This Wild Tribe Again on the War Path.

Tramps Take an Iowa Town by Storm.

Gold Mine Discovered in the City of Tacoma.

FRIGHTFUL RAILROAD ACCIDENT

Hermosillo, Mex., Dec. 22.—The Yaqui Indians have started on their winter depredations, and a large number of outrages are reported. Information has reached here that a raid was made on a ranch in the valley of the Yaqui river, and the Indians destroyed all the buildings and killed four cowboys, and drove off hundreds of cattle. An effort will be made to capture the offenders, but they have an almost impregnable stronghold in the Sierra Madre mountains.

Taken by Tramps.
Oskaloosa, Iowa, Dec. 22.—A gang of sixteen tramps held up and robbed the deputy sheriff and a policeman late last night. One tramp was killed and the other badly wounded. The victim is now in a hospital. The tramps were called out to protect the town.

Railroad Accident.
Nashua, N. H., Dec. 22.—A frightful accident occurred last night at Holliston, Worcester, on the Nashua division of the Boston & Maine road. Three were killed and many injured. All were occupants of a single crossing the track, which was straddled by a train.

Fatal Attack.
Hanford, Cal., Dec. 22.—In a desperate shooting affray between J. Byrd and John Harris, both were fatally wounded. Harris met Byrd and drew a revolver and opened fire, which was returned, after which both grappled and were separated with difficulty. Both will certainly die.

New England Society.
New York, Dec. 22.—Hon. Eldon Reed was today elected president of the New England society of New York, and J. Pierpont Morgan, the noted banker, was selected as one of the directors. Tonight the annual banquet of the society will take place.

A Day State Celebration.
Boston, Mass., Dec. 22.—This is "Father's Day," a time honored celebration among the sons and daughters of the Bay State, and in all the principal cities of the country the two hundred and seventy-third anniversary of the landing will be appropriately observed. In this city Governor Russell and Senators Lodge and Hoar will be the principal speakers at this evening's banquet.

Great Preparations.
San Francisco, Dec. 22.—Great preparations are being made for getting the Mid-winter fair on January 1. It will be ushered into existence in a blaze of tropical beauty. The fair at first thought of as an insignificant side-show of the Columbian exposition is now a magnificent exhibition in itself, and comprises seventy-five buildings on one hundred and sixty acres in Golden Gate park.

Gold Ledge Discovered.
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Coughlin's Case.
Chicago, Dec. 22.—Judge Tuttle, presiding in the Coughlin trial, this morning overruled objection to Mrs. Fog's testimony, but placed limitations upon it. He is not prepared to render decision on the question of admitting the testimony of witnesses who could swear to acts of Coughlin's fellow conspirators subsequent to the murder.

Mrs. Fog this morning gave incriminating evidence against Coughlin, tending to show him as a member of a conspiracy to murder Dr. Cronin. She swore to various visits of defendant to her husband, and once heard the former say "I move Cronin at all hazards." Attorney Wing objected to her evidence, but was overruled, which is a great victory for the state.
