## When Uncle Sam Has an Auction Sale



THE number of going, going, gone sales which the government conducts ought to qualify Uncle Sam for admission to the guild of auctioneers. These sales are the real thing, too, red flag and all.

The tourist in Washington gets a shock when he is passing the back of the department of agriculture building these days and sees a big red flag with the usual white letters sewed on: "Auction To-day." He wonders if the government is restoring to desperate means of raising the wind.

But your Uncle Sam is not in the auction business from necessity. The agriculture sales are explained in this way. Whenever an invoice of any article of food arrives from abroad a certain number of packages are taken by the government for examination to see whether the article complies with

our food laws.

For instance, olive oil, Maraschino cherries, wine, sardines, mushrooms, French peas, preserves and jams—in fact all imported food articles—come under this regulation. But though the government requires half a dozen packages to be turned over to it for inspection—in order to avoid the chance of a single one being fixed up and slipped off upon them—the analysis rarely goes beyond the contents of one specimen out of the six.

So that of each consignment of six cans of olive oil, six bottle of cherries or of champagne or six cans of sardines, five remain untouched. If graft were really as prevalent as the muck-rakers would have us believe the entire six packages would probably be opened and a nip taken from each one, while the rest of the contents would be appropriated as a legitimate perquisite of office (by the heads of the department).

Instead of that, five out of six of the articles received for analysis under the law are sold at these auctions behind the department building. The receipts go into the exchequer of the bureau.

## Disaster to Japanese Editor's Chin



LACK of mastery of the English language led to the loss of a carefully cultivated beard which graced the chin of S. Zumoto, editor of the Japan Times of Tokyo and a member of the commercial commission visiting this country. Mr. Zumoto visited the barber shop in the hotel at which he is a guest.

"I would like to be shaved," he said,

in halting English. "Not altogether, but conservatively."

He carried his vandyke as he spoke. The barber, a taciturn workman, said nothing, but tucked the towels and aprons and other articles of his trade in and around the Japanese editor's neck. Then he began.

Americans in the shop were startled when they heard a flow of what probably was strong language in Japanese. The barber had encroached on the Japanese imperial, with the result that nearly half of it fell beneath his keen blade before the customer could protest. It was necessary then to cut it all off.

Members of the Japanese party enjoyed the situation. M. Zumoto declined to see it in a humorous light.



### Statehood Expressions.

There is one very good thing about the proposed statehood bill and that is that it will insist upon the constitution of the new state containing a clause making it obligatory upon the people to select state and county officers who can read and write the English language.—Roswell Record.

Statehood, we are gently informed, may possibly be postponed until after the 1910 census just to be sure that any people live down here. After that it will probably be broken with equal kindness by the powers that be, that it will be better to wait until after the 1920 census and make assurance doubly sure. Same old chimera.—Second Fiddle Albuquerque Journal.

In a strong and interesting editorial, the Tribune-Citizen discussed the statehood proposition, taking the ground that the action of the new governor will have much to do in securing the passage of the bill. But why? Haven't we been told from one end of the territory to the other that we have a delegate in congress who "does things?" Have not we heard it from the stumps and from the house-tops that if we would send him there that he would pull statehood out of his vest pocket and hand it to us immediately upon the convening of congress? Then why try to give the honor to Judge Mills, who has promised us nothing and is therefore under no obligations to us? Surely the Tribune-Citizen forgets that we have a delegate in congress, and that he has promised us everything on earth that we want.—Lakewood Progress.

The Tribune-Citizen has not forgotten. In fact, it remembers too well that we have the same delegate there now that has been there before.—Tribune-Citizen.

### What is Whisky?

President Taft, according to a dispatch dated Dec. 26, issued the following verdict Sunday: "If it is made of grain, looks good, smells good, and tastes good, it is good; but if composed of molasses and neutral spirits, though it has all the above qualifications it is not whisky, in spite of the contrary opinion of Chemist Wiley, Attorney-General Bonaparte and Theodore Roosevelt." However, President Taft declares that some whisky is better than other whisky; that straight whisky, aged in charred wood, is the best; that rectified whisky, aged in wood, also, for a time, is better than whisky not thus aged; and that, therefore, the kind of whisky contained in a bottle should be stated on its label. Accordingly, henceforth, there will be four principal classes of whisky:

1. Straight whisky, aged in wood.
2. Whisky made from rectified spirits.
3. Whisky made from redistilled spirits.
4. Whisky made from neutral spirits.

The makers of these classes of

whisky will have to advertise the truth on their bottles. Mixtures of the one kind with another or others, under this decision, can be called "blend."
