MERRY SCRAP

Promised Over Benefit for "Little Minnie."

MONEY WILL NOT RETURNED OVER

To Dr. Lukens on Ground he Refused to Allow Statement to be Published.

CLOTHES BOUGHT FOR CHILD FIGURE IN CASE

A merry little war is promised as a result of the refusal of Mrs. J. H. Robinson and Ben Digneo, in charge of the benefit dance in Colombo hall some time ago for "Little Minnie," the crippled girl at Dr. Lukens home, to turn over the money to Dr. Lukens. Mrs. Robinson said this morning that the money would be turned over to the non-Sectarian Benevolent association.

According to Mrs. Robinson, the money, \$58 in all, was offered to Dr. Lukens some time ago, but the latter refused to permit a statement to be made in the paper to the effect that the money was turned over. Mr. Digneo said that when the money was ready to be turned over, as soon as all the tickets were in, Dr. Lukens refused to permit the fact to be published and that he insisted on such a statement so that the public would know where the money for the dance went.

Another feature of the situation is the statement of Mrs. Robinson that Dr. Lukens refused to accept clothes for "Little Minnie," saying that they were too large and that the money should have been turned over to him to buy garments.

"Mrs. Miller and I went to the home two Sundays ago," said Mrs. Robinson, "and we found Minnie poorly clad. We asked the nurse if she had any clothes and the nurse said that she had not, and that she was working on a calico dress. We told her we would get the clothes and we paid \$7.80 to buy her some dresses, etc., and sent them up to the home. When Dr. Lukens found this out he called me up and asked whether the clothes were a private donation or were bought out of part of the benefit money. I told him the benefit money was for Minnie and I thought this would be a good way to spend a little of it. Dr. Lukens told me he would not accept them under the circumstances, that they were too large anyway, and Minnie had plenty of clothes to last while she was in the home.

"I don't know why the money was not turned over to me. I know what she needs," he said.

"I told him I would make over the dress to fit. He said we would do just as we pleased about the clothes. He said the ministers advised him not to take money raised by a dance. I told him he had nothing to do with that—that it was all done on our part for Minnie.

"I have written to the address given as the mother of Minnie several times, as have other women, intending to have her see that the money went for the child, but never received an answer."

Mr. Digneo said this morning that he saw the officers of the Benevolent society and that they

would be able to make good use of the \$51.20 remaining, and the money would be turned over to the society.

"We are doing this because Dr. Lukens refused to allow us to make a statement in the papers that he received the money," said Mr. Digneo. "Dr. Lukens flatly refused to permit such a statement."—Albuquerque Tribune Citizen.

McLENATHEN FOR MAYOR

Thorne, Brice, Cooke and Jolly for Trustees, Harvey for Recorder, Carl Gordon for Marshal and Rives, Grantham and Harkey for School Board.

The Democrats of Carlsbad met at the court house Tuesday night on call of J. E. Laverty and elected C. N. Jones, secretary, and adopted the following resolutions, after which they elected J. E. Laverty chairman and J. B. Harvey secretary for the coming two years.

Whereas, by a petition signed by two hundred twenty legal voters of the town of Carlsbad to the effect that no political convention nominating a partisan ticket shall be held in Carls-

three years, John T. Rives for a term of two years, and D. R. Harkey for a term of one year.

Be it resolved by the democrats of Carlsbad in convention assembled that it hereby endorses and approves the good work of the present mayor and board of trustees of the town of Carlsbad and to commend them as one of the most faithful, energetic and capable boards that the town has ever had.

Be it further resolved that a copy hereof be sent to each member of the Board of Trustees and that a copy be published in the Carlsbad papers.

After the adoption of the above resolutions the democratic meeting adjourned and D. G. Grantham called the Citizen's Convention to order. After the election of Harry Christian for secretary the organization was made permanent and the following resolutions were by

RESOLUTION.

Mr. Chairman: Your committee on permanent organization recommends the following:

That this convention be known by the name of "The Citizens Convention" and that its ticket be styled "The Citizens Ticket." We further recommend that the following device be adopted as an emblem, to-wit: — We further recommend that the temporary organization be made permanent. We further recommend the following order of business:

1. The action on this committee's report.

2. Report of committee on credentials, unless otherwise ordered.

3. The election of officers in the following order, unless otherwise ordered.

(a) Mayor.

(b) Two trustees to serve for two years.

(c) Two trustees to serve for two years.

(d) Town recorder.

(e) Town marshal.

(f) Three members of the Board of Education of the town of Carlsbad; one to serve for one year, one for two years and one for three years, in the order named.

4. Miscellaneous business.

5. Adjourned.

Ordinance No. 100.

AN ORDINANCE to prohibit Chickens, Turkeys, Ducks, Geese, Guinea and other fowls from running at large within the corporate limits of the town of Carlsbad, and to provide the punishment for so doing.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the town of Carlsbad, Eddy county, New Mexico, as follows:

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to permit chickens, turkeys, ducks, geese, guinea and other fowls to run at large within the corporate limits of the town of Carlsbad; and the owners or those who are in charge or control of such fowls are hereby required to keep the same within enclosures, securely, so as to prevent such fowls from destroying lawns, gardens or other like improvements within the limits of the town of Carlsbad.

SECTION 2. Any person, firm or corporation who shall permit any fowl of the description mentioned in Section 1 of this ordinance, owned by them or under their charge or control to run at large within the limits of said town of Carlsbad after the passage of this ordinance, and after notice by any person that such fowls are disturbing any such person, or destroying property, shall, upon conviction before the proper court, be fined in a sum not less than three dollars nor more than fifteen dollars, or by imprisonment in the town prison or county jail not to exceed ten days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court trying the cause.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect upon the completion of legal publication, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

The above ordinance was proposed by the Board of Trustees of the town of Carlsbad, New Mexico at its meeting on the 14th day of March, 1910, read for the first time and ordered published once in the Carlsbad Current.
