COURT CONVENES

The April Term of the District Court Opened in Carlsbad Last Monday

SEVERAL IMPORTANT CASES TO BE TRIED

The Fifth Judicial District Court convened for the April term in this city last Monday morning presided over by Judge W. H. Pope, judge of this district and who was, also, recently appointed Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the Territory of New Mexico. The other officers of the court are S. I. Roberts, clerk; G. E. Benson deputy clerk; L. O. Fullen District Attorney, M. C. Stewart, sheriff and Longstreet Hull court reporter.

PROHIBS CLEAN ROSWELL.

Whole Temperance Ticket Carried With the Exception of One Alderman and One Member of the School Board.

Roswell, N. M., April 5.—The city election held today was in many respects the most remarkable in the history of the town, and from the figures just completed it appears that the prohibition wing of the democrats carried every ward in the city except one, and elected every candidate on their ticket except one alderman and one member of the board of education. This in face of the fact that J. S. Lea, the straight or wet democratic candidate, is perhaps the most popular man in the county and had the full support of the democratic organization.

It was unquestionably a victory of the dry democrats alone, as the republicans kept out of the matter as an organization, individual members of the party voting as they pleased, the struggle resolving itself into a struggle between the wet and dry factions of the democratic party.

The drys put through a whirlwind campaign under the direction of Mr. C. J. Hall, the California Wizard, and there were many spectacular features. There were nightly public meetings, sometimes two or three, and daily paper meetings in the churches, and all of the way through the W. C. T. U. the Woman's Club and the Ministerial Alliance were on the works. On election day hundreds of

The following petition was forwarded Delegate Andrews Monday of this week:

Whereas there is now pending before the committee on Ways and Means of the House of Representatives a Senate bill authorizing the issuance of evidences of indebtedness to the amount of thirty million dollars for the purpose of completing irrigation systems not yet completed, and

Whereas the Carlsbad Project is an incomplete system, and

Whereas the contract between the government of the United States and the Pecos Irrigation Company places upon the government the obligation to complete this system according to the original estimates, and

Whereas that water available is sufficient for a much larger system, and

Whereas, the fitness of the site for Reservoir No. 3 is easily shown, and

Whereas the Pecos Water Users' Association has developed the fact that the owners of sufficient additional lands are ready to subscribe for the water rights and

Whereas the experience of the past two years has demonstrated that the expense of keeping up the system on the present acreage is so great as to seriously threaten the success of the Project, and

Whereas the Senate Committee favored such extension, and

Whereas the completion of the Project in accordance with the original report of the Board of Engineers would greatly lessen the per acre expense, and

Whereas we have at all times and still believe that the government will complete the system in accordance with such agreement, and

Whereas the future success and prosperity of all the people residing under this project depends upon the completion of the Project by the admission of other lands,

Now, therefore, be it resolved, That we earnestly ask you to use your best efforts to secure the passage of such senate measure.

Just what happened to the fruit crop of this section of the valley last Monday night is still speculative. Some of the orchardists assert most positively that the fruit was all killed except where the system of smudging was successfully carried on while others state that on the uplands the fruit was practically uninjured. In La Huerta there is no doubt but that considerable damage was done to the fruit, especially the peach crop, and south of town, along the river bottom a large portion, if not all, was "nipped," but away from the river, in the dryer sections practically no damage resulted. The thermometer registered 23 degrees outside of the Tracy and McLanthen orchard, in La Huerta, while inside of the orchard where smudge pots were working the mercury reached a point as low as 28 degrees, only, and this morning no trace of frost effects of the freeze could be seen in the smudged district. The orchard consists of about fifty acres of bearing trees and was studded with about three thousand pots which were lighted about half past ten o'clock and kept burning until daylight. They were watched over by James Beverly, Tom McLanthen and Bryan Mudgett, assisted by Mr. Tracy. While the smudge pots have long since passed the experimental stage in California, and even in Colorado, they are being used here in this section of the valley for the first time this season, and upon their success depends whether or not they will become generally adopted by the other fruit growers of the valley. Many regret, already, that they deferred the purchase of the pots at the time McLanthen and Tracy ordered theirs. Next season will, in all probability, see every bearing orchard equipped with these not only useful but necessary fruit savers.

This is court week and the usual crowd of witnesses, jurors and hangers-on are held in "escrow" at the court house. Conversations bordering close on to heated arguments are held at all hours of the day on topics ranging from politics, strikes, cattle and aeroplanes to cooking and fancy work. MAJOR E. P. BUJAC, FIRST REGIMENT INFANTRY, N. M. N. G.
(By Our Staff Representative)
Carlsbad, N. M., March 31.—Captain E. P. Bujac, veteran of both the Spanish and Philippine wars, and up to this time the gallant commander of Co. B, First Regiment Infantry, New Mexico National Guard, stationed here, will hereafter wear a gold maple leaf on his shoulder straps as the commander of the Second Battalion, First Regiment Infantry. Although Captain Bujac will always perhaps be Captain Bujac, his military title will hereafter be officially written Major E. P. Bujac. Captain Bujac is now Major Bujac. He is one of the best officers in the entire New Mexico National Guard. On two occasions he has been in ranks as a high private, but both times he soon gained recognition and was made a non-commissioned officer and then a commissioned officer. He points with pride to his service as a corporal in the old Texas militia, as a member of Co. B, First Regiment Infantry, better known as the "Houston Light Guards," the famous Lone Star State organization that was awarded first prize at the Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia in 1876, and continued to take every first prize offered to a militia organization up to the Spanish War period.

When the Spanish war broke out Major Bujac was in Tennessee but he quickly shook the dust of old General Hickory Jackson's native heath from his feet, and went back to Houston. When the old "Houston Light Guards" was reorganized, Captain Bujac raised a company of his own in "Heavenly Houston" which was subsequently mustered in as Co. H, First Regiment Infantry, United States Volunteers. After the Spanish war his

he has recently been appointed the second time in a manner which will be a credit to himself, court, and the community represented.

The vote at Artesia in the town and school district election must be very consoling to such wind jammers as the New Mexican that have claimed that Artesia is republican and that a new county if formed would be republican. company was mustered out and he enlisted as a high private in the Thirty-third Regiment Infantry United States Volunteers, Col. L. R. Hare, commanding. He was quickly made a battalion sergeant major and then regimental sergeant major and as the senior non-commissioned officer of the Thirty-third commanded the band which was armed at the battle of San Jacinto. He was recommended for a commission for his conduct at San Jacinto, and was commissioned a second lieutenant. At Tuganad mountain he was in the thick of the fight and was recommended not only for a medal of honor for personal gallantry, but former President Theodore Roosevelt recommended him for the brevet rank of first lieutenant, which honor was conferred. The bill for the medal of honor is now pending before the United States Congress.

Following his service in the Philippine Islands, which after he was commissioned saw him largely as a commander of scouts, Major Bujac returned to Houston, coming to Carlsbad in 1903. On May 1, 1909 he was commissioned by Governor Curry as captain, commanding Co. B, First Regiment Infantry, Carlsbad and Co. C, First Regiment Infantry, Artesia, the other two companies having not as yet been assigned.

Major Bujac is a lawyer of sterling ability, a peerless orator, chairman of the board of commissioners of Eddy county and one of the best citizens to be found in the entire length and breadth of the great Pecos Valley.

Ordinance No. 101.

An Ordinance changing the names of certain streets in the town of Carlsbad, Eddy County, New Mexico.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the town of Carlsbad, Eddy County, New Mexico as follows:

Section 1. That the streets of the town of Carlsbad, New Mexico, running north and south thereon, now and here-tofore named Main Street, Canyon Street, Canal Street, Halaguense Street, Alameda Street, Gaudaloupe Street, Mesquite Street, Lake Street and Mesa Street, respectively, be, and they here-by are, re-named as follows, to-wit: The street heretofore known as Main Street is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as "Eastern Avenue"; the street now named Canyon Street is hereby named and shall hereafter be known as "Central Avenue"; the street heretofore known as Canal Street is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as "Western Avenue"; the street heretofore known as Halaguense Street is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as "Church Street"; the street heretofore known as Alameda Street is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as "Washington Avenue"; the street heretofore known as Mesquite Street is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as "Grand Avenue".

Section 2. The names of the streets of said town of Carlsbad, running east and west thereon are hereby abolished, and said east and west streets are hereby named and shall hereafter be known and designated as follows: What is now known as Lea Street is hereby named First Street; what is now known as Brown Street is hereby named Second Street; what is now known as Tansil Street is hereby named Third Street; what is now known as Greene Street is hereby named Fourth Street; what is now known as Fox Street is hereby named Fifth Street; what is now known as Mermud Street is hereby named Sixth Street; what is now known as Stevens Street, is hereby named Seventh Street; what is now known as Shaw Street is hereby named Eighth Street; what is now known as McKay Street is hereby named Ninth Street; what is now known as Hagerman Street is hereby named Tenth Street; what is now known as Bonbright Street is hereby named Eleventh Street; what is now known as Lucky Street is hereby named Twelfth Street; what is now known as Church Street is hereby named Thirteenth Street; what is now known as Blodgett Street, is hereby named Fourteenth Street; and what is now known as Pierce Street, is hereby named Fifteenth Street.

Section 3. All other streets in said town of Carlsbad, shall remain named as now named.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and

after its passage and publication as required by law, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

A CARLSBAD GENIUS

Charles M. Acree Patents Three Computing Machines Which are Wonderful in Makeup

COMPLICATED. YET SIMPLE AND ABSOLUTELY ACCURATE

The names of C. M. Acree and George W. Goss, both of Carlsbad, bid fair to become prominent among those handed down in history as being the inventors of three of the most remarkable computing machines ever made. The machines will, as soon as they are placed on the market in the various fields for which they are intended, dispense with many of the machines now in use and be readily recognized as an important factor in the markets and busy business centers of the country.

Mr. Acree, who is well known in Carlsbad and who has been for years one of the largest sheep growers and wool producers in the southwest, has been working on the machines for the past twelve months, assisted by Mr. Goss, who has been living at Oria, Texas, a small station on the Eastern Railway of New Mexico, located near the state line between this city and Pecos. They have perfected the machines and expect to have them on the market soon.

Briefly described they are as follows: One for computing interest is the largest and most complicated machine. It will be made of brass and steel. It will measure about 30 inches in length, 20 inches wide and 18 inches high and will weigh between 75 and 100 pounds. It has the appearance of being a solid mass of cog wheels. It is so constructed that it will instantly compute interest at any rate from three to twelve per cent, on any given principle from one dollar to one thousand and for any given time from one day to thirty or from one month to twelve. It will total as much as \$750 of interest at any rate according to the time indicated and will figure from \$5,000 as high as \$40,000.

Another machine is what he terms his tax computing machine or a stock company machine. It is made entirely of steel and measures 10x18x10 inches in size and will weigh only about 25 lbs. It computes from one-fourth of a mill up to any given per cent and on as many as thirty different accounts at the same time. The advantage of which will be seen at once by county treasurers who may have many different funds at different levies to figure in their business. For stock companies it will prove of inestimable worth as it will compute the earned dividends on as many as thirty shares of stock, of different amounts in a company having a capital stock ranging as high as \$200,000. For instance, dividends accruing on thirty different shares of stock, for thirty days time can be instantly computed and will show on the indicator by pressing a lever, all done in less time than the figures can be placed on paper to be figured in the usual manner.

The third machine he terms a cotton computer and is a small machine made in semi-circular form measuring about twenty inches wide and standing about six to ten inches high and will weigh about twenty-five pounds. The top consists of a brass dial, the same shape of the machine on which are figures representing amounts of weights ranging from one pound to 650 pounds. Revolving from the center of the arc, as a radius, will hang a finger, or lever, which when moved to any amount representing the given weight of a bale of cotton will produce on the indicator the value of the bale, in dollars and cents figured at any price per pound varying from three per
