COURT CASES CONTINUED FROM LAST WEEK

The Moore Brothers Being Tried for Killing Dobbins Near Monument.

A REMARKABLY INTELLIGENT JURY.

The following cases have been continued over the term:

Territory of New Mexico vs. Leander Mitchell, two counts, charged with larceny of sheep and receiving stolen property in one count and unlawfully killing sheep in the other.

Territory vs. Joe Mackey charged with larceny of a horse.

Territory vs. Milton Kornegay charged with assault.

Territory vs. E. D. Cameron charged with carrying a deadly weapon.

Territory vs. Jim Nelson, charged with assault and battery.

Territory vs. A. Miller charged with obtaining money under false pretenses.

In the case of the Rotan Grocery Co. vs. A. B. Gerrells a motion for judgment by default was over ruled by the court on the ground of improper service. The process which was served on the defendant not having been properly signed by the clerk.

W. C. Wilson charged with assault with a deadly weapon and unlawfully carrying a deadly weapon was arraigned in open court and plead not guilty. His case was set for today.

The case of E. A. Sweazea, charged with resisting an officer was set for hearing on Saturday April 16, tomorrow.

In Territory vs. Estauban Flores charged with unlawfully discharging a pistol and unlawfully carrying a deadly weapon was set for today.

Territory vs. Sylvestre Flores, charged with assault with a deadly weapon which is the case where the defendant struck another Mexican with a shovel while at work near the La Huerta bridge a few weeks ago. His case has been set for hearing tomorrow.

In the case of A. Norfleet vs. State National Bank a verdict was returned by the jury in favor of the defendant.

In a case brought for the purpose of procuring judgment and for the establishment of a lien and also for foreclosure brought by A. W. Reagle & Gibbons Crowder vs. Wylder & Gilday, a verdict was returned by the jury in favor of the plaintiffs.

In the particular suit brought by Adelphine Irebarne vs. Angeline Mackey, et al, a judgment for the plaintiff was found, returned and Messrs. M. D. Cullpepper, J. R. Yates and J. D. McBride were appointed by the court as commissioners to appraise the property and adjust a satisfactory division of the property in question.

The two cases of F. M. Duncan vs. Thomas B. Hunter alleging damages were continued until the next term of court.

The case of Hazel Davenport vs. E. F. Cooper which was appealed from a court of the justice of the peace was set for hearing for Monday April 18.

Juan Pablo Rameriz, charged with assault upon his wife was arraigned in court and pleaded not guilty.

A verdict in favor of the plaintiff was returned in the case of Chas. Rogers vs. Elizabeth R. Bruce and judgment allowed in the sum of \$100. A motion for

new trial was filed by the attorneys for the defendant.

H. N. Frost obtained judgment vs. Cuno Sheel in the sum of \$1937 together with interest and attorneys fees.

George Walker, who is held on three counts of forgery pleaded not guilty on two counts and entered a plea of guilty in the other. His case was set for the 18th and 19th, respectively.

Will Kishbaugh pleaded guilty to receiving stolen property.

Earl Bownam pleaded guilty to a similar charge.

The suit on a note brought by A. J. Crawford vs. Santo Gievengio otherwise known as "Little Joe" was compromised and an order issued for defendant to pay his own costs.

The case of J. S. Crozier vs. Cuno Sheel as satisfactorily settled and the costs divided.

Crandall & Co. vs. G. M. Phelps judgment for \$400. was rendered in favor of plaintiff.

S. J. Wilburn who had been previously indicted on the two counts, one charging him with selling intoxicating liquors to

COMPANY "B." COMPLIMENTED

Inspecting Officers are Loud in Their Praise of Local Company in Their Drill and Appearance

TO HAVE ARMORY AND TARGET RANGE

A huge wreath of laurel was placed upon the crown of Company B, First Infantry, New Mexico National Guards at their first inspection, held in the armory last Friday evening.

The armory, which is the large corner room in the Tansill block was affluster, last Friday evening, with flags and bunting and the very atmosphere was full of patriotism preparatory to the first formal inspection of the company since it has been organized some few months ago.

The commissioned officers of the company are Major E. P. Bujac; Capt. C. D. Church; Lieutenants Schwerdtfeger and

company of friends in honor of the visiting guests by Major Bujac at "Armada," his riverside home in La Huerta. Those present were Adj. Gen. Brooks, Capt. McCoy, Capt. Church, Lieut. Schwerdtfeger, Lieut. Bitting, Judge Pope, Judge Brice and Rev. Mr. Mythen.

At half past seven o'clock the Carlsbad band gave a short concert in the armory while it soon filled to overflowing by the citizens of the town who assembled to witness the inspection and who fully enjoyed the music. Promptly at eight o'clock the order to "fall in" was issued and Company B was soon drawn to "attention" and the formality of being inspected by an officer of the United States Army being conducted. After a short drill on the street the company returned to the armory where they were put through the manual of arms and the equipment of each private inspected.

Capt. McCoy paid the company a most appreciative compliment in regard to the work through which they had just passed and also upon their equipment. He stated that it was beyond any doubt the best drilled and best appointed company of any which he had so far inspected while on this trip and further that it was the best company which it had ever been his good fortune to inspect while in the service. While the compliment was doubtless well merited, coming as it did from an inspecting officer from the United States Army it was fully appreciated by the officers and members of the company and will prove a valuable incentive for even better work in the future.

At the conclusion of the inspection a military ball was held complimentary to the visiting officers. About ten o'clock everyone was admitted to the floor and a most delightful evening was spent dancing until about midnight.

Adj. Gen. Brooks told Capt. Church at the conclusion of the inspection that the matter of erecting an armory in Carlsbad and also of procuring a target range for the company would be presented to the next legislature and a bill providing for the same urged for passage.

minors and the other for violating the Sunday laws and who had previously entered a plea of not guilty came again into court and withdrew his former plea and pleaded guilty to both counts. He was fined \$25 and costs on the first count and received a jail sentence of fifteen days on the second which was suspended during good behavior.

Monday after hearing a number of motions and the customary long winded debates upon minor points such as lawyers can invent and argue, the court called the case of the Territory of New Mexico vs. the Moore Bros. charged with murder. While the scene of the crime is east of Monument eighty-two miles from Carlsbad the news of the case had reached Carlsbad and had been discussed on the streets until the matter of procuring a jury to try the case was long drawn out and it was not until about Tuesday noon that a jury was procured. A special venire was drawn and forty-four jurymen were examined before the jury was organized and the introduction of the testimony was begun.

The following citizens were finally secured as a trial jury:

The jury was sworn and one witness examined before noon, being Oliver Greenwood, who was present at the killing. Bales another witness testified in the afternoon and Dr. Sellers also. Yesterday was put in on character witnesses and today the defendants are on the stand.

Secretary Hove of the Water Users Association announces that many of the water users who were delinquent in their payments the last of last month are now coming in and paying up, and having their water returned to them. English Highway Policy.
Two points in the recently proposed British bill to provide for the economic development of the United Kingdom and the improvement of the roads therein are worthy of notice in the United States. The program of the bill provides for special motor roads to be exclusively or chiefly for the use of motorcars, the road board having authority to improve existing roads or to construct new roads for that purpose. The board may acquire land for this purpose by right of eminent domain and may also acquire land adjacent thereto for a width 220 yards distant from the middle of the road, which land they may sell, lease or control, the increment therefrom being used for the maintenance or construction of this class of highways.

THE NOSE COUNTERS GET BUSY

Counting the Men, Women, Children and Dogs in the United States Begins Tomorrow.

BE SURE YOU ARE COUNTED IN ONE OF THE LISTS

Beginning today, the army of census enumerators in the United States will begin the arduous task of counting noses in every state in the union. As every community is anxious to make as good showing as possible in the reports which will be printed later each and every individual should see to it that he, or she, is included in the list. The enumerators are under oath not to disclose any information they receive through the performance of their duties and are also empowered to enforce their claims for answers to their many questions.

A circular letter is being sent out by Paul A. F. Walter, the census supervisor for the territory instructing the stock men about making the proper enumeration of live stock. He has the following to say, in part:

"The enumerators are under oath not to reveal to any tax assessor or any other county or territorial official, or any special agent of the government, the holdings of any stock owner. Owners of stock on partnership or "partido" contracts should report only the stock on their own ranches or under their own immediate control. Stock that is being grazed on other ranches should be reported in the name of the owner or manager of the ranch where found on April 15th."

ANOTHER AW-FUL KILLING

Bill Arnold Kills Albert Luckie at Cedar Point Ranch

MEN WERE OLD TIME FRIENDS.

News reached Carlsbad Wednesday morning of the killing of A. S. Luckie by Bill Arnold at Cedar Point Ranch some fifty miles north-east of Carlsbad at 4:30 Tuesday afternoon. Both were old timers and well known here and the news created quite a sensation among their friends. The following from Wednesday's Roswell Record gives the only reason of the tragedy up-to-date:

"W. T. Arnold, well known among all cow men as 'Old Bill,' aged 61 years, and for 25 years a resident of Roswell county, shot and instantly killed A. S. Luckie a fellow employee, at 4:30 yesterday afternoon at the Cedar Point Camp, fifty miles south-east of Roswell, in Chaves county, at the foot of the hills forming the edge of the plains. Arnold gave himself up at once and will give a complete story of the shooting on the claim that it was justifiable. Upon complaint of Ed Tyson, manager of the Turkey Track Ranch, to whom, as a deputy sheriff, Arnold gave himself up. A warrant has been issued for Arnold, charging him with murder. Upon this charge he will be given a hearing before Justice R. D. Bell, of this city, tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock. Meanwhile, Arnold is out on a bond of \$5,000, signed J. M. Coburn, president of the Turkey Track Company, 'Bud' Wilkinson and J. S. Lea, Mr.

to Artesia last night and brought him to Roswell this morning. Mr. Tyson made the formal complaint with the idea of having the matter legally disposed of.

Arnold is known to all old timers as a peaceable man, never having had trouble before. He has been in the employ of the Turkey Track ranch for 12 years. He never married.

Luckie was about 35 years old and leaves a wife and 4 children, who live at the Cedar Point ranch. He was a brother of Tane Luckie, who has charge of the Turkey Track wagon and is well known over this part of the country.

They had a quarrel, or trouble of some character, while out in the lot near the house. Both men ran to the house for their guns, one going in at one door and the other at another. Arnold had the short-end route and he also called to Luckie's twelve year old daughter to hand him his gun, which was a 45 calibre-shooter. This the girl did and as Arnold started through the door he met Luckie with an open knife. Luckie evidently having given up the idea of finding his gun in time. Arnold fired five shots, killing Luckie instantly. All this, of course, is given by the living man, and he does not desire to make any fuller statement previous to the preliminary hearing tomorrow. No person witnessed the shooting except the little twelve year old girl. A ten year old son heard the difficulty in the lot preceding the killing. Arnold is now stopping at the Grand Central. Immediately after the shooting he sent Jack Avery to phone Manager E. Tyson to send someone out after him, as he had killed a man. Being a deputy sheriff, Tyson sent word for him to come in, and he took him

After the banquet several impromptu speeches were made by Capt. Bujac, C. H. McLenathen and in fact all the guests who were present. The speeches were all eulogistic of the guest of honor many having received much kindness at the hands of Capt. Merchant and all seemed especially anxious to express their appreciation to him while he lived, and as Mr. O'Quinn said, not wait to say it at his funeral. Capt. Merchant as is well known, has recently recovered from a very serious illness wherein his life was for a time despaired of but thanks to a strong vitality and the will of God, he has again recovered, and is his old self apparently. Capt. Bujac announced that Capt. Merchant would constitute one of the committee to go east shortly in the interest of a railway for Carlsbad and that as long as we had him we could count on a strong advocate for Carlsbad. Mr. Osborne was highly commended for his thoughtfulness in getting up the banquet at which not even light wines or any kind of strong drinks were in evidence. The caterer Mr. Bates is too well known as a prince of restaurant men to mention how elegant the spread really was. After the banquet all clasped the hand of the guest of honor and wished him many more years of useful-

ness, and they did not forget to thank Mr. Osborne for his hospitality.

Ordinance No. 101.

An Ordinance changing the names of certain streets in the town of Carlsbad, Eddy County, New Mexico.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the town of Carlsbad, Eddy County, New Mexico as follows:

Section 1. That the streets of the town of Carlsbad, New Mexico, running north and south therein, now and hereafter named Main Street, Canyon Street, Canal Street, Halaguemo Street, Alameda Street, Gaudaloupe Street, Mesquite Street, Lake Street and Mesa Street, respectively, be, and they hereby are, re-named as follows, to wit: "The street heretofore known as Main Street is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as 'Eastern Avenue'; the street now named Canyon Street is hereby named and shall hereafter be known as 'Central Avenue'; the street heretofore known as Canal Street is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as 'Western Avenue'; the street heretofore known as Halaguemo Street is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as 'Church Street'; the street heretofore known as Alameda Street is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as 'Park Avenue'; the street heretofore known as Gaudaloupe Street is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as 'Washington Avenue'; the street heretofore known as Mesquite Street is hereby named, and shall hereafter be known as 'Grand Avenue'."

Section 2. The names of the streets of said town of Carlsbad, running east and west therein are hereby abolished, and said east and west streets are hereby named and shall hereafter be known and designated as follows: What is now known as Lea Street is hereby named First Street; what is now known as Bronson Street is hereby named Second Street; what is now known as Tansill Street is hereby named Third Street; what is now known as Greene Street is hereby named Fourth Street; what is now known as Fox Street is hereby named Fifth Street; what is now known as Mermod Street is hereby named Sixth Street; what is now known as Stevens Street is hereby named Seventh Street; what is now known as Shaw Street is hereby named Eighth Street; what is now known as McKay Street is hereby named Ninth Street; what is now known as Hagerman Street is hereby named Tenth Street; what is now known as Bonbright Street is hereby named Eleventh Street; what is now known as Lucky Street is hereby named Twelfth Street; what is now known as Church Street is hereby named Thirteenth Street; what is now known as Blodgett Street is hereby named Fourteenth Street; and what is now known as Pierce Street is hereby named Fifteenth Street.

Section 3. All other streets in said town of Carlsbad, shall remain named as now named.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and

after its passage and publication as required by law, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Finally passed by the board of trustees of the town of Carlsbad, April 4, 1910.

REPORT OF GRAND JURY

For April 1910 Term of Court Eddy County, New Mexico.

To the Honorable William H. Pope, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the Territory of New Mexico, and presiding Judge of the Fifth Judicial District Court:

We, the members of the Grand Jury impaneled by you for the April Term of 1910, held in Eddy County, hereby submit the following report:

Out of the large number of cases investigated we have found and returned twenty-seven true bills and six no bills. Many witnesses were examined and much testimony heard in numerous other cases where the evidence was deemed insufficient to warrant conviction. Our sole aim has been to enforce the law without respect to persons.

Our deliberations have been entirely harmonious throughout, and aside from the unpleasant task of presenting indictments against persons charged with the violations of the statutes of New Mexico, the session just ended has been one of good feeling. Among the reasons for this condition of affairs we may mention that we have enjoyed the co-operation and courtesy of the court, the district attorney, the sheriff and assistants, and all other persons whose lawful duty it is to maintain morality within the county.

An attempt has been made to limit the expenses incident to the inuiry of our body where such curtailment would not interfere with the ends of justice.

Our committee appointed to inspect the county jail reports as follows:

We, the members of the Grand Jury who have been selected as a committee for the inspection of the Eddy County Jail beg to submit the following report: We have gone thru and inspected the jail and prisoners and find the jail in a clean and sanitary condition. The prisoners are well treated and well cared for and are apparently well pleased with the treatment they are receiving.

Generally speaking, we find that a very wholesome respect for the law exists in all sections of the county, and that a majority of the citizens desire to see this situation maintained and improved. Accordingly our recommendations are limited as to number. Concerning the compulsory school law we would suggest that all teachers and trustees of public schools report any violation of this statute which may come to their notice, to the County Superintendent of Public Instruction. We would also recommend to the various incorporated towns of the county not having in force a curfew law that they speedily adopt and enforce such an ordinance. Believing further action upon our part at this time unnecessary, we beg to submit the above report for the consideration of the
