## A MILLION DOLLAR DEAL

**A Roswell Gas and Oil Company Acquires Extensive Holdings in Eddy County. Oil Fields.**

## DEVELOPMENT TO BEGIN SOON

Interest in the undeveloped oil field, which lies west and north of Carlsbad, has been frequently revived by drillers finding strong indications of oil in the wells which have been drilled for water in that section of the country, bordering on what is supposed to be the oil field, but not until this week has any well defined and tangible business proposition been closed which gives promise of resulting in an active development of the field.

W. C. Lawrence, of Roswell, transferred a lease conveying the right to three hundred and twenty acres of oil land to H. C. Hammond of Garden City, Kansas, who represents the Giant Oil and Gas Company, which now has extensive holdings in the territory which is supposed to be rich in oil.

The consideration in the deal was one million dollars.

It is probable that the new company, which has acquired the holdings, will soon put several rigs in the field and determine to an exact certainty the depth and quantity and quality of that much coveted commodity which furnishes the basic foundation for the largest and wealthiest corporation in the world, and which for strength openly defies the very government under which it was constituted.

### Otis Items.

The Otis Farmers Club met Tuesday night with the best attendance of any meeting during the season. Dr. Diefendorf gave a talk on alfalfa, showing that it was the crop of the valley and telling of an alfalfa field of 80 acres that yielded five tons per acre last year. The doctor just finished shipping two car loads of alfalfa, getting \$15.00 F. O. B. Otis.

Mr. Crandall gave an interesting talk on the uses of concrete on the farm.

He is an enthusiast and an expert on concrete. He has just put in some gates in his ditches that only cost outside of labor \$2.00 each.

Mr. Stauffer made a good talk on pigs. The opinion is that Otis people will raise pigs next year on alfalfa, alfalfa hay and green sorghum and finish off with kaffir corn.

The cantaloupe seed has arrived and is ready for distribution.

Mr. Warren has arrived from Artesia and will work Dr. Russell's farm that is being irrigated by centrifugal pump and electric motor.

The country home of Dr. L. F. Diefendorf has lately been remodeled, repainted and otherwise improved, which makes it one of the neat country homes of the valley. Mrs. Diefendorf has been visiting with her daughter in Aberdeen, South Dakota, for the past eight months, and her husband has arranged a clever surprise for her, upon her return, in the improvements of her home. She is expected to return to Carlsbad within a few days accompanied by her daughter, Mrs. H. J. Rock and children, who will remain in Carlsbad for the summer.

### Ordinance No. 101.

An Ordinance changing the names of certain streets in the town of Carlsbad, Eddy County, New Mexico.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the town of Carlsbad, Eddy County, New Mexico as follows:

Section 1. That the streets of the town of Carlsbad, New Mexico, running north and south therein, now and heretofore named Main Street, Canyon Street, Canal Street, Halagueno Street, Alameda Street, Gaudaloupe Street, Mesquite Street, Lake Street and Mesa Street, respectively, be, and they hereby are, re-named as follows, to wit:—The street heretofore known as Main Street is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as "Eastern Avenue"; the street now named Canyon Street is hereby named and shall hereafter be known as "Central Avenue"; the street heretofore known as Canal Street is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as "Western Avenue"; the street heretofore known as Halagueno Street is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as "Church Street"; the street heretofore known as Alameda Street, is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as "Park Avenue"; the street heretofore known as Gaudaloupe Street is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as "Washington Avenue"; the street heretofore known as Mesquite Street is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as "Grand Avenue".

Section 2: The names of the streets of said town of Carlsbad, running east and west therein are hereby abolished, and said east and west streets are hereby named and shall hereafter be known and designated as follows: What is now known as Lea Street is hereby named First Street; what is now known as Bronson Street is hereby named as Second Street; what is now known as Tansill Street is hereby named Third Street; what is now known as Greene Street is hereby named Fourth Street; what is now known as Fox Street is hereby named Fifth Street; what is now known as Mermod Street is hereby named Sixth Street; what is now known as Stevens Street, is hereby named Seventh Street; what is now known as Shaw Street is hereby named Eighth Street; what is now known as McKay Street is hereby named Ninth Street; what is now known as Hagerman Street is hereby named Tenth Street; what is now known as Bonbright Street is hereby named Eleventh Street; what is now known as Lucky Street is hereby named Twelfth Street; what is now known as Church Street is hereby named Thirteenth Street; what is now known as Blodgett Street, is hereby named Fourteenth Street; and what is now known as Pierce Street, is hereby named Fifteenth street.

Section 3. All other streets in said town of Carlsbad, shall remain named as now named.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage and publication as required by law, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

An unusually large number of civil cases are to be presented at the next term of the district court which will convene in this city next week.

With Cannon at the right of them, and Cannon at the left of them, the insurgents, reinforced by democrats of the house, made a valiant charge this week and won the fight, by thunder!

The fact that the civil docket for the coming term of court is much longer than usual, is no reason for supposing that the citizens of the county are becoming more "fussy" than usual, but it is an indication that there are many more people in the county than heretofore.

The work and expense of connecting your property with the sewer is a drop in the bucket compared to the benefit derived therefrom to you, individually, to your neighbors, and to the town in general. It makes your own property more sightly, it removes the foul odors and best of all destroys the breeding place for germs and disease of every description.

The peach blooms on the great majority of the trees are now in full blast, and the fruit is well formed. An orchardist stated this week that it would require a hard freeze to kill the fruit after ten days from this time. Provided the valley is not visited by a freezing cold rain for a few days the prospect is most promising for one of the finest fruit crops known in the history of the country, as the acreage of all kinds of fruit has been greatly increased within the past few years.

The change of names of all the streets of Carlsbad effectually obliterates the last remaining vestige of the old guard who first laid out and planned the town, naming it Eddy, from the president and christening each street running east and west from the name of some stockholder in the Pecos Valley Town Company, which corporation purchased the land and laid out the town. The present plan of numbers from south to north and names without reference to persons seems more in keeping with the latest ideas on the subject, as it is the plan generally in use now and will probably meet with public favor.

There has been considerable uneasiness among some of the water users under the Carlsbad Project concerning the matter of payment of the first installment due the government in payment of the loan of \$600,000 made to the farmers. Quite a few of those who have resided upon their lands for the longest are unable to meet the assessment and must borrow or stand to lose their water rights, and this will certainly be the case with those who farm by proxy. It is of the utmost importance that all who can, pay every cent possible even sooner than March 31, so the cash will be in the hands of the receiver of the U. S. Land Office at Roswell on the day set for its receipt by the government. This may lead to some plan whereby a few unfortunate old settlers may be protected.

Eliminating personal interests from the cases which have been recently occupying the attention of the court of this district, relative to the rights of the cattle and sheep men to the free and unrestricted use of the public domain, a general feeling of satisfaction and justice is enjoyed by those familiar with the cases in regard to the decision as handed down. That an individual is entitled to the benefits derived from the expenditure of his capital for improvements in wells and other artificial watering places, is undisputed, but the right to graze stock upon the public domain should not be restricted to the few larger interests nor should it be controlled by a few under a local or personal agreement, to the jeopardy of all comers. As the settlements encroach upon the free range let each stockman share, proportionately, the loss; for it is only a question of a short time, comparatively, until the farmers will have usurped the entire range of the south-west. For the protection of the homesteaders and the cattle interests there should be some better manner of handling the government lands and the four section homestead arrangement is probably the best for the arid west.

We have always maintained the supremacy of our merchants but we are impressed when we learn that parties come from other towns to trade here. Only this week parties came from Artesia to trade with Mr. May for no other reason than that they can get better prices. It pays to be an up-to-date merchant.—Lake Arthur Thimes.

You bet, partner, the live wire is the boy that gets the grapes. The town that contains such a man is in luck, for it requires only a few days to learn where goods are sold at the closest margin of profit.

The fireless cooker craze has struck Carlsbad with a vengeance. Twelve of these household necessities arrived in Carlsbad last week, and another club is now being organized for the purpose of procuring twelve more from a house which offers special inducements to the housewives making up the club. A protest is being prepared by the fuel merchants of the town and the dispensers of gasoline stoves and ranges.

The Western Union telegraph operator, at the depot, has received the new blanks for the new night letter rate which was recently made effective by the Western Union Telegraph Co. The new rate is, in substance, that a night message consisting of 50 words can be sent at the same rate, to a given point, as a day message consisting of ten words. There is also the usual provision for a nominal charge for each word exceeding the maximum of the fifty word rate. This is a generous provision made by the company, and one which will be keenly appreciated by the public.

An innovation in the form of a foreign missionary service was held at the Lyric theater, last Sunday evening, conducted by Rev. W. R. Evans, pastor of the Methodist Church. Scenes in many of the foreign countries where the mission work is being conducted were exhibited to a large and attentive congregation. The use of the machine for the reproduction of the pictures was very kindly tendered by Mr. Robb, proprietor of the Lyric. Many persons were unable to gain admission on account of the large attendance.

L. A. Swigart who is one of the largest sheep growers on the plains stated this week that a good shower of rain fell on the plains country in the neighborhood of Lovington and further south, last Saturday, which will be of great benefit to the stockmen of that section. While his range is farther north than the

section visited, he said that in all probability it would be followed by more showers which, although local in their nature, would reach over the country generally. He is not a tender foot, either.

County Treasurer W. H. Merchant received a large consignment of trees of various kinds which he has had planted on his farm located about three and one-half miles south of town. He already has fine young orchards established which are irrigated from a well and which gives flattering promise of being one of the finest young orchards in this part of the county.

The performance entitled "The Old Clothes Man" as rendered in the High School Auditorium last Friday evening was one of the best of its kind to be given in Carlsbad this season. A large and appreciative audience was in attendance. About twenty dollars was added to the high school auditorium fund.

Teams are busy hauling the sand to be used in the construction of the concrete culverts which will be built across the new roadway being made between the city and Lake Avalon. This driveway will be constructed in a most thorough manner and will, when completed, resemble as up-to-date boulevard as seen in the cities. It will be graded and leveled and lined on either side with trees which will make it a popular driveway for automobiles and vehicles of every description. It is to Capt. Bujac the present chairman of the board of County commissioners that the thanks of the community is due as the work will be done at no extra expense to the tax payers of the county.

Last Saturday was a busy day in Carlsbad. A large number of the farmers of the valley were in town doing their shopping. The stores were all busy and the streets presents a lively appearance. It was reported as being the best Saturday for business experienced by the merchants, in a long time. The custom of making Saturday a shopping day is a good one and is generally observed by the farmers in most all sections of the country. It affords the opportunity of getting together, exchanging ideas and results in much mutual benefit. It generally adopted by the farmers of the valley much good would doubtless result both to the farmers as well as to the merchants and citizens of the town.

## Ordinance No. 100.

AN ORDINANCE to prohibit Chickens, Turkeys, Ducks, Geese, Guinea and other fowls from running at large within the corporate limits of the town of Carlsbad, and to provide the punishment for so doing.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the town of Carlsbad, Eddy County, New Mexico, as follows:

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to permit chickens, turkeys, ducks, geese, guinea and other fowls to run at large within the corporate limits of the town of Carlsbad; and the owners or those who are in charge or control of such fowls are hereby required to keep the same within enclosures, securely, so as to prevent such fowls from destroying lawns, gardens or other like improvements within the limits of the town of Carlsbad.

SECTION 2. Any person, firm or corporation who shall permit any fowl of the description mentioned in Section 1 of this ordinance, owned by them or under their charge or control to run at large within the limits of said town of Carlsbad after the passage of this ordinance, and after notice by any person that such fowls are disturbing any such person, or destroying property, shall, upon conviction before the proper court, be fined in a sum not less than three dollars nor more than fifteen dollars, or by imprisonment in the town prison or county jail not to exceed ten days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court trying the cause.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect upon the completion of legal publication, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

The above ordinance was proposed by the Board of Trustees of the town of Carlsbad, New Mexico at its meeting on the 14th day of March, 1910, read for the first time and ordered published once in the Carlsbad Current.
