A Shooting Affray at Corona.

Word reached here Tuesday of a shooting affair on a ranch, distant from the town of Corona about four miles, in which deputy sheriff McAdams is supposed to be fatally wounded. About 20 shots were fired from rifles and six-shooters and the wonder is how it wasn't worse. Ill feelings is said to have existed between McAdams and J. C. Trapp for a long time, and their grievances have been tried in the precinct courts of the county more than once. At the time of the shooting Trapp had a suit pending against McAdams for \$25,000 for false arrest and imprisonment and was himself under bonds for carrying a six-shooter. Trapp is, or has been at some time an unordained "Campbellite" preacher and while never accused of being a "bad man," was, for some reason, unpopular in the community. After the shooting, the man who accompanied McAdams to the Trapp homestead, hastened back to Corona for reinforcements, and when he returned the Trapps had left on horseback. It was learned later that they went to Roswell and surrendered.

The following account is taken from the El Paso Herald:

Shot through the abdomen in a duel against three armed men, deputy sheriff W. J. McAdams of Corona was brought to El Paso and placed in Providence hospital in a critical condition. McAdams went to the home of J. C. Trapp, who lives four miles from Corona Tuesday afternoon to notify him to appear in a bond case. Before McAdams had a chance to tell his business Trapp and his two sons opened fire on him. McAdams was struck in the abdomen and fell. He managed to roll behind a wood-pile and returned the fire. Richardson, who accompanied McAdams, was also fired upon but escaped by hiding behind a hay stack.

McAdams was operated on by Dr. M. O. Wright and Dr. H. W. Hardy of Corona, who accompanied him to El Paso. The man's condition is reported critical by Dr. Wright with only a bare chance of recovery.

McAdams has a wife and nine children living in Corona. From the appearance of the wounds the shots that took effect had been fired from a revolver. Malcom

Trapp, according to McAdams, used a pistol, the father and the younger son using rifles.

A Narrow Escape.

A run-away accident occurred on the Bonito last week which might have ended fatally but for a mother's love for her offspring. It appears that J. F. Greer and wife with their four children were going to visit some friends in a hack to which was hitched a pair of mules. The four little girls were placed in the hack, the father returned to the house for some article which he had overlooked, when the mules started to run away. The mother grabbed the lines and was dragged for a distance of a hundred yards, and it is more than probable that all would have been killed had the mules gone fifty yards further. The screams of mother and children brought the father to the door, who quickly drew a pistol and with a well placed shot dropped one of the mules. The children were not injured, but the mother who had held tenaciously to the lines was cut and bruised, and her clothing was tightly wound around the hub of the hack and had to be cut into pieces in order to extricate her. The mule does not appear to be much the worse, although carrying a 45 caliber bullet in his skull.

Found Dying in His Cabin.

Word reached us this week that an old man named Sykes, who has lived for about twenty-seven years at the mouth of the south fork of the Bonito was found in a dying condition in his cabin about the first of the year. He had not been seen for some time, and his neighbors becoming uneasy about him, notified Justice of the Peace Robinson. They forced the door open, and found the old man lying on his bed almost speechless and apparently in a dying condition. Everything possible was done for him, and the following day he was still living, although very weak. It is not believed he can pull through, as he is well past sixty years. Those who ever fished on the Bonito will remember the old man. He was a native of Turkey, and was familiarly called the Turk.

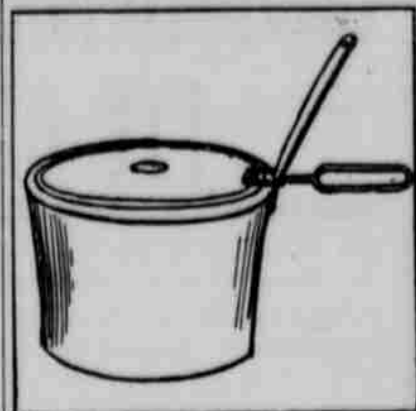

HOLDS LID FIRMLY IN PLACE

If This Device Is Used There Is No Danger of Its Rolling Off Sauce-pan to Stove or Floor.

Cooks will vouch for the annoyance to which they are subjected by the lids of pots and pans falling off those receptacles to the stove or floor. To correct this an Ohio man has invented a lid holder for cooking vessels which insures the lid staying in position. In the first place, the lid in his design is hinged and does not set on loosely. In addition to this it has a handle, independent of the pot handle. If it



is desired to lift the lid all that need be done is to depress this handle, which is shown in the cut below the handle of the pot. Let go and the lid drops back into place. When the contents of a stewpan or boiler are cooking busily, it is no joke to lift the lid off and set it properly in place again with the steam arising against the hand. Consequently, an attachment which permits the cook to stand at a safe distance and open the pot is a welcome one. The handle is of open twisted wire and does not heat up like a solid piece of metal would.

The Home.

If any one has trouble with custards wheying add a pinch of soda before pouring into the cups.

Then have in the closet a can of plum pudding that can be quickly heated and a hot sauce made in a few minutes.

It is a great comfort to always keep in the house a dark fruit cake, wrapped in a wax paper and hidden away from the children, to be relied upon in case of the unexpected guest.

When planning for the elderdown carriage robe buy a half yard extra and turn it up and bind it like a pocket to slip the baby's feet in, and thus keep out the wind on all sides.

A sprinkling of salt along the slats of all wooden beds and a layer of yellow soap rubbed across the slats and on ends of the side pieces will keep all wandering life from coming near.

Those who live in the country can often earn quite a little by gathering the more delicate Christmas greens and vines and berries and sending them to be sold at the nearest town.

Southern Corn Bread.

Sift flour and cornmeal together, stir in sugar and salt, then the butter; beat eggs thoroughly, then add them with the milk, add baking powder last; stir well and bake in gem pans.

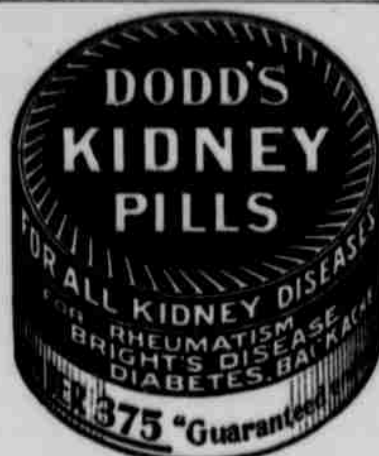

BOILER EXPLODES AS TRAIN SPEEDS

FIREMAN IS KILLED AND ENGINEER BADLY HURT ON LAKE SHORE.

CHILDREN IN GREAT PERIL

Several Little Boys and Girls Have Narrow Escapes in a Spectacular Railway Accident in Ohio.

Cleveland.—One man was instantly killed and another probably fatally injured when the boiler of Lake Shore engine No. 5948 exploded just east of Geneva while the train was running at a high rate of speed. Fireman A. E. Crawford of Collinwood, met instant death in the explosion. Engineer Harry Braymer of Erie, was badly scalded by the escaping steam and water. He was taken to the General Emergency hospital in Geneva, where his injuries were pronounced serious. Both men were hurled as though from a catapult from the cab of the engine when the crown sheet let go without an instant's warning. Crawford was

thrown 50 feet from the track. His death was instantaneous.

Five little girls and two boys living in Geneva narrowly escaped death by the flying fragments of the boiler as they were walking along the track near the speeding train. Several of them were hurled to the ground by the force of the explosion. All were covered with soot and grime as the engine fled past them. Had they been closer to the train death or serious injury to all of them must have resulted. Several of the children heroically rushed to the aid of the injured engineer, who was thrown near them.

Railroad officials said the explosion must have been caused by low water in the boiler. They say inspection of the engine before it left Erie showed it to be in good condition for the run to Collinwood.

When the crown sheet let go with tremendous force, the train, which was a west bound freight, was running about 40 miles an hour. Not an instant's warning was given the engine crew. Engineer Braymer was hurled bodily through the cab window at which he sat. Fireman Crawford's body shot through the space between

cab and tender and landed against the fence of the railroad right-of-way. The train ran its length before the lack of steam brought it to a standstill. There was no derailment.

Engineer Braymer was picked up in a semi-conscious condition. His clothing from his waist down was literally burned from his body and limbs. He was apparently delirious and begged for water and to be at once taken to a hospital. He once broke away from those who had gone to his assistance and started to run. He fell unconscious before he could go far and was taken to the hospital in a carriage summoned to his aid. There it was said he had but a bare chance of recovery.

A brakeman riding on the tender of the engine escaped with a few bruises. He was hurled to the coal on which he was standing, but managed to keep from being thrown from the train. Fireman Crawford, the man who met instant death, came from Emlenton, Pa., but made his home at Collinwood, the end of his run. The crew left Erie in the morning for the run to Collinwood. The fireman's body was covered with burns. He had been literally scalded to death.

POSED AS MAN EIGHT YEARS

Maude Allen, Young Mulatto Posing as Boy, Graduates and Is Made Teacher—Better Chance.

Baltimore, Md. — After masquerading as a young man for eight years because she believed it would give her better chances for advancement in the world, Maude Allen, alias "James Allen," a bright young mulatto woman, has been arrested for wearing male attire. As a girl in her teens she passed at the head of her class in a boys' school, and as a young woman in trousers she became a teacher in the public schools at Baltimore.

"I got through school in three years, graduating at the head of my class. I was appointed a teacher at the Brooklyn school and several months ago transferred to school No. 106 in this city. I see no reason as to why I should not be allowed to dress as I please. I am surely not different from the majority of other members of my race. I should not be hampered."

Never once was the sex of the young "man" who daily sat at the desk in a public school, suspected.

Electric Drugs.

Forcing drugs into the system along the path of an electric current is a novel form of treatment for skin diseases, which is now being extensively used at St. Bartholomew's hospital, London, Eng.

First introduced by Prof. Leduc of Paris in 1903, it has only recently emerged from its experimental stages. The treatment consists of passing an electric current through the diseased part, one of the electrodes being covered with a pad soaked in a solution containing a drug or chemical. The electricity breaks up the solution into "ions," which penetrate the tissue cells along with the current.

The disease for which ionic medication has proved most successful so far, according to Dr. Lewis Jones, is rodent ulcer—treated with zinc ions. Here a pad of lint soaked in a one per cent. solution of zinc sulphate is placed over the ulcer. A zinc electrode padded with lint, also soaked in the solution and connected with the positive pole of an ordinary continuous current battery, is then applied over this. The current is applied for ten or 15 minutes at a time.

As the process is sometimes painful the part may be first cocaineized by ionisation, a one per cent. of cocaine hydrochloride being applied and the current passed for a few minutes.

Boy's Essay on Clothing.

Here is an extract from an essay, written by a boy in a London school: "Clothing is an article which everybody should wear. The least of this article is worn by savages or natives, which is a piece of cloth or a few leaves or feathers round the waist. In cold countries, same as Eskimos, the people wear more clothes than we do, count of the icy cold out there. They can skate all the year round, except about one thaw there is in summer. If they walked about like natives they would catch cold directly and die of bronchitis. We put clothes on which are nearly like our bodies, some have caps, coats and trousers, but women and girls wear hats and frocks to tell who they are."

The Cost of Politics.

In his reminiscences of Grover Cleveland, George F. Parker tells a story concerning prodigal expenditures in politics. A rich man who had been nibbling at the Democratic nomination for governor of New York asked William C. Whitney's advice. This is the advice: "Of course, you ought to run! Make your preliminary canvass, and when you have put in \$200,000 you will have become so much interested in it that you will feel like going ahead and spending some money."

Purchasing Power.

A young gentleman of our acquaintance, who had just reached the age of six, was recently waiting with his mother for a train at a railway station, when he noticed a penny-in-the-slot weighing machine. He asked his mother a great many questions about it, and at last received permission to drop in his penny and be weighed. Having obtained that important information, he said: "How much would I have weighed, mamma, if I had dropped in a dollar?"

Compulsory Vaccination.

Editor News:

Dear Sir:—Having read your circular letter from the Superintendent of Public Instruction, defining the duties of school boards and teachers, as touching the "vaccinating law," and as I am a director in precinct No. 15, of Lincoln county, I would like to have a chance to express my views on the question through your paper.

I have no desire to pose as a "kicker," but sometimes forbearance ceases to be a virtue, and to my mind the unconditional enforcement of the vaccination law is the limit. I am always willing to abide by the will of the majority, especially in all things reasonable. However, I am confident the majority of the people in the territory are opposed to the unconditional enforcement of such a law. I have not talked with a single person that favors it, and for my part I consider it one of the most brazen pieces of petit graft I have ever met with. Our public school has been the common prey for the book and furniture trusts. But now the medical trust comes in for its share.

When the people are held up for double the value of books by the book trust, they can put on a few more dollars for books and a few dollars less for clothing and food for their children. But when they are commanded to "cause their children to pass through the fire to molach," I think it time to call a halt. If the vaccination law had been submitted to a vote of the people in each school district, it would have had one redeeming feature about it, that is a trace of democracy. As it is, it bears on its very face the blossoms of graft and no doubt the bill was fathered by medical interests of the territory.

It is clear to be seen that if vaccination is a preventative of smallpox, that it may be applied by each individual, regardless of the action of his neighbor, which is not the case with typhoid, measles, scarlet fever and other contagious diseases.

Now I would not make any vigorous kick about the fee that is charged for vaccination, I will donate that sum to the medical fraternity, if they will have the law repealed. But when it comes to demanding a general round-up of our children to be branded by the Right Honorable Mr. Dr., at so much a head, I think it time to call a halt and ask in the spirit that characterizes the western man, "Where does individual rights come in?" That is paternalism with a vengeance. The

next thing in order will be for our representatives up at Santa Fe (who appear to be using sweet bread for brains) to do will be to pass a law compelling us to adopt some of their favorite brands of breakfast foods, and to make monthly reports to the Board of Health, showing a certificate from the manufacturer of said breakfast food, certifying to the fact that we have bought so much of the food.

I am not making any fight on the medical fraternity, I don't blame them for coming in for their part, seeing we are as "sheep, dumb before our shears, so we open not our mouths," we are so easy it is hard to tell whether we are objects of pity or contempt. It is said of the ass, that in the country, where they run wild, that when assailed by an enemy they will put their heads together and their heels out and kick the enemy to death, but we common people usually do the reverse, put our heels together and our heads out and kick ourselves to death.

As for my part, I serve notice here and now, that I will not take any steps to have my children

vaccinated or use my position as school director to have others do so, and so far as the public school is concerned, if it must become the prey of every graft, from the book trust to the medical grave diggers, I can have them taught at home, where they can learn at least as much sense as the wild ass.

FOR THE DESSERT

LONG LIST OF MOST APPETIZING DAINTIES.

Suitable for Grownups and Children
Alike—Gingered Peas Among the
Best—Approved Method of
Making Apple Pudding.

Fig Puffs.—One and one-half cups of flour, two teaspoonfuls baking powder, one-half teaspoonful salt, one tablespoonful butter, 1½ cups milk, one egg, thoroughly beaten, two-thirds cup figs, chopped and dredged with flour. Bake in a moderate oven.

Brownies.—One cup sugar, one-half cup butter, two-thirds cup flour, two squares Baker's chocolate, two eggs, one-half cup chopped nut meats, one teaspoonful vanilla. Melt chocolate and butter together, add sugar and eggs, then flour, nuts and vanilla. Bake from twenty to thirty minutes in medium oven. Don't bake too long, but when they feel a little firm on top take out. Cut when first taken from oven, while in pan, in squares.

Sponge Cake.—Three eggs, beaten light, 1½ cups sugar (sifted), one cup flour, with one teaspoonful baking powder, one-half cup cold water, one cup flour, flavored with lemon. Beat all together with egg beater, which you can do until last cup of flour is added. Bake in moderately hot oven.

Five-Minute Cake.—Sift into dish as follows: One and one-half cups flour, one cup granulated sugar, two teaspoonfuls baking powder, salt and flavoring. Put in large coffee cup three tablespoonfuls melted butter, two eggs and fill with milk. Add to flour mixture and beat five minutes.

Spice Cake.—One and one-half cups sugar, one cup butter, three cups flour, two eggs, one cup milk, one teaspoonful soda, about one pound raisins or currants and sliced citron, one teaspoonful allspice and a little salt.

Apple Pudding.—Slice four large apples very thin. Beat one-half cup of sugar and one scant half-cup of butter together, until creamy. Add the beaten yolks of two eggs. Mix with the sliced apples and bake until the apples are softened, then add the beaten whites of the eggs with two tablespoons of sugar beaten with them. Return to the oven and brown slowly. Very nice.

Gingered Pear.—Pare and core hard pears sufficient to weigh eight pounds. Chop in the chopping tray until they are coarse, about the size of dice. To eight pounds fruit add six pounds sugar. Put in a preserving bottle and let stand over night. In the morning quite a sirup will have formed. Place over the fire, and add three-quarters of a pound of dry preserved ginger. The square cut ginger is usually the cheapest and is good. If the larger pieces are used it should be cut fine. Cook slowly several hours. When fairly cooked add the juice of three lemons, and a little of the thinly pared yellow rind. Cook until the sirup is thick and of a dark amber color. When cold seal in small glass jars or jelly tumblers. Remove the juices of lemon rind. The late hard pears make the best preserves. This must be stirred often in cooking, as it scorches readily.

Baked Bananas.

Fill a baking dish with bananas, which have been peeled, cut in halves, lengthwise and crosswise. To one banana allow two tablespoons of water, one-half cup sugar, one teaspoon of melted butter, one of lemon juice and a few grains of salt. Bake often and cook slowly a half an hour, or till the bananas are red and sirup thick. Serve very hot.

Dutch Cabbage.

Slice one small red cabbage as for slaw. Wash and put in to boil with six tart apples, pared and quartered, and one-quarter pound of fat salt pork. Cover with boiling water, boil one and one-half hours. Drain, remove pork and serve.

The Fez a Necessity.

All through the markets of every Turkish city and village are little shops where the fez can be pressed and ironed for a few cents. At his prayers a Moslem could not use a hat with a brim, as his head must press the prayer rug a certain number of times during each prayer. As the head must be covered at all times, a fez or some other brimless covering must be used.
