Commissioners Session

A Lively and Interesting one
With Much Business.

\$4,000 More for Roads

Three More Bridges and Three
new Precincts.

BE IT REMEMBERED, that on this 29th day of January, A. D. 1910, in pursuance of an adjournment had January 25th, the Board of County Commissioners met in adjourned session at which the following members were present: Chairman, E. P. Bujac; Joe H. Graham, Commissioner from District No. 2; C. W. Beeman, Commissioner from District No. 3, and A. R. O'Quinn, Clerk.

It was moved and carried that J. E. Lavery be appointed Scale Inspector.

Moved and carried that the Clerk be ordered to draw warrant for the purchase of a copy of the Compiled Laws for the Justice of the Peace at Monument.

Upon motion duly carried the Board adjourned until February 21st.

BE IT REMEMBERED, That on this 21st day of February, 1910, an adjournment meeting of the Board of County Commissioners of Eddy County, was held in pursuance of an adjournment had January 29th, 1910. Members present: E. P. Bujac, Chairman; Joe H. Graham, Commissioner from District No. 2; C. W. Beeman, Commissioner from District No. 3.

The matter of the construction of the bridge between Dayton and Artesia over the Pecos River and between Artesia and Hope across Eagle Draw and the repairs on the bridge over the Pecos River at La Huerta was taken up. The Midland Bridge Company presented three plans which for the purpose of identification were marked "Exhibit A, B, and C." After due consideration and discussion it was moved and carried that said plans be adopted and that the different bidders be allowed to make their figures from said plans. There being 7 bridge builders as advertised, and all of the 7 bidders having presented their bids and they having been opened, and it having been found that the Midland Bridge Company made the lowest bid, it was moved and carried that said Midland Bridge Company's bid be accepted. Said bid was as follows:

For the Eagle Draw bridge, plan "B" \$2250.00; for the Pecos River bridge, plan "B" \$4950.00; for the La Huerta bridge, plan "B" \$3850.00. Bids for extra concrete at the Carlsbad bridge was \$7.00 per cubic yard and the Eagle Draw bridge \$9.00 per cubic yard, and for the Pecos bridge \$8.00 per cubic yard.

It was moved and carried that the following order be passed:

WHEREAS, the contemplated construction of the bridges over the Eagle Draw and Pecos River and the repairs of the La Huerta bridge over the Pecos River, all in Eddy County, New Mexico, were duly advertised for plans and bids, and

WHEREAS, the plans of the Midland Bridge Company of Kansas City, Mo., were accepted according to Exhibits A, B, and C, and according to bids marked thereon, and

WHEREAS, bids were received in accordance with said advertisement according to the figures shown in Exhibit "B" and

WHEREAS, the said Midland Bridge Company submitted the best and cheapest bids, now, therefore, upon motion of Mr. Beeman seconded by Mr. Graham, the contract for the construction of the said Eagle Draw and Pecos River bridge and repairs on the La Huerta bridge are hereby awarded to the said Midland Bridge Company according to their bids as per figures shown in Exhibit "B" as per plans marked A, B, and C.

It was moved and carried that the following order be made:

WHEREAS, there is now in the Treasurer's hands funds arising from taxes levied to cover the Lincoln County indebtedness sinking fund and the court house and jail indebtedness and sinking fund, and the general special fund which indebtedness has been paid, and

WHEREAS, no debts exist against said county for these above mentioned funds, and the funds are not needed for that purpose, it is therefore ordered by the Board that all moneys in said funds be divided between the three road districts of said county after the one third has been deducted as provided by law for the general school fund, in compliance with Section 1, Chapter 57 of the Laws of 1907.

On motion of Mr. Beeman, seconded by Mr. Graham, the following concerning the Tracy letter was adopted: An open letter under date of Feb. 5th, 1909, signed by Francis G. Tracy having been called to the attention of the Board, and same being read and considered, the Board finds as follows: That said letter contains nothing of fact with which the Board is not already familiar, and that said letter cannot assist the Board to any useful purpose in its future deliberations.

Second, That equalized assessments are demanded by the tax paying public and said letter does not commend itself as being in sympathy with this idea, or with the present day reform in that respect. Therefore, further official notice will not be given said letter but the members of the Board are at liberty to make such individual

comment as they desire.

A petition from J. W. Creighton & Son of Lovington, N. M., having been presented requesting permission to construct and operate a local telephone system in and about the town of Lovington, it was moved and carried that said petition be granted.

A petition having been presented signed by 59 freeholders requesting that a voting and Justice of the Peace precinct be created at Loving, requesting that the said precinct be composed of the following territory, to-wit: All of Township 23, S. Range 28 E.; all of Tp. 23 S. Range 29; all of Tp. 23 S. Range 30 and the S. half of Tp. 23 Range 27, and making the place of voting the town of Loving. It was moved and carried that said petition be granted, and an election ordered by the Chairman and Clerk of this Board to be held Saturday, March 19th, and the following were appointed as Judges of such election, to-wit: W. E. Ball, R. E. Tucker and John Nymeyer.

The following Proclamation was ordered:

WHEREAS, on the 21st day of Feb. A. D. 1910, the Board of County Commissioners of Eddy County created a Justice of the Peace and voting precinct embraced in the following described territory, to-wit: The S. half of Tp. 23, Range 27; all of Tp. 23, Range 28; all of Tp. 23, Range 29; and

WHEREAS, said Board ordered an election to be held in said voting precinct No. 11, on the 19th day of March, 1910, for the election of a Justice of the Peace and Constable for said precinct. The undersigned was ordered and directed by said Board to make proclamation of said election in the manner and form required by law.

Now, therefore, we hereby proclaim an election to be held in the Loving voting precinct No. 11 at the town of Loving within the territory above described, at a place to be designated by the officers. The election appointed by said Board to be held on the 19th day of March, 1910, for the purpose of electing one Justice of the Peace and one Constable to hold office for the remainder of the present term, or until their successors shall have been elected and qualified. Qualification of voters shall be the same as provided by law for voters in general election in this territory, but no registration shall be necessary or required. The judges appointed to hold such election

shall be as follows: W. E. Ball, R. E. Tucker and John Nymeyer.

A petition having been presented requesting the establishment of a voting and Justice of the Peace precinct at Eunice, N. M., it not having the required number of signers, it was moved and carried that the petition be returned, and that the Clerk be instructed to request the petitioners to get the required number of signers.

The returns from the Lovington Justice of the Peace election, which was called on Feb. 16th, having not arrived, it was moved and carried that this Board adjourn until Feb. 23rd, at which time it will canvass the vote from said election.

BE IT REMEMBERED, That on this 23rd day of Feb. A. D. 1910, an adjournment meeting was held in pursuance of an adjournment had Feb. 21st, with members present as before. E. P. Bujac, Chairman; Joe H. Graham, Commissioner from District No. 2; C. W. Beeman, Commissioner from District No. 3, and A. R. O'Quinn, Clerk.

A canvass of the vote from the Lovington precinct No. 10 was made and

of this Board and J. J. Beals for Mr. Beal's service as road supervisor for the remainder of the year 1910 was discussed, and upon motion made and duly carried, said contract was approved and ordered filed with the road papers said contracting and agreement to pay the said Mr. Beal \$1000.00 per year, said J. J. Beal agreeing and obligating himself to furnish one wagon, two horses and harness, and to work same continuously and himself exclusively each work day in the year 1910. Mr. Beal's bond was presented and upon motion duly carried and approved.

J. F. Kerr presented a butcher's bond for \$1000.00 to conduct a butcher and slaughter business at Knowles, and same was approved.

There having been several new school districts opened up during the year 1909, and the Board having acted upon the advice of the Deputy District Attorney, O'Brien, in paying the surveyor for surveying out these new school districts and it having ordered warrants drawn against new school districts in each case, and the Board having been presented with a ruling from the Attorney General and the present District Attorney that the manner of paying for such work was erroneous and that it should have come out of the general county fund, it was moved and carried that the Board instruct the Clerk and Chairman of this Board to draw warrants against the general fund to replace the amount drawn from the new school districts funds.

It was moved and carried that the following resolutions be passed:

WHEREAS, Coffin & Crawford of Chicago, have made demand on the Treasurer of this county for interest on the bridge bonds from January 1st, 1909, when this county was not in possession of the money arising from the sale of such bonds until six months later, and

WHEREAS, this Board is of the opinion that this county should not pay interest on said bonds until the money was turned over to the county, and the Treasurer having requested this Board to make a ruling, it is ordered by this Board that the matter rest at the present time, and that information regarding the matter be furnished the District Attorney requested to make a ruling on the matter as soon as possible, and the Treasurer is hereby ordered to act upon the ruling of said District Attorney.

Mr. O. W. Beals having made the lowest bid for hauling dirt for the approaches to the La Huerta and the Green street bridges, said bid being 23 cents a yard for dirt on the Green street bridge and 21 3/4 a yard for dirt on the La Huerta bridge, it was moved and carried that the contract be awarded to Mr. Beals and the Chairman of this Board be empowered to enter into an agreement to levy a tax that will amount to \$1968.78 to cover the expense of said work. There being no further business the Board adjourned until Monday, Feb. 25th.

BE IT REMEMBERED, That on this 24th day of February, A. D. 1910, at a meeting of the Board of County Commissioners held in pursuance to an adjournment had Feb. 23rd, at which members were present as before, Chairman E. P. Bujac, Joe H. Graham, Commissioner from District No. 2, C. W. Beeman, Commissioner from District No. 3, and A. R. O'Quinn, Clerk.

It was moved by Graham and seconded by Beeman—and carried—that the Assessor of Eddy county is hereby instructed to assess all property, real estate and mixed, at the rate of 25 per cent of its real value for the year 1910. The Board spent the day in discussing tax matters.

The contract and bond entered into between the Chairman of this Board and Mr. O. W. Beals for the hauling of the La Huerta and Green street bridges was presented, and upon motion duly carried was approved and Clerk ordered to file same.

James M. Wood, Justice of the Peace of precinct No. 4, having presented his resignation, it was moved and carried that said resignation be accepted and that Mr. J. W. Deaton, of Lakewood, N. M., be appointed to fill the unexpired term of said Justice of the Peace in precinct No. 4.

There being no further business the Board adjourned until Thursday, Mar. 24th, 1910.

I hereby present my name to the voters of Eddy County as a candidate for re-election to the office of Assessor of Eddy County, subject to the will of the democracy as expressed in the primaries. Your support is solicited.

The announcement of W. W. O'Neal for the office of Assessor was a surprise to many, for Billy had refused the requests of his friends so persistently that many felt it would be impossible to induce him to accept the nomination even if tendered by the primaries. However, at the very earnest solicitation of very many enthusiastic supporters he finally consented to run. Billy, for by that name he is familiarly known, came to New Mexico sixteen years ago and worked with a cow outfit for a season, then returned to Texas, finally coming back nine years ago. He was for eight years foreman of the Plains Pool, the combination of cattle owners who ran stock in common on the plains of Eddy county, and no other ever gave the general satisfaction he did in that very "touchy" and difficult position. To come out with the respect and esteem of all his fellows was remarkable to say the least. During the past few years he has been engaged in the cattle business for himself, and is still connected with the work, though he has taken up a 320 acre homestead that he is improving. He was born and brought up in Texas, and received a good education, and is fully competent as well as obliging. He writes an excellent hand and is accurate as an accountant. If he is elected he will make as good an assessor as Eddy county ever had, and far superior to many.

An authentic rumor relative to the daylight train between this city and Roswell confirms the statement made some time ago that the train would be put on soon. It is probable that the train will be started within the next thirty days and that it will be in the form of another local freight which will give a freight service on the north end of the road daily instead of tri-weekly. It will be an accommodation train, and will carry local passengers the same as the local does at this time. The division of the freight between the two trains will lighten the work of each and a better schedule will be maintained. The trains will, in all probability, leave Roswell early in the morning and reach Carlsbad before dinner time, and returning, leave Carlsbad in time to reach Roswell about supper time. Even though somewhat slower than regular passenger train service, the daily service will be greatly appreciated by the citizens of the valley who transact business in the towns along the line as well as the army of traveling salesmen who now required to remain twenty-four hours in each town or make drives some distance in order to "make" more than one town. This great inconvenience in railroad service has prevented many salesmen from visiting the towns in the lower valley. Its convenience will be appreciated by the local merchants, also, as they will receive freight shipments every day instead of every forty-eight hours.

The cow-men are busying themselves preparing to leave for the work which is to begin within the next few days. Some expect to leave next week.

John W. Price, the present Assessor, announces in this issue for re-election to the office he has at present. He is a young man of sterling worth and ability who was elected two years ago in the three cornered fight between J. O. McKeen, D. N. Harkey and himself. He was a resident of Artesia when elected, but has made his home in Carlsbad since. He was born in Fate Texas, twenty-seven years ago. He received a good common school education and graduated from the Fate Texas high school in 1900. He was married in 1905 in Artesia to Miss Florence Robertson, who was formerly of Denton county Texas. He came here directly from Chickasha, Okla., where he was manager for a big mercantile Co. After coming here he went to drilling wells and after to shipping horses, in the pursuit of which he was crippled for life while shipping out from Hagerman. Mr. Price has made a good assessor and has many friends all over the county.

Many of the cowmen who have been spending the winter at their homes in this city are preparing to leave within the next few days for the range to begin the "work." They will be ready to start out following trails before the last of the month and then round-ups will be in vogue for the early weeks of spring. A large number of cattle have been contracted for sale and delivery from this place between the first of May and the middle of June, and the work of gathering them will be a difficult one but always the cow-boys delight. The "tarp," the "chuck wagon" and the wild and daring riding and the excitement and danger incident thereto has a fascination about it which appeals strongly to those who have experienced it.

The flow of water for the coming season was turned into the canal last Friday evening and came down as far as town by daylight Saturday morning. Only a small flow has been turned into the canal at present, giving it an opportunity to soak up and fill in all crevices around the various headgates before a stronger run of water is made. Only a slight demand has been made for water by the farmers, to date, as many of them have not prepared their ditches and headgates for the coming season. There is an abundance of water in the reservoirs, and as the season opens and the work progresses it is probable that a stronger flow will be run down the canal this coming summer than there ever has been since the government assumed control.

At a meeting of the city council to be held next Monday evening contracts for the construction of \$750 square feet of concrete sidewalks will be let. According to a recent ruling made by Judge Pope the cost of construction can be assessed against the abutting property. Where the owners of the property refuse to pay, the walks will be ordered laid and the cost assessed to the property and in a short time the few gaps in the walks will be closed and Carlsbad can then reassert her claim to having more miles of good concrete sidewalks than any other town of its size in the southwest.

Last week a petition was circulated by Capt. Bujac and W. G. Woerner requesting the following citizens to accept the offices of Mayor and Trustees for the coming term: C. H. McLanthen, Mayor; and the following for Trustees: R. M. Thorne, C. R. Brice, W. S. Jolly and G. M. Cooke. The petition received about 150 signatures, which exceeds the number of votes ever cast in Carlsbad since 1893, the first election. The chances are at present that there will be little or no opposition to the ticket, for the town offices are generally of much worry and work to those who are already overburdened with the affairs of business.

A H. Kent, of Dayton, was in the city the early part of the week transacting business. He reports the country in the northern part of the county as filling up rapidly with new comers and that many new wells are being steadily drilled and satisfactory flows of water being brought in.

Little drops of water on the scorching sand makes it worth the money and puts it in demand. Two six hour per day water rights in the community ditch, at Hope, sold last Saturday at the court house for \$4350, or \$2175 each. Under the arrangement at Hope the water rights are not appurtenant to the real estate, but are transferable separate therefrom. The sale was made by C. M. Richards special master in chancery in the matter of the estate of G. B. Bell, deceased. The water rights were purchased by W. J. Teavor, of Hope, who also purchased one hundred and sixty acres of land for \$700.

It is rumored that a certain real estate firm in this city has placed an order for five more automobiles to be used in the transaction of their business. The use of these machines have proven their worth in economy of time and are being universally adopted by all leading firms who convey large numbers of prospectors to the various parts of the county.

A law suit in which more than the usual number of people are interested will be filed in the district court of this county next Tuesday. The case will be brought for the purpose of enforcing the city ordinance passed some time ago requiring the property owners to pay for watering the trees in front of their property.

CARLSBAD PROJECT PROBLEMS

Shareholders Meet With Engineer Reed.

A Thorough Understanding

Reached With Government Officials. Payments Will be Met.

District Engineer, W. M. Reed of the Reclamation Service, with headquarters in El Paso, spent a few days in this city the latter part of last week and met with the Board of Directors of the Pecos Water Users Association in the office of the secretary, last Friday.

The meeting was for the purpose of discussing the matter of delinquency of some few of the water users who will be absolutely unable to pay their assessment by the thirty-first day of this month, the date set for the final payment.

After a thorough canvass of the shareholders under the project it was learned that only a very small per cent of the shareholders would be unable to meet their payments when due, and as it is the ruling of the department that those who are unable to meet their payments at this time shall have their water right annulled, and shall henceforward be debarred from reinstatement, under the project, it was determined by the board to make a final effort to procure some means whereby those who are totally unable to pay, to have the cancellation of their water right deferred, temporarily, giving them another opportunity to "make good."

Engineer Reed who has always shown a most friendly feeling for the shareholders of the project listened to the final appeal with an attentive ear. He stated most emphatically that those who are able to meet the payments must do so; that the amount had been fixed and as a great majority were able to meet the payments they would be expected to do so; the mere fact that the majority of them paid showed that in most instances the conditions were such that the charges as assessed were being met and also that the

payment by those who can and do pay will assist materially in affecting some satisfactory adjustment of the matter when viewed by the department. While he was unable to state what the attitude of the department would be in regard to the matter, he expressed, and also demonstrated, his unqualified friendship for all of the water users by, immediately after the adjournment of the session, sending a code message to the department, consisting of eighty-one words, which when translated was of great length, stating the exact situation here as he had found it. When seen by a representative of the Current relative to his message he stated that he had covered the ground completely in his message, and while he could not state what would be done in the matter, nor what would be even recommended, he, personally, felt confident that those few who were unable to pay by the latter part of this month would be able to do so shortly and he did not favor a cancellation of their water right promptly on that date.

He repeated again the importance of those paying who are able to, and that the coming season will in all probability be a successful one, and the payments in the future will be met with less difficulty. He thought that the farmers under the project would appreciate the fact that they must study the conditions, the climate, the soil and the use of the water closer, and by so doing with energy and industry reap in abundance where now they reap but a partial crop.

The shareholders have taken a philosophical view of the matter and those who are able to pay are willing to assist in every way possible those who find themselves unable to do so, and the great majority are coming to the front and planking down the amounts set opposite their names, and thereby perform the double mission of insuring water for themselves, for the coming year, and also helping to maintain the credit of the project, which will materially assist their delinquent brothers in retaining their water rights.

Mr. Reed, accompanied by L. E. Foster and W. H. Frankland left about five o'clock in an automobile on a tour of inspection to Lake Avalon and other points of the project.
