HEARST TROPHY

Returned to its Law-
ful Place.

A Mandatory Injunction

Brings the cup Home, Where
it Will Remain, for it is
Owned by Eddy
County.

All manner of argument and persuasion have stood for naught with the Artesia people in regard to the rightful possession of the much talked of Hearst trophy cup which was awarded to Eddy county at the recent irrigation congress at Albuquerque. The still small voice of District Judge Pope, however, had much to do toward the cup's sudden appearance from its mysterious hiding place. It had been absolutely lost, according to statements made by those who were presumed to know of its whereabouts, but repeated inquiries only drew the veil of mystery closer, and the cup was on the verge of passing into oblivion in so far as Carlsbad was concerned. Last Monday evening this highly prized, greatly coveted and much contested cup arrived in Carlsbad in the care and custody of one R. D. Ferson who registers from the town of Artesia.

It will be remembered that at the sixteenth annual irrigation congress, which was held at Albuquerque, N. M. one year ago last October, this aforesaid silver cup was offered by our esteemed fellow countryman, Wm. Randolph Hearst, of New York City, for the best county exhibit displayed at the congress. Eddy county entered the contest and the exhibit was made from produce contributed from the agricultural districts of Carlsbad, Artesia and Hope. It was an exhibit that would have been a credit to any county in the United States at any of the world's fairs ever held and when the awards were made the committee having the matter in charge, naturally awarded the prize to Eddy county. Each district had a representative from its section of the country present and when the cup was presented to them, they, by mutual agreement among themselves, without the approval of the Commercial clubs from their respective towns, decided that as all had an interest in the cup, that the said cup should be held for a given time and then passed on to the next, each, in turn, holding it three months. All went well until the cup fell into the hands of the Ishmaelites of Artesia. They immediately reinstated the old common law statute that possession is nine points in the law and they immediately claimed title to the cup. They were allowed possession of it for the time agreed upon, at the expiration of which time Carlsbad asked for it and the representatives of the latter named town were politely informed "where to get off" and with that a controversy arose.

Considerable correspondence has passed between the commercial clubs of the two towns and all manner of inducements from tear stained pleadings to threats and challenges of every description proved of no avail, the cup reposed peacefully in its solitary seclusion.

The correspondence which is now on file in the office of the secretary of the Carlsbad Commercial club shows that Mr. Feemster stated last fall that he had the cup in his possession and fully expected to keep it and he did keep it until the recent order of the court brought him face to face with the county jail when his "bluff" failed him and he threw down his hand. Several letters from the more con-

scientious citizens of Artesia, who were disposed to do what was right as per the original agreement, state that they believe Carlsbad is rightfully entitled to the cup but as the cup was in the possession of Feemster and as they had not the power to dispossess him of it it would be a matter of legal process to obtain it. As stated above one brief but pointed communication from His Honor, Judge Pope, was all that was necessary. In the vernacular of the cowboys Mr. Feemster hurried and "came across." Had he retained possession of the cup in the name of Artesia his position would have been less ridiculous, but to claim his individual right, title and interest to the cup surpasseth all understanding.

One year after the award had been made when the Territorial Firemen's Tournament was held in Carlsbad a letter was written to Mr. Feemster asking for the cup that it might be exhibited in Carlsbad at that time. His pompous declaration that he would not consent to releasing possession of it until the board of county commissioners would first rescind their action demanding its delivery and also make a statement disclaiming any authority in regard to its disposal or ownership, received a death blow by an injunction proceedings filed in the district court.

Some few days since Captain E. P. Bujac, the newly appointed chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, took the matter in hand and through the board procured the adoption of a resolution authorizing him to file in the district court of Eddy county a complaint against in the form of a mandatory injunction issuing against E. J. Feemster for the possession of the cup and for its delivery to the Board of County Commissioners. The court after hearing the case ordered that the cup be delivered to the clerk of the court at Carlsbad within the next five days or the party not so doing would be held in contempt of the court. Pursuant to the order of the said court, at the hour of the fifth day R. D. Ferson, bearing the court's challenge, costly, contested and coveted cup safely under his arm walked into the office of Deputy Clerk G. E. Benson and to him delivered the cup. The final hearing of the case will be called at the next term of the district court in this city, at which time the court will determine who shall be the rightful trustees or guardians of the cup which was presented to Eddy county as a whole and not to any one section thereof.

COMMISSIONERS REPLY

To the Statements Made by F. G. Tracy in an "Open Letter" to the Commissioners

Facts and Figures Galore

Not Unsupported Statements, but Record Evidence

On motion of Beeman and seconded by Graham, the following, concerning the Tracy letter was adopted, Beeman and Graham voting for the adoption.

"An Open Letter," under date of February 5th, signed by Francis G. Tracy, having been called to the attention of the Board and the same being read and considered, the Board finds as follows:

1. That said letter contains nothing of fact with which the Board is not already familiar, and that such letter cannot assist the Board to any useful purpose in its future deliberations.

2. That equalized assessments are demanded by the tax-paying public, and said letter does not commend itself as being in sympathy with this idea, or with the present-day reform in that respect.

Therefore, further official notice shall not be given said letter but members of the Board are at liberty to make such individual comment as they may desire.

CONCERNING TAXATION.

The Tracy Letter—Beeman and Graham's Retraction (?)

After formal action on the "Tracy Letter" by the Board of County Commissioners, Mr. Beeman and Mr. Graham hand the press the following signed statement:

We have no inclination to become involved in a newspaper controversy as a result of any action we may have taken when acting in our official capacity as members of the Board of County Commissioners, but an "Open Letter" under date of Feb. 5th, signed by Francis G. Tracy, and published in the Carlsbad papers is of such a character, that ordinary self-respect would require one to respond to it.

The Board, as we understand it, had no quarrel with Mr. Tracy and has certainly undertaken no controversy with him. As individual members of the Board, we are always open to suggestions as to any course of action and are always glad to advise with well-informed and unselfish persons with regard to county affairs. There must come a time, however, when it becomes the duty of any deliberative body to make up its mind and place itself of record. When we, as a part of the Board, have done so, it was not out of disrespect either to Mr. Tracy's ability or willingness to advise us, but with his contentions fully considered, that we sometimes have decided the issues contrary to his wishes. But Mr. Tracy is persistent. He states in his letter that he was denied a hear-

ing before the commissioners. The fact is that Mr. Tracy had appeared before the Board, both in person and by counsel, a number of times before the commissioners took the action complained of. The interests he represents have an energetic advocate. In his letter of the 5th inst., he continues to advise the Board of its duty. In so far as we are concerned, this latter is voluntary and gratuitous. The issues have been made up.

That Mr. Tracy should state, in effect, that the Board's ruling with regard to the lands in question was because of the domination of one member of the Board, is an insult to the other two members, but if Mr. Tracy would resort to this kind of buncombe in order to carry a coveted point, he is doubtless entitled to whatever capital he may achieve. He says Beeman induced Graham to sign the statement to Attorney General Clancy. This both untrue and absurd. If such an impeachment were true neither of us would be worthy the confidence of any self-respecting person in Eddy county. It but shows the desperate straits to which a man, careless of the reputation of his neighbor, will resort in his attempt to carry a point.

Mr. Tracy takes umbrage to himself and others because of the letter to Attorney General Clancy. No one except himself, self-conscious and sensitive as he appears, could so have misconstrued that letter. It is a principle we have sought to deal with and not individuals. As we view it, Mr. Tracy has ex-

Official Paper of Eddy County.

There seems to be some inclination among democrats in certain parts of the territory to agree with republicans to hold a non-partisan constitutional convention. Can such democrats give any reason for such a hybrid? What good would it do to accept the republican offer? If republicans are afraid to make a constitution why not let democrats make it? Then if such a convention were held and the constitution made and it proved unsatisfactory what would republicans say? Oh, we were in no wise responsible, it was those pesky democrats. There can be nothing gained with an alliance with republicans and much may be lost. Let the constitution be democratic and if not democratic let it be as democratic as it can be.

The sale of the steers west of the Pecos in Eddy county to the amount of about \$100,000 reminds again of the fact that Carlsbad is a stockman's town. Its resources have always been derived from the stock interests which if removed could never be replaced by farmers. While the irrigated lands are well worthy all that is said about them the live stock is entirely overlooked until, as is the case some seasons when a quarter of a million is brought to the town from the sale of live stock and live stock products.

E. P. Bujac, the newly appointed chairman of the board of county commissioners, has determined to give Eddy county a business administration such as it has never had, and while he has instituted several propositions which will add greatly to the convenience and comfort of the citizens of the county, he has safeguarded the funds of the county in such a manner that the additional cost to the tax payer will not be one iota more.

Captain A. R. Lenau who has one of the finest dry farms above the canal has recently planted, or set out a large acreage of orchard and this week installed a new gasoline engine for irrigation purposes. He has his land in fine condition and is an enthusiast on the subject of dry farming. He is a constant worker and the success of his efforts are eagerly watched by others who are hopeful of the best of success both for the captain and also themselves.

Sometime the right man lands in the right place even in county affairs. Such seems to be the case of J. J. Bealls who has been re-appointed by the county commissioners to succeed himself as road supervisor in the first district of Eddy county. Mr. Bealls faithfully and conscientiously performed his work through the past year filling his contract at a loss to himself, having taken the work on a contract and by his faithful performance of the agreement has been rewarded by being re-appointed for the coming season at a slightly advanced salary. He kept the roads and culverts of the county in better repair than they have been for years and he has also succeeded in obtaining a larger percentage of the Mexican labor worked than has been worked for years past. He has just completed the task of removing the loose stones from the road leading into town from the south which is certainly ap-

preciated by the residents of the lower valley. Virtue hath its own reward for road supervisors as well as newspaper editors.

The spring term of the district court will convene in this city Monday April, fourth. Several interesting cases will be called for a hearing at that time. There are two or three murder cases on the docket.

A. M. Hove and P. J. McShane of Loving were sent to El Paso this week for the purpose of extending an invitation to Supervising Engineer Hill and District Engineer Reed to visit the Carlsbad Project and meet with the water users for the purpose of discussing ways and means of meeting the payment which will become delinquent after March thirty-first.

Death of Mrs. C. B. Watrous.

News of the death of Mrs. C. B. Watrous, Monday evening, February 21, brought grief to a large circle of friends. Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. P. Hanson, of Urbana, Illinois, and sister of Mrs. C. M. Richards, of Carlsbad, she had, during the year she and Mr. Watrous lived here, endeared herself to all who knew her.

Ida Hanson was born January 23, 1884, at Villa Grove, Illinois. Reared in a large family she grew to womanhood, developing a most winning, sweet personality. She was a girl whose beauty and charm made friends wherever she went. Her education was received in Urbana, at the University of Illinois.

In the winter of 1904-5 she visited Carlsbad, the guest of her sister. Few of the young women who have visited our town have made as many friends as she made during the few months spent here. She was one of the most popular members of the charming circle of girls who formed the Visitors Club. Those acquainted were interested to hear of her marriage, August 6, 1906, to Mr. Christopher Beach Watrous. After their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Watrous made their home in Minneapolis.

Bravely and smilingly she fought tuberculosis, always bright and cheerful, sunny and unselfish. Her husband built for her a bungalow after plans she made and here, with him and her mother and father, she spent the strength that was left to her.

A few days ago her brothers, S. J. and Earl Hanson, of Oklahoma City, joined the family. Surrounded by these dear ones she quietly fell asleep Monday evening, going so gently that the watchers knew not when she "crossed the bar."

Mr. Watrous, accompanied by her parents and brothers, left Wednesday morning, taking the body to Villa Grove, for burial. Besides the brothers mentioned and the sister, Mrs. C. M. Mail Route to the Plains.

The government has advertised for bids for a mail line to run from Carlsbad to Lovington by way of Monument and Knowles leaving Carlsbad Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 7 a m arriving at Lovington at 7 p m and leaving Lovington at 7 a m Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays arriving in Carlsbad at seven p. m. The distance is given as 108 miles. The contract is to be let April 22 for four years and service will commence July 1st.

Otis Farmers Club.

The Otis Farmers club held a most interesting meeting at the Otis school house last Tuesday evening. A large number of both men and women were present. W. R. Hegler gave a very instructive and entertaining talk on "Pure Bred Chickens and How to Procure Winter Eggs." Mr. Hegler is an enthusiastic and practical poultry man and his suggestions were highly appreciated and they will doubtless help fill the Otis egg baskets next winter. J. C. Keith discussed the methods of preserving the farmers supplies of meats both winter and summer. He fully demonstrated the folly of farmers paying high prices for packing house products, when he could with so little outlay provide himself with the products of the farm. He clearly illustrated the point of how saving money was as beneficial to the farmer as making money. His talk was replete with sound common sense and will doubtless bear much fruit in the future. Cantaloupe growing was the subject next taken up by the meeting. The contract between the Melon Growers Association of the Carlsbad Project and the Wood commission house of Chicago was read and discussed. Pledges were received for some forty acres of cantaloupes to be planted this coming season. A committee composed of Messrs. J. C. Keith, F. E. Bryant and A. A. Masters was appointed to complete the list. The club then adjourned to meet again in two weeks at the same place.

The Farmers Institute of Eddy county will hold its regular meeting at Malaga, next Saturday. A most interesting program has been arranged. An all day basket picnic is also the program with a good musical accompaniment. Everybody in Eddy county is earnestly requested to attend.

Tom Pope who has had a force of men installing concrete head-gates in the laterals down the valley has completed the work in the first district and this week moved with his outfit to the lower valley. The new gates are a decided improvement over the old frame structures and aside from being everlasting gives a bearing to the project which will inspire the confidence of every person who sees them. The entire project is now in first class shape for the first run of water which will be made within the next two weeks.

By order of the county commissioners new voting precincts have been established at Lovington and Roberts on the plains east of Carlsbad and also at Lovington south of Carlsbad on the railroad.

Association, who was also an officer of the Pecos Irrigation Company, for a statement of the amount of land owned by the Pecos Irrigation Company on March 1, 1909, and also the amount owned at the time the information was given (Dec., 1909). His reply disclosed the fact that approximately 1800 acres had been sold since March 1st up to that time.

We have made a partial examination of the records in the office of the Probate Clerk and Recorder and it appears that the Pecos Irrigation Company lands sold at from \$40 to \$60 per acre as stated in our former letter. These records are always open to public inspection.

On the whole as between Mr. Tracy's unsupported word and the records, we prefer the records.

Unfortunately taxes are high, but we do not believe in throwing the whole burden upon the hard-working farmers and permitting the large land companies to evade their share.

We trust that the above facts justify the position we have taken. We will adhere to it unless overruled by the courts.
